



EXPECT TO AGREE ON A PROGRAM TO DEVELOP AIRCRAFT

DO NOT WANT TO DISCOURGE COMMERCIAL POSSIBILITIES MOVING AT SNAIL PACE ALL OVER THE WORLD

Expect No Serious Proposal for Limitation of Arms Conference

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—Decision of the American delegation to the conference on limitation of arms to exclude aircraft from proposals for reduction and future limitation of naval forces goes deeper for its reasons than Secretary Hughes indicated in his statement, saying merely that the ready convertibility of commercial aircraft to war purposes made the writing of aircraft limitation impractical.

View Reflected in Proposal. This is the view taken by army and navy officials of the United States and is reflected in the American proposal to the conference. It is to be expected, as the conference moves along, that the limitation of the use of aircraft, to curb bombing of defenseless cities and civilian non-combatants, hospitals and the like in war, will be written in a definite place for that on the agenda, but no government would look with favor for any proposal that would tend to discourage inventors and public and private enterprises from plugging the possibilities of air routes in the view of finding cheap, fast methods of communication and transport.

As to convertibility, it is apparent that the military and naval officials, if any other member, could be loaded with bombs for war purposes, equipped with machine guns and other things, put into fighting shape in a matter of hours. Without any change whatever, a commercial airplane in war for the purpose as yet of military and naval aircraft, according to the view of army and navy officials, is a point where the old-time surface craft of the battleline have lost their importance as the main reliance in war at sea, but they are being developed in a way that adds to the factors to the game of war and that in the future may be such a factor as to wholly revolutionize naval warfare.

The affair, which was given at the Metropolitan Hotel, was one of the most brilliant functions yet tendered distinguished visitors to the conference. Ranking members of the military and naval delegations to the conference and heads of the various divisions of the American army were among those invited.

PLAYER RECEIVES AWARD FOR INJURIES SUSTAINED IN A BASEBALL GAME

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 16.—For the first time since the start of the baseball season a player has received an award for injuries sustained in a game. The award was made to David J. Hickman against the Oil City Baseball association. His leg was broken at the opening of the 1921 season and he is unable to play baseball, according to his statement. He will receive \$12 a week for the period in which he was accustomed to play baseball from May 17 to November 8.

NO LIMIT FIXED ON LOANS ON LIVESTOCK

Corporation Accepts Whatever Paper is Submitted by Reputable Banks

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—No limit has been fixed by the war finance corporation for individual loans on livestock in Texas. Instead the corporation stands ready to accept whatever paper is submitted by reputable banks and so endorsed. This information was conveyed to Representatives Hudspeth and Summers today by Director Angus McLean of the corporation, when the Texas congressman called to see him relative to a loan requested of \$100 a head on a herd of prize cattle near San Angelo. Information had reached the congressmen that advisors of the corporation in Texas had refused to grant a loan of more than \$100 a head.

RE-ARREST WOMAN WHO JUMPED \$10,000 BOND

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 16.—Mattie Howard, convicted here in October, 1919, on a charge of having murdered Joseph Morino, diamond broker, who jumped a \$10,000 bond after being sentenced to 12 years in the penitentiary, was re-arrested last night in Memphis, Tenn.

**Most Serious Ailment of the Movies Is "Growing Pains"**

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—What's the matter with the movies? You and your next-door neighbor keep asking it. Newspapers and periodicals are filling their columns with discussions of the question.

This writer reads 50,000 feet of film a week and three stage performances. As far as he can see there isn't nearly as much the matter with the movies as there is with the stage, i. e., as far as matters needing censorship are concerned.

There are stage plays on Broadway today which would be killed in their entirety were they to be transferred to the screen. If they were not killed they would ruin the business of any neighborhood exhibitor who would show them.

That might not hold true for a Broadway movie house, although it has been this writer's observation that even Broadway movie fans demand cleaner entertainment than Broadway stage patrons.

There are few stage plays now showing that could escape film and actors without serious changes in their stories.

The only thing "the matter" with the screen is that it has the growing pains. Paul Brunet, president of Pathe, put it a little differently the other day.

"Public taste is on a higher plane than it was a few years ago," he said. "Audiences are growing more and more discriminating, but the better class of producers has succeeded in keeping pace with the popular demand for a more careful choice of subjects and better technique in pictorialization."

The competent producer welcomes a public manifestation for a higher quality of photoplays. That is the clearest road now open to the true progress in our art.

The thing that is missing in the movies is highbrow stuff—works of art which enlighten as well as entertain and are as worthy to survive as fine paintings, sculpture, novels and dramas survive, and receive their power of entertainment for each succeeding generation.

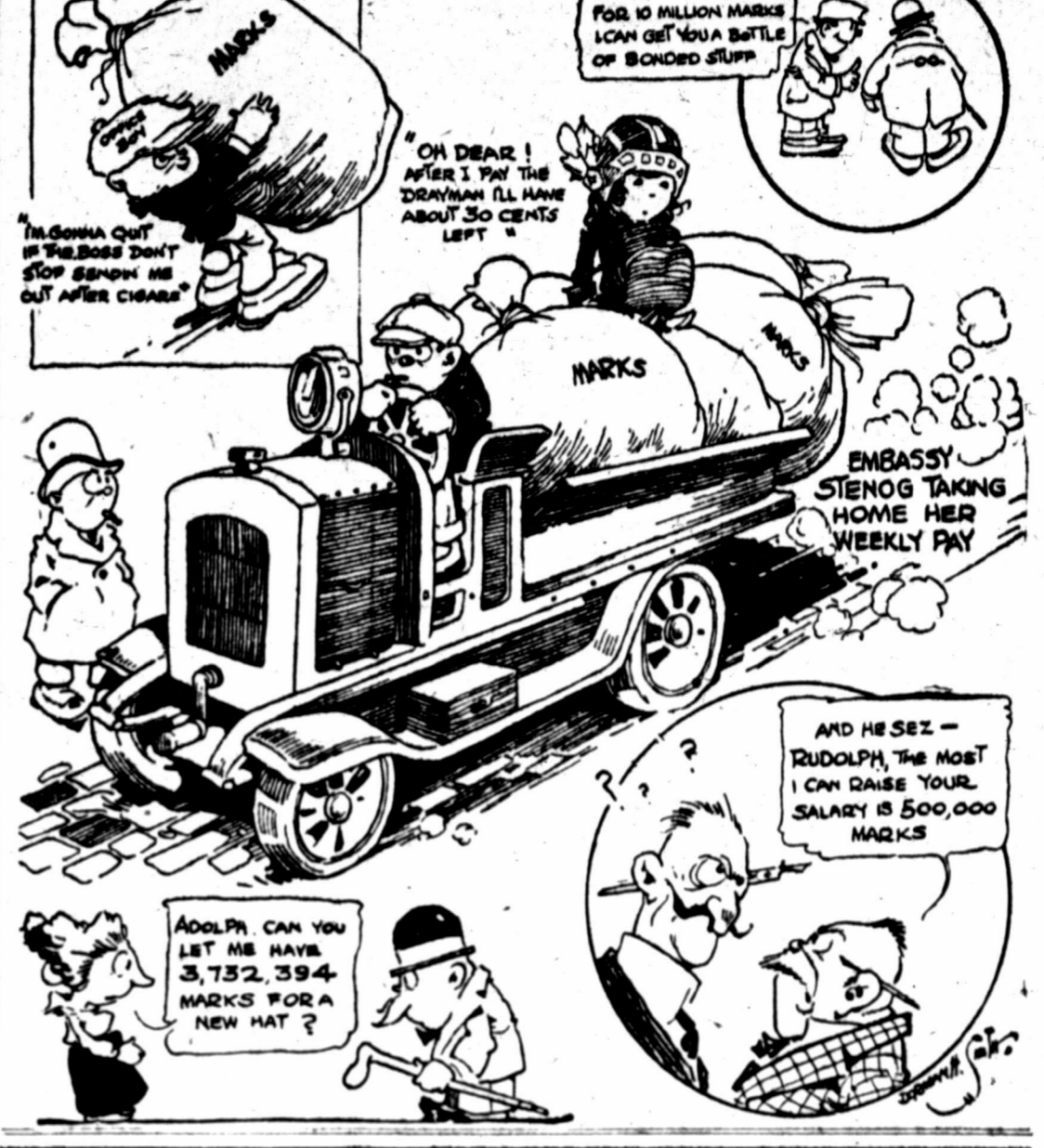

# ENGLAND MAY GO U. S. ONE BETTER ON DISARMAMENT

## CONSIDERS MOTION TO CUT SECRETARY HUGHES' PROGRAM IN TWO

### WILL BE VIRTUALLY ABANDONMENT OF WAR

Plan Practically the Same as Universal and Complete Disarmament

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 16.—It must be taken for granted that there are future implications in the Hughes' disarmament proposal not revealed in the text. In some respects these implications are fully as important as the proposed step itself.

In fact, it is not too much to expect the future effect of the Hughes plan would be practically the same as universal and complete disarmament. It is these future implications which the militarists of some of the nations not great in number but high in power, foresee more quickly than the general public does and are made uncomfortable thereby. Already, in the great note of public approval, we are hearing little mouse-like squeaks about labor thrown out of employment by the closing of shipyards, about professional naval morale destroyed, about national pride hurt by the scrapping of great historic ships and the like and about the "loss"—a grotesque idea—involved in scrapping a battleship on which a million pounds has been spent already.

In the situation as it stands at this hour, the aspect of the Hughes plan which has the most important bearing on the future is that for the next 10 years or more it establishes a relative of armament among the three powers concerned. It is out of this fixing of relativeity that the most hopeful results in the future are to be expected after the Hughes proposal, or any modification of it, is in effect. It will be quickly realized that there will not be more use in any of the great powers maintaining even as much armament as this arrangement leaves them.

Just as soon as each of the nations realizes that it is on a secure defensive basis, and that none of the others is in a position to conduct a war against it, at the same moment it will be realized that there is no use of maintaining even as much armament as the Hughes arrangement accords to each nation. Certainly the United States will be quick to realize this. If the present program is adopted, it is to be expected that within six months the United States would tie up in the docks fully half of the vessels permitted to us and would man them with only skeleton crews. It is almost equally certain that the other nations would do the same. In the case of the United States this can be more certainly predicted because the money saving achieved by the United States in the Hughes' plan will not really be so great as has been commonly taken for granted in the hurried figuring of the last two or three days. To save as much money as the people of this country are going to insist on saving when they no longer need to fear war, it will be necessary to take advantage of the safety which is the real heart of the Hughes' program and reduce naval expenditures to a much smaller limit than the plan permits.

This future result of the adoption of the Hughes' plan would be likely to go really the whole length in the direction of disarmament. As soon as one realizes that his rope is so short that he cannot reach the other fellow anyhow, he ceases his objections to making it even shorter. The great outstanding thing about the Hughes' proposal is that it makes war impossible with the existing armament that any nation will have. The psychological effect of this would be exactly the same as that of complete disarmament. Utterly the Hughes' plan would be most likely to reduce the armaments of the world not merely to a defensive basis, but to the minimum of the purely police basis necessary for keeping pirates off the seas and that kind of thing.

The naval experts have been hectically busy with their pencils and logarithms ever since 11:30 Saturday morning. But as soon as they get an opportunity to sit a little sleep they will realize what the thoughtful already know, namely, that the Hughes proposal means the ending of war as a contest between forces prepared in advance and that all their minute calculations as to the relation of cruiser to seaplanes and the like are futile and beside the point.

This is a drawing of Japan's new monster battleships, Kaga and Tosa, which, as units in Japan's 1915-19 naval program, are to be launched shortly. They will be the largest and most powerful warships the world has ever known, says the current issue of Popular Science monthly. The picture portrays the enormously costly naval construction to which the powers will henceforth be forced to compete, unless the disarmament conference at Washington results in a limitation of armaments. When completed the ships will cost around \$40,000,000 each. Normal displacements of the ships are about 41,300 tons as against 32,500 tons for the Maryland, pride of the United States navy, and 41,200 tons for the prize British battle cruiser Hood. Their main batteries will fire a broadside of no less than 24,500 pounds, as against 15,534 for the Maryland and 15,600 for the Hood. The length of the ship is 700 feet and the beam 104 feet normal, and 108 feet at the extreme. The 16-inch guns, mounted on five turrets, two to a turret, fire a shell weighing 2,400 pounds, at a speed of about 2,700 feet a second, that will pierce 12 inches of armor at a range of 12 miles. Twenty-two 5.5-inch guns are mounted high which will make them available in all kinds of weather. There are four anti-aircraft guns and four deck and four submerged 21-inch torpedo tubes. Immense British-built turbines will drive these ships at a normal speed of 23 knots.

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WAGE REDUCTION IN PART SETTLEMENT MINES OF COLORADO STRIKE EXPECTED

Notice Posted Involves Thirty Per Cent Cut at Thirteen Plants

DENVER, Nov. 14.—Notice of a general wage reduction of about 30 per cent to take effect tomorrow morning in thirteen of the company's twenty-six coal mines in Colorado was posted at the headquarters of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company here this morning. The order reducing wages directly affects about 2,500 men employed in mines in Las Animas and Huerfano counties. None of the company's mines in Fremont and Gunnison counties is affected.

It is the contention of the company that the reduction of wages is being put into effect in accordance with agreements with the employees of the mines affected which were made last August. At that time, it was expected that the men circulated petitions asking that in order to increase their working time, their wages be reduced. The strike has not been disturbed by the company's action, although the 2,000 shops involved are picketed during working hours by the strikers.
