WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Stock issued by a company organized in 1915 to take over all property, assets, rights, etc., of and distributed among the stockholders of the parent company, was subject to the income tax law of 1912, the supreme court held today.

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### WILBARGER COUNTY DRIVE WEDNESDAY FOR WELFARE FUNDS

VERNON, TEXAS, Nov. 21.—Plans were inaugurated Saturday afternoon at a meeting of the Wilbarger County Welfare association for the inauguration of a county-wide drive Wednesday, Nov. 23, for the purpose of providing the organization with funds for the next year. The city will be divided into districts, and two workers will be appointed for each block. The association hopes to raise \$5,000 for work, which was formerly carried on at considerable more expense. Furthermore, some of the money raised before went out of the county and it is planned to keep the entire amount raised this time at home.

In the event that the full quota is subscribed, a statement has been issued to the citizens informing them that it will not be necessary to donate one cent to any beggar in the county. The association will be equipped to care for these wants itself.

The new organization is a combination of all the welfare bodies in the county, and its aim is to systematize the work of caring for the needy and avoiding duplication of effort. Already it has manifested its presence in various ways. A 1921 who died of typhoid fever was given a good burial, an expectant mother was sent to relatives in another state, a 17-year-old soldier, needed at home, was obtained his discharge, and various men have been found work.

### VETERANS' CLAIMS CAN BE ADJUSTED IN DISTRICT OFFICES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Decentralization of the veterans' bureau, promised by Col. C. R. Forbes in October, has now advanced to the point where the district offices will now be authorized to adjust the old claims as well as the new ones. Only a master file of each case will be retained in the Washington office and whatever negotiations may be necessary or additional proof required will be submitted to the regional director of the district within which the claimant may live. It is estimated that within 30 days the disability cases now on file with the veterans' bureau also will be in the hands of the regional directors. This radical change in administration of veterans' relief is expected to speed up adjustment of all claims. There will be no necessity for the ex-serviceman to come to Washington to press his claim. In fact that would only serve to delay action for the regional directors and the staffs assigned to each of the offices will have power to pass finally on any question which may be submitted.

A large number of experts trained in handling claims of veterans have been transferred from the regional offices and this, it is believed, will result in a big reduction in the volume of work now performed by the veterans' bureau staff here.

The fourteen regional offices are located at Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Washington, Atlanta, New Orleans, Cincinnati, Chicago, St. Louis, Minneapolis, Denver, San Francisco, Seattle and Dallas. In addition there are 146 sub-offices, each of which will be equipped to handle the claims of that particular section.

### LIGHT WINDS FROM NORTH AND CLEAR SKY ARE GENERAL

Throughout the district surrounding Wichita Falls clear skies, light north winds and moderately cold weather prevailed Monday morning with no indications of any material change, except slightly higher temperature for Tuesday.

### CONGRESSMAN PARRISH SEES A REAL DISPOSITION AT CAPITAL TO BRING ABOUT DISARMAMENT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—A real disposition to bring about disarmament is seen by Representative Lucian W. Parrish in the arms conference now being held here in Washington. Congressman Parrish has been a close observer of this conference and is convinced that it is a step in the right direction, which, if followed, will make for the future peace of the world. In discussing the disarmament conference today, Congressman Parrish said: "I believe that the international conference for the limitation of armaments is progressing most satisfactorily. When the czar of Russia called the first conference of this character in 1893, there was a general acceptance of his invitation, but the response was not in any sense enthusiastic or whole-hearted, and the subsequent history of that conference and other conferences of a similar character, discloses that there was no genuine enthusiasm on the part of at least some of the great nations, and while the conference were being held the opportunity to prevent war passed, and suddenly we found ourselves thrown into the greatest war of all history. There is no doubt but what this war could have been averted had the nations attending the conference been seriously in earnest about disarmament."

"However, the call for the present conference met with an entirely different reception. Wholeheartedly and enthusiastically the invited nations responded, and when the United States presented its program for a definite limitation of

armaments there was a genuine disposition to co-operate to the fullest extent in the acceptance of the principles laid down. When we observe, as we did on yesterday, that England is willing to surrender her concessions in China if France and Japan will do likewise, we see a real disposition to sacrifice in order that this conference may succeed, and while the conference is yet young and the result of its deliberations still in doubt, yet, I believe that great good is going to be accomplished and that, through the effort of the representatives present, supported by a strong public sentiment, the future peace of the world will be made more secure and the burdens and horrors of war further removed from the hearts and consciences, not only of the people of our own beloved country, but of the other nations as well.

"I certainly pray that such will be the result."

### P. O. DEPARTMENT PLANS TO CARE FOR CHRISTMAS RUSH

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The postoffice department is planning a month ahead to take care of the Christmas rush and in that connection has suggested to the postmasters of various cities that, where consent of the proper authorities is obtainable, school houses be utilized as distributing centers.

This plan was tried out in one city last year and marked success was attained. Not only were the Christmas packages distributed in record time but it was much easier for the postmen, who could make many trips instead of one or two in a day, and at a marked reduction in cost to the department.

In his letter to city postmasters, the postmaster general suggests that if the use of school houses can be obtained for a period of four days before Christmas and one day afterwards, much of the confusion incident to Christmas deliveries can be eliminated. Mail and packages for a section centering about the school can be sorted and delivered there at night. The postmen can then re-sort it so it can be handled in the most expeditious manner. Such offices as adopt this system

As a further aid to Christmas mail delivery the postoffice department is considering the authorization of concessions in the postoffice to persons who will wrap and properly tie bundles. This has long been one of the difficulties with Christmas mail and officials here believe the public would welcome such a service and be willing to pay a reasonable amount. If efficiency and courtesy is insured.

# FOREIGN ENVOYS RUSH TO ENDORSE HUGHES ARMS PLAN

## DELEGATES SWEEP OFF FEET BY PRESSURE FROM HOME.

### ALL OF QUESTIONS MAY BE SETTLED WITH EASE

#### Even Far East Problem Likely to Be Adjusted Without Friction.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—One of the ablest of the foreign correspondents here is Col. Repington, author of the famous war diary, who writes for the London Daily Telegraph. Col. Repington began his dispatch with the words, "this conference is so replete with infinite possibilities that it is not safe to conclude that our opinions of today will be those of tomorrow."

Col. Repington's use of the word "possibilities" reflects on his part an underlying skepticism which is shared by a few of the other British representatives. It is rather the state of mind which we in America describe as "waiting to be shown."

But the main point that Col. Repington makes about the rapid changes from day to day, and from hour to hour, is about the most conspicuous thing here. I have the feeling, and I think most of the newspaper men share it, that while we write the thing as it is, it frequently turns out that the situation has progressed several furlongs by the time it is printed. This makes the recording of events difficult. It is also true that it makes it easy, when you look into the situation closely, to put your finger on the huge fundamental trend which determines these shifting details.

What is happening is this: The effects of Hughes' opening speech are still spreading like giant waves over every corner of the earth. That speech is stimulating a response of such proportions that when it comes back here it causes the delegates from all other countries constantly and rapidly to change their point of view in the direction of assent to what Hughes wants. Not only does it cause them to show an increasing disposition to accept whatever Hughes wants on the far east subject and everything else.

**Powerful Effect of Hughes' Speech**  
The public approval of Hughes' speech in foreign countries is of such an overwhelming character that it has had something of the effect of a force of nature. When its echoes roll back here the representatives of foreign countries are unwilling to seem even in the faintest degree to be standing in the way of it. This leads them to a degree of abandonment of their original positions, and a degree of assent to the Hughes' program that may almost have disadvantages, even from the American point of view. It makes you sometimes wonder whether the only danger in the Hughes program may turn out to be, so to speak, in the excess of its success. If things continue to go as they are, the Hughes program will go through without even those desirable modifications which might arise from the clash of different viewpoints.

You see one of the foreign representatives on, let us say, a Tuesday, and he tells you that never, never will his country recede from such and such a position on the far east. You see him again on Thursday, and he acts as if he had never heard of the view he so deeply held on Tuesday.

As American politicians hear from the grass roots, the Japanese are hearing from the rice fields, and the British, from the coal mines. The Japanese dare not go home, and the British dare not go home with a record of having done anything that would seem even in the faintest degree to imperil the Hughes' plan in armament. Incidentally, it is not merely from their peoples that the foreign delegations are hearing, but from some of their most responsible statesmen as well. Some of the messages carrying the reactions of home governments to the Hughes plan that have come over cables during the past few days will make pungent reading when history gets around to them. The thing that Hughes said is the thing that the peoples of the world want. They have taken Hughes for their leader, and their own statesmen and delegates are straining for the tall grass, even some who have been for modifications of the Hughes plan which would be reasonable to consider.

**Armament Plan Will Go Through**  
The end of it all will be that the Hughes programme will go through. That programme will be the adoption of the armament plan already announced, without material modifications. When adopted, it will be submitted to the senate independently and apart from any far eastern agreement. In this independent form the senate will adopt it unanimously. As to the far east, the Hughes programme probably will turn out to be an agreement so informal, and otherwise of such a nature, that it will not need to be submitted to the senate. At least it will be in such a form as to excite senatorial objections to alliances. The American programme on the far east will probably turn out to be a process of taking the ten requests already made by the Chinese; of agreeing upon them, or at least upon nine-tenths of them, by all the governments; and the carrying out of this agreement, without any formal document of such a binding nature that the senate would have to ratify it. In short the American plan will probably avoid senate complications.

of submarines to be permitted but affects a point that is rather more serious; namely, how complete the naval holiday shall be? From the American point of view, the cessation of building for a period of ten years is fundamental. The Americans want the psychological and physical effect of that cessation. They want the future and permanent effect of the dismantling or disuse of naval ship building plants. The Americans foresee that if they can bring about a complete stragulation of preparation for war the result will be that if anybody wants to go to war it will be necessary to overcome an almost insuperable inertia. The Americans think, in short, that when the end of the naval holiday comes it will be almost impossible to begin over again.

Some of the British, on the other hand, apparently want to make the naval holiday less complete. They want to keep one or more than one ship building plant at work, at least on a skeleton basis, so that they will be able to recommence building more readily. If the need for new ships should arise. The British point of view is to pave over this period of excessive cost and excessive taxation but still be ready to begin again if they should think the circumstances call for it.

**Will Insist on Naval Holiday**  
The Americans, on the other hand, want building stopped, and want it stopped in such a way that in all likelihood it will never begin again. The Americans will stand pretty firmly on this position. They may be willing to shorten the term of the naval holiday down to fewer years, but they will insist on its being complete as long as it lasts. On this point, as on all other points, there is nothing more obvious in Washington than the increasing disposition of all the foreign delegations to accept the Hughes programme. It ought to be possible for the agreement on the far east to be made public within ten days, and it ought to be possible for the conference to end within a shorter period than has generally been anticipated. If the conference did not overshadow everything else, some of the other things that have happened in Washington in the last twenty-four hours or so would occupy bigger headlines than they have had. The rejection of Harding's request about taxation by the lower house of congress is a sensational event which will have far-reaching echoes in American politics. Especially in the congressional and senatorial elections of next year, the preparations for which will be under way in a few months. It was doubtful tactics for Harding to send his letter to Fordney. Fordney was not the strongest man in the world for Harding to tie up to. Fordney, like several other republicans who have the position of leadership without the powers of leadership, does not stand so high in congress as his position on the ways and means committee would seem to indicate. There will be a lot of aftermath to all this.

Also the matter of whether Senator Newberry of Michigan is to be seated or ousted would be recognized as more interesting and more critical if the details of it were not overshadowed by the conference.

One incident of yesterday that, at

most escaped the attention of the newspapers is of far-reaching importance. President Harding issued an executive order giving to Director of the Budget Dawes a degree of authority second only to his own. The order says that the director of the budget is acting for the president, and his calls upon the chiefs of bureaus and other administrative officers for purposes of consultation or information take precedence over the cabinet head of a department or any head of an independent organization. If all the implications of that order were understood, it would be recognized as one of the most important departures in our government that has happened for a long time.

## DENTON COUNTY WILL BUILD GOOD ROAD TO EXPERIMENT STATION

DENTON, TEXAS, Nov. 21.—Farmers of Denton and surrounding counties will be able to keep more closely informed of new agricultural developments through the construction of a paved highway to the Texas experiment farm located about four miles southwest of Denton, work on which was directed to proceed by the Denton county commissioners' court recently, according to R. Youngblood, director of the Texas experiment station at College Station.

when practicable in order to keep in close touch with the new agricultural information constantly being developed through the experiments being conducted, the director said, but owing to this stretch of bad road, visitors have frequently found it out of the question to drive to the station.

Just now, Superintendent C. H. McDowell is developing work with sweet clover in rotation with small grains, both as a soil improver and as a forage crop. 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### WILBARGER COUNTY DRIVE WEDNESDAY FOR WELFARE FUNDS

VERNON, TEXAS, Nov. 21.—Plans were inaugurated Saturday afternoon at a meeting of the Wilbarger County Welfare association for the inauguration of a county-wide drive Wednesday, Nov. 23, for the purpose of providing the organization with funds for the next year. The city will be divided into districts and two workers will be appointed for each block. The association hopes to raise \$8,500 for work, which was formerly carried on at considerable cost to the county. Furthermore, some of the money raised before went out of the county and it is planned to keep the entire amount raised this time at home. In the event that the full quota is subscribed, a statement has been issued to the citizens informing them that it will not be necessary to donate one cent to any beggar in the county. The association will be equipped to care for these wants itself. The new organization is a combination of all the welfare bodies in the county, and its aim is to systematize the work of caring for the needy and avoiding duplication of effort. Already it has manifested its presence in various ways. A lad who died of typhoid fever was given a good burial, an expectant mother was sent to relatives in another state, a 17-year-old soldier, needed at home, was obtained by discharge, and various men have been found work.

### VETERANS' CLAIMS CAN BE ADJUSTED IN DISTRICT OFFICES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Decentralization of the veterans' bureau, promised by Col. C. R. Forbes in October, has now advanced to the point where the district offices will now be authorized to adjust the old claims as well as the new ones. Only a master file of each case will be retained in the Washington office and whatever negotiations may be necessary or additional proof required will be submitted to the regional director of the district within which the claimant may live. It is estimated that within 90 days the disability cases now on file with the veterans' bureau also will be in the hands of the regional directors. This important change in administration of veterans' relief is expected to speed up adjustment of all claims. There will be no necessity for the ex-serviceman to come to Washington to press his claim. In fact that would only serve to delay action for the regional director. The staffs assigned to each of the offices will have power to pass finally on any question which may be submitted. A large number of experts trained in handling claims of veterans have been transferred to the regional offices and this, it is believed, will result in a big reduction in the volume of work now performed by the veterans' bureau staff here. The fourteen regional offices are located at Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Washington, Atlanta, New Orleans, Cincinnati, Chicago, St. Louis, Minneapolis, Denver, San Francisco, Seattle and Dallas. In addition there are 140 sub-offices, each of which will be equipped to handle the claims of that particular section.

### CONGRESSMAN PARRISH SEES A REAL DISPOSITION AT CAPITAL TO BRING ABOUT DISARMAMENT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—A real disposition to bring about disarmament is seen by Representative Lucian W. Parrish in the arms conference now being held here in Washington. Congressman Parrish has been a close observer of this conference and is convinced that it is a step in the right direction, which, if followed, will make for the future peace of the world. In discussing the disarmament conference today, Congressman Parrish said: "I believe that the international conference for the limitation of armaments is progressing most satisfactorily. When the czar of Russia called the first conference of this character in 1898, there was a general acceptance of his invitation, but the response was not in any sense enthusiastic or whole-hearted, and the subsequent history of that conference and other conferences of arms nations, and while the conferences were being held the opportunity to prevent war passed, and suddenly we found ourselves thrown into the greatest war of all history. There is no doubt but what this war could have been averted had the nations attending the conference been seriously in earnest about disarmament. "However, the call for the present conference met with an entirely different response. Wholeheartedly and enthusiastically the invited nations responded, and when the United States presented its program for a definite limitation of armaments there was a genuine disposition to co-operate to the fullest extent in the acceptance of the principles laid down. When we observe, as we did on yesterday, that England is willing to surrender her concessions in China if France and Japan will do likewise, we see a real disposition to sacrifice in order that this conference may succeed, and while the conference is yet young and the result of its deliberations still in doubt, yet, I believe that great good is going to be accomplished and that, through the effort of the representatives present, supported by a strong public sentiment, the future peace of the world will be made more secure and the burdens and horrors of war further removed from the hearts and consciences, not only of the people of our own beloved country, but of the other nations as well. "I certainly pray that such will be the result."

### P. O. DEPARTMENT PLANS TO CARE FOR CHRISTMAS RUSH

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The postoffice department is planning a month ahead to take care of the Christmas rush and in that connection has suggested to the postmasters of various cities that, where consent of the proper authorities is obtainable, school houses be utilized as distributing centers. This plan was tried out in one city last year and marked success was attained. Not only were the Christmas packages distributed in record time but it was much easier for the postmen, who could make many trips instead of one or two in a day, and at a marked reduction in cost to the department. In his letter to city postmasters, the postmaster general suggests that if the use of school houses can be obtained for a period of four days before Christmas and one day afterwards, much of the confusion incident to Christmas deliveries can be eliminated. Mail and packages for a section centering about the school can be sorted and delivered there at night. The postmen can then re-sort it so it can be handled in the most expeditious manner.
