THE ROAD MONEY.

The action of the county commissioners Monday in blocking the original road program for the county is to be regretted for several reasons. First, it ctually reduces the amount of paved mileage that be obtained, because it applies the money on reads upon which no state or federal aid will be given. Second, it proposes to neglect the main traveled roads for those where there is less traffic. Third, it goes back on the promise that was given to the voters of the county when the bonds were voted. Fourth, it implies that the county commis-Moners look upon Wichita county, not as something to be considered as a whole, but as merely a bunch of precincts.

Aside from the legal right of the commissioners divert the money from the roads for which it was voted—and there is a possibility that that right will be tested in the courts—there are moral questions igvolved. Whatever objection there is to carrying him as possible. out the original program should have been raised when the bonds were voted. If, as may be inferred from Monday's proceedings.

the commissioners from Precincts 2, 3 and 4 are looking toward another bond issue, to provide money esough for all the roads, they are laying a rather doubtful predicate for such action when they cause the county to go back on the promise it gave at the previous election. What assurance will taxpayers the world kicks at you. have that the proceeds of the new election, too, will not be diverted from the original purposes.

It is to be hoped that the narrow and selfish stand taken by the commissioners will be changed before the new policy is put into effect.

TRYING IT OUT.

With a half billion dollar cut in the appropriation bill, as a result of the budget system, the budget in for a real try-out at this session of congress. The test of a budget system, of course, is not in the budget itself, but in the appropriations that result m it, and it remains to be seen how the schedule will fare after it leaves the hand of the budgetmakers and runs the gauntlet of the diverse, political, solfish and time-serving interests that constitute congress. 





Everything relating to trade among ourselves and among nations has been expanded, excessive, inflated, abnormal, and there is a madness in finance which no American policy alone can cure. We are a creditor nation, not by normal processes, but made so by war. It is not an unworthy selfishness to seek to save ourselves when the processes of that salvation are not only not denied to others, but commended to them. We seek to uncermine for others no industry by which they subsist; we are obligated to permit the undermining of none of our own which make for employment and maintained activities.
