KATY BRIDGE EAST OF CITY DESTROYED

Destroyed in Flames Saturday Night Shortly After Passenger Trains Cross It.

Shortly after a passenger train of the M. K. & T. railroad had passed over the bridge at a point four miles east of Wichita Falls, the bridge was discovered in flames at 11:45 o'clock Saturday night by the crew in charge of a freight train. The bridge was destroyed.

All trains were derailed over the Fort Worth & Denver pending repairs. The bridge was again ready to handle all traffic at 6:00 o'clock Sunday evening. Origin of the fire is unknown.

The M. K. & T. of Texas established an enviable record in February for the number of passenger trains that made runs on schedule time. The entire system in Texas held a record of 94 trains that ran on time. The Wichita Falls & Northwestern led the divisions with a percentage of 95.

The Texas divisions handled a total of 149 passenger trains with but 60 trains that ran behind time. Over the entire system 170 out of a total of 2915 trains arrived late. This gave a percentage of 58 per cent on time.

The Wichita Valley Railway conveyed the Frisco Exposition shows, consisting of 20 cars from Abilene to Wichita Falls. The special trains arrived here at 11:00 o'clock Sunday evening.

RAPID PROGRESS IS BEING MADE WITH SEWER EXTENSIONS

NORTH SIDE WORK NEARLY FINISHED AND FLORAL HEIGHTS PART TO START SOON.

MIDDLE OF MAY TO SEE NEW SYSTEM COMPLETED

Special Attention Being Given To Probable Future Growth In Designing Sewer Routes.

Work on the sewerage extensions in the southern portion of Floral Heights is starting this week, according to an announcement at the city engineer's office Monday. The work on the north side is, with good weather, within about 10 days of completion.

The middle of May will see the sewer work completed, in the opinion of Julian Montgomery, city engineer, who has just returned to duty after being laid up by injuries received in a gas explosion. There are four machine-excavator gangs at work, and a separate contract is caring for the two outlets.

Commenting upon the completeness with which Wichita Falls would be cared for by the construction of the new system, and extensions to the old system, the city engineer remarked that to his knowledge no city in Texas would be so well provided for with regards to the completeness with which the sewage of the present population would be collected, and in the provision for handling the sewage of the future Wichita Falls, for which future ample provisions were made in the design of the system. Mr. Montgomery said that the design, and plans for the future, received very high praise from Mr. Kessler, and that future generations especially would commend the foresight which prompted the making of careful provisions for future growth.

In reply to a question about the design of sewer systems, Mr. Montgomery remarked that such designs, if done properly, required exhaustive data, but was very interesting.

"Certain fundamentals must be followed. A topographic map must be obtained showing the hills, the hollows, the creeks and the ravines. The city must be divided into drainage areas and the sewerage lines designed together with the estimated future population, obtained. The closer the location to the business district, the greater the estimated density of population should be. Infiltration into the sewer system must be allowed for. The maximum amount of water per capita per day must be estimated. The maximum and minimum grades permitted by the topography must be ascertained. All of which information is necessary for the proper design of the size of the sewers."

"It is always necessary to place the sewer mains in the lowest part of the city. They must be close as possible to the creeks and ravines which are always in the lowest part of the terrain. This is because the sewage from the houses and laterals must flow into the mains to be carried away to the river. This means that the mains themselves must be as low as possible so that the sewage from the laterals can flow into them. A careful design also places the mains in the lowest parts, thereby reducing to a minimum the excavation required to get the mains and laterals low enough. Also in this way the mains will have the best chance of draining the hollows and low places.

"Ordinarily, the houses are not connected to the mains, but to the laterals. Often it is impossible to connect houses to the mains. It is of the greatest importance that the mains follow the creeks and ravines. Sometimes this takes them out of the streets and alleys, and runs them through private property. At such times it takes the main through portions of the city which are not at present inhabited. In no instance, in the history of any city having a properly designed sewer system, has it been possible to lay out the mains in any other way; and nat-

urally, a portion of the mains in following the creeks and ravines to a logical outlet, must pass through some territory not inhabited.

"In flat countries, such as a portion of Wichita Falls is, it is very difficult even after following the lowest portions of the terrain, to get the mains low enough to drain long laterals which must have a certain minimum grade and still keep the main high enough to empty into the river. It is always desirable to complete the construction of the mains, even for future provisions, so that when the city builds up, the mains will already be in; and then it will only be necessary to construct the laterals out from the mains, to care for the city as it builds up."

All of the mains, and a large portion of the laterals on the north side have been constructed. When completed, this system, with provisions for future extensions, will take care of the sewage of the north side adequately. A separate outlet has been provided for the north side which will empty into the middle of the river, a good distance outside the city limits. Provision also has been made for carrying this sewage across the river at this point to the south side when treatment becomes necessary.

Most of the mains and sub-mains for the south side system have been completed. It is planned to start machines onto the laterals in the Sibley-Taylor and Fairview additions immediately.

Several thousand feet of extensions to the old system also have recently been constructed on Fifth street and adjacent alleys, and on Broad street, Third and Fourth streets and adjacent territory. These extensions will give relief to a good section of the city.

When the south side system is completed it will serve the following:

1. The unserved section east of the railroads.
2. Sibley-Taylor first and second additions and Cannon Park addition.
3. Future extensions east and south of Holiday creek.
4. Golf club neighborhood and Curlew addition.
5. Factory district and Fairview addition with provisions for extensions to the lake and aviation grounds.
6. Highland addition, west End addition, part of Floral Heights addition and the neighborhood centering around M avenue and Sam Houston school on Grant street.
7. The old system which is now greatly overburdened, will be relieved by tapping it at Grace and Smarsh streets and at Fourteenth and Scott streets.
8. Pumping equipment with electrical starters will be provided at the south side outlet so that during flood stages of the river the sewage can still be forced through the outlet into the river and thus prevent backing up of the sewage into the system and the resultant overflowing into basements, etc.
9. The system is so designed that it will care for the present population and future growth.

DR. HOOVER ELECTED KIWANIS' PRESIDENT

New Club Elects Permanent Organization Monday—Other Officers Chosen.

Permanent organization of the Kiwanis club was effected Monday noon when members of the club met for the weekly luncheon at the Kemp. Officers were elected as follows: Dr. M. W. Hoover, president; William Viney, vice-president; Ben E. Neal, secretary; Homer Lee, treasurer; these four, with Rhea Howard, Carter Motinger, Rev. F. T. Dutton, Al Poth, Jovette Bonner, G. J. Moulder and H. S. Baum, directors.

The club adopted its constitution and by-laws; permanent committees will be named later in the week.

Dr. Hoover was presented with the "big stick" of Kiwanis by Al Stiners, organizer; the new president promised to wield it with discretion.

A rising vote of thanks was extended Mr. Stiners, who has been here for several weeks getting the club started, and who will leave shortly. Responding, Mr. Stiners called attention of members to the fact that Kiwanis is more than a lunch club in other cities in Texas and elsewhere.

"It is a real power throughout the country," Mr. Stiners declared.

He urged local Kiwanians to plan to attend the international convention to be held in Cleveland next summer. The Fort Worth club will make an effort to secure the 1922 meeting for that city, Mr. Stiners said.

The officials delivery of the charter will be made to the club in the near future by the district governor, and it will be the occasion for a formal celebration.

A very large percentage of the members attended Monday's luncheon. A vocal selection by Paul Von Allman, with Miss Shafer as accompanist, was a very enjoyable feature. RAPID PROGRESS IS BEING MADE WITH SEWER EXTENSIONS

NORTH SIDE WORK NEARLY FINISHED AND FLORAL HEIGHTS PART TO START SOON.

MIDDLE OF MAY TO SEE NEW SYSTEM COMPLETED

Special Attention Being Given To Probable Future Growth In Designing Sewer Routes.

Work on the sewerage extensions in the southern portion of Floral Heights is starting this week, according to an announcement at the city engineer's office Monday. The work on the north side is, with good weather, within about 10 days of completion. The middle of May will see the sewer work completed, in the opinion of Julian Montgomery, city engineer, who has just returned to duty after being laid up by injuries received in a gas explosion. There are four machine-excavator gangs at work, and a separate contract is caring for the two outlets.

Commenting upon the completeness with which Wichita Falls would be cared for by the construction of the new system, and extensions to the old system, the city engineer remarked that to his knowledge no city in Texas would be so well provided for with regards to the completeness with which the sewage of the present population would be collected, and in the provision for handling the sewage of the future Wichita Falls, for which future ample provisions were made in the design of the system. Mr. Montgomery said that the design and plans for the future, received very high praise from Mr. Kessler, and that future generations especially would commend the foresight which prompted the making of careful provisions for future growth.

In reply to a question about the design of sewer systems, Mr. Montgomery remarked that such a design, if done properly, required exhaustive data, but was very interesting. "Certain fundamentals must be followed. A topographical map should be obtained showing the hills, the hollows, the creeks and the ravines. The city must be divided into drainage areas and the sewerage of each gathered together with the estimated future population, obtained. The closer the location to the business district, the greater the estimated density of population should be. Infiltration into the sewer system must be allowed for. The maximum amount of water per capita per day must be estimated. The maximum and minimum grades permitted by the topography must be ascertained. All of which information is necessary for the proper design of the size of the sewerage."

"It is always necessary to place the sewer mains in the lowest part of the city. They must be close as possible to the creeks and ravines which are always in the lowest part of the terrain. This is because the sewage from the houses and laterals must flow into the mains to be carried away to the river. This means that the mains themselves must be as low as possible so that the sewage from the laterals can flow into them. A careful design always places the mains in the lowest parts, thereby reducing to a minimum the excavation required to get the mains and laterals low enough. Also in this way the mains will have the best chance of draining the hollows and low places."

"Ordinarily, the houses are not connected to the mains, but to the laterals. Often it is impossible to connect houses to the mains. It is of the greatest importance that the mains follow the creeks and ravines. Sometimes this takes them out of the streets and alleys, and runs them through private property. At other times it takes the mains through portions of the city which are not at present inhabited. In no instance, in the history of any city having a properly designed sewer system, has it been possible to lay out the mains in any other way; and nat-

urally, a portion of the mains in following the creeks and ravines to a logical outlet; must pass through some territory not inhabited.

"In flat countries, such as a portion of Wichita Falls is, it is very difficult even after following the lowest portions of the terrain, to get the mains low enough to drain long laterals which must have a certain minimum grade. A separate outlet has been provided for the north side which will empty into the middle of the river, a good distance outside the city limits. Provision also has been made for the main to cross the river at this point to the south side when treatment becomes necessary.

Most of the mains and sub-mains for the south side system have been completed. It is planned to start machines onto the laterals in the Sibley-Taylor and Fairview additions immediately. Several thousand feet of extensions to the old system also have recently been constructed on Fifth street and adjacent alleys, and on Broad street, Third and Fourth streets and adjacent territory. These extensions will give relief to a good section of the city.

When the south side system is completed it will serve the following:

1. The unsewered section east of the railroads.
2. Sibley-Taylor first and second additions and Cannon Park addition.
3. Future extensions east and south of Holiday creek.
4. Golf club neighborhood and Curlew addition.
5. Factory district and Fairview addition with provisions for extensions to the lake and aviation grounds.
6. Highland addition, west End addition, part of Floral Heights addition and the neighborhood centering around M avenue and Sam Houston school on Grant street.
7. The old system which is now greatly overburdened, will be relieved by tapping it at Grace and Smarsh streets and at Fourteenth and Scott streets.
8. Pumping equipment with electrical starters will be provided at the south side outlet so that during flood stages of the river the sewage can still be forced through the outlet to the river and thus prevent backing up of the sewerage into the system and the resultant overflowing into basements, etc.
9. The system is so designed that it will care for the present population and future growth.

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"RESPECTABILITY" IS SUNDAY MORNING THEME AT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

By FRANK'S REID.
Dr. Grafton's subject of his morning sermon at the First Presbyterian Church, "Clove of Respectability," contained some very interesting thoughts applicable to our daily lives.

He made reference to the white-washed sepulchres and the thought and custom they brought to the Jews. Said Dr. Grafton:

"These white-washed sepulchres in which were dead men's bones were familiar with the landscape of the country in which they were located. The Jews did not bury their dead as we do, in graves, but in caves in the hillsides and the doors to that grave were closed by means of a large flat stone. Annually the Jews would go to these sepulchres for the benefit of beautiful flowers from the hillsides to lay upon a sepulchre, for to do this meant an unclean body, but through a certain ceremony performed by the Pharisees, the spirit of the temple the body would become clean again. In his application of this, as he observed the Pharisees, Christ said you are full of dead men's bones. That was a terrible arraignment for the Lord to make to these Pharisees, said Dr. Grafton."

"Yet He knew they were wearing the cloak of respectability, though down in their hearts they were sinners. They were doing things that were a shock to society, yet the Lord knew their thoughts and intentions."

Said Dr. Grafton: "What is respectability? It is a sin that carries with it no stigma; it is a sin that is tolerated by the public. A man may be very respectable in society, does not have any doors shut in his face, seems to be absolutely all right, measures up to the standards of men and women, and is fairly satisfied, but as the Lord said, 'You are like the sepulchre, clean on the outside and full of dead men's bones.'"

Continuing, said Dr. Grafton: "Respectable sin is governed by commercial standards. Society smiles upon certain sins. Society shuts the door in the face of certain people and opens it in the face of others, wearing the cloak of respectability. It is a sliding scale. In one place the door will be shut in the face of a man guilty of a certain sin. In another city or town that sin will be received with a smile and will be passed upon as being all right. These people carry the cloak of respectability, nobody frowns upon them, no one condemns them. This is the lesson that Christ teaches," said Dr. Grafton.

"What was the attitude of Jesus in this respect?" said Dr. Grafton. "His attitude was one of condemnation. His attitude towards the man who violated the laws of God in society was one of tenderness."

"There was one time in Christ's life," said Dr. Grafton, "when Jesus was angered, and that was when he went into the temple and saw the men congregated there—respectable sinners—and he reminded them that the house was God's house of prayer and not one of a den of thieves and every one of them went out of God's house and respected it thereafter. Christ absolutely had no respect for a man who wore the cloak of respectability and did not at the same time respect the laws of Almighty God."

"Why was this attitude of Christ so pronounced?" said Dr. Grafton. "First, because respectable sin denotes conscience. Second, because respectable sin is evil in its influence, and third, because respectable sin dishonors God."

12,000 ATTENDED AUTO SHOW LAST WEEK, SAYS COMMITTEE'S ESTIMATE

Attendance at the Automobile Show last week has been officially estimated at 12,000. No effort was made to keep a record of the number of visitors, but dealers thought 12,000 a conservative figure.
