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### HARVEST UNDER WAY, MUCH OATS IN SHOCK

Wheat Binders in Operation From Harrod Westward Along Denver Road.

Oats harvest has started in Wichita county and a number of fields are already in the shock. Although a little wheat has been cut the harvest generally will not start for a week or 10 days yet. Thirty or 40 days ago there was little hope that there would be any wheat to harvest in Wichita county, owing to the ravages of the green bug and rust and the dry weather but some fields have come out wonderfully well, as high as much as seven or eight bushels per acre.

### Break up Wedding And Honeymoon of The Dallas Victim

DALLAS, TEXAS, May 25.—In addition to whipping J. T. Moore, white man, Monday night following his arrest on charges of entering a 12-year-old white girl to a room, the Ku Klux Klan broke up his wedding and honeymoon plans, it was disclosed today. A young woman who refused to disclose her name or address, called on Sheriff Harston today and inquired for information about Moore, saying she was to have married him this week. Harston told her he would search for Moore, who has been phoning since his "disappearance" from the downtown and told to "keep quiet and keep going." Harston said he thought Moore's present address is "somewhere in Mississippi."

### SENATOR FRANCE GOES TO RUSSIA TO SIZE UP THE SOVIET GOVERNMENT

NEW YORK, May 25.—Senator Joseph L. France of Maryland called today on a steamship agent to make ready to spend several weeks in Russia. He announced that representatives of the soviet government will meet him in London and escort him into Russia either through Riga or Liabu. During his visit Senator France said he expects to interview various bolshevik leaders, including Vladimir Lenin, Trotsky, and obtain an understanding of conditions there. He plans to stay at least six weeks in Moscow, the seat of the soviet government. Senator France said he hoped to bring about a series of conferences which would improve relations between the soviet government and the American government. The senator declared that better relations with Russia was a matter of political policy.

### JAPANESE MINIMIZE THE EXTENT OF DISTURBANCE IN CHINA WITH AMERICANS

PHILADELPHIA, May 25.—Reports from Shanghai stating that Japanese and American sailors have been engaged in a clash there elicited a statement today from the foreign office which said that the American sailors involved were playing in the streets in the amusement quarter, setting off firecrackers, the explosion of which hurt some pedestrians. A quarrel ensued in which some on both sides were injured. The officers and the consuls were investigating the affair, the statement added, and the foreign office expressed belief that the matter could easily be settled.

### REPORT SIX HUNDRED OF BRITISH MINERS RETURN TO WORK AT SHROPSHIRE

LONDON, May 25.—The first break in the ranks of the striking British miners occurred today when 600 Shropshire miners returned to the pits. The men went back to work under a temporary wage agreement with the colliery owners. The more optimistic observers declared the defeat was the beginning of a landslide.

### SHERIDAN MOTOR CAR CO. IS SOLD TO A SYNDICATE

MUNICH, IND., May 25.—The Sheridan Motor Car company, operated by the General Motors corporation, was sold to a syndicate of automobile financiers headed by William Durant, according to announcement made here today. Daniel A. Burke, president of the Sheridan company, is interested in the new project. It is believed the sale was close to a \$5,000,000 transaction.

### More Men Injured Since the Arrival Of the Short Skirt

By United Press. CHICAGO, May 25.—Short skirts may lessen the number of accidents to women, but they increase injuries to men.

This was the reply made today by Chicago reformers to the claim of Frederick Herz, city statistician, that short skirts had reduced the number of accidents to women. Men are so interested in watching women wearing short skirts that they fail to keep an eye out for their own safety, the reformers contended. The figures showing there were more accidents to men in the last year than the figures indicating their contention was correct, they said.

In 1916, when skirts were long, 467 women were injured alighting from street cars, but in 1920 only 292 were hurt.

In boarding street cars, 432 were injured in 1916, compared with 263 in 1920.

An increase in the total number of men injured was reported in 1920 over 1916, which was blamed by reformers as due partly to short skirts worn by women.

"Watch the men going along the street today," said Arthur B. Farwell, and you will see that half of them have their eyes on some woman with a short skirt. They cannot protect themselves from street accidents while they have their attention concentrated below the skirt line."

### AUTO OF GENERAL WOOD FALLS INTO RIVER BUT GENERAL ESCAPES INJURY

TUGEGARIO, CAGAYAN PROVINCE, Philippine Islands, May 21.—(Delayed)—The automobile of Major General Leonard Wood, who is investigating conditions in the Philippine Islands at the request of President Harding, fell into Pinacayun river, near the Cagayan route here yesterday while being ferried across the stream. General Wood escaped injury, but an hour was required to pull the vehicle from the water.

### NO HASTY WITHDRAWAL OF TROOPS IN SANTO DOMINGO

WASHINGTON, May 25.—The United States government has decided against a hasty withdrawal of its military occupation of the "Black Republic" of Santo Domingo. It was learned today.

However, it is understood to be the intention of this government to withdraw the forces of 24,118 American Marines as soon as self government can be firmly established in the Dominican republic. At present the little republic is under the tutelage of an American military governor and is without its own president.

### GENERAL ALFREDO SORRATOS RECEIVES HIS COMMISSION

AKRON, OHIO, May 25.—General Alfredo Sorratos, former Mexican minister, today received his commission from President Obregon as the Mexican consul for western states at Boise, Idaho.

Three years ago, General Sorratos fled from Mexico with his family to Akron, where he obtained employment in a rubber factory.

### WHEAT AND GRAIN TO THE TROPICS

KANSAS CITY, MO., May 25.—Fire early today destroyed hay and grain valued at \$75,000 and damaged buildings \$25,000 at the warehouse of W. H. North and Brothers here.

Three box cars on a railroad siding, whose contents were valued at \$12,000 also were burned.

### MATERIAL DECLINE IN PROSPECTS FOR GRAIN IN KANSAS AND OKLAHOMA

ARKANSAS CITY, KAN., May 25.—Leading farmers here declare the oat crop for southern Kansas and northern Oklahoma will be almost a complete failure and the past ten days seem to have developed a material decline in wheat prospects. The wheat showing over the same belt gives promise of 10 to 15 bushels to the acre.

### ANOTHER LIFE SENTENCE IN THE ALEX LIND CASE

VICTORIA, TEXAS, May 25.—Henry Geffert, on trial in connection with the murder of Alex Lind, service car driver, was given a life sentence here today for his part in the crime.

Lonnie Lindberg was given a life sentence last week in connection with the same crime.

Geffert plead guilty and the jury brought in an instructed verdict. Lind, the chauffeur, was killed, his automobile burned and body hidden in a thicket near the car last February.

### Young Man Kills His Father When Mother in Danger

WACO, TEXAS, May 25.—Joe Lumpkin, the 17-year-old son of J. H. Lumpkin, who killed his father last night when the latter advanced upon the boy's mother with a club threatening to beat her brains out, was admitted to jail today in \$1,000 on a charge of murder. His examination trial was set for Friday at 2:30 o'clock.

According to the coroner who held the inquest the shooting was a culmination of a series of quarrels between the boy's father and mother. The boy's statement under oath to the coroner that he shot only after his father started toward his mother with a club and a threat to brain her was corroborated by the mother. The boy fired through a screen door, a .41 caliber bullet piercing the brain of his father, killing him instantly.

### LUMPKIN ALLOWED BOND BY JUDGE OF WACO COURT

WACO, TEXAS, May 25.—Bond of \$1,000 was today allowed Joe Lumpkin, 17, alleged to have shot his father, J. H. Lumpkin at the latter's home in East Waco.

Justice J. J. Padgett previously returned a verdict that the elder Lumpkin met his death from a gunshot wound inflicted by the son who claimed the life of his mother had been threatened at the time of the shooting.

# INDEPENDENCE OF PHILIPPINE ISLANDS INVOLVES ONE ISSUE

ONLY ONE CONSIDERATION IN OPINION OF CHARLES EDWARD RUSSELL.

THIS FEATURE OF COURSE OTHER THAN JONES LAW

Conditions on Islands Are Further Discussed by Noted Special Writer.

MANILA, May 25.—When all is said and done, the question of Philippine independence aside from the covenant of the Jones law, settles down to one consideration and only one.

It is true that the Asiatic is essentially and always, in his physical, mental and spiritual being, in the marrow of his bone and the texture of his brain, in his doing and his thinking, always and far away the inferior of the European?

The British in Asia have invariably proceeded upon the theory that he is upon this and the practical ramifications of it has been built the whole structure of British supremacy. In great things, in small things, in all the aspects and relations of life, the Asiatic is the inferior creature and must not for a moment be allowed to forget the fact that he is inferior.

United States ought to do. No nonsense with the Asiatic. So many times and from so many lips I have heard this doctrine it has left in me no kind of doubt that it is a fundamental philosophy—the Asiatic is inferior; by no possibility can he be worthy of independence or of democracy.

Then it is shown that the Filipino, being a Malay and an Asiatic, partakes in full measure of Asiatic inferiority. His mind is smaller and duller; God made him so. He has no initiative, no executive ability, no business capacity; he makes a hash of everything he undertakes. In the four years and six months he has been in charge of the government of these islands he has mismanaged everything. It is not in him to do anything else. The British are perfectly right; you can do nothing with an Asiatic but make a servant of him and a poor one at that.

But it happens that even while they laud the British conception of the Asiatic that conception seems to be going to smash in the very countries where it has had the fullest and most perfect exercise.

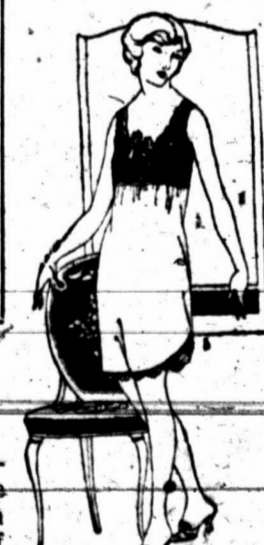

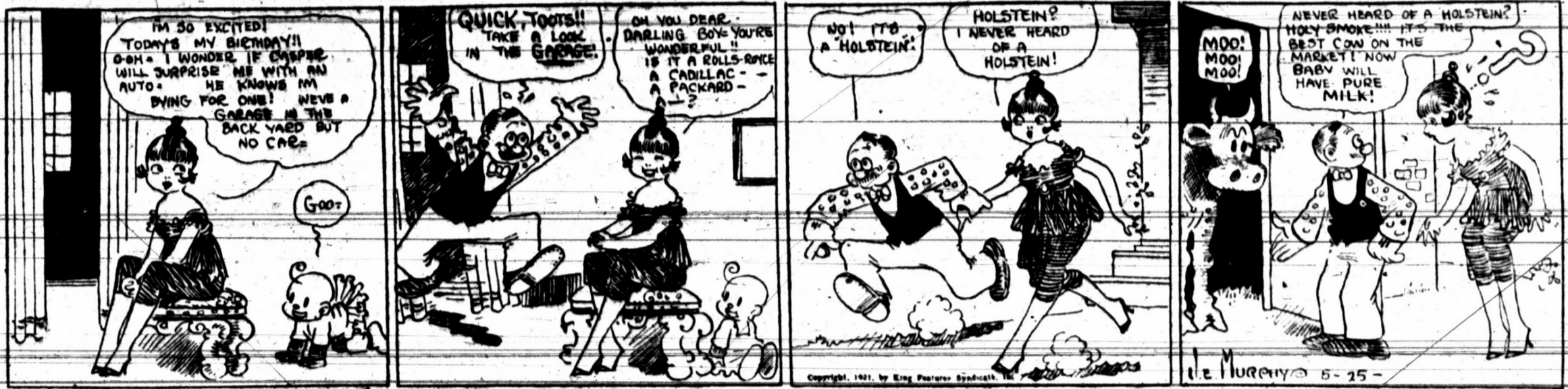

URGES PATIENCE ON IRRIGATION PROJECT

J. A. Kemp Tells Ad Club Members Of Necessity For Proceeding Slowly. J. A. Kemp told members of the Wichita Falls Ad club Wednesday that citizens must be patient toward the irrigation project. The absolute necessity of proceeding along the engineering lines of certain correctness, he said, required that every engineering detail be settled in advance, and this task, now in the hands of some of the country's leading engineers, will probably require 60 days more, he said.

Mr. Kemp mentioned a hitherto unmentioned feature of the project, that of protection from flood damage. "That may seem a remote danger to you," he said, "but I am told by men who were here before I was, that once the entire present area of Wichita Falls was inundated. Those of you who were here in 1915 know that had there been just a day or two more of rain, now in the hands of some of the country's leading engineers, would have been disastrous."

The dam will be big enough to impound the maximum flood that can come down the river, and will be absolute protection to this city." Mr. Kemp spoke of the great project under way at Canyon, Okla., where \$10,000,000 is being spent to build dams for flood protection.

The talk by Mr. Kemp was the principal feature of the Ad club's session of the West Texas chamber of commerce, in which he told of the outside attention that the irrigation project is attracting, with another feature. Vice President T. A. Bradley presided in the absence of President Daugherty. Norris Ewing was program chairman.
