Eliminates Guessawork. "To eliminate all 'guess work' from our cooking and have the satisfaction of uniform results, all measurements should be accurate. The lack of accurate measurements more than any other one thing accounts for the frefailure of so many housewives to obtain satisfactory results with any given recipe after its first trial. The reason for this is that when the recipe is first used, the materials and meas-urements are carefully noted and followed painstakingly, but ever after-ward it is 'guess work' with failure as the inevitable result.

'My recipes, as well as those con-tained in any up to date cook book written by a domestic science expert, written by a domestic science expert, call for level measurements. A standard half pint measuring cup for liquids and one for dry ingredients, a standard set of measuring spoons containing four parts—a tablespoon, a teaspoon, half teaspoon and quarter teaspoon—should be included with the kitchen 'tools' of every housewife.

"In measuring flour, which should always be sifted before measuring, it is heaped lightly into a measuring cup—not shaken down—and leveled off with a spatula or the back of a table knife.

PLAN FIGHT ON BILL TO INCREASE GASOLINE TAX

The bill pending before the legislature providing for a special tax of f cents a gallon on gasoline at garages and filling stations is looked upon as unreasonable and unjust to the auto mobile owners by the directors of the Automobile Association of South Texas. At the meeting of the directors of the association last week the provisions of this bill were thoroughly discussed and it was decided that the levying of

and it was decided that the levying of this special tax on gasoline would directly affect the automobile owner because the garage owners and filling station proprietors would add the 3 cents to the price of gasoline.

During the discussion it was pointed out that if money is needed for road repairs it can be raised in a more pease onable way than to place this extratax on gasoline.

The original bill providing for a tax of 1 cent a gallon on gasorine was introduced by Representative Hill of Wheeler and the amendment raising the tax to 2 cents and levying it on the garages and filling stations was offered by Representative Crawford. In order to sheek the passage of the bill if possible, the officers of the association will communicate with the Harris county representatives in the legislature and ask that they oppose the measure. the measure.

Honest Dealers Suffer.

But the career of a stolen car often involves honest dealers as well as disnonest ones. An automobile thief, afbeing identified, may sell it to some used-car dealer as a legitimate used car, posing as the owner. When the car is later found to be stolen, and is traced back to the dealer, he is compelled to make good the purchase price of the innocent buyer. Few persons auspect how heavy dealers' losses run in this connection. One dealer has lost in this way during the past year alone more than \$6000. Consequently, an honest dealer has a strong incentive to prevent any stolen cars from passing

through his hands.

The result of this situation is that he performs an invaluable service to the bureau. A man, for instance, drives into his garage and offers him a car for sale.
