ADOPT RESOLUTION FOR THE INVESTIGATION OF AN ALLEGED DYE LOBBY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The long pending Kirtland resolution directing an investigation by congress into the alleged dye stuffs lobby was adopted today by the senate without a record vote.

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FIFTEEN HUNDRED POLICE GUARD CHICAGO PLANTS

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—Fifteen hundred policemen were sent to the stockyards early this morning, when, long before dawn, several groups of persons, including a few women, gathered about the stockyards. Only a few hours before 200 policemen had fired on thousands of strike sympathizers who attacked plant employees and finally the policemen. Last night's riotous activities in the neighborhood of the yards were closed today by order of Chief of Police Fitzmorris. The chief said that the rioting would be stopped at any cost.

The women are more difficult to deal with than the men. Chief Fitzmorris said this morning. "They carry red pepper and throw it in the policeman's eyes. They are scattered through the adjacent streets in an effort to stop the motor policemen."

Efforts are being made to control the disorder in this strike. We may have to use every available policeman in the city and then call upon the reserves. We will be ready to deal with them."

When the strike went into effect Monday there was little trouble and the situation remained quiet until last night when workers began to leave the regular stock yards. The few hundred strikers on picket duty and a few "hangers on" intercepted their passage to the car lines and police endeavored to make a path through the crowd. Without previous warning large numbers of persons began to enter the strike sympathizers. The police were ordered to clear the area. When reinforcements arrived, the police cleared at midnight. No further trouble was expected at the time the regular guards were partially withdrawn.

However, by 2 o'clock this morning they began wandering back and the number increased so quickly that the regular police on duty were increased to 1,500.

The day shift was to report at 6 o'clock and every precaution was taken by the chief of police for their safety.

Efforts to verify a rumor that a negro was thrown into a well and stoned until he was drowned could not be verified. No further immediate action was expected today on a petition for an injunction against the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America by 22 packers who allege that intimidation of workers has been practiced by the union.

NO PICKETING AT KANSAS CITY PLANTS

By Associated Press. KANSAS CITY, Dec. 8.—The fourth day of the packing house strike dawned calm but uneventful. The lines of the packers and the striking packing house workers are approximately where they were Monday night. The picketers are held in operations by the packers, who have hired several hundred new men. Most of the replacements appear to be negroes. No picketing of the plants is being attempted following conferences with Mayor Harry B. Burton of Kansas City, Kan. Henry Brainerd, city attorney, and Joseph H. Brady, city councilor. These officials with the exception of the chief, whose office is in the police building, are expected to meet today at a number of mass meetings to obey the law. Their advice has been followed. With the exception of a few picketers yesterday afternoon in which a negro packing house employe shot a Mexican striker, there has been no violence of any sort here since Monday when the mayor and the chief of police persuaded crowds outside all the packing houses to go home.

PASSENGER TRAIN WRECKED AT NOON

CLOSE ARGUMENTS IN CASE INVOLVING TEXAS RAILROADS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Argument in the case brought by the state of Texas challenging the constitutionality of the transportation act was concluded today in the supreme court with the declaration of Solicitor General Beck that attack by the state should be thrown out of the court.

The federal government had not given its consent to be used by the state. Solicitor Beck said adding that neither did the state's bill present any concrete controversy in which the state had shown any personal or pecuniary interest which would permit it to bring such a case. The whole proceeding, he asserted, was "an unprecedented challenge" and an appeal to the supreme court to exercise "its erroneously supposed power of academic revision over the powers of legislation."

The solicitor general argued the impunity of the federal railroad labor board from the attack made upon the validity of its organization.

P. J. Farrell, counsel for the Interstate Commerce commission, discussed the constitutionality of the act raised by Texas concerning the commission's organization and acts.

Eighty-five per cent of all freight car accidents in the country are caused by the passenger travel in interstate. Alfred P. Thom, general counsel of the Association of Railroad Executives, said here today, stating his contention that interstate business overhauled state traffic.

EPIDEMICS TAKING A HEAVY TOLL IN FAMINE DISTRICTS

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WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The cotton goods schedule of the permanent tariff bill as it passed the house is the "most revolutionary piece of tariff legislation that has been proposed since Abraham Lincoln signed the first tariff act in 1864," former Senator Henry P. CONVERSATION IN BEAUTY PARLOR IS TOPIC OF EVIDENCE

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 8.—A conversation in a beauty parlor, involving a prediction of the death of J. Belton Kennedy, was the major topic of testimony in the trial of Arthur C. Burch, accused of murdering Kennedy.

The conversation was described by Mrs. Mary Balliff of Los Angeles, who said Mrs. Madalynne Obenchain, accused jointly with Burch, had made the prediction of Kennedy's death. Long cross examination failed to change her story.

Mrs. Balliff said she met Mrs. Obenchain first in the beauty parlor last spring and they "got to talking as women will." Later, she said, they met again at the same place and she described to Mrs. Obenchain a dream she had had, in which she saw Mrs. Obenchain on a country road with a crowd approaching.

"I couldn't tell whether it was a funeral or a wedding procession," the witness declared, and added she thought it strange she should dream such a thing about a stranger, whereupon Mrs. Obenchain said:

"I know exactly what it meant. I feel something is going to happen. Belton will soon pass out." And later she said: "Belton will soon pass out. I could almost put my hand on the spot where it will happen."

Asked how she knew who was meant by "Belton," Mrs. Balliff said Mrs. M. L. Wilson, proprietor of the beauty parlor, had told her "Belton was Madalynne's sweetheart."

Mrs. Balliff said she would never marry Belton.

"I asked her why and she said because he has deceived her," the witness said. "She said she had detectives from Chicago watching him."

During the same conversation, Mrs. Balliff testified, Mrs. Obenchain called Kennedy a degenerate.

"Did she say she would not marry him because he was a degenerate?" Defense Attorney Paul W. Schenck asked in cross examination.

"No, she said she would not marry him because he had deceived her."

The witness said Mrs. Obenchain telephoned her to come to the hotel on August 1, and when she did so told her Kennedy had come to her room at 10 o'clock the night before and urged her to marry him.

She said he had a revolver with him and took it out and laid it on a dresser, the witness said. Later he put it in the bath room and she said she got it and that he struggled with her for three hours trying to get it away from her. She said she knew it would be safe with her, but she did not know what he would do with it. He stayed until 2 o'clock in the morning, she said, and during that time his parents called up twice on the telephone trying to find him.

"I wonder how long he thinks he can play with me and get away with it."

On another occasion the witness said Mrs. Obenchain said:

"I feel I'm going to see Mrs. Peete and talk with her. I can just see myself in jail." Louise L. Peete, convicted of the murder of J. C. Denton, was then in the Los Angeles county jail.

ONE ARREST MADE IN CONNECTION WITH BIG JEWELRY THEFT

DALLAS, Dec. 8.—With one man under arrest at Los Angeles, Cal., and further developments expected today, police believe the mystery surrounding the disappearance from a local hotel last week of a suitcase containing jewelry valued at about \$15,000 has been solved. Captain of detectives, Will Moffett, said he would lay the case before the grand jury today and that two detectives would leave immediately to bring the Los Angeles suspect back to Dallas.

The jewels, property of Shire and Strauss of New York, have not been recovered, but Captain Moffett asserted he expected "further developments." Harry L. Straus, traveling salesman for the New York firm, left the suit case in the office of a hotel on Thursday night of last week. When he called for it the next morning the alleged theft was discovered.

PLEDGES ASSISTANCE OF THE GOVERNMENT TO THE OIL INDUSTRY

CHICAGO, Dec. 8.—Predicting that America will maintain her present position in the production of oil, Judge Edward C. Finney, first assistant secretary of the Interior, told the American Petroleum Institute today that the federal government stood ready to co-operate with and assist oil production in every possible way.

He sketched the laws relating to government oil lands and said he "hoped an era of contentment, without draws, charges of technical frauds and discouragement had been ended by the enactment of the general leasing law of February 25, 1919."

"Our British friends have accused us of extravagance," concluded Judge Finney, "but we can point out that American drillers are in the four corners of the globe drilling wells and handling the oil according to American practices for those who charge us with waste."

"It would be folly to claim that our methods are all that could be desired, yet we should be proud that our nationals with American machinery have drilled for our commercial rivals in one month wells which previously it has taken three years to complete without American machinery."

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DISCOURAGES THE PLAN OF FORMING BLOCS IN CONGRESS

WILL DIVIDE COUNTRY INTO HOSTILE FACTIONS, SAYS WAR SECRETARY.

CONTRASTS THE PRESENT WITH "BIG STICK" PLAN

Question Is Discussed Before The Association of Life Insurance Presidents.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The present system of organization in congress, whereby control is divided between numerous committees may, if carried to its logical conclusion, divide the United States "into hostile factions or groups" and leave the country "powerless to defend or maintain its interests, national or international," John W. Weeks, secretary of war, said today in an address before the convention of the Association of Life Insurance Presidents.

Contrasting the present situation with a recent administration characterized by reference to a "big stick" Mr. Weeks said: "It was not many years ago that we heard stories about a 'big stick' which was supposed to be used in driving congress into a state of tractability and force the enactment of laws desired by the executive. The truth, however, is that while the executive was a masterly man of dominating personality and character, he was a party man and those in the legislative branch of the government were equally so. They believed in government by party and that the responsibility under such government should be observed even by those who might doubt the wisdom of the proposed action. The result was that the leaders in the senate and in the house consulted the executive and together they

formulated the policies to be followed. Quite frequently, no doubt, the executive in some instances urged and perhaps imposed his views on the congressional leaders; but invariably these men returned to the capitol to carry out the decision reached at the conference and the members of that party in the senate and house recognizing the necessity of responsible action assisted them in their endeavors. "Then came a reform or it was so heralded, in the conduct of the house of representatives. The power of action which had largely rested with the speaker and through him with the committee on rules was taken away and divided among committees. The result—and I think it has been clearly demonstrated—is that it is impossible to get the type of legislative action which comes from party regularity and responsibility.

Record of Cannon "I can recall," said Mr. Weeks, "in the days of so-called Cannonism, when Mr. Cannon was called a czar, as would have been any other man of strength filling the speaker's chair under those conditions, that the speaker found ways, perfectly legitimate under the rules, to prevent the enactment of a vast amount of personal and irresponsible legislation. More than that he had the power, and he used it, to prevent appropriations intended for local purposes which were not needed and were not for the general good.

"The slightest examination of the increase in governmental expenditures during the last 15 years for the ordinary requirements of the government will indicate to what extent this change in the methods of legislating has affected the treasury.

"To my mind, the change has had a tendency to weaken effective government, has resulted in irresponsible legislation, prevented both party and non-party pledges made in their platforms and, in time, will divide the legislative branch of the government into groups, each group championing a special cause and we will see one group combining with another to bring about control of legislative action in the interest of a particular faction.

"While we may not degenerate to the level of some countries in this respect, carried to its logical conclusion, we may eventually find ourselves divided into hostile factions or groups, one class plun-

dered by another, and the country powerless to defend or maintain its interest, national or international.

Financing the Farmer

"One of the least excusable of the laws passed, it seems to me, was that increasing the interest rate on farm loan bonds to 4 1/2 per cent and leaving the rate to the farm borrower the same as it had been. Under the present law, as I see it, the government is financing the farmer and is producing a vast volume of non-taxable securities so that in effect the farmer is borrowing his money at a much lower rate than the current market warrants. What would be said as an offset if the government undertook to finance all the manufacturing industries of the United States by loaning them money at a fixed rate and no taxes were paid on this indebtedness, and then extending that policy to every industry. We should soon find ourselves without taxable property and complete transfer of the investments of large estates into non-taxable securities."

Mr. Weeks then reviewed "the further legislative program" of the agricultural bloc, characterizing as "unwise" the so-called wool bill, declaring that the proposed law to regulate cold storage would "make the price of many articles of food higher," and describing the federal highway bill as being designed to construct "roads purely local in character" for the benefit of "one or at best, a few individuals." The demand of the bloc for a representative of agriculture on the federal reserve board, Mr. Weeks said, was as worthy as would be similar demands from "manufacturers or labor, commerce, or any single great industry."

FORMER EMPEROR WILLIAM HAS PUBLISHED A BOOK

BERLIN, Dec. 8.—Former Emperor William has published a book entitled "Comparative Historical Tables From 1878 to the Outbreak of War in 1914," according to the newspaper Ach Tribuna-Berlin. In addition to tabulated matter the book contains information regarding events immediately preceding the great war.

SEIZE SHIP WITH 40 CASES LIQUOR

Captain Was Placed in Beaumont Jail And Boat Is Held By Dry Agent.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Dec. 8.—The United States transport Lake Flourney, leased by a private company, was seized at Beaumont by Prohibition Agent J. W. Quinlan, Federal Prohibition Director David H. Morris announces. Forty cases of intoxicating liquor are alleged to have been found on board. The captain of the ship was placed in jail and the boat is being held by Agent Quinlan pending instructions from Washington.

This is the first ship to have been seized on this charge by federal officers at a Texas port, Mr. Morris said. The vessel will be allowed to make delivery of its cargo at Port Arthur and Galveston with Agent Quinlan in charge.

RECOMMENDS INCREASE IN SIZE OF CADET CORPS AT WEST POINT ACADEMY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—An increase in size of the cadet corps at the West Point Military Academy from 1,334 to 2,500, is recommended by Brigadier General Douglas MacArthur, superintendent of the academy, in his annual report to the secretary of war made public today. The academy at the present time, the report shows, can train only one-third of the officers.

"As our standing army goes down in number," he continued, "the enrollment of the military academy should go up. Over a century ago with a population of scarcely more than 4,000,000, the American government authorized a cadet corps of over 250. Today, with that population increased twenty-fold, the number of cadets in training is scarcely four times the original number authorized."

ATTORNEY GENERAL SAYS COMMUNISTS ARE ACTIVE IN U. S.

UNITE TO SPREAD PROPAGANDA TO CONTROL LABOR.

STATEMENT IS MADE IN HIS ANNUAL REPORT

Calls Attention To Work Of Department In Dealing With Situation.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The movement launched by the Third Communist Internationale at Moscow to gain control of the trade and industrial unions throughout the world is meeting with marked success insofar as it relates to syndicalist unions in the United States, says the first annual report today of Attorney General Daugherty.

Communist parties in this country, Mr. Daugherty says, have united to more effectively carry on propaganda and the policy is to endeavor to gain control of the labor organizations through the control of the executive committees or other governing bodies therein.

"Many of the leaders of this movement are American citizens," he says, "though they are subject to orders from Moscow as to their action and activities in the United States."

The attorney general says there has been a noticeable effort "upon the part of various so-called defense societies to propagate and carry on agitation in behalf of the ultra-radicals in the United States."

"Inconspicuous individuals in the ultra-radical movement apprehended locally," he asserts, "are martyred and propaganda started in their behalf, not only within the United States, but throughout the entire world. In many instances the so-called defense organizations are found to be merely a camouflage for such movements as the united communist party which must conduct its activities underground."

Foreign propagandists still are flocking to the United States, according to the report, which notes that 47 of them arrived in the last fiscal year. "The movements, the nature and the extent of the activities of these individuals, have been carefully observed. It is stated, and

the government has been kept "inadequately informed."
"During the past fiscal year," the report continues, "the activities of foreign propagandists in the United States have been particularly active and careful attention has been given to this pernicious form of work within this country. It is impossible to accurately estimate the vast amount of money spent in the United States by the foreign agents engaged in exploiting the American people and in creating interest in a support for movements and schemes entirely foreign to the interests of the American people."
Calling attention to the activities of the federal government in dealing with ultra-radicalism are limited by law to aliens, Mr. Daugherty notes that practically all of the states now have enacted laws defining and punishing criminal syndicalism and anarchy. These laws reach the citizen as well as the alien.
The dealing with ultra-radicalism is only one of the many activities of the department of justice during the past fiscal year which are reviewed in the attorney general's report. He calls attention to that while the department ceased last January its activities in the enforcement of prohibition, it is continuing to cooperate in this work.

Court Calendar Crowded.
The attorney general observes that "there has been no decrease in the number of illicit distilling cases since the enactment of the prohibition law and that the court calendars in some jurisdictions have been overtaxed by this class of cases."
"Where the facts warrant," he says, "the offenders have been vigorously prosecuted, and it is believed that this will result in a material reduction of such violations of the law."

Selective service act cases disposed of during the year numbered 1,862, the report says, the convictions numbering 148 with 130 pleas of guilty. Cases pending at the beginning of the fiscal year numbered 55,687 and 1,321 new cases were begun.

Violations of the so-called disloyalty sections of the espionage act have greatly decreased, according to the report, which notes that only six cases were begun under the entire act during the fiscal year, while 41 cases were disposed of, 130 cases having been docketed at the beginning of the year.

Mr. Daugherty declares that as an organized system the white slave traffic has been broken up, but adds that a great many individual cases are pending. It is added.

Among his specific recommendations, the attorney general asks for enactment of legislation:

Authorizing the appointment of two federal judges at large for each of the nine judicial districts in order to assist in clearing the congested court dockets; or plainer making it a criminal offense to send through the mails, letters

threatening injury to life or property.
Authorizing the presence of stenographers in grand jury rooms.
Making it a crime for a single individual to defraud or attempt to defraud the federal government in any manner, as the law now provides for the punishment of "two or more persons who conspire to defraud."
Limiting the compensation to be received by referees in bankruptcy.

Freddie Bishop, who was indicted along with seven others in connection with the theft of nearly 4,000 barrels of oil from the Empire Pipe Line company, was arrested Wednesday at Mexia and was returned to this city by Deputy Sheriff Ralph Rohatch.

Bishop had never been apprehended since the return of the indictment. Three others in the case were tried and one of the parties was sentenced to a two-year term in the penitentiary. The case is on appeal.

Two others also drew a sentence of one year, but it was suspended by the jury that tried the case.

The alleged oil theft occurred in the northwest fields when a pipe line leading from a 55,000 barrel storage tank was tapped and the oil run to a refinery near Mexia Falls. One of the men indicted in the case paid the Empire company for the oil at the price that prevailed when the pipe line was tapped.

DECLARES DRIVES NOT INDORSED BY CHARITIES BOARD

The following statement has been issued by Hubert M. Harrison on behalf of the united charities campaign committee:

"The committee in charge of the recent united campaign for charitable and benevolent organizations has not endorsed any other financial campaign or any solicitation of funds by any organization, except as outlined in the publicity of the campaign for Red Cross, Y. W. C. A., Welfare Council, Boy Scouts, Texas Children's Home Society, Day Nursery and Salvation Army."

"The business men of Wichita Falls, and particularly the retail merchants, are being harassed by various and sundry solicitors for funds for numerous causes. The plan of the chamber of commerce to unite all campaigns in one was to eliminate the large amount of this unwarranted annoyance of the business people as well as to keep strict supervision over the use of money for charitable and benevolent purposes in Wichita Falls."

"Of course there will be no effort made to keep people from giving privately to any cause, they may be interested in, but this committee will endeavor to study carefully any project before they give their endorsement to it or ask the community to contribute to it."

"Under the suggested plan a municipal board of charity is to be formed, which will handle such matters in the future. In the meantime, before this board of charity is formed, and begins to function, all solicitations for funds within the corporate limits of Wichita Falls are controlled by the committee appointed by Major Cline at the beginning of his administration, which is composed of J. C. Hunt, chairman; N. H. Martin and Mrs. C. E. Ousley. No permit for solicitation of funds has been issued by this committee since the recent united campaign."

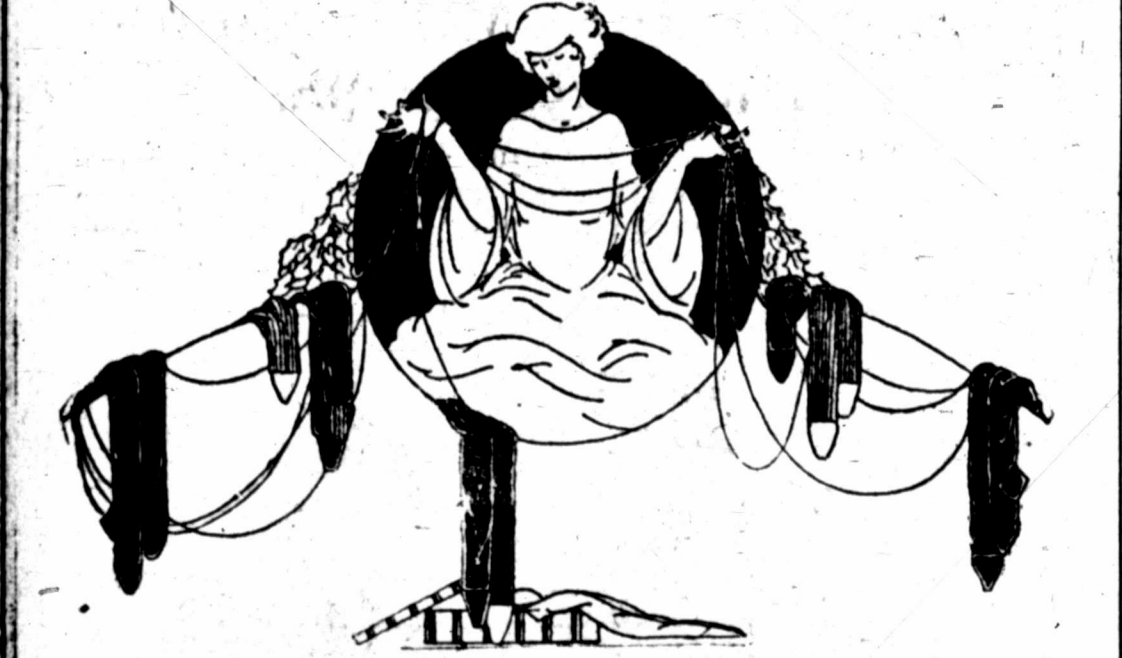

DANNY MURPHY OF PHILADELPHIA ATHLETICS VERY ADEPT AT ART OF CATCHING SIGNALS



By BILLY EVANS
Danny Murphy of the Philadelphia Athletics is the "Marconi of Baseball."

In other words, when it comes to picking up signs or signals, the Marconi system has nothing on Murphy.

All of which means that Danny Murphy is of invaluable aid to the pitchers on the Philadelphia club, by being able to tell them in advance what the pitcher intends to throw.

Don't get the impression there is anything unprofessional about Murphy's methods, for such is not the case. Murphy doesn't use any field glasses or employ any other outside help to gather his information, other than a keen sense of observation and the ability to think quickly.

To me Danny Murphy is one of the most remarkable characters in baseball. Standing on the third base coaching lines when the Athletics are at bat, he is far from an imposing figure. His position is usually a careless one, and he smokes no wild yells like Hughie Jennings did in the days of old.

As a matter of fact Murphy probably impresses the average fan as a player who had little interest in his work. Usually as the pitcher starts his delivery, Murphy can be seen uttering a few words, or apparently unintelligible remarks to the batter. While the fan can't hear, and doesn't understand what Murphy is saying, the batter is getting a lot of inside stuff.

Has a Word Sign
"Step into this Jimmy," is the signal for the pitcher that the pitcher intends to throw a curve. "Take a crack, Jimmy," is the sign that the pitcher intends to dish up a fast one.

"Get a hold of it!" is the way of telling the batter a spitball is coming.

The batter is waiting patiently for these words of wisdom from Murphy. The moment Danny flashes the wireless message to him he shifts his position, in order to hit the style of pitching that is coming.

It is a distinct advantage to the batter. It usually means that he can add at least 30 per cent to his batting average if he knows what is coming. This is evident by making comparisons of certain players while they play in Philadelphia and then with some other club.

All Pitchers Are Easy
One day last summer I was umpiring in Philadelphia with the New York team. Three of us were officiating, and in this particular game I was stationed at throwing the curve instead of the fast one. The moment Hoyt was over his head, he tips off his stuff. It is then time enough for Murphy to flash the "curve" sign.

"In all my experience," said Murphy, "I don't believe I have seen a down pitcher who throwing the various deliveries, without a noticeable difference. It seems a physical impossibility for most of them not to have some tell-tale motion. I watch every pitcher carefully, and if he has a weakness in his delivery I get it. The rest is easy."

American league pitchers will frankly admit that when pitching against the Athletics, they realize every ball is being tipped off and yet they are unable to conceal what is coming. Murphy certainly is a wonder.

TODAY'S Sport Angle

It is impossible to make money in any business where more money is being spent than taken in. That is the situation that has prevailed in the minor leagues for several years. If they are to continue in business, it must be remedied.

Unfortunately for most minor leagues, there is usually one owner in every circuit who is in baseball simply as a sideline. It is a sport with him rather than a business.

Of course it is the desire of every owner to have a winner. The magnitude of the business, for instance, doesn't think of the money involved. He simply wants a winner. Profits mean nothing to him.

One of the suggestions offered to cut down expenses was the elimination of the double umpire system. I am positive that would be a grave mistake, rather than a tidy profit. If the umpire system is as nothing compared to the way money is spent in other directions.

Umpiring is no longer a one-man job. It is a difficult matter to satisfy with two men officiating. To go back to the single system would be a step backward by the minor leagues.

HOW TO PLAY GOLF

Match and Medal Play.
We often hear of golfers being either good medal players or good match players, and rarely does one find a golfer who is considered equally good at both. Of the two methods of playing, medal play is the harder, but at match play if one is tough opponent the latter is liable to be more trying. There is nothing like medal competition to show up one's actual game, for in match competition one has to win a number of matches in succession as one is liable to become impressed with one's own game, but a couple of medal rounds will tell the truth.

There are a good many golfers who can win consistently in match play, and yet when they enter a competition at medal play, and playing with practically the same field as they meet in match play, they find themselves way down on the list. Some men possess the temperament for match play, but in a medal round, where every stroke counts, the realization that each shot means so much seems to unnerve them, with the result that they play more unsatisfactory golf.

In medal play one or two bad holes will completely ruin one's chances of winning, whereas in match play it means only the loss of those holes. In match play one does not mean by this that a player should attempt wild shots, but if it is a course with little difficulty on the following hole, then again, in match play one should take into consideration that every hole which one gets in through the brilliant golf of one man, for he may be playing in a very ordinary manner, but through the superior golf of his opponent.

"Nothing Venture, Nothing Have."
Let us assume that two golfers who play the game equally well meet in match play. Both are playing the game on that particular day up to their usual standard, and it is a nip and tuck battle all the way. On the first hole where one gets in to trouble, the other takes advantage of the slip and gets a lead. From then on the player with the lead plays the match with the lead, and playing and takes a few chances. I am inclined to think that when two players, who are very evenly matched, meet in match play, it is the one who takes the chances and gets by with them who emerges the victor. Of course I do not mean by this that a player should attempt wild shots, but if it is a course with little difficulty on the following hole, then again, in match play one should take into consideration that every hole which one gets in through the brilliant golf of one man, for he may be playing in a very ordinary manner, but through the superior golf of his opponent.

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One thing which is true in match play is that a man should play his own game regardless of what his opponent is doing. Perhaps you play a rather short game, with more or less accuracy, and you find yourself matched against one of the long hitters of the game. Stick to your own game and do not press, for pressing never gets one any better. If on the long holes your opponent has the advantage through his long game, well and good; you have an opportunity to even things up on the short holes.

Steady Game In Medal Play.
In medal play a steady game, practically without the taking of chances, is advised, for one bad play might lead into a world of trouble and the game is off. How often do we hear of a player, even in an important event as the national open championships, who picks up his ball and withdraws from the game?

M'Graw Clinches Claim to Being Greatest Baseball Trader in Game's History

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—At the height of his playing career John J. McGraw, then a member of the Baltimore club, was sold with two other star baseball players to the St. Louis team for the sum of \$15,000.

During the last 40 hours the same John J. McGraw, as vice-president of the New York National league baseball club, has paid the sum of \$175,000 for two players, one of whom will not be available for the 1922 season.

In the spread of these two deals is epitomized the progress of baseball in two decades.

In the purchase of Heinie Groh from Cincinnati for the reported sum of \$100,000 and two players and Jimmy O'Connell of the San Francisco club of the Pacific Coast league for \$75,000, McGraw has clinched his claim to being the greatest baseball trader in the history of the game. In his long career as manager and officer of the local National league club he has established a record as a buyer and trader of players never approached by any other major league manager.

A list of all the players bought, sold and traded by McGraw since he joined the Giants would read like the roster of a big league.

Apply termed the "David Harum" of baseball, McGraw has also earned the reputation of a "one season trader." To win a pennant within six or twelve months has been his objective.

Usually Trades Players.
In spending \$175,000 for two players, however, McGraw appears in a new light for he has in the past traded in blocks of players rather than large sums of cash. His two deals in Buffalo this week place him in the high water mark class, so far as money involved is concerned, as is shown by the attached list of cash deals based upon figures unofficially announced at the time of transfer.

HOUSTON EXTENDS A HEARTY WELCOME TO MARSHAL FOCH

HOUSTON, TEXAS, Dec. 7.—Two hundred thousand citizens of Houston and from all over the state, several thousand singing school children, as many former service men, including wounded world war veterans from the United States public health service hospital at Camp Logan, gave Marshal Foch the lone star state's greeting here Wednesday evening and last night.

The generalissimo, accompanied by National Commander of the American Legion Handford MacNider, State Commander Wynne Davis, Bismarck Post Commander Dallas Matthews and Governor Neff arrived under an air escort of army flying machines from Ellington field at 5:27 Wednesday afternoon.

A parade was formed at the railway station and as it moved down the street school children stationed at each curb took up the refrain of the "Marseillaise" and Dixie and the waves of song continued block-by-block as the marshal, the legion commanders, governor and other members of the marshal's party proceeded to the central part of the city.

The marshal's car was surrounded by an escort of service men in uniform, who had won French war decorations. The wounded men were drawn up along the curb and as Foch passed he gave a solemn salute. With the same grave courtesy he salutes veterans of the civil war, confederate veterans and members of the grand army of the

republic stationed side by side further down the line.

As the parade moved down Main street the night's darkness came on, to be pierced by the flares of many lights and searchlights stationed along the way. Cheer after cheer rose as Foch appeared and billowed down along the mass of humanity on each side of the street.

The parade ended at a local hotel where duck banquet was served by Bismarck Post, American Legion to the marshal and his party. Five hundred were seated at the banquet, which had taken on a southern tinge before the duck was brought on. School children banked in the back of the banquet hall facing the marshal's table, greeted him with the "Marseillaise" which was quickly turned into the refrain of "Away Down South in Dixie." Then on a rostrum appeared a southern belle, hoop skirts and all, flanked on one side by a confederate veteran, in an age worn gray uniform, and on the other by a G. A. R. veteran in his battered blue. The stars and bars of the south, the lone star flag of the Texas republic mingled with the American and other world war allied flags.

The sweet lyric soprano voice of the southern belle was raised in the refrain of old southern melodies.

Featuring the banquet program of the usual addresses of welcome and the response by the marshal was the pinning on the breast of Brig. Gen. Roy Hoffman of Oklahoma City the medal of commander of the Legion of Honor of France. Marshal Foch and party left for New Orleans at 10:30 p. m.

HUSBAND MUST PAY POLL TAX OF WIFE WITH PROPERTY TAX

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Dec. 8.—Answering a question about which the attorney general's department has received many letters lately, Assistant Attorney General W. W. Caves in an opinion held that a husband in paying the tax assessed against the community property of himself and his wife must pay the poll tax assessed against the wife.

Mr. Caves held that where the poll tax of the husband and wife is assessed against them along with the community property the husband has not the right to pay the property tax and leave unpaid the poll tax assessed against the wife. If the wife is in fact subject to payment of such poll tax.

He also held that when the husband applied to the tax collector to pay his community property tax and the collector finds there has been no poll tax assessed against the wife it then becomes the duty of the collector to assess the wife with a poll tax, if the wife is subject to such a tax, and to refuse to permit payment of the property tax without payment of the tax assessed against the wife.

Also either the husband or wife has the right to pay the poll tax of the other without a written order authorizing him or her to do so, Mr. Caves held.

The opinion was given in answer to questions submitted by A. J. Lewis, county attorney of Cameron, Texas.

This opinion answers the numerous queries which the department has been almost swamped with in the past few months.

ATTACK OF TEXAS INVOLVES VALIDITY RAIL LABOR BOARD

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—Validity of sections of the transportation act providing for establishment of the railroad labor board are attacked in the supreme court by counsel for the state of Texas in presenting argument in the second of the great rate cases. The Texas suit which primarily seeks to have the court determine the power of the interstate commerce commission to regulate intra-state freight schedules and passenger fares, was called as a similar case from Wisconsin.

T. L. Beauchamp, of counsel for Texas, said that state assailed also the commission's assumption of authority to regulate railroad construction to order abandonment of lines, or to supervise financing of carriers incorporated by the state and to which the state had donated large tracts of land. He contended that the "power of the states to regulate their internal commerce had been annihilated" by the transportation act without giving the railroads of the country "any substantial relief from existing conditions."
