



# HEIGHT OF FOLLY TO DISARM FIRST SAYS SECRETARY OF WAR

WANTS TO SEE THIS NATION  
PREPARED TO DEFEND  
ITS RIGHTS.

## DOES NOT ANTICIPATE WAR BUT URGES PREPARATION

Possibility of War With Great Britain  
Not Given Moment's  
Consideration.

NEW YORK, June 3.—Declaring that it would be the height of folly for the United States to disarm first, Secretary of War Weeks, in an address today to the graduating class of New York university, said he hoped to see this nation prepared to defend its rights, its sovereignty and its citizens until the day comes when all nations by mutual consent dismantled their fortifications and scrapped their navies. The university conferred upon Secretary Weeks the honorary degree of doctor of laws.

"I do not favor war," the secretary said. "I abhor it. No nation should have a clear realization of it until it has a clear realization of its own weakness. But conditions may arise which make it with all its horrors the only alternative to a dishonorable peace. Then every patriotic citizen wants war. I do not anticipate war, but there are active and feverish military preparations among those with whom we might possibly come in contact. And I want to say here and now that I cannot give a moment's serious consideration to the possibility of war with Great Britain."

1 egg  
1 teaspoon ginger  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 tablespoon vinegar  
1 tablespoon cold water  
2 cups flour

### TREASURY BONDS DELIVERED BY GERMAN GOVERNMENT

PARIS, June 7.—The reparations commission announces that in execution of Article V of the schedule of payments for reparations Germany has delivered up to the present time treasury bonds payable Aug. 31, 1921, amounting to about \$10,000,000 gold marks.

The total of these two sums over the 2,000,000,000 gold marks which Germany was to pay before June 1 will be used for the amortization of part of these bonds. The excess amounts to about 40,000,000 marks.

# AS EUROPE SEES IT WAR BETWEEN U. S. AND JAPAN CERTAIN

### PARTICULARLY IS THIS TRUE WHEREVER BANNER OF ENGLAND FLIES. EVEN MONEY IN SHANGHAI WILL BE IN SIX MONTHS

No Issue Worth Digging One Trench  
Declares Charles Edward  
Russell.

TOKIO, June 8.—As to the chances  
of war between the United States and  
Japan, if you listen to the talk in the  
foreign clubs and circles of the Orient,  
especially wherever the banner of Eng-  
land flies, there is no chance about it.  
War is certain, assured, on its way,  
and there is nothing to speculate on  
except the first gun fire. When I was  
in Shanghai they were betting even  
money that this would be in six months  
and 3 to 2 that it would come within  
a year.

And yet there is between the two  
countries no issue worth the digging  
of one trench or the shedding of one  
drop of blood. No issue, and on the  
part of the Japanese, no intention of  
no hostile feeling and no impulse to  
fight.

For I should like to try again to call  
attention to the iniquity of the mon-  
strous inventions spread in America  
about the attitude of these people. It  
is merely vicious to say that the pop-  
ularly known American traveler is not  
safe here.

Do not believe it nor anything that  
looks as if it came from the same fac-  
tory. I have been up and down the  
length of this country, by main travel-  
ing roads and far-off trails, through  
cities, towns and hamlets, and have  
never seen so much as one unfriendly  
glance nor found one instance of the  
failure of the traditional Japanese  
courtesy. I have not found one nor  
with diligent inquiry been able to find  
any other American who had heard of  
anybody that had found one.

Even about Yap, where the Japa-  
nese, it must be admitted had under the  
Versailles treaty a most plausible case,  
nobody is angry here. Part of the press  
had some bitter comments, but  
nothing compared with the shriekings  
of a part of our own press. The Tokio  
papers this morning complain acridly  
that Japan is tired of being always  
in the position of yielding her rights be-  
fore the overbearing attitude of the  
United States, and that she is in a  
position to demand a more equitable  
treatment.

As to the masses, they are as responsive  
as the Dalai Lama himself.

Yap, they think, is nothing to fight  
about, and they are perfectly right in  
that thought. The treatment they are  
getting in California is rough, they  
think, but nothing to fight about, and  
once more their thinking is sound and  
gane. But there is one point of fric-  
tion between the countries that seems  
not to have occurred to them, and yet  
it is far more important than any of  
these casual things. In truth, the cas-  
ual things, Yap and the cable com-  
pany's roar and the rest, really grow  
out of this and the Japanese press  
never mentions it, although it contains  
the only grave chance of producing be-  
tween these countries a row that might  
call for guns.

Japan, as I have pointed out before,  
is driven into China not by land hun-  
ger or a mad purpose to annex every-  
thing in sight, but because old eco-  
nomic necessity demanding raw mate-  
rials has the pistol at her head and  
she can't do anything else. She has  
blundered in left-handedly, but she is  
—seeking the things she needs.

Now it is not to be denied that Jap-  
an, with all the remarkable keen-  
ness and ability exhibited by her  
best men has one fundamental theory  
of business that doesn't agree at all  
with ours. She does not fancy a field  
open to everybody and equal chances  
to all. For some reason she seems al-  
ways fearful of competition and to look  
for a closed market, that is to say, a  
market closed to everybody except her-

self. Why this is so has been the sub-  
ject of much speculation among ob-  
servers, whether she doubts the qual-  
ity of her goods or the ability of her  
merchants or is awed by the greater  
experience and bolder methods of other  
nations; but of the fact there is no  
kind of doubt.

In other words and plain, what is  
really at stake is the exploitation of  
China. I have no doubt it will be "neat-  
ly" disguised with something else—Yap  
or California or the horrible ambition  
of the terrible man-eating Jap, or  
something—but this is what it is all  
about. For one handy disguise the  
United States has for the Orient a  
traditional policy exactly the reverse of  
that Japan's is supposed to be. It  
is about the only discernible thing we  
know about the Japanese—foreign policy  
and we are therefore the more likely  
to insist upon it, particularly in sight  
of all these exploitable treasures. As  
Japan works her way into economic  
China she will presumably try more or  
less to keep other people out and her  
policy and that of the United States  
may be on a grade crossing with every  
chance of some collision; not neces-  
sarily anything for the wrecking train,  
but some kind of collision.

On this situation comes the devil and  
plies the California row and the mad  
armament race. The United States, be-  
ing out of the league of nations, starts  
upon a big navy program. Japan gets  
the news and looks carefully around, sees  
nobody else that can reach her, says  
"That must be meant for me," and  
starts to build a new line of capital  
ships, urging self-defense. This fact  
is duly printed in the United States,  
which says "See what the Japs are at!  
They're building those ships to attack  
us," and starts on a program still big-  
ger. Whereupon Japan is convinced

or is told that America is really com-  
ing to blow her out of the water and  
pushes herself into the present lunatic  
program, which, if it doesn't bankrupt  
her in eight years will give her a na-  
tional fighting force of stupendous pow-  
er; much greater, in first line ships,  
than even the navy of Great Britain.

The point of danger then is that if  
Japan pursues her present policy in  
China, if alarmed American interests  
continue to misunderstand and misrep-  
resent it, if the minds of the Japanese  
people are at length angered by con-  
tinuous and gratuitous insults from  
America, if outside influences are suf-  
ficiently (or successfully) irritating  
why, then, say the quarrel grows about  
wretched Yap or California race prej-  
udice, and the temptation to use these  
islands as a base for operations over-  
whelming when there will not be the

slightest justification for their use.  
At the present moment the angering  
of the Japanese people to a point where  
they will "want" a war with America  
looks like a hard job, but the peace  
agencies should not count too much on  
this. Any people, no matter how paci-  
fic, can be goaded into war hunger  
by the application of a sufficient num-  
ber of the right kind of lies. It is un-  
doubtedly true, as I have pointed out  
before, that war will never again be  
made in Japan as it has been made  
heretofore; never again without refer-  
ence to the will and judgment of its  
people. But this, to a disillusioned  
world, will seem, after the great dis-  
appointment about Germany, only a  
shadowy protection.

There is one other ominous fact  
about this situation. The Japanese  
people are growing more and more  
adverse to war the government  
of Japan is strengthening her defense,  
not necessarily against us, but  
strengthening them, or this there are  
indubitable signs. We should not, fur-  
thermore allow ourselves to be fooled  
with any comfortable belief that Jap-  
an is financially unable to carry on  
great war. Her national debt burden  
is trifling compared with that of the  
European nations. She owes but \$1-  
255,872,000, about \$17 for each inhabit-  
ant, on which the interest is \$38,900-  
000 or 75 cents a year for each inhabit-  
ant. She has been diligently (and  
successfully) piling up her gold re-  
serves, next to the United States she  
is now the first of the gold-owning  
and creditor nations.

But one little practical fact we  
ought to remember—supposing we  
have not lost taste for that exercise  
to the black moral turpitude of such  
war we ever fought, and the most cost-  
ly, as well as the most senseless and  
most inglorious. Japan is marvelously  
fortified, you cannot possibly get at  
her from the open ocean. Behind her,  
the Japan Sea would be such an impos-  
sible Japanese lake as the Russians  
found, only worse. At only one point  
could she be attacked and that is in  
Korea, and the expense of getting at  
her there would be so colossal, expen-  
ditures of money, expenditures of  
American lives, that what we spent  
and lost in the European war would  
be literally a trifle.

Toward this truly appalling abyss  
the feet of the gentlemen eager to kick  
Japan in the face are pointed, a fact  
of which it were better to think, if we  
have not lost taste for that exercise

### COUNCIL AWARDS PAIVING CONTRACTS TO FOUR CONCERNS

UVALDE ASPHALT TO BE USED ON FIFTEENTH, HOLLIDAY AND ELIZABETH.

MAINTENANCE BONDS MAY BE MADE FOR FIVE YEARS

North Indiana and North Ohio to Be Concrete Paved; Bitulithic for Fillmore

Paving contracts to the value of approximately \$250,000, covering 27 blocks, were awarded Wednesday morning by the city council to four different contractors, as follows:

North Indiana, six blocks, and Sixth street a half block, concrete, to L. E. Whitman & Co., \$376.85 per 50-foot front, (\$351.71 for cash).

North Ohio, six blocks, concrete, to Plains Paving Co., \$443.96 per 50-foot front.

Fillmore, four blocks, bitulithic on concrete base, Texas Bitulithic Co., \$403.29 per 50-foot front.

Fifteenth, seven blocks; Elizabeth, three blocks, and Holliday, one and a half blocks, Uvalde rock asphalt; on Fifteenth and Holliday, crushed rock base, \$104.93 and \$145.23, respectively; Elizabeth, concrete base, \$115.70 for 50-foot front; all to Roberts Brothers.

There may be some slight increases in the final cost, as the council is considering requiring five-year maintenance bonds instead of one-year bonds as at present. This would increase the cost about five cents a square yard, it is estimated.

The concrete awards were made to the lowest bidders for the respective streets. On Fifteenth, property owners met Tuesday night and declared their preference for asphalt with a crushed rock base. There seemed to be some difference about Fillmore property owners' preference. Luther Hoffmann and two other residents said all that they had questioned wanted bitulithic. B. E. Berry thought a canvass would show a great majority for concrete. In the absence of more information, the council decided on bitulithic. Both Ohio and Indiana property owners wanted concrete.

The asphalt contract in the first to be awarded here, and the council made this award after considering reports from several other Texas cities as to their satisfactory experience with it. 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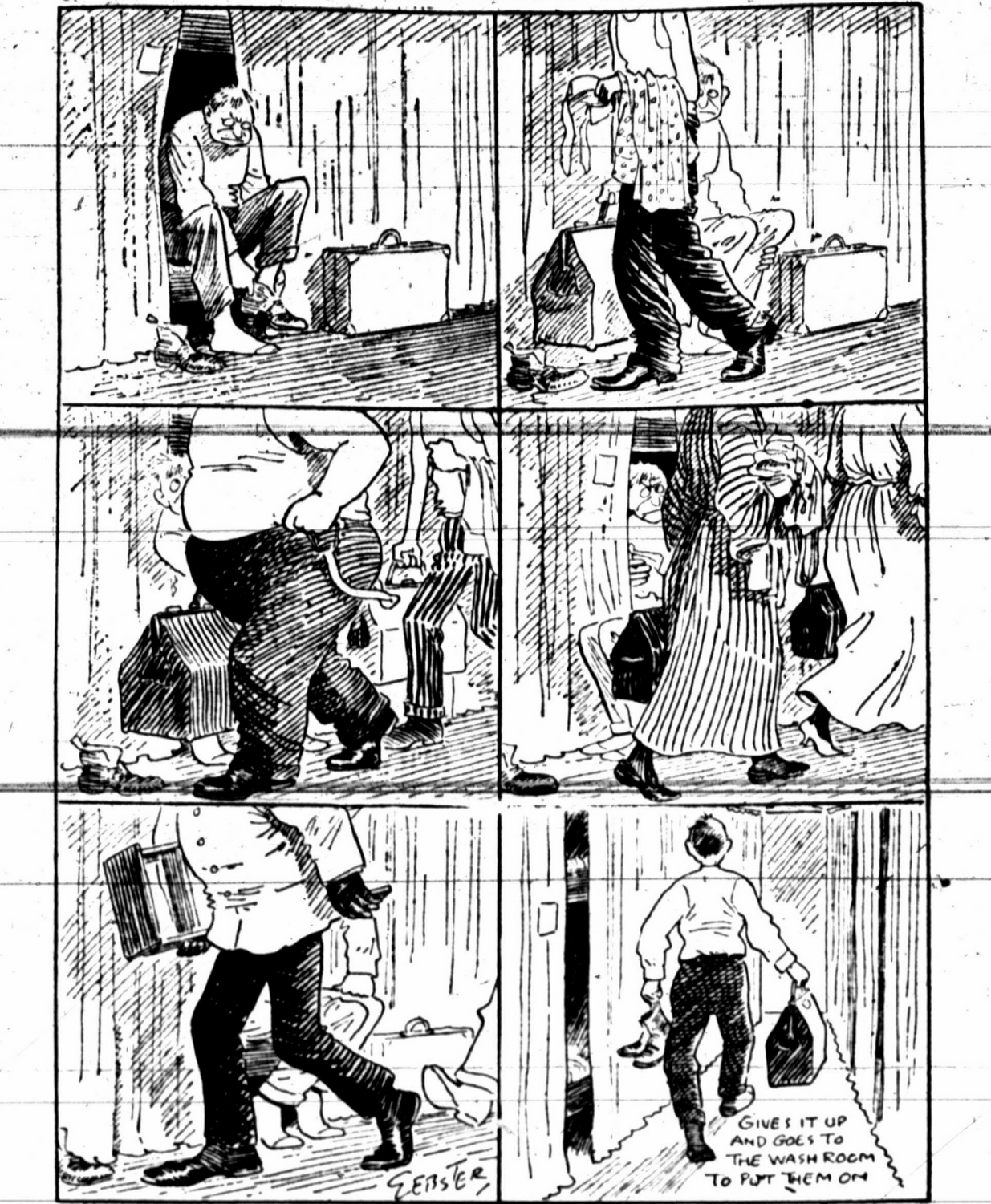

Future of France May Rest With Result of Fight

By WEBB MILLER, United Press Staff Correspondent.

PARIS.—(By Mail)—Whether he wins or loses, Carpentier's fight with Dempsey eventually will be a big factor in the future military defense of France and even her material prosperity.

This is the novel view taken by Gaston Vidal, under-secretary of technical instruction in physical culture and sports, the first official minister of sports to be appointed by any government in the world. "After the enormous losses in the war, it is a vital necessity for France to rebuild her depleted man-power if she is to effectively defend herself in any future wars of aggression. As you know, the birth rate in France is not sufficiently above the death rate to provide an inexhaustible supply of man-power. France's birth rate is much lower than her neighbors—especially that of Germany. Therefore, it is necessary that France do her utmost to conserve the lives we have and keep the people in good health and physical fitness for service in our armies—if the need ever arises. "Unfortunately, France has always

been far behind other nations—including Germany—in physical culture and sports which go to raise the average physical fitness of the nation. That is one reason the present ministry of sports was created.

Good Athletes in France.

"That the French people can become as adept as any other people in sports and physical culture has been effectively proved. I have only to cite Carpentier, Lenglin, Vermeulen to illustrate that point.

"The problem remains to interest the French people as a whole in athletics. The rest will be automatic. "The physical culture of the people of Georges Carpentier against Dempsey becomes apparent. The attention of France will be fixed in an unprecedented way upon physical attainments that fight will plant the germ of interest which the ministry of sports hopes to develop. For this reason this single fight may have an incalculable effect upon the future physical development of France as a nation—and therefore her defense if it ever becomes necessary.

"As for the material prosperity of France—that is also affected in this way. When the physical standards of the masses are raised it will not be necessary to keep young men in training in the army classes each year so long. That will permit men to go back to their normal employment months sooner and thus increase France's power of production. "We regard Carpentier as the flag-bearer of all French athletes and French physical culture."

MICHIGAN THREATENS TO SUE WISCONSIN IN A BOUNDARY DISPUTE

WANTS POSSESSION OF HURLEY, THE RICHEST VALLEY IN THE WORLD. TOTAL OF 360 SQUARE MILES INVOLVED IN CONTROVERSY. Trouble is Result of Mapmakers' Error in the Year 1789.

MADISON, Wis., June 3.—Michigan is threatening to sue Wisconsin to obtain possession of Hurley, the "richest village" in the world, and 360 square miles of Wisconsin territory. Michigan and Wisconsin are in dispute over their boundary line, and the upper peninsula of Michigan wants to secede and form a new state of Superior, while Wisconsin hopes to annex the rich peninsula country to herself.

When the congress of the 13 states, in session at Philadelphia July 12, 1787, adopted an ordinance for the government of the Northwest Territory, embracing the present states of Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin, Mitchell's map was used as a guide. The ordinance provided that two of the five states should lie "north of an east and west line drawn through the southern end or extreme of Lake Michigan." The preamble of the ordinance stated that its articles should "forever remain unalterable unless by common consent."

boundary as provided by the ordinance of 1787, with the result that the new territory claimed a strip some six miles wide across the entire southern side of Lake Erie, including the port of Toledo. The dispute lagged until 1835, when Michigan became a state and sought to enforce its claim on the Lake Erie strip. Civil war between the two states threatened, and some actual fighting occurred before congress settled the dispute by recognizing Ohio's claims and compensating Michigan with the gift of the upper peninsula. Michigan when first got enthusiastic over the new territory until a dozen years later when first copper and then iron ore was discovered in the peninsula.

In 1818, when Illinois was created, Nathaniel Bowditch, her delegate in congress, argued for a northern boundary where Mitchell's map showed the foot of the lake instead of where the southern bend actually is. He declared the new state's commerce must become identified with the northern lakes or else flow south down the Ohio and Mississippi rivers, with the result that a section joining a southern confederacy in case the union were disrupted. Congress heeded his plea and gave the new state Chicago and a strip of territory running 41 miles north from the foot of the lake and west to the Mississippi.

Another mapmaker's mistake is involved in this dispute according to Mr. Thwaites. A committee of the United States senate fixed the boundary line, using a map published by I. Judson, which represented the Montreal and Menominee rivers both rising in Lake Vieux, Desert, thus making an island out of the northern peninsula. Senator William C. Preston of South Carolina proposed this alleged river highway as a fair dividing line, and his plan was approved. Surveyors eventually found Lake Vieux Desert is really the headwaters of the Wisconsin river and has no connection with either the Montreal or Menominee, and Capt. Thomas Jefferson Cram of the topographical engineers reported to congress that it took an Indian without pack eight days to travel from the lake to the Montreal river. Eventually congress selected a boundary following in part "the main channel of the Montreal river." Michigan now claims the wrong channel was followed. In connection with the boundary dis-

putes, Mr. Thwaites has recalled a plan proposed by Thomas Jefferson in 1784 for the division of the Northwest Territory into 10 states, with such classical names as Sylvania, Michigan, Chesconipissip, Illinois, Polypotamia, Chesconipissip, Metropotamia, Saratoga, Pexipissip and Washington. His report and map, in his own handwriting, are in the archives of the state department.

State boundary disputes are not confined to the middle west. Oklahoma and Texas had a dispute last year over their Red river boundary and residents of the northern neck of Idaho recently proposed that they join Washington, with which state their interests are closely linked. And in South Dakota there is a movement to change the name of the state to Roosevelt.

TEXAS TRAVELERS HOLD AN IMPORTANT MEETING. AUSTIN, June 3.—A meeting of the Texas Travelers was held at the Driskill hotel this city with a large number of traveling men present. Almost every district in Texas was represented and much business was transacted.

COLLISION ON TENTH STREET IS SETTING FOR A DAMAGE SUIT. A collision on Tenth street on March 5, 1921, between an automobile and a motorcycle was basis for a damage suit filed in the district court Wednesday.

BOILER ROLLS OVER AN EMBANKMENT KILLING ONE AND INJURING 31 MORE. PITTSBURGH, June 3.—One man was killed and three others injured here today when a twenty-ton boiler rolled over an embankment on the Bigelow boulevard into a party of 33 workmen. Hospital physicians said that the injured men were in a serious condition.

SIGNS OF TRAGEDY ON RIVER BANK LEAD TO OFFICIAL PROBE

Police officials Wednesday were endeavoring to unravel the mystery surrounding the finding of a pool of blood on the river banks east of town Tuesday afternoon and the locating of a rubber sign which would indicate, they say, that something had been killed and thrown into the river at this point. A fisherman discovered the blood about 5:30 o'clock in the afternoon and immediately notified the police. Chief Detective Boyd arrived at the scene after a short investigation ordered that the river be dragged in that vicinity. An 800' work with a fisherman's seine revealed nothing and a further investigation was put off until Wednesday.

Italy Seeking Commercial Aid From Germany. By HENRY WOOD. UNITED PRESS STAFF CORRESPONDENT. ROME, June 3.—Fresh complications for the allies in the very near future are now rapidly brewing in the intense propaganda being carried on in Austrian Tyrol for annexation to Germany.

LOUIS, June 3.—Award of \$2,000 to Carrie Williams, negress, from the East St. Louis & Suburban railway for an alleged attack on her by a mob during the East St. Louis race riots of July, 1917, was upheld in the St. Louis court of appeals here yesterday. She suffered injuries, she declared, when attacked while on a street car, the conductor and motorman making no effort to protect her.

of coal, wheat and other essentials for her life.

Yet with England controlling both the western entrance to the Mediterranean to Gibraltar and the eastern at the Suez canal she could at any moment cut off Italy from all commerce with the rest of the world and reduce her to starvation and terms in a very few weeks.

The thesis of nearly all leading Italian statesmen has therefore always been that Italy's national safety and existence depended upon connection with some northern country that could always insure an outlet for her commerce through "neutral" states as well as an inlet for importation. Manifestly, the country best situated to do this is Germany, and this was one of the principal considerations in Italy's membership in the triple alliance before the war as well as the principal motive back of all Italian statesmen who hesitated in the matter of Italy's warring sides with the allies during the recent war.

The treaty of Versailles reduced the territory which separates Italy from Germany to an almost inconceivable strip. The population is overwhelmingly German and it is amongst this population that Germany is carrying on an only too welcomed propaganda for annexation to Germany.

The lack of a common frontier both the German and Italian economists point out constitutes the greatest barrier to reciprocal economic development and relations of the two countries, which would require a customs unity. The propaganda now being advocated is that the Tyrol could be formed into an autonomous province and annexed to Italy for the sake of the common frontier and reciprocal economic advantages.

The propaganda to this end is being carried on in a manner that the situation created thereby can hardly escape much longer consideration by the allies.

HODGINS HAS NO ANNOUNCEMENT AT THIS TIME AS TO HIS INTENTIONS.

### QUESTION RAISED AS TO OTHER POSSIBLE ELECTIONS

Bralley Announces Late Tuesday His Decision Not to Carry Case to Higher Court.

With the announcement late Tuesday by Police Commissioner W. G. Bralley that he would not appeal the election, court recently decided in favor of George L. Hodgins, interest in city political circles turned Wednesday to several questions arising in connection with the new election. George L. Hodgins, successful contestant, said Wednesday that he had no announcement at this time, and that after the election was ordered and a date fixed, there would be plenty of time for him to do any announcing. It had been taken for granted that Mr. Hodgins would again be a candidate. With rumors in circulation of other possible candidates, there appears to be some question whether the race would not be limited to Messrs. Bralley and Hodgins, these being the only two who figured in the contest litigation. No one would attempt to say that there was any law limiting the number of candidates in the race. The judges who decided the election case are expected to shortly fix a date for the election.

### PRESIDENT DECLARES NOTHING SECURE FROM ICONOCLASTS' ATTACKS

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Declaring that "almost nothing" remains secure today from the attacks of iconoclasts, President Harding appealed to the graduating class of the nation's universities and colleges in an address here today to dedicate themselves to an unselfish service in the preservation of civilization. "We look to this month's graduating classes," said the president, "to provide far more than their numerical share of leaders for the nation in the future not far ahead. Almost nothing remains that we may safely think of as sacred or secure from the attacks of the iconoclasts. It is a time in which men search their souls and assay their convictions, in which they examine the very fundamentals of institutions immemorably accepted in which no tradition may be held immune from the assaults of skeptic and doubter. The president added that there must be an open minded willingness to recognize the arguments of doubters and experimenters. Foreign relations were also touched on by Mr. Harding, asserting that America could best help mankind if it held fast to its own ideals and its own security.

CHICAGO, June 8.—Corn belt farmers today turned over the starving children of Poland \$31,148.88 worth of corn through J. W. Coverdale, secretary of the American Farm Bureau federation. The message did not name the steamer and gave the position only as 48°20' degrees west longitude. The message said: "Just struck iceberg; position 48°20' west longitude. Someone near please answer. Believe we are sinking." The distress call was received on continuous wave, which requires a high-power sending station. Because of this, radio operators ashore said they believed the vessel a big one. Only the larger steamers, and most of them passenger liners, were equipped with continuous wave apparatus, they said.

### FREIGHTER HITS ICEBERG IN MID-ATLANTIC OCEAN

NEW YORK, June 8.—The British freighter Seapool struck an iceberg in mid-Atlantic today. Private reports received here gave the name of the steamer after a radio message had been picked up in Boston stating that an unnamed craft had crashed into a great block of ice and was believed to be sinking. The Seapool, a steamer of 4,502 gross tons, was built in 1912 and owned in England. She was last reported leaving Montreal for Dublin June 2. The position given was 48°20' north latitude, 48°30' west longitude. The Seapool, a vessel of some 4,500 tons, arrived at Montreal from Sydney May 14 and sailed June 1 for Dublin.

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### MEXICO INCREASES THE EXPORT TAX ON OIL 25 PER CENT

By Associated Press. MEXICO CITY, June 8.—Petroleum companies operating in Mexico must pay an average increase of 25 per cent in export taxes on their products, beginning July 1, under the terms of a decree issued by President Obregon last night. It is estimated that this increase in taxation will net the government more than 30,000,000 pesos per annum.

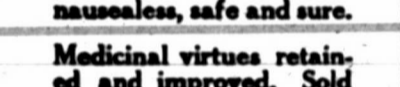
The decree, which was brief, asserted that within recent months other nations have increased their taxes on similar products and declared it was only just that the world's largest source of petroleum should reap similar benefits in view of the economic situation.

It made specific mention that all funds received would be applied on the foreign debt on which not even the interest has been paid since 1912, and which amounts to more than 600,000,000 pesos.
