

TEST OF REPUBLICAN LEADERSHIP TO COME OVER DISARMAMENT

BORAH RESOLUTION TO PROVIDE ISSUE IN SENATE THIS WEEK.

DEFEAT OF PROPOSITION CONFIDENTLY EXPECTED

Plan to Make Vote a Matter of Confidence in the Harding Administration.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—A test of republican leadership in the senate, which is expected to prove to President Harding that senate republicans are standing almost solidly with him, is due this week on the Borah naval disarmament proposal in connection with the navy appropriation bill.

Republican leaders are letting it be known unofficially today that they intend to make the vote of Borah's proposal "a matter of confidence" in their leadership. They want to set at rest the grip of republican leadership on the rank and file of republicans in the senate is slipping and at the same time improve what they call "democratic canards" regarding a "break" between Harding and republican senators on foreign affairs.

This is because a good many republican senators, including some of the new ones from the middle west and northwest, are inclined to be impressed by Borah's arguments for economy. He not only wants the international conference, he is fighting determined for a reduction of the \$100,000,000 increase.

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SAYS MEXICO WILL NOT SIGN PROTOCOL WITH UNITED STATES

MEXICO CITY, May 13.—Mexico cannot and will not sign a formal protocol as a condition to recognition by the United States, President Obregon told newspaper men last night in referring to President Harding's policy as outlined in dispatches received here on Tuesday. He declined to comment on the policy pursued by the United States further than declaring he had received letters recently from friends in Washington, who assured him they see in President Harding, Secretary Hughes and Assistant Secretary Fletcher three men with extremely cordial feelings toward Mexico, who apparently are inclined to re-establish relations between the two countries.

Although President Obregon has insisted that this government cannot sign a formal treaty or protocol, it is known here that an informal exchange of communications between the two governments which would be tantamount to formal conferences, would not be rejected by the Mexican government. Close friends of President Obregon assert he is willing to give the United States any information it desires relative to conditions in Mexico. Assurances have been given as to safeguards and guarantees for foreign investments, and various public declarations by President Obregon indicate, he believes, such assurances are ample and sufficient to prove the nation's stability and its right to recognition.

Referring to Great Britain's evident intention to withhold recognition until safeguards are given, the foreign office stated last night that the Mexican government wishes at all times to return all confiscated property to its legitimate owners and to pay for damage suffered during revolutions.

"Not for one moment," the statement added, "does the Mexican government wish to Mexico the prospect of a less to appropriate goods belonging to another, either a foreigner or a Mexican."

AMNESTY OFFERED THE TROOPS UNDER GENERAL WRANGEL

RIGA, May 12.—The Russian soviet government has offered amnesty to all the officers and soldiers of the army of General Wrangel, former anti-soviet leader of south Russia, who now are hiding in the Crimean mountains, provided they surrender their arms before May 20, according to advices received here today. Amnesty also has been offered to all civilians who participated in the operation of General Wrangel on General Denikin in 1918 and 1919.

Seven hundred of General Wrangel's soldiers who have arrived in Odessa have been granted the right of franchise by the soviet.

SURPRISED TO LEARN FURTHER PROOF REQUIRED

MEXICO CITY, May 12.—Mexico City newspapers, except Excelsior, which makes brief editorial comment, were silent today concerning the Mexican policy of President Harding as announced Tuesday.

Excelsior declares it is surprised to learn that Mr. Harding will require further proof from President Obregon of his ability to stabilize the country, pointing out the vast difference between conditions prevailing now and those of a year ago. It adds that the United States is holding the entire Mexican nation to blame for the faults of a few individuals, principally the followers of the late President Carranza, to Mexico, the paper asserts, might in justice declare it has suffered from the United States as exemplified by the acts of former President Wilson and his adherents.

With a largely attended "love feast" Friday afternoon, as a closing feature, the 34th annual convention of the Texas Christian Missionary convention entered upon its final activities. It was expected to adjourn late Friday to meet next year in San Antonio.

MAY SUPPLEMENT RANGERS SALARIES TO KEEP THEM HERE

CUT IN PAY RESULTS IN ACTION
BEING TAKEN BY BUSINESS
COUNCIL FRIDAY.

ANOTHER EFFORT PLANNED TO GET TRAFFIC ORDINANCE

Committee Named to See Aldermen—
Zoo May Soon Be Established
At Lake Wichita.

Unless the \$110 per month salaries of the three Texas rangers here are supplemented from unofficial sources, the state officers cannot continue on duty here, it was stated at Friday's luncheon of the business council, at which steps were taken to provide funds to make the rangers' pay \$200 per month until the legislature can act.

The rangers formerly received \$200 per month, but action taken at the last session of the legislature resulted in their pay being cut to \$110. This amount, members of the force contend, is insufficient to live on, and individuals who want the rangers kept here saw that the matter was brought to the attention of the chamber of commerce.

The business council recommended that the directors take necessary action to provide the additional \$90 per month, and the directors are expected to act on the matter shortly.

While the matter was under discussion, Horace Robbins said that the auto theft situation had shown some improvement since rangers were sent here; that not only had the number of thefts decreased, but more cars were recovered; automobile insurance companies, Mr. Robbins said, were taking more liberal attitude toward insuring risks here since the rangers came.

General Manager Harrison, who presided at the meeting, announced that the preliminary survey had been taken for establishment of a zoo here, a tract on the lake road being available for such a purpose. Efforts would be made later, he said, to obtain animals. Somebody suggested that there should be no trouble in obtaining wildcats.

Mr. Harrison reported to the council on several organization activities, including the recommendation for tourist camp site purchase, employment of a county agricultural agent and other matters.

A committee consisting of Messrs. Randie, Rogers and Robbins was named to find out why the city council had pigeonholed the carefully drawn traffic ordinance submitted by the business council several months ago. Members expressed the opinion that some legislation on traffic matters was necessary. The question of residential street lights was raised by C. W. Beavers, Councilman Curlee explaining that the 500 lights ordered some months ago are being installed as rapidly as possible, but that lack of material is delaying progress.

STOCKMEN TO MEET SATURDAY MORNING TO PLAN FOR EXHIBIT

Formation of a district live stock organization, with a view to erecting a pavilion and holding annual exhibits here, will be considered at a meeting called for 10:30 Saturday morning at the chamber of commerce. Stockmen in Wichita and adjoining counties have been invited to attend the meeting.

If tentative plans of some of the progressive stockmen can be realized, an annual live stock exhibit will be held here in the hope of stimulating and encouraging live stock raising in this county. This plan was advanced some weeks ago by George Kajtch, a stock raiser whose entries have taken prizes.

INTERNATIONAL FUR EXCHANGE REPORTS A LARGE DEFICIT

ST. LOUIS, May 12.—The International Fur Exchange, the largest wholesale fur house in the United States, has issued a statement to its stockholders informing them that a deficit of \$9,202,427.15 exists in the finances of the company.

The statement says that reorganization plans are being considered by large stockholders.

"The sudden and violent collapse in the spring of 1920 of the wholesale market in furs was given as the reason for the condition of the company's business."

The statement announced the assets as \$8,562,166.91 and the indebtedness as \$18,965,604.06.

The notification is signed by Phillip R. Pouke, president, by order of the board of directors.

"YOUR LAST CHANCE" ADDRESS THEME AT HIGH SCHOOL FRIDAY

"This is your last chance," was the text of an inspiring address delivered to students of the local high school by Rev. Chalmers McPherson, newly elected president of the Texas Christian Missionary convention Friday morning, an address which brought out the main idea that the present opportunities for learning are the last that the younger generation may have, and that a day lost now is lost forever.

The speaker dwelt at length on the necessity for thinking, emphasizing at the same time the equal necessity of thinking clearly and in a Christian manner if the thing we term success is to be acquired.

"One of the most lamentable habits of school children today," he declared, "is their thoughtlessness and unappreciative spirit toward those who are giving their lives to fit the students for the great battles of life, and it should not be so."

Mr. McPherson then said that the most overworked and underpaid body of men and women in the country were the school teachers, and added to this was the fact that but very few of their pupils ever expressed gratitude for the work and time which the instructors put in with them.

He then gave the story of Blake Van Neal of Bonham, who now holds the chair of professor of hydraulic engineering at the University of California, although only 27 years of age. He traced Van Neal's rise from a street orphan's home, through a minor college and into Purdue University, the greatest civil engineering school in the country, from which he graduated with highest honors. The appreciative attitude displayed by the boy and the manner in which he took pains to thank those who were instrumental in his success were cited by the speaker as an example of what one great man thought of the matter.

Following Mr. McPherson's talk, Harry Kahne, mental concentration expert now appearing at the Wichita theatre, was presented for a brief exhibition of his powers, and completely dumfounded the students with his feats. Mixing up letters, sentences, writing upside down and backward, keeping up an incessant line of conversation and answering questions fired at him by the unashamed audience afforded an entertainment which was thoroughly enjoyed by pupils and

WARNS PARENTS NOT TO ALLOW CHILDREN TO HOOK AUTO RIDES

"Some child is going to be killed one of these days if they don't stop trying to hook rides on automobiles," says Chief of Police Huff, who has had dozens of complaints of this nature within the past week, "and then an awful cry will go up about the reckless driving in the city."

"This situation has been growing worse this spring," says the chief, "and it's a miracle that some one has not been killed before this."

School children are the main offenders, police officers say, and the lengths to which some of them will go in order to catch a ride to school is the last word in recklessness. Youngsters in knee pants are in the habit of dashing squarely in front of a machine, forcing it, and then making pointed remarks about the driver when he lets loose a storm of protest at their foolhardiness.

The police can do little about the matter, and the only remedy is for the parents of children to give them orders to stay out of the streets.

NEW AND APPARENTLY PRODUCTIVE SAND FOUND IN SOUTH ELECTRA FIELD

What is believed to be one of the best oil sands yet discovered in the Electra field has been reached in the independent test now being drilled by Roy I. Carter on a 160 tract offsetting the Emeric lease five miles southeast of Electra. The sand was struck at 1550 feet and was drilled through seven feet, the oil showing in richer quantities as the drill went lower.

This is a new sand for that portion of Electra territory, other production having been found at 700 feet and again at 1455 feet. Casing was being set on the Carter well Friday and was to be completed not later than Monday, after which the hole was to be cleaned and placed on the pump.

EX-SENATOR GORE OF OKLAHOMA CANCELS HIS UNIVERSITY CLUB DATE

Knowing the local interest in oil questions and taxation the University club had expected ex-Senator Gore of Oklahoma to speak at its luncheon Tuesday next. The senator has, however, been in Washington on business engagements for the past few days and has wired the secretary of the University club that he regrets his inability to appear Tuesday as planned, but hopes soon to avail himself of the invitation extended him.

The club has therefore made other arrangements for Tuesday's program, but hopes to have Senator Gore or some other oil and tax expert on its program soon, unless greater interest should appear in other subjects.

"Beer for All" Is the Chicago Policy Put into Practice

CHICAGO, May 13.—Bar eyes of the nation today were focused upon Chicago—the oasis in the great Volstead-ise desert.

Oliver J. Remmers, attorney for the Anheuser-Busch Brewing company, St. Louis, puts this in the headlines following his testimony before the house judiciary committee in which he charged real beer was being sold openly in Chicago.

"You said a steinful, Oliver," was the way the exposé was received here by patrons of the backstreet "dry" cafes. "Here's how."

Remmers' demand for a congressional investigation did not worry saloon keepers here who haven't handled near beer for two months.

"Drink hearty, boys, they're just jealous of us," was the frequent remark from behind the mahogany.

Large steins from four to six per cent beer were still being sold today at from 25 to 30 cents a copy. The no proof of "good fellowship" was demanded in most cafes.

During the last few weeks the "good old days" have come another step nearer—the great neighborhood habit of inelegantly "shooting the can" to the corner saloon has returned. The only difference is that a good sized "can costs about seventy cents instead of a dime."

During Remmers' testimony, which was presented to the hearing on whether beer should be sold as medicine, he read a statement from August Busch, head of the Anheuser-Busch company, which said the policy of the company is "beer for all or beer for none."

IT'S MILKWEED THAT GIVES BITTER TASTE TO BUTTER, AND IT CAN'T BE HELPED

"If the ice cream you buy these days tastes bitter, or if fresh country butter has a rather unpalatable odor, blame it on nature and not the merchant," says Dr. A. H. Douglas, director of the city health department.

A number of complaints have been received lately by the department, stating that butter, ice cream and milk had a peculiar taste, which was decidedly unpleasant. This is caused, according to Douglas, by bitter weed or milk weed, which is now thriving in all surrounding pastures and which forms one of the principle articles of honey's diet.

The weed flavors the milk, it is said, which of course imparts the unpleasant taste to the butter and ice cream manufactured from it. The condition is unpleasant, but not at all harmful and will be of but short duration. No remedy can be made at present, for the weed grows in all pastures where the cows graze.

BORAH PROVIDES THE ONE EMBARRASSMENT FOR ADMINISTRATION

FIGHT ON DISARMAMENT MARS HARMONY BETWEEN CONGRESS AND PRESIDENT.

TO PRESS RESOLUTION INTRODUCED IN SENATE

Hard to Define Distinction Between Senator and President on This Question.

WASHINGTON, May 12.—The only difference between President Harding and congress that promises real embarrassment to him is Senator Borah's fight on disarmament. There is no real difference over what President Harding has done in Europe. The senators are reconciled to that so far as it goes. It is possible that in time participation in European affairs may reach a point where the irreconcilable senators will fight again, but that isn't likely.

On disarmament, however, there is the possibility of real embarrassment for President Harding. Senator Borah is going to press his resolution, and either in the senate or in the house or both, there is enough sentiment in favor of disarmament to that so far as a fight successful. That sentiment may not show itself immediately, but very much of it will be restrained by a feeling of generosity toward President Harding of not wishing to embarrass him.

Just what is the distinction between President Harding and Senator Borah on disarmament?

Senator Borah is hard to define. President Harding says he favors disarmament, and President Harding says that in the course of time when the conditions are ripe and the occasion is becoming, he will take steps toward disarmament. Senator Borah and those who follow him think there is no reason why these steps should not be taken immediately.

It is difficult to say concretely what reasons President Harding has for postponing his initiative towards disarmament. His reasons may be more important than the mere fact that he is busy with many other things. In his talks with senators favoring disarmament, who have gone to see him, President Harding has convinced them of his sympathy with the idea. But as for taking an immediate step, he has the hesitancy which a man in a position of responsibility often has, compared with another man who is really a propagandist for a cause that is not his own.

It may well be that President Harding will welcome Senator Borah's fight, that he will be glad to have his hand forced to take a definite position on disarmament. He is a man of strong expression of public opinion demanding that he make the move toward disarmament. Nobody doubts that the bulk of the American people want an agreement for disarmament. Nobody doubts that the British people want it. These are the only three nations concerned.

In addition to the peoples of these nations, many of their statesmen want disarmament. But others of the statesmen of these three countries are restrained by natural conservatism, by the hesitancy that often goes with responsibility, or by the temperament that waits for some one else to take the first step.

May Become Impatient.
The danger that faces President Harding and the United States is that if he fails to take a step towards disarmament by agreement among the three nations the result may be that the American people will become impatient and begin disarmament separately. That would be a pity. No responsible person wants to see the United States disarmed while Japan and Great Britain go on with their great naval program. The only way to forestall an impatient and headlong demand for disarmament on the part of the people of the United States is to satisfy the people by taking the first step toward an agreement among the nations. There is unmistakable vitality in the determination on the part of the people of the United States. It is reflected in the hearts of congress, and sooner or later it will be reflected in the votes of congress. Congress wants to be patient. The congressmen all like President Harding. They sympathize with his difficulties. They would rather do almost anything in the world than embarrass him or make trouble for him, but sooner or later they will take the step toward disarmament unless he does it first.

Party leaders know well how formidable the coming church movement towards disarmament may be. Such a determination and such a step on the part of great numbers inspired with religious passion might well turn out to be that spiritual solvent of the world's trouble which many claim must come sooner or later. The man who had much to do with starting this church movement, General Tamm H. Bliss, is one of those figures whose personality is much bigger than the public knowledge of it.

American Commission.
He was, as everybody knows, one of the American commissioners to the peace conference, and as a few people know, he was one of the most courageous and wisest men in Paris. For a generation, in one way or another usually as a soldier of the highest reputation, but occasionally as a civilian servant with important duties, General Bliss has been contributing wisdom and idealism to the public business of the United States. In his letter to the churches General Bliss said: "If the churches cannot agree upon a demand for an international conference, it will not be done, nor will it be done until the good God puts into them the proper spirit of their religion. The responsibility is entirely upon the professing Christians of the United States. If another war like the last one comes they will be responsible for every drop of blood that will be shed and for every dollar wastefully expended."

Such excited conviction as that coming from a man of General Bliss' standing and character and addressed to an officially existing group which includes the Protestant churches, the Catholic churches of America, might turn out to be the beginning of a spiritual movement for more effective work toward ending the world's troubles than all the wandering in blind alleys that the politicians and economists have been doing.

OIL STANDS 600 FEET IN MONA MARIE TEST T. W. ROBERTS FARM

W. E. Fridy, one of the trustees of the Mona Marie Trust company, reports a new oil find on the T. W. Roberts farm located in the northeast corner of section 20, about one mile northeast of Fowler. The sand was found at a depth of 901 feet and was drilled eight feet in the sand. The well was reported to be standing 600 feet in oil and is estimated at 50 barrels or better. This well is in strictly wildcat territory, being about one mile northeast of the Powell well. The Mona Marie Trust company holds an 80-acre lease and have made another location for well No. 2 and will begin drilling this week. Trustees of the company are W. E. Fridy, W. S. Robertson and J. B. Hatchitt.

In Archer county the Radtke Drilling company No. 1 Netherton have tested their 1200 foot sand, and as it did not show enough to warrant a commercial producer, the company has decided to continue drilling to the deeper sand.

The Battlesnake Oil company on the Dr. Nettleton ranch, which has been shut down while waiting on their 121-inch casing, has again started drilling. This test is located about one and one-half miles south of the proven field in Archer county. The company is owned by L. Helmsing, Joe La Croix, Rogers, Kazan and others. Developments in this section will be watched closely.

Couch-Winfree Oil company No. 1 Nat Henderson, one and one-half miles northwest of the Texhoma discovery well, is reaming down to find sand to set their 4 1/2 casing on the sand, which was encountered at about 1615 feet.

COURT DECISION UPHOLDS BRITISH RECOGNITION OF THE SOVIET GOVERNMENT

LONDON, May 12.—The initial judicial decision affecting the British government's tacit recognition of the soviet as the de facto government of Russia was rendered today when the court of appeals reversed a previous finding of the high court in the disputed ownership of a quantity of veneer and other wood material shipped from Russia under a contract made by Louis Krassin, the soviet trade commissar.

The goods, confiscated by the soviet in 1919, were sold to a firm of British importers. The British court found the original owners entitled to the goods, as the soviet government had not been recognized by the British government and consequently had not the right of confiscation.

The court of appeals found that since the soviet government had been recognized as the de facto government of Russia it was not within the jurisdiction of the British courts to consider the justice or morality of the confiscatory order.

THIRD TRAIN SERVICE INTO MEXICO IS PLAN

HOUSTON, May 12.—Opening of the third train service between the United States and Mexico City will probably result from the visit of W. R. Scott, president of the Southern Pacific lines, headquarters in Houston, to Mexico City, it was learned here today.

The Gulf Coast line has sleeping car connections with the Mexican National lines at Brownsville for the Mexican capital, and the I. & G. N. connects at Laredo from San Antonio. The Southern Pacific would connect with the National lines at Eagle Pass. Leon Salinas, president of the National Mexican lines, is accompanying Scott to the capital in Scott's private car.

HENRIETTA WILL PAVE THE BUSINESS SECTION

HENRIETTA, TEXAS, May 12.—With the \$40,000 sanitary sewer system nearing completion, Henrietta is shortly to undertake another important civic improvement, the paving of the business section. Bonds to the amount of \$20,000 have been voted and work is to start early in the summer; property owners will bear a portion of the expense.

Mr. Taylor has been employed by the Valley and Denver railroads in this city for many years and had a host of friends in this city. His fellow employees at the railroad offices presented him with a silver set. He will assume the duties of agent at Gore after May 25.

NEARLY 60 PER CENT OF EARNINGS OF M. K. & T. FOR WAGES

During 1920 58.3 cents out of each dollar of earnings of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railway company went to pay wages, according to figures made public here. The exact amount paid out during that year was \$12,523,000 in comparison with \$15,210,000 for 1919, during which year the percentage was 43.3 per cent. The Texas Special of the M. K. & T. arrived at San Antonio on time every day during the month of April, according to the official bulletin of the company, and arrived at St. Louis on time every day except one. While passenger trains are making an excellent on-time record, reflecting the improvement in railroad service, the Katy is making a corresponding showing in freight service. In March 94.4 per cent of all scheduled merchandise cars arrived at destination on time and the April record was equally as good. The Wichita Falls and Northwestern railroad made an enviable record during April for on-time passenger trains finishing the month with 100 per cent. During the thirty days 253 trains were operated on time. Over the entire system of the M. K. & T. from April 25 to 30 824 merchandise cars were carried, of which number 804 or 97.1 per cent were on time. H. G. Smith, division freight and passenger agent of the M. K. & T. railroad, left Friday for Dallas on business. He will return Monday morning on the special chamber of commerce train from Dallas, which arrives here at 4:15 a. m. The Dallas chamber of commerce is making a tour of cities in Texas and Oklahoma.

TO START BAILING ON J. I. STALEY TEST

Grisham Well Nears Interesting Depth in Archer County. Other Oil News.

Bailing is expected to start Friday on the test of J. I. Staley & Co. on the Coffin, in the new Archer county pool, having completed the setting of casing. The test of W. J. Grisham et al on the Gose, is now nearing the 1,600-foot depth, and is due for some early developments. At Electra, the Anderson Drilling company has started its No. 27 on the Diadolphus tract and is down 800 feet. This well is the first of six to be put down on the west side of this acreage. On the Lazy J ranch, seven miles southeast of Electra, the Nelson-Donoho Oil company's No. 1 is being put on the pump, and the rig is being skidded preparatory to starting No. 2. No. 1 made 75 barrels from the 1,500-foot sand, flowing before the pump was installed. The well on the P. R. Weatherford tract five miles northwest of Jordan Park is now drilling around 2,500 feet. This test is being closely watched, having had several small showings. The Hammill-Staley No. 1 has resumed drilling around 1,400 feet after being delayed a day or two by some minor trouble.

PART OF MOTEX OIL COMPANY'S PROPERTY SOLD BY RECEIVER

M. E. Stevens, receiver of the Motex Oil company Thursday afternoon sold a portion of the property that came into the receiver's hands. All the buildings and tanks were offered for sale, but Mr. Stevens secured a buyer only for the buildings which were disposed of in a lump at the price of \$1,225. The tanks which are still located on the lease will be disposed of at an early date and the proceeds added to the funds realized and a settlement made with creditors.

MILITARY COMPANY WILL BE ORGANIZED AT VERNON

VERNON, TEXAS, May 13.—Vernon will have a militia company, according to plans made Wednesday night at a meeting of about forty men in the district court room. Thirty-five of these have signified their intention of signing enlistment blanks. Clyde Watis has been appointed captain by the adjutant-general's office. Vernon members will endeavor to increase their rolls to 50 in order that they may attend the summer camp beginning June 12 at Camp Mabry. Much enthusiasm was displayed at the meeting Wednesday night and prospects are excellent for putting the company on a peace-time basis, 65 members. A six-target range will be established here and the state government will furnish an armory. Drill periods will be for an hour and a half, once each week. For this the men will receive a full day's pay.

CUTTING SCRAPE LANDS TWO NEGROES IN JAIL

The two were taken before the grand jury, it was learned, and later misdemeanor charges of affray were filed against each of them.
