

The police are proceeding in the search for the assasin on the theory that the slayer was an avenger in a family feud of ong standing which already has

cost several lives.

Restiva was sitting at a table in the rear of a drug store in the Italian district yesterday talking with several companions. A man entered. Walking to within about ten feet of the table, the man sudnly whipped a sawed off shotgun om beneath his raincoat and fired at Restiva. The charge took effect Restiva's back. He died in about minutes. The assassin turned and fled.

Police were called and they conducted a hurried search throughout the neighborhood. In an alley near the drug store they found a shotgun containing two empty shells. The police questioned many withesses. They were non-committal. For the most part they declared by did not know the murderer and build not give a description. "Life z too sweet to know how he looked," declared one of the wit-

nesses in answer to the questions of ne police. Restiva formerly conducted a grocery store here. A former partner was shot to death about 18 months

Restiva figured in what police ave termed the Rugerro-Campa-cila feud of Dallas and Kansas The feud is said to have started n 1918 when Sam Restiva, a relain 1918 when Sam Restiva, a rela-tive of Anthony Restiva, was shot and killed by Vitto Campanella Jr., son of a Dallas grocer and butcher. At the time Campanella told the po-lice Sam Restiva had demanded money from him and that he had killed him in self-defense.

In August, 1920, the Campanellas made a second visit to Kansas City. While Vitto gampanella and his son were standing in front of their home a motor car sped by and the occupants opened fire on them. The Campanellas returned fire. Anthony Restiva was wounded. Police learned that Restiva's companion in the motor car was LaForte and he was arrested.

Police File Charges

Warrants charging Restiva and aForte with assault with intent to kill were sworn to by the police. Restiva's wife and daughter in turn sought to obtain a warrant against the Campanellas, but this was refused by the prosecuting attorney until the charges against Restiva and LaForte had been heard. The fued in Kansas City subsided.

Then it broke out again in Dallas in September, 1920, where the Rug-geros operated a butcher shop. Vitto Campanella Jr. entered the butcher shop and was fatally wounded by Joe Ruggero, who had Kansas City

The Campanella Sr. announced he would "kill Ruggero at Ruggero's home in Oak Cliff at 8 o'clock tonight. Ruggero, who asserted he feared the Campanella threat, sur-rendered to the police, confessed to the shooting and claimed he had shot in self-defense. 



#### ADVERTISING IRRIGATION

If irrigation farming publicity is to be one of the chief activities of the chamber of commerce in 1922, as is announced, it is to be hoped that this city can profit by the mistakes that have been made in advertising other irrigated sections of Texas. That widespread and aggressive publicity should be given to the irrigation farming possibilities of this section is entirely in order, but it is also in order to afford every reasonable protection to the man who

comes to buy. When the Rio Grande Valley section got irrigation, unscrupulous land agents operated for a time, and seriously handicapped the healthy det elopment of the valley. They advertised and sold, as "irrigated land," tracts that were some distance from any of the canals and that shared none of the benefits of the irrigation system. The commercial organizations of the valley awoke to the dangers of such a situation, and today one can see large signs throughout the valley, warning prospective buyers not to buy until they nave investigated through the chambers of commerce in the valley towns.

Not only by publicity of the right kind, but by making it possible for farmers to buy land on easy terms, can the chamber of commerce help in the development of irrigation. The man who has money enough to pay cash for his land isn't usually the kind of man who will put in the hard, unremitting toil that it takes to make a success of irrigation farming. Wichita Falls ought to do everything that she can to provide long-term payments.

These are just a few of the problems that the irrigation district already presents. It's well to start planning now to tackle them.

Civilization Survives All Its Ruins

(Austin Statesman) A great menace of this day to the happiness and welfare of society is the mistaken idea that we can solve all our newly arisen problems of an economic nature by elaborate organization and the simple extension of the functions of government, as though the government could actually create desired con ditions by the expedient or regulation. Under this notion all questions become , irely administrative, and when any new difficult situation arises it is thought to be adequately dealt with when an everexpanding government organization has been au-thorized to regulate it. The government, in fact the creature, comes to be looked on as the creato of civilized society, and from being the servant becomes the master of the people; the non-productive agency for co-ordination of the initiative and enterprise of the people and protection of their productive industry, becomes the whole business of the country and the only care of its people. We have called this a "mistaken idea." but in truth it is no idea at all; it is merely the expression of an impulse. In th ence of new difficulties some of us are prone to tear the whole structure of organized society is about to fall and to continue to add to the insupportable superstructure instead of strengthening the foundations. History teaches, however, that civilization survives all its ruins, even the calamities inflicted upon it in the name of reform. This letter Carleton enclosed with another to Harper's Weekly, again addressed to George William Curtis, who was so pleased that he published the poem in Harper's Weekly and sent the author \$10-the first money he ever received for his efforts!

And that is what Carleton got for the poem that

made him famous and gave him recognition. The greatest thing behind fame is appreciation. Without that, fame is emptier than a vacuum.

There are much finer things in this world, however, than fame. You have to live up to fame. You have to fondle and purr it. You have to stand in too many false lights before it. You have to keep sing yourself behind its back.

The best plan is to pay no attention to fame. Do work, and be glad while you do it. Pass from completed task to something greater and more work. Keep halping someone else along.






