



## CONFERENCE BEGINS AUSPICIOUSLY

Secretary Hughes' proposals were a bold and master stroke and already, even before we have gotten through gasping, Great Britain, Japan and France have announced their acceptance of the proposals in spirit and in principle. This much has been accomplished before the conference was in session two days. Of course, there is a great amount of detail to be worked out which will take weeks and perhaps months, but the acceptance of the principle of the proposals, if agreed upon at all, had been expected to be the works of weeks instead of days.

The conference has begun most auspiciously, and while it is admitted that there are perplexing probiems yet to come, it is expected that they will be approached in the same bold, straightforward manser in which Mr. Hughes announced the American disarmament proposal







This future result of the adoption of the Hughes' plan would be likely to go really the whole length in the direction of disarmament. As soon as one realizes that his rope is so short that he cannot reach the other fellow anyhow, he toses his objections to making it even shorter. The great outstanding things about the Hughes' proposal is that it makes war impossible with the existing armament that any nation will have. The psychological effects will have.
