



### SHARP FIGHTING BY SPANISH TROOPS AND MOORISH TRIBESMEN

MELILLA, Aug. 17.—There has been much sharp fighting between the advance posts of the Spanish foreign legion and Moorish tribesmen south of this city. One Spanish lieutenant has been killed and several soldiers wounded while the Moors are reported to have suffered heavy loss.

### SPANISH HIGH COMMISSIONERS WILL NEGOTIATE SURRENDER

MADRID, Aug. 17.—General Berenguer, Spanish high commissioner for Morocco, will go to Tetuan, in the western part of that country, to negotiate the surrender of the principal chiefs in that district, says El Diario Universal. It is indicated that a punitive expedition against the rebellious tribesmen will not begin until next month.

The new Spanish government, which came into office as a result of the military situation near Melilla where Spanish troops were severely defeated three weeks ago, has been received in Spain. The stock exchange has reflected confidence on the part of the people and state bonds have risen almost a whole point since the ministry was established.

In discussing the situation in northwestern Africa, Premier Maurin's newspaper, La Action, says: "We do not wish to conquer Morocco, as such a task would cost us many sacrifices and sufferings as did our American colonies. We merely intend to prosecute a civilizing expedition without intent and impatience. We will stay fully on the coast of Morocco, leaving the native authorities to establish themselves in the interior."

### KANSAS CITY NEGRO IS HANGED FOR ASSAULT ON ELDERLY WHITE WOMAN

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 17.—Walker Lee, negro, was hanged in the county jail here this morning for an assault upon an elderly white woman more than a year ago.

The negro displayed not a trace of nervousness when he was led from the death cell. Upon the scaffold he led in singing the hymn, "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," and he appeared to be less affected than county officials, negro ministers and priests and some of the hundred spectators who witnessed the execution.

Since Lee was placed in the death cell a week ago he embraced several religious denominations. A section hand was sentenced on Aug. 22, 1920, after a jury had found him guilty of a statutory charge filed against him on the complaint of Mrs. Elizabeth Dahm, 54 years old, of Independence, Mo. Mrs. Dahm died a few days after Lee had been sentenced. The attack occurred on June 23, 1920. Mrs. Dahm was found lying in a road near her home where she had crawled in an attempt to reach aid. Her clothing was torn in strips and saturated with blood. Lee was arrested a few days later and confessed to the crime.

This was the first hanging in Kansas City in the last six years, during which time capital punishment had been abolished in this state and later made legal.

### WELL KNOWN PUBLISHER IS VICTIM OF CANCER

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Aug. 17.—J. R. Crowell, former owner of the Crowell Publishing company, Springfield, Ohio, publishers of the "Woman's Home Companion" and "Farm and Fireside," died early today in a hospital in this city. He had been ill with cancer for many months.

### "TOO MUCH MOTHER-IN-LAW" SAYS MRS. COLGATE

The fair divorcee-alleges that the mother-in-law nagged her on every occasion. Mrs. Colgate says she has not seen her husband for two years. Although she is practically without funds she wants none of the Colgate money excepting \$50 a month to support her son.

### SUCCESSFUL EXPERIMENT IN PHOTOGRAPHY FROM AIR, DEVELOP WHILE FLYING

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—A successful experiment in photography from the air which is regarded by aviation officials as possessing possibilities of high military value, has just been conducted by the army air service. A photographer flew from Bolling Field to Camp Meade and returned a few minutes later with a plate already developed, showing clearly the parade of citizens attending the citizens training camp there. The plate was developed in the air and ready for printing when the plane returned to the field. Further experiments will be conducted with a view of printing the photographs in the air so they will be ready for distribution when the plane lands.

### KELLY MILLING CO. PLANT AT KANSAS CITY IS BURNED

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 17.—Damage estimated at approximately \$500,000 was caused here early today when the large plant of the Kelly Milling company, located in an east side industrial district, was destroyed by fire. The plant is supposed to have been struck by lightning during a severe electrical storm.

The Kelly plant was one of the largest of its kind in the city. It consisted of a main structure of seven stories, an elevator and several other smaller buildings.

According to Arthur B. Kelly, president of the concern, the plant was valued at \$500,000 and was insured. Mr. Kelly said the mill had a capacity of 25,000 barrels of flour daily and that the elevator would hold 200,000 bushels of grain. About 45,000 bushels of wheat were stored in the elevator, he said, and in the warehouses were between 2,000 and 3,000 barrels of flour. Investigation showed that the lightning bolt struck a chute leading from the elevator to the milling buildings. Because of the rapidity with which the flames spread firemen said they believed grain dust must have been ignited.

### SAYS GREATEST BENEFIT FROM CONFERENCE TO BE OF ECONOMIC CHARACTER

TOKIO, Aug. 17.—"It is my belief that the greatest benefit example will derive from the forthcoming conference in Washington, will be of an economic rather than of a diplomatic or a political character," said Sanji Muto, the leading figure in the Japanese spinning industry, who took a prominent part in the popular movement for armament restriction in this country.

### CANTON GOVERNMENT HAS PRACTICALLY FREE HAND SOUTH OF THE YANGTZE

CANTON, Aug. 17.—The Canton government has practically a free hand south of the Yangtze due to assurances by the authorities of Kweichow, Kiangsi and Fukien that they will not interfere with the Canton program of unification in south China. In addition Kweichow is said to have agreed to send an expedition against the Kwangsi war lord, Lu Yung-Ting.

The people of Szechuen are alleged to have acknowledged the authority of Dr. Sun Yat-sen, as head of the new government, and Hunan is said to be preparing an army of 20,000 men to assist the inhabitants of Hupch to get rid of their military governor, Wang Chan-Yuen, one of those war lords who dominate the Kiang government. The removal of Lu Yung-Ting from Kwangsi and Wang Chan-Yuen from Hupch would mean the freeing of the best part of China from military rule, leaving Chang Tso-Lin of Mukden and Tsao Kun, of Peking Fu to be dealt with.

### PERPETUATE INJUNCTION RESTRAINING THE UNION FROM ORGANIZING MINERS

BLUE FIELDS, W. VA., Aug. 17.—Judge I. C. Herndon of the county circuit court yesterday signed a bill at Princeton making permanent a temporary injunction granted the Pocahontas Coal company against the United Mine Workers of America restraining the union from unionizing in Mercer county.

### WILLING TO STAND TRIAL BEFORE CATHOLIC CLERGY

REDWOOD CITY, CAL., Aug. 17.—Willingness to stand trial before a jury composed of Catholic clergy, was expressed by WILLIAM A. HIGHTOWER held here in connection with the death of Patrick E. Heelan, murdered Colma Catholic priest, the prisoner said in an interview.

"I have such a high regard for the Catholic religion and the Catholic priesthood that I would be willing to be tried by a jury of Catholic priests. I am assured of my own innocence, but I can not expect a fair trial because of the ignorant prejudices of the public mind."

### REDISTRICTING BILL EFFECTIVE IN 1924 GOES TO GOVERNOR

Dispatches from Austin say that there are no indications that Governor Neff will veto the senatorial redistricting bill passed by the legislature. Under the bill redistricting will not become effective until 1924.

The new bill places Wichita county in the 23rd district with Hardeman, Ford, Kays, Wilbarger, Baylor, Archer, Young and Clay counties.

The long deferment of redistricting makes a forecast of candidates for senator from this district very uncertain. It had been no secret that Representative R. F. Johnson had intended to be a candidate but three years is a long time in politics and he may change his plans in the meantime.

### STONE SHORTAGE MAY HOLD UP ROAD CONSTRUCTION WORK

Possibilities of expensive delays in the road construction work in the county again looms up by reason of the Lone Star Stone company at Chico being unable to furnish the required amount of rock.

County Engineer Isbell and Mr. Prentice of the contracting firm of Potts and Prentice made a trip to the quarry Tuesday and upon their return Tuesday night stated that the outlook was indeed gloomy.

Potts and Prentice have already been unable to use their storage supply and with the amount of rock that is in transit it is believed that they will be able to keep operating throughout the week. The sub-contractors, however, who secured the contracts to pave through Iowa Park and Electra will necessarily have to suspend work due to the stone shortage.

County Engineer Isbell, Wednesday, was attempting to make arrangements with another quarry in Oklahoma to furnish the rock, but it will be several days before any definite information can be secured.

### FUNERAL SERVICE FOR BRUCE COBB DELAYED; TO BE HELD THURSDAY

Funeral services arranged to be held in Iowa Park Wednesday afternoon for Bruce Cobb, overseas veteran who was killed in France, were postponed until Thursday when the body of young Cobb failed to arrive from Little Rock, Ark., as had been expected. According to reports received by Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Cobb, parents of the dead soldier, the remains were to have reached Iowa Park Tuesday but later advices indicated that they would not arrive until some time Wednesday afternoon.

Military services have been planned by the Pat Carrigan post of the American Legion, members having arranged to go in a body to attend the services. It was also planned that a bugler and firing squad from Fort Sill should attend.

Cobb was killed while in action in France but a few days before the armistice was signed. He was born and raised in Iowa Park and was well known in this city.

### THIEVES TAKE PARTS FROM AUTO IN STREET

### MRS. J. B. NICHOLSON DIES AS RESULT OF FALL FROM AUTO

Mrs. J. B. Nicholson, for many years a resident of Wichita county, died in the Methodist hospital at 5 o'clock Tuesday afternoon from the effects of injuries sustained early in the morning when she fell from the running board of an automobile near her home, near Wichita Falls on the Petrolia road. Her skull was fractured in the fall and she never regained consciousness.

She had spent the early part of the morning at the home of her son, H. T. Nicholson, who lives but a short distance from the home of his parents, bidding good-bye to Joe Terrell, an old family friend of the Nicholsons, who was leaving the city. She was riding to her own home on the running board of the Terrell car when the wind blew her bonnet from her head, causing her to grasp at it and lose her balance. She fell on her head at the side of the road and was rendered unconscious. A physician was summoned to her home, where she was taken by Mr. Terrell after the accident, and ordered her removal to a hospital.

Mrs. Nicholson had lived in or near

Wichita Falls for the past 15 years and had made many friends during that time. She was 66 years of age. Surviving relatives include her husband, J. B. Nicholson; two sons, J. M. and H. T. Nicholson; and two daughters, Mrs. Ambrose Yeager of Wichita Falls and Mrs. G. R. Rambo of Floydada.

Funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock Thursday morning in the family residence on the Petrolia road, conducted by Rev. W. C. Ashford, assistant pastor of the First Baptist church. Burial will be in Riverside cemetery.

### VERNON LIONS CLUB WILL ASSIST ATHLETIC TEAMS

VERNON, TEXAS, Aug. 17.—The Lions club of Vernon is planning determined backing for athletic teams in the local high school the coming year. G. Schroeder. All have had experience in coaching and playing on university teams. Some games of real calibre are being staged in football for Vernon this fall.

### TAX LEVIES FOR SCHOOLS ARE SET

Tax Assessor's Rolls Are Held Up Due To Non-Arrival of State Tax Rate.

List of the tax levies for the common school districts for 1921 in Wichita county has been supplied to the county tax assessor who now awaits the state rate before beginning the task of compiling his annual rolls for the tax collector.

It was stated Wednesday that no word had been received from the state giving any intimation as to what the rate would be for this year and that indications were that the rate would not be received before the latter part of the month. It is estimated that it will require at least six weeks to complete the rolls.

'TURKEY FOR TURKS' NATIONALIST SLOGAN

Reiterate Determination to Drive Out The Greeks "If It Takes Years."

ANGORA, Aug. 11.—A reiterated determination to drive out the Greeks "if it takes years" is the keynote of conversations which a correspondent of the Associated Press has just had with the nationalist leader, Mustapha Kemal at the latter's villa in the nearby village of Chankali which dominates the Angora plains. "Turkey for the Turks" is the nationalist slogan. "Although the Allies appear to be unable to believe it, we will not bargain nor accept half measures," Kemal said. "We are prepared to go on fighting for what we deem our rights. It is not the first time in history that a war has lasted a century," Kemal said to the correspondent. "It is just that the vanquished party

shall pay for a lost war," he went on, "but it is not just to kill a nation. It is unjust to attempt to divide up Turkish soil, giving part to the Greeks and a part of influence to the French, the Italians and the British. This is a form of political slavery. "Our conception of peace for the mainland has often been stated," Kemal continued. "As for Thrace, eastern Thrace is an inseparable part of our homeland, because of the Turkish majority there. For the rest of Thrace we are willing to agree to a plebiscite. Constantinople, too, is ours, but for the straits and the Sea of Marmora we are willing to accept any solution by which the safety of Constantinople can be protected. My honest opinion is that the old arrangement by which the Turks, armed, guaranteed the neutrality of the straits, is the only working solution. It is patent that an international commission will result in quarrels. "If the allies desire peace and sincerely wish to do make us pay for the war," Kemal concluded, "let them cease trying to divide us, for division means political injustice as well as commercial folly. I realize war is a costly affair, and feel its atrocities deeply, but it would be a greater and lasting ruin if we permitted the cutting up of the country into zones of influence without fighting. "If we are given a chance we will

by our nationalist movement, regenerate Turkey. We already observe prohibition strictly and have also suppressed gambling and card-playing. "We look to the United States to continue its friendship and commerce with us. We believe we are as democratic as the United States, but have no intention to institute a republican government which we do not need. I personally have no ambition to become president. "We shall keep to our Caliphate in Constantinople because the country needs that from a religious standpoint. It is a matter of detail who is made sultan, as he has no political responsibilities. The nation's power lies in the national assembly which is both legislative and executive. We are united. It is not true that there is an Enverist party trying to overthrow me. As for bolshevism, we have a treaty of friendship with them, containing a clause which provides that no propaganda must be undertaken here, because the soviet organization differs from ours fundamentally on account of our religion. TOWN OF ISMID WHERE GREEK HAS MET TURK BEFORE IS AGAIN CENTER OF MILITARY ACTIVITIES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 11.—The name of the town of Ismid, which has figured largely in recent activities of the Greeks and Turkish nationalists and raised the first grave threat of drawing other European powers into the fray, would have appeared many times in heavy black headlines if the modern newspaper had existed throughout historic times, says a bulletin issued by the National Geographic Society from its Washington, D. C., headquarters. Ismid's once impregnable harbor is now silted and its population is barely 20,000. But before Constantinople was enlarged by Constantine the Great, Ismid—then Nicomedia—was for a time the capital of the Roman Empire and the metropolis of the Near East. Once Great Caravan Port. Situated at the head of the Gulf of Ismid, which forms the sheltered Asiatic end of the Sea of Marmora, and with high ground behind it, the town lay in

place in their memorable retreat from Asia to their homes. Near there the decorated Ismid, a refugee from the domestic, committed suicide, and in a villa close by Constantine the Great died. Later after force of Crusaders held the town during the middle ages. Sent of Constantinople the Great. From Nicomedia Diocletian directed the implacable campaign of persecution against the Christians and later the first Christian emperor, Constantine, gathered from his palace, barely 20 miles to the south at Nice, the church council which framed the Nicene Creed and cast a short distance to the west, on the Ismid peninsula in 431 A. D. was held the ecumenical assembly from which the Armenians belated to form the separate Armenian church, which, with the Roman Catholic, the Greek Catholic and the Protestant churches, helps make up the four major divisions of Christianity. History is closely repeating itself at Ismid. Just as the Turkish nationalists drove the modern Greeks from the town in recent weeks, so in 151 the Muslims, pushing far into the Asiatic territories of the Byzantine Greeks, defeated their armies at Nicomedia and occupied on the east bank of the Bosphorus and the city of Constantinople. The Emperor, Isaac, ransomed the city and the other occupied territories. But the Mohammedans slowly

encroached, and in 1338 Nicomedia fell permanently into the hands of the Turks. It remained a threat to Constantinople until 1452 when the threat was a good, and Constantinople became Stamboul and the church of Sophia a Mohammedan mosque. The Ismid of today has little to remind the observer of its glorious history. An old Greek acropolis flanked by Roman and Byzantine towers is about the only remaining link with its ancient past. The iron and wood caravans of the Bagdad railway do not need to pause in Ismid as did the camel trains, and its toll from commerce has dwindled away. To it the world no longer looks either for creeds or the treasures of Arabia—only for a modest supply of silk, cocoons, tobacco and forest products. **OFFICERS TRAINING CAMP SUCCESSFULLY DEVELOPS A NEW DENSE SMOKE SCREEN**

BALTIMORE, MD., Aug. 17.—A white smoke screen, denser and more impenetrable to vision than any smoke screen yet invented was demonstrated yesterday at Camp Meade for the members of the reserve officers' training camp. It is a new invention, the secret of which is being guarded closely by chemists and army officers developing its use.

When the smoke candles were lighted, instead of seeing black clouds as they had seen on the battlefields of France, the reserve officers were surprised by the beautiful white clouds which rose from the ground. They were so dense that they seemed almost solid.

Major Earl J. Atkinson, commandant of the Edgewood arsenal, said today the white smoke candles was a distinct improvement over the black smoke candles used during the war. They not only possess a greater obscuring power, he said, but produce smoke in greater quantities. They are not poisonous and produce no toxic effect.

"There is no point to infantry advancing in the open any more," said Major Atkinson. "The smoke candles can be thrown in front of an advancing line by mortars or artillery."

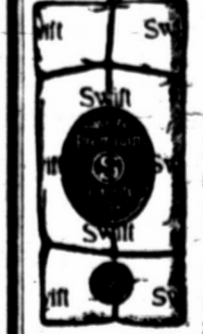

### KELL BELIEVES KELLOGG BILL WILL AFFORD RELIEF

Belief that the Kellogg amendment to the Norris bill will give the war finance board power to make such loans to the cattle men as will aid in saving that industry was expressed by Frank Kell upon his return from Washington Tuesday when he has been a member of a special committee to urge some relief measure by congress.

Mr. Kell issued a statement which follows: "The committee, composed of Hon. Marion Sansom of Fort Worth, Judge R. L. Taylor of Austin, A. C. Williams of Fort Worth and myself, appointed by the executive committee of the Texas Cattle Raisers' association to go to Washington City for the purpose of securing such additional legislation as would be necessary in order to enable the war finance corporation to make direct loans to the cattle men of the west, on its arrival found that the Kellogg bill, which is an amendment to the Norris bill, and which is known as the farmers' export bill, gives to the war finance corporation the legal authority to make these direct loans, and if the Kellogg bill as now amended is passed and becomes a statutory enactment it will give to the war finance corporation the authority to make about what the cattle men desire done.

We had an extended conference with the chairman and several of the directors of the war finance corporation, and have their assurance that if the Kellogg bill is accepted by the house as it is passed by the senate, that the war finance corporation will immediately arrange the machinery for taking care of the cattle industry and where necessary, they have assured us that they will make direct loans.

We had a personal talk with Senator Kellogg, who felt that we might endanger the life of the bill if we undertook to introduce any additional amendments at this time.

We came from Washington city feeling that the bankers' attitude which is now in operation will offer relief to a considerable portion of the cattle business and while this will not reach the ranges and take care of the cows and calves as we would like, at the same time it will do a great deal of good, and with the passage of the Kellogg bill, if the war finance corporation carries out its assurance to us, we feel that relief will come to the cattle industry.

We are especially thankful to all members of the Texas delegation as well as a number of the Oklahoma and Kansas congressmen, delegation and also to Senator Kellogg of Minnesota and Senator Bursum of New Mexico, all of whom were helpful to our efforts.

### DIGGING FOR GOLD HIDDEN BY ROBBER ON HOLLIDAY CREEK

Wichita Falls may soon be in the charmed circle of cities that have found buried treasure at the door step, for operations were started Wednesday morning by a party of gold seekers who aver that a vast store of wealth, hidden fourteen years ago by a notorious bank robber, is lying buried less than a mile from the business section of the city. An excavation was started early in the morning and when discovered by the police shortly after noon a hole some four feet in diameter and five feet deep had been sunk, but no treasure chests had at that time been brought to light.

According to the stories of the strangers, the gold, "thousands and thousands of dollars of it," was buried late in 1907 by a notorious bank robber now serving a life sentence for murder in the Oklahoma state penitentiary. One of the "prospectors" reports that he had "done" Wichita Falls with the outlaw and that while they worked together behind prison walls the old robber told of the hidden treasure and gave directions as to how it could be recovered.

The money was stolen from an Oklahoma bank and secreted at a point four feet north of what is now the Henrietta road just before it crosses Holliday creek. The robber was captured, it is said, ere he could return for his ill-gotten gain.

Whether money is actually hidden at the point indicated remains to be seen, but it is a fact that a four foot hole and a awaiting pick, welder were present east of the city Wednesday, and the fact that the money was hidden from Oklahoma with the express purpose of making the search, were confident of their ultimate success.
