PROCEEDINGS OF TEXAS COURT CRIMINAL APPEALS

AUSTIN, Nov. 2.—The court of criminal appeals today affirmed the life term imposed on Fleming Johnson, convicted in Lamar county for murder. The case of J. N. Gunn of Bell county, given 20 years for murder, was also affirmed, and remanded to the trial court for a new trial.

AMERICA MAY YET TAKE HAND IN THE GERMAN PAYMENTS

EUROPE'S DILLY-DALLY GETTING ON WASHINGTON'S NERVES.

FUNDAMENTAL CAUSES SHOULD BE REMOVED

Action is Necessary to Cure the World Industrial Depression.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—There is at present in Washington, a representative of British bankers, who is holding informal conferences with American bankers and with American officials looking to the possibility of an international institution similar to what is known as the Tor Meulen bank plan, for the direct or indirect stabilizing of exchange. Probably it is the presence of this agent that is responsible in part for the constantly recurring talk about the coming Washington conference taking up "financial matters." No such relation actually exists. There is no intention of taking up financial matters at the coming armament

conference. The two things are wholly separate. The present financial proposal from England is aimed primarily to interest American bankers and business men rather than the American government. It is true that our system of statutory control of national banks through the federal reserve system, together with our present policy of maintaining an informal contact on the part of the government with our private bankers may enter, makes it necessary for such a proposal as the present one to come ultimately to the notice of the federal government. The plan proposed appeals to us favorably. Our import and export business is directly dependent to a great degree on the stabilizing of exchange and our domestic prosperity is ultimately dependent upon it. In fact, the progressive breakdown of international trade is the most conspicuous single factor in the industrial depression from which America now suffers.

Depends on the U. S. In a speech which the controller of the currency, Mr. Cressinger made before the New York State Bankers' association as long ago as last June, he said, in speaking of a similar proposal, "I may frankly state my belief that the efficiency of international co-operative measures to deal with these matters must in large measure depend on the hearty participation of the United States. My present views have been forced upon me by study and observation of the whole link of financial and economic development and of the essential unity of the world's business fabric. People who want to feel generous may urge us to the whole link of co-operation on the ground that we will be helping others. I do not need that unctious. I can urge this in all sincerity from the entirely selfish motive of helping ourselves. But I realize that in helping ourselves, we are also helping others." It is also true that there are certain fundamental factors that cannot be escaped. International exchange is merely a by-product. It reflects causes, but is not in itself a cause. By a closer

analogy, international exchange is like a spirit level that measures the relative height of the amount of work and business being done in different countries. You can no more cure fundamental causes by attempting to stabilize exchange than you can cure a fever by tampering with the figures on the thermometer. The fundamental causes of Europe's inability to buy from us, of fluctuations of European currency, and of the paralysis of international trade, lie in the improper courses now being pursued by several European governments. The faulty things which these European governments are doing are these: They are printing a steadily increasing quantity of paper currency, they are spending large sums on maintaining armies and they are failing to keep their expenditures within their income. There is nothing more obvious in the world than the fact that American cannot prevent these European governments from doing these things. Only the governments themselves can do that. Until the governments at fault are willing to take the necessary steps towards sound business any help that America can give and any interest that American can take can only be largely academic.

Another Factor A complete list of the causes of paralysis in international trade would include one more factor, namely, the failure of the European allies to fix the amount of the German reparations at a sum which the business men of the world will see is reasonable, also as the real amount of the German reparations remains unfixed, this factor will have an adverse effect upon international trade in a multitude of ways. This factor also is one which the United States cannot cure. It can only be cured by action on the part of the European allies in taking up once more the subject of German reparations and fixing them in the way they ought to have been fixed in the beginning. Meantime, America's prosperity

must continue to suffer from causes over which we have no control. It is true there is an alternative constantly urged by many. That alternative is to go backward a certain distance from our present isolation from European affairs, re-enter the reparations commission and take upon ourselves the initiative which is properly the duty of the European allies. If the European allies continue to fail to act, and if our commercial distress is prolonged, the time may come when the business elements among us and what is politically more potent, our farmers may look with tolerance on this course. For the present, however, the political sentiment that has been built up in opposing to taking any part in European affairs makes the latter alternative impossible. There is nothing to do but wait.

The news of his sudden illness and surgical operation came as a great shock to his hundreds of friends in the city, as he was on duty the entire day Tuesday and was in apparent good health.

The pretty debutante who wants to be strictly Vogue has to resort to false hair. The "Debutante" which illustrates the evolution of the bobbed head to the lovely coiffeur, is based, of course, upon the waved hair with its slight fringe and the slight pompadour.

NEW CHAIRMAN OF DEMOCRATIC PARTY OUTLINES POLICIES

DEVELOP COMMITTEE INTO MILITANT EFFICIENT ORGANIZATION

TO ORGANIZE VARIOUS STATES AND COUNTIES

Also Plans to Maintain an Efficient Publicity Bureau

By Associated Press. ST. LOUIS, Nov. 2.—Development of the democratic national committee into the "most militant and efficient organization" within his capacity and dissemination of facts concerning the "shortcomings" of the present national administration, among the "average citizens" is in brief to be the policy of Cordell Hull, the new democratic chairman, he outlined today to the Associated Press. Mr. Hull expects to leave here today for Washington, arriving there tomorrow evening.

The new chairman's policies are briefly outlined in the following statement: "The first step in administering the affairs of the committee will be to pay off the present indebtedness and create a good atmosphere in which to work. We shall try to pay all debts at an early date. We shall also proceed at once with establishment of a systematic and thorough organization in the various states and counties. In this same connection we shall strive to maintain an efficient publicity bureau to get unbiased and accurate facts relating to the shortcomings of the republican administration before the average citizens.

"People have been fed upon a vast amount of misrepresentations, misinformation and falsehoods concerning the true record of the democratic administration covering the period since 1918. Subsequent events and daily happenings have exploded a vast number of these falsehoods which at times were very dangerous.

Lewis Favors Abolition of National Committee

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 2.—Former United States Senator J. Hamilton Lewis of Illinois, who attended the democratic national committee meeting yesterday, said the fight between the McAdoo and Cox contingents for the championship was as profitless as a "mutiny in an army preparing for war over the selection of a drill sergeant for dress parade."

"He said the conflict between the McAdoo and Cox forces over the organization would make a former vice-president Thomas R. Marshall the nominee for president in 1924. Lewis advocated the abolition of the democratic national committee and the other party national committees, declaring they are not needed in national elections. He issued a statement giving his views as follows: "The national campaign committees of all political parties ought to be abolished. There is now no need for any of them in the national election. The state election machinery in each state in presidential election conducts the elections which choose presidential senators and congressmen at the same time the state officials are elected. The day has gone when there was conflict and jealousies between state and nation, and their officials, as well as when there were different dates for state and national elections. We should now have only state committees, aided by a campaign committee chosen by the candidates for president and vice-president as they are named by the conventions, this campaign committee to merely co-operate

DEATH PENALTY FOR TOM SLAUGHTER IS VERDICT RETURNED

FINE BLUFF, ARK., Nov. 2.—Tom Slaughter, handit, heard a jury declare him guilty of murder in the first degree in a "baron circuit court here late yesterday. The verdict carries the death penalty. Sentence will be pronounced this week. It took the jurors just one hour and fifteen minutes to declare that Slaughter, a life-terminer at the state convict farm at Tucker, killed Bliss Adkisson, another convict, in a futile attempt to escape September 18, here.

DEAN PROHIBITION LAW IS ATTACKED FROM NEW ANGLE

AUSTIN, Nov. 2.—Senator Joe Burckett of Eastland is here today to attack the constitutionality of the Dean prohibition law from a new angle in submitting an appeal to the court of criminal appeals. He announced that he would attack the law from a conflicting standpoint, holding that back in 1899 the legislature passed a law declaring it a misdemeanor to "unlawfully sell intoxicating liquors."

At this time, he said, local option was in effect in numbers of counties of the state and the law was passed primarily to make the unlawful sale of liquor punishable, but that the law has never been repealed and the Dean law does not carry a clause repealing all laws in conflict with it, he pointed out. Thus, Mr. Burckett's conclusion is that there are two laws against selling intoxicating liquors now on the statute books of the state, one making it a misdemeanor and the other declaring it a felony.

FORMER EMPEROR ON WAY TO EXILE

With Former Empress, Charles Will Be Landed at Galatz, Rumania

BUDAPEST, Nov. 2.—Former Emperor Charles was today on his way out of Hungary to begin what appeared to be permanent exile. He and former Empress Zita left Ti-hany yesterday for Dunafoldvar, a town on the Danube below this city, and there they went on board the British gunboat Glow Worm. Arrangements have been made to land the erstwhile monarch at Galatz, Rumania, a city about 100 miles from the mouth of the Danube.

Preparations were being made here today for a special session of the Hungarian national assembly tomorrow, at which time a resolution deposing the Hapsburg dynasty from the throne will be presented. The assembly was convoked of the government in response to an ultimatum from the allied powers directing that all ties between the Hapsburg family and Hungary be formally severed.

RAILROADS TO TRANSPORT FREE TO THE SEABOARDS GRAIN FOR EAST RELIEF

TOPEKA, KANS., Nov. 2.—On behalf of all the railroads of the country, J. R. Coontz, assistant freight traffic manager of the Santa Fe, today notified W. H. Eiby of Topeka, regional manager of the near east relief association, that the railroads have agreed to transport free to the seaboard two million bushels of grain for export to the near east sufferers. This free movement of grain is equivalent to 11,500 cars of 50,000 pounds each, or 22 trains of 50 cars each. The shipments may also include grain products.

The splendid old dean of American organists, who has held thousands of audiences all over the world enraptured at his performances, is to give his concert here at the First Baptist church Thursday evening of next week.

"The Diapason," a leading American organ journal, has this to say of Mr. Eddy:

"There are not many cities in the United States in which the name of Clarence Eddy is not known, and his accomplishments are equally well known in Europe. He has given recitals and has dedicated new organs in every state in America. In Chicago alone Mr. Eddy has presented nearly four hundred recitals.

"The directors of the great exposition which have been given in this country or abroad always have hastened to avail themselves of the services of an artist whose skill and whose musical inspiration are as remarkable as the skill and the inspiration of Mr. Eddy. So he has played the organ in the great exhibitions of Vienna, Philadelphia, Paris, Chicago, San Francisco, St. Louis, etc.

C. H. CLARK CITES EVIDENCES OF CITY'S PRESENT STABILITY AND OF ITS FUTURE GROWTH

Land in the Wichita river valley planted to pecan trees after 10 years of growth will be worth not less than \$1,000 acre and will be better than any orange grove in California, C. H. Clark told members of the Wichita club at the weekly luncheon Wednesday, in discussing present conditions and the future of Wichita Falls. Mr. Clark referred to the account of his experiments with pecan culture which appeared in The Times recently and said that he and Walter Cline had 170,000 young pecan trees growing under the care of the greatest pecan expert in the country.

Mr. Clark's reference to pecan culture was incidental to his discussion of the irrigation project and what it would mean for the future of Wichita Falls. He said that a few pessimists had asked what could be grown under irrigation. He said that good seasons of ample rainfall had shown that almost anything could be grown here.

"We have had the soil and the sunshine and when we get the water, we will market not a few hundred thousand dollars worth of products but millions of dollars worth," Mr. Clark said.

He said that progress was being made toward the sale of the bonds and that when they were sold work would start immediately. The \$1,500,000 from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds would be expended for labor, he said, which would be of immediate benefit to the community. The moment the bonds were sold, investments in land in the valley would

be made and this would turn more millions of dollars to this community.

Mr. Clark said that there were 500 more children enrolled in the schools than a year ago and that there were no empty houses in Wichita Falls and that rents continued high—too high. He told the prospects for another railroad to the north into Oklahoma and said that as much as Wichita Falls appreciated Frank Kell, he doubted whether he was appreciated at his real worth.

He paid tribute to the banks of Wichita Falls.

"The banks of Wichita Falls have done a heroic task," he said, "and I doubt whether there is another community in Texas whose banks could have held things together under similar conditions as the banks of Wichita Falls have done."

He turned from a discussion of material things to those of another nature.

"We must not forget that we have the might of the golden rule into our business and our every day lives," he said. "Let us do unto others as they should do to us and let us help one another as best we can."

The burden of the great work of carrying on the development of the community was falling upon the younger men of the country, Mr. Clark said. They must be prepared to carry on the work. Their opportunity, he said, was as great as their responsibility and their duty.
