LITTLE PROGRESS MADE IN CONGRESS ON TAX MEASURE

FOREIGN RELATIONS INTERFERES WITH EFFORTS OF THE LEADERS.

COMMITTEE IS UNABLE TO REACH A CONCLUSION

Innumerable interests insist on presenting arguments for and against provisions.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Nobody can follow events in Washington without observing again and again that the foreign relations have a trick of getting right of way over everything else.

Probably the most important item of domestic legislation being transacted by the government is the framing of the new tax bill.

Nearly every day, for a part of the day or for the whole day, the 17 members of the senate finance committee hold hearings and listen to arguments from persons who have ideas about how our present tax schedule should be revised.

But no one can observe the time devoted to this work without feeling strongly that it is being done very fast.

Those who believe in a sales tax are as confident as at any time that sooner or later this new form of taxation will come. They say it will come because the country must have the money, and this is the only way to get it.

The new tariff bill is not very much farther ahead than the sales tax bill, and the tariff bill is not very much more advanced than the tax bill.

DIPLOMAS AWARDED TO 76 GRADUATES FROM HIGH SCHOOL

LARGE CROWD ATTENDS CLOSING EXERCISES AT WICHITA THEATER.

W. J. BULLOCK DELIVERS PRINCIPAL ADDRESS

Diplomas Are Presented by Judge A. H. Carrigan, President of School Board.

Before an audience which packed the Wichita theater to its utmost capacity and which applauded continuously during the presentation, 76 members of this year's high school graduating class received diplomas from Judge A. H. Carrigan, president of school board, Friday night and were officially declared to have ended their grade school careers.

Judge Carrigan prefaced the presentation with several remarks in which he took occasion to congratulate the class and assure it that the school board, the teachers and the town as a whole were proud of its achievements.

The largest increase during April, the figures showed, was recorded in the Texas and Louisiana division, amounting to 15,000,000 gallons.

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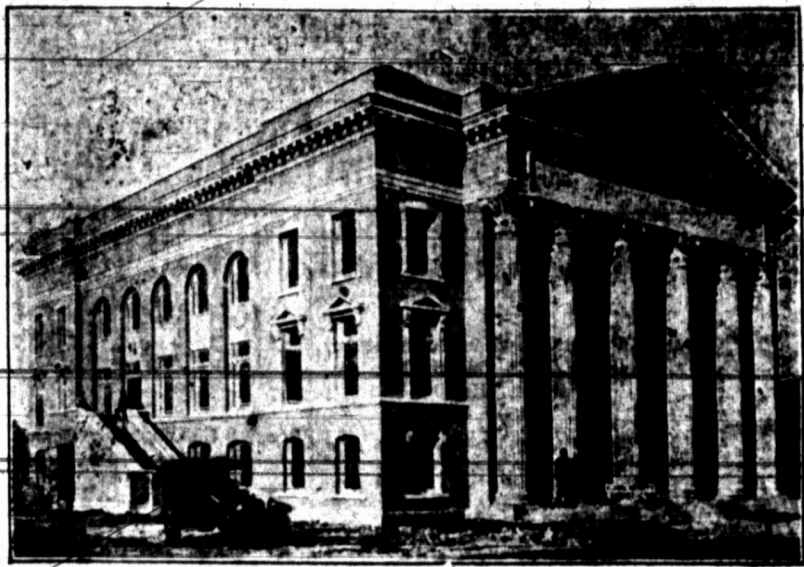

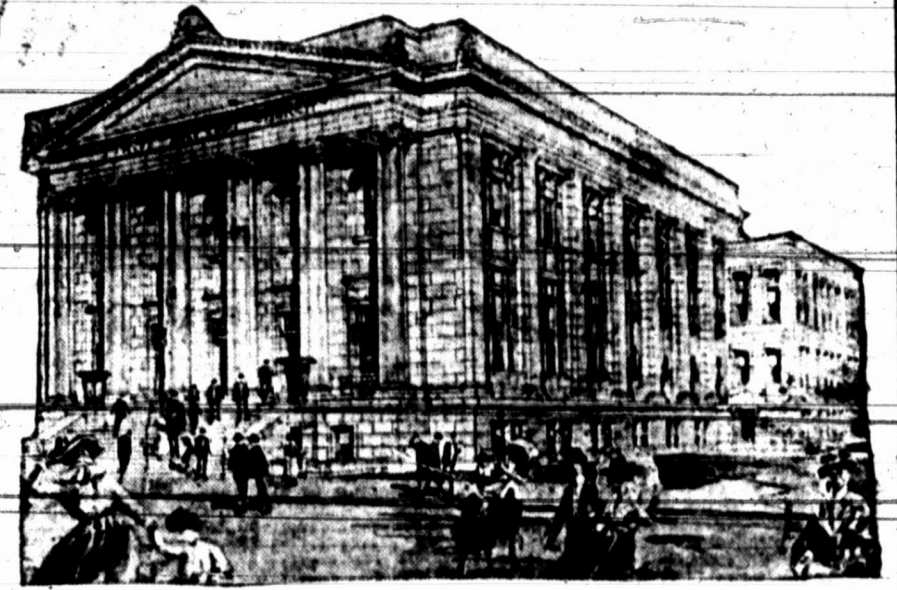

There is no virtue so universal or so helpful as hope. The human soul clings to it after having relinquished claim to all else.

Hope is the greatest architect: It plans great futures. To other forces is given the power to realize or to disappoint.

Hope is desire magnified. It views the distance as through a telescope.

Hope lives only in the future tense. It is the father of ambition; it is the mother of faith.

Hope is the prodigal draftsman whose plans are modified and oftentimes mutilated by experience.

But with all this, hope is the builder of happiness. Through its gleaming prospects and promises youth rejoices and age finds happiness in the recollection of hope.

To the presumptuous man who deems labor and patience not worth while, hope will act as a devil which smooths his way for a time, then suddenly breaks his neck.

Hope is liberal but stern. She readily agrees to do great things for you but she always insists that you, too, do your part, else she will fail you.

Like all other pleasures immoderately enjoyed, all else forgot in its excess, hope brings pain as the disappointing reward.

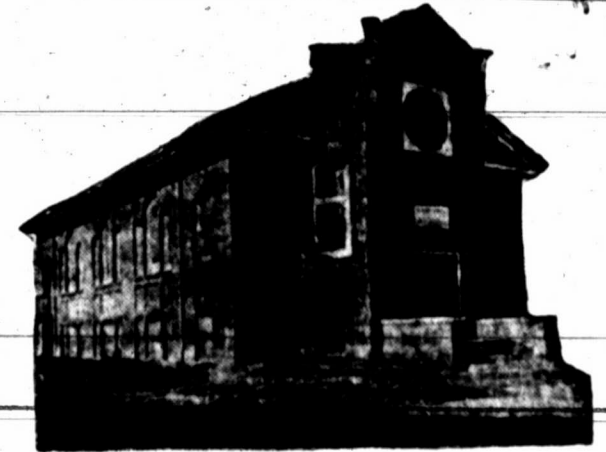
Hope is a necessity. Where there is no hope there is no endeavor. Dilute your hopes with patience, purpose, and practice.

However frequently our hopes may seem to be frustrated no man is lost unless he extinguish hope.

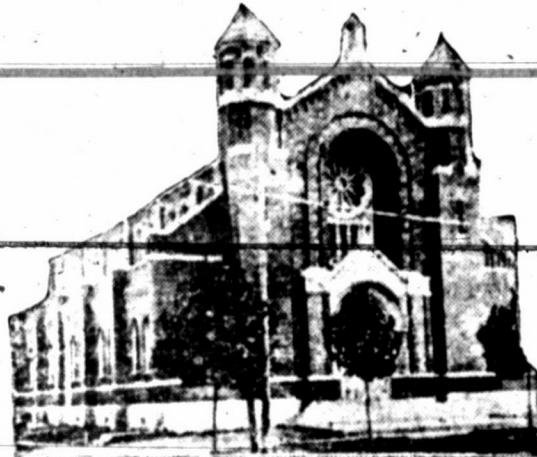
The man of power never leaps from pleasure to pleasure but from hope to hope. It is hope that carries us, willing toilers, to the end.

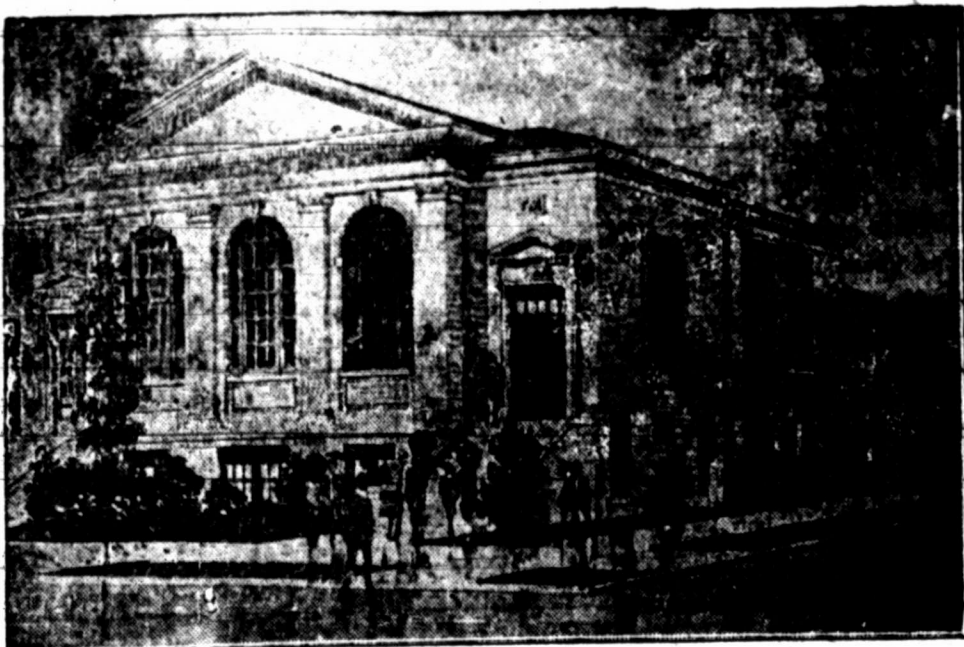

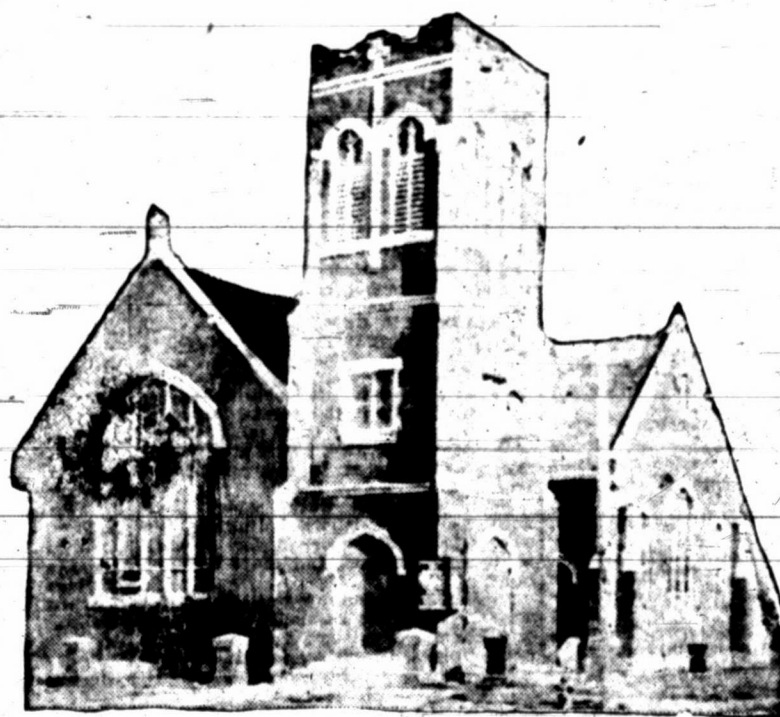

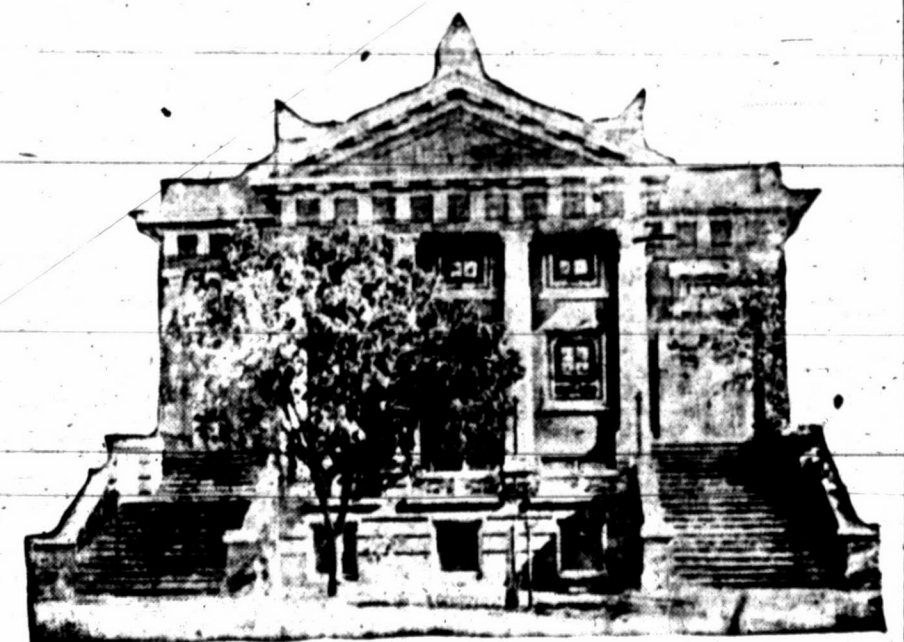

ERRAND UNFINISHED WHEN LITTLE GIRL IS KILLED BY AUTO

RUNNING TO STORE FOR MOTHER,
VETA MORRIS, AGED TWO,
MEETS DEATH.

DRIVER OF MACHINE IS DECLARED NOT TO BLAME

Young Woman at Wheel of Car Be-
comes Hysterical After Tragic
Occurrence.

A desire to complete an errand quickly cost the life of two-year-old Veta Morris, daughter of Mrs. Mary Morris, 764 Burnett street, late Friday afternoon. The little girl was run over and instantly killed by an automobile driven by Miss Lucille Billinger at the corner of Burnett and Seventh streets, just as she was running to the grocery store of George Johnson, 1112 Seventh.

Eye-witnesses of the accident declared that the driver of the machine was in no way to blame for the tragedy, as the car was proceeding slowly and was under complete control. The little girl had just started to cross Seventh street according to Mr. Johnson, who saw the accident, when the machine approached from the east, she stopped on nothing, but for some reason jumped squarely in the path of the wheels just as the car came opposite her and was hurled to the ground. The front wheel of the car, a Paige roadster, passed over her head, crushing it, and causing instant death.

In the car with Miss Billinger were Anna Belle Brooks and a Mrs. Potter, whose address was not obtained by the police. Miss Billinger and Miss Brooks live at 308 Burnett street and were returning home when the accident took place. The former became hysterical a soon after the death of the child and was taken to her home. Miss Brooks was also considerably upset by the tragedy.

An investigation of the matter was made by Plainclothesman F. T. Hunter and Mounted Officer J. O. Colvin Friday night and both were convinced that Miss Billinger was not to blame for this accident. It is their belief, and that of Mr. Johnson, that the victim became excited and attempted to beat the machine across the street, with fatal results.

The bodies were removed to the Martin & Lunn undertaking parlors and prepared for burial. It is being held there pending funeral arrangements, which were to be made Saturday afternoon.

Johnson kept on and placed the speeder under arrest.

Juvenile Officer R. W. Morgan allowed the boys to go after hearing the pitiful story of getting their report cards and told them they need not return.

Interest derived from the depository on school funds for the county will serve to bear all the expenses of the schools for the coming year, according to County Treasurer Tom McHam. The expenses include the salary of the superintendent as well as incidental expenses such as printing of report cards, etc.

Heretofore the county treasurer was forced to make a levy of one or two cents on each school district but it will not be necessary that this be done this year.

Saturday morning the county treasurer received the deposits allowed by the bank for May interest on money in the various funds. They are highway fund \$922.61; general fund, \$2,127.50; road building fund, \$132.56; school fund, 250.00, totaling \$3,632.72.
