

### FOR ALL OF WHICH WE ARE DULY THANKFUL

Three hundred years ago the Pilgrim fathers landed upon the bleak coast of New England in their quest for religious liberty. In the new land they have formidable difficulties to face but before long they had partially conquered nature and gained a livelihood. It was but natural that a religious people should have set aside one day for Thanksgiving and we who follow them, although many of their traits and beliefs have vanished with the centuries, continue to keep alive their worthy custom.

One day out of each year has been set aside for the celebration of the good things that have come to us in that year. In this year of 1921 we have so many things for which to be thankful, such a multitude of commendable fine things. It is hoped that we, with our bounty, may find in our hearts a small part of the sincere thankfulness, the reverent thankfulness, which the Pilgrim fathers had on this day shout three centuries ago.

We can well be thankful that the practice of acing debtors in prison does not pertain now as it did then. At that time those persons to whom a man owed money could and did imprison the debtor. That was one of the best customs of that age, at least is was one of the most generally practiced customs. Were it in practice in the year of 1921 there would hardly be enough persons left outside prison walls to make a shabby guard to watch and care for those inside. That custom has been sloughed off as the race has climbed its struggling path upward and for that we can be reverently thankful, joyously

When the custom of setting aside one day each year for Thanksgiving was started the divine right kings was firmly established upon the earth. Human slavery was far reaching and the opportunity for those well down in the social scale to climb out of the ruts of chronic poverty were almost nil. At that time even our Pilgrim fathers, who had come to the new world to secure religious freedom, were themselves the most intolerant of people, they banished Roger Williams, they burned "witches," they made life in peace impossible for the quiet Quakers; in fact the verything they left England and Europe to get away from was what they established in the new settlements. They wished to worship in their own way but at the same time they insisted and demanded that everyone else also worship in their way.

With the passing of the years human slavery has been banished from practically the whole earth, religious freedom throughout these United States of ours is a reality as well as a name. The menace of starvation, which faced our New England forebears, is hardly known in this nation; the bloodlusty savages have become the fat, lazy, contented ell plutocrats with tomahawks sheathed and the blood-lust gone.

The scattering colonies along the Atlantic coast became welded together, they contested the right of the mother country to rule them without giving them representation, they established the right to govern themselves and formed the basis the world's proudest, the world's strongest nation. The idealism of our Pilgrim fathers has not all disappeared as have many of their practices and their customs. We have given the civilized world that which it needed for inspiration. We lead the way whether it is by giving advise or by giving of our sons. We have made some impress upon all of the peoples of the world by our high minded lead-

ership and for this we may be duly thankful. Just now there is sitting in Washington a group of men representing the leading nations of the world. Their immediate task is to try and take the machinery of war away from mankind in order that when next flies into a rage it cannot make human blood run in rivers. Their next task is to fron out the wrinkles in the Pacific problem, the next seat of world trouble, before those wrinkles become war

In fact the very calling of the conference encouraging within itself because it was the first time in the history of man that he seemed to have sufficient sense to meet difficulties sanely before international difficulties made him able onlyhandle those difficulties insanely.

We can be thankful, we should be deeply. revereptly, earnestly and sincerely thankful that ch a conference has been called; that headway is ing made with its program.

ears too large. The body is too unwieldly. It will doubtless be said that many states have a larger membership in the legislature, but that fact is no answer to the proposition that Texas has too many legislators.

This is a new state. Some new question of great aportance is constantly presented, and most often t affects different parts of the state differently, ow ng to industrial and economic conditions, and the more important the question the greater the necessity for intelligent, dispassionate discussion

Such discussion is well nigh impossible with more than a hundred and forty men, some living nearly a thousand miles apart and representing widely diferent interests engaged in it.

No man who has watched, even in a casual way, the proceedings of the legislature can have falled to observe how much less delay and debate and friction

there is in the senate than in the house. The senators are chosen from larger districts, and the voters have a wider scope in choice, and the re-

form a compact, concrete body of men, who debate all seasures much after the order of a large committee. It needs no argument to prove that a house of 62 nembers-twice the number in the senate-can and will do work quicker and more efficiently than 140

The experience of many years has shown that at he end of 60 days the most important bills have not been passed, and in consequence an extra session is cessary, and sometimes two or more extra sessions. This is the result of per diem payment. If there were 40 men, or even 60, elected from larger districts

and pald annual salaries, there would be no necessit;

to limit the sessions, for it would be to the interest of members to expedite business. There has been a time when nearly a majority of of 60 days in order to compel an extra session, but he plan failed because a few more than a majority
