### \$5,000 IS QUOTA FOR IRISH RELIEF FUND

Committee Named at Meeting Tuesday Night to Raise Funds for Women and Children.

Wichita Falls' quota in the nationwide campaign that will be waged tomorrow—St. Patrick's day—for the relief of the suffering women and children in Ireland was set at \$5,000 Tuesday night at a meeting of the local workers in the chamber of commerce rooms.

After a few introductory remarks by J. L. McMahon, who is in charge of the Wichita Falls district, the meeting was turned over to Mayor Cline. Mr. Cline stated that this was the first time Wichita Falls had ever been called upon to aid the suffering in Ireland and that this subscription would be raised regardless of political or religious creeds.

Committees were named to solicit the business districts of the city and shanties will be placed on sale at street corners, hotel and building lobbies and every place accessible to the public.

J. F. O'Donohoe was elected treasurer of the local branch of the American committee and C. H. Francis was appointed secretary.

Little difficulty is expected to be encountered by the solicitors in reaching the \$5,000 goal as they believe the amount is small and well within the means of the Wichita Falls citizens.

BACK TO THE FARM.

A New York realty firm which handles farm land sales throughout the country reports a decided drift from the city to the farms. The records of the company for the past 20 years have shown almost invariably that two-thirds of their sales have been to farmers who are moving from one state to another. The records from the past 12 months show that two-thirds of the sales are now being made to city folks who are moving to the farms.

Periods of industrial depression have always seen a back to the farm movement. Folks who are tempted to the cities during times of expansion and flush times remember when periods of depression and lack of employment came that a living is much more certain from the farm than anything else, and if they can get back to the farm, many of them go.

ARMOUR COMPANY TO TRY INDUSTRIAL DEMOCRACY.

The Armour packing company has asked its workmen to elect representatives for an industrial democracy, which it is proposed to establish in Armour plants. This democracy is to be a medium whereby matters of mutual interest to the employees and the company may be discussed and adjusted.

Industrial democracy apparently is making headway in American industry. It is in successful operation in a number of plants in different parts of the country. One of the big corporations which has adopted industrial democracy is the Standard Oil company.

Editorial Echoes

Duels, Old and New. (Shreveport Times) Two Texas congressmen posted bets, \$1,000 each, the issue being "Who's a liar?"

Not being on speaking terms any longer, they addressed each other sharply in the notes that passed between them, the veracity of each being at issue. Duelling thus by mail, they derived as much satisfaction and were as entertaining to the public as those elder statesmen who fought their duels at 18 paces.

Besides, no one gets hurt. In former days duelling was the sport of American statesmen until the mortality rate became so high that various states felt obliged to pass anti-duelling laws.

The most famous of all duels between statesmen was that engaged in by Henry Clay and John Randolph, a United States senator from Virginia. Clay had been named secretary of state by President John Quincy Adams, whose election had been made possible by the withdrawal of Clay from the presidential race.

Randolph denounced the appointment of Clay as the offspring of a corrupt bargain and hurled some deadly epithets, as statesmen know so well how to do in those times.

Clay challenged Randolph, and in the resulting duel Clay fired the first shot, but Randolph wouldn't fire back. Whereupon the duel ended.

Before he became president Andrew Jackson killed a man in a duel that resulted from a quarrel over a horse.

Who, me? I sed.

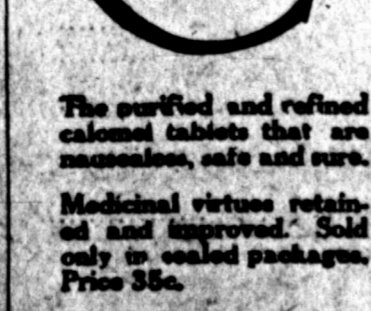

UNABLE TO IDENTIFY WORM DAMAGING THE WHEAT IN WILBARGER

VERNON, TEXAS, March 16.—Samples of a cut worm which is ravaging certain parts of the county sent to A. and M. college and the United States bureau of entomology at San Antonio by the county agent are defying the efforts of the experts at identification for the present, at least. County Farm Demonstrator Jones has been informed that it will be necessary to wait until the adults can be hatched before the correct identity of the worm can be established. Both the bureau at San Antonio and the expert at A. and M. college have intimated that the specimens submitted are those of the corn ear worm, and in that event it will be necessary to take every precaution to check their progress.

A specialist from the San Antonio bureau of entomology was in Vernon Sunday and examined specimens of the worms in the fields. In his opinion, also, it is the corn ear worm.

Fifteen or about twenty acres of wheat near Fargo have been nearly destroyed by the worm and the county agent is of the opinion that it may be found in other parts of the county as well. As yet no serious proportions have developed but all efforts will be made to prevent them.

WILBARGER FARMERS TO REDUCE COTTON ACREAGE ABOUT TWENTY PER CENT

VERNON, TEXAS, March 16.—A recent survey by the county farm demonstrator of the cotton crop in Wilbarger indicates that the acreage next year will be cut down about twenty per cent by the end of the month. When cash is offered for ginning, charges by the local operators are thirty cents per 100 pounds. In most instances, however, seed are being offered as remuneration, and these are accepted on the basis of twenty cents per hundred pounds of cotton ginned. A count taken recently from local gins showed that over 16,000 bales of cotton have been ginned here by three establishments thus far this season.

Local gins continue to do a flourishing business, but a slackening has been felt for the last two weeks. With a continuance of fair weather, in the opinion of the ginners, picking will be concluded by the end of the month.

When cash is offered for ginning, charges by the local operators are thirty cents per 100 pounds. In most instances, however, seed are being offered as remuneration, and these are accepted on the basis of twenty cents per hundred pounds of cotton ginned.
