

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2. — When people speak of a conference to take up "economic matters," they



separated and distinguished by different degrees of responsibility on our part.

A multitude of persona have wanted the present conference to consider thease seconomic subjects. Some of the advocates are foreign statesmen, some are American business men, some are conomic theorists, and some are idealists. The motives vary from the purest sort of aliruism. All these appeals have been firmly resisted by the men who are dominant in the conference, and will continue to be resisted. But that sooner or to be resisted. But that sooner or later a new conference must and will take up these economic sub-jects there can be little doubt. The world cannot get on the track

and under way again until these subjects are disposed of. Europe is the chief aufferer from failure to take action, but America is so deer ly involved that our interest in getting the questions out of the way cannot be doubted. The most competent judges believe it to be as sure as the rising of the sun that America cannot have any real prosperity until reparations are set-tled, international debts put on a permanent basis, and exchange stapermanent basis, and exchange sta-bilised. They say that the present apparent prosperity in America is-due chiefly to the lowering interest rates and that the lowering interes rates and that the lowering interest rates are a sign, not of business prosperity, but rather of business stagnation. These judges say that business in America, especially as respects the export of farm products, cannot go forward in any ef-fective way until three economic messes are cleared up.

From the point of view of the United States, the largest problem is in what degree we should take the initiative. Europe would very much like to see us take the initiative. They want us to take the initiative because they think that we, as the richest nation in the world should bear the largest share of the cost of the cure. Reparations at Impossible Figure The original trouble began with the fixing of the German reparations at a sum and with such conditions as are impossible for Germany to live up to. The British and French statesmen who did this knew at the time that they were placing an impossible burden on Germany, and that some time is other the thing would have to be revised. Some of the British public men who participated have admitted this publicly. The motive on the part of the British was political. Lloyd George and his lieutenants held an election in December, 1918. In that election they promised the British public that Ger-The original trouble began with 1918. In that election they promised the British public that Germany should be made to pay the entire cost of the war, including pensions and separation allowances they knew at the time that there was not enough wealth in Germany to pay this much. But they made the promise in order to win the election. When the peace conference came, they camouflaged the discrepancy between their promise and the possibility of fulfillment by leaving the amount of the reparations indeterminate.

After German reparations question is out of the way, the next thing to take up is the international debts. By this is meant the various sums which Great Britain, France, Italy and some of the other allies owe to the United States, together with the open accounts which some of these countries have among themselves. The best judges in America believe that if the reparations question were once settled right, these international debts acauld be handled comfortably, and that there does not need to be any cancellation by the United States of the principal of these debts, except as regards some of the minor ones. But it is also believed that it will probably be necessary for us not to exact any interest, or at least to fix the interest at a more or less nominal rate for a few years.

With these two questions of reparations and international debts fixed and out of the way, the matter of stabilizing exchange would take pare of itself.

All this, in a very condensed way, is a picture of the economic situation of the world as it is viewed by some men of experience and dependable judgment.

RAILROADS KILLING FEWER PEOPLE.

The "Safety First" campaign that has been congood fruit. There were fewer people killed by the railroads in 1920 than 10 years ago, although there had been a big increase in the number of passengers carried and in the tons of freight carried one mile.

Statistics show that in 1920 the railroads killed 6,958 persons, injured 163,308 and in that period car- the sleeper. ried 411,151,320,758 freight tons, that is, the equivalent of that many tons one mile.

The peak of railroad slaughter was reached in 1913 when 10,964 persons were killed, 200,308 injured, while carrying 300,558,234,000 freight tons.

The year 1920 also was marked by the smallest number of passengers killed relatively to passengers little body and carry it tenderly to its bed. Then a failed to cover expenses, taxes and rents, the roads till morning comes. carried 47,276,131,157 passengers one mile with only seventy-six fatalities to passengers in train accidents. That is, 622,054,357 passengers were carried one mile dolly and horsey—and all! to one killed.

As a part of this achievement the bureau has the record of 293 roads which operated almost half the railway mileage of the United States in 1920 without a single passenger killed in a train accident.

The fatalities to passengers were practically the same in 1920 as in 1898, although passenger traffic had increased 254 per cent. The fatalities to employes increased less than 32 per cent., although the number employed increased 160 per cent.

The decrease in railway fatalities to trespasser and other persons may be attributed to the elevation of tracks, the abolition of grade crossings and the campaign against the common use of railway right of way by pedestrians.

The foregoing figures are highly gratifying insofar as they show a saving in human life. A large number of these lives have been saved at no cost to anybody except that of observing reasonable pre cautions and rules for safety. There is still much as we ever had. progress to be made in this direction. The railroads are on the right track in this matter. The next ten years can be expected to show a still further decrease in the number killed and injured by the railways. The railroads are setting an example that all other industries can follow with profit and with an increasing appropriation of the value of human life.



DALLAS, Dec. 2.—The Louisiana quarantine against Texas cotton because of the prevalence in this state of the plak boll worm will be modified to permit the shipment of lint, Harry D. Wilson, commissioner of agriculture for Louisiana, stated today at a conference of cotton experts here. His statement followed announcement by R. E. McDonald, Texas state entohologist, that an effective means of gist, that an effective means of sterilising cotton seed so as to kill the worm had been discovered and would be applied as quickly as pos-

Following Mr. Wilson's announcement. W. G. Lackey, Oklahoma state seed analyist, stated the pro-posed embargo by his state against Texas cotton seed would probably

rexas cotton seed would probably be a slight one.

Mr. McDonald told the conference, at which the states of Oklahoma. New Mexico, Arkansas and Louisiana and the federal horticultural board were represented, that he expected to have every cotton gin in Texas equipped with a sterilizer next year. Seed dealers and farmers had pledged co-operation towards stamping out the pest, he said. The method of extermination includes heating the seed to a temperature of 140 degrees, which McDonald said would be effective.

Three non-otton growing parishes in Louisiana probably will be abolished this year, Mr. Marlatt said. He explained that due to the stringent Louisiana regulations it is possible that the worm has been completely

Louisiana regulations it is possible that the worm has been completely exterminated in that state.

The non-cotton zones at Hearne and in the Pecos valley probably will be abolished as none of the warms have been found there in sook time, Dr. C. L. Mariatt, chairman of the federal horticultural board, said. The situation around RI Paso has shown little improveent, however, and due to its closeness to the Mexican border, it probably will never be free from danger of infestation, he said.




