The local banks are so loaded with paper taken at the high prices of one or two years ago, that they cannot give any help in the present distress. 

The first problem that must be solved will be a financial one. During the oil boom Wichita Falls convenience and, expense? grew and her needs multiplied far more rapidly than her revenues. There was necessity for many pub-If improvements. The demand was imperative that these improvements be made and this without delay. We voted bonds and told the city council to go ahead. They did so ahead, even though costs were at their peak. We've got a lot done, even if the costs have been high.

But in meeting the situation that has been forced upon Wichita Falls the council has spent more than the revenues. The city has been without enough revenue at times to meet its current expenses. This situation is likely to become pronounced next year. Expenditures on account of the interest and sinking funds are fixed and must be met. They require a very considerable part of the city's revenues. With pers in front of it! the remainder the overdraft in the city treasury must be taken care of and the current expenses of the city met. This will take careful financing.

As said before the first problem of the new administration will be financial rather than one of contruction or new undertakings, but Wichita Falls foes not want a mere nickel pincher as mayor. OIL WILL COST MORE TO PRODUCE.

Gasoline and oil products are never likely to be cheaper than at the present time, according to Frank laskell, of the Tidal Western Oil company. Mr. Haskell points to the fact that production

costs are constantly increasing. It not only costs more to drill wells of the same depth but producers forced to drill deeper to get the oil. The shalow fields are becoming exhausted and few new shalow pools are being discovered. The difference in the cost of drilling a well fifteen hundred feet and one three thousand feet is altogether out of proportion to their relative depths.
