FINAL DECISION ON IRISH PEACE TREATY ON NEXT WEDNESDAY

FOUR ALIENISTS EXAMINE WOMAN IN MURDER CASE

CHARACTER OF DEFENSE PENDING UPON THEIR REPORT

By Associated Press. DUBLIN, Dec. 17.—Final decision on the Irish peace treaty will be made on Wednesday, according to information obtained from authoritative sources in Dublin. A statement signed by Eamon de Valera and Arthur Griffith was issued last night announcing a public session of the parliament on Wednesday morning. The session will be for ratification of the treaty which will be made. Discussion of the motion to allow full publicity to the views of the members of the cabinet on the treaty will be held on Wednesday. It is thought, however, that the cabinet will not meet today for continuance of the secret sessions of the last three days.

REVEAL IDENTITY OF THE "MYSTERIOUS MAN"

Tells of Conversations Had With Mrs. Raizen Before the Shooting.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Counsel for Mrs. Lillian Raizen, who shot and killed Dr. Abraham Gluckstein, her alleged betrayer, conferred today with four alienists who have been examining the woman to decide upon a course of defense. Meanwhile they have revealed the identity of the "mysterious man" in the case as Albert Bradley, 60 year old waiter. It was Bradley who met Mrs. Raizen at the pier when she arrived from the south on the day before Dr. Gluckstein was killed and who took her to the hotel where she spent that night. Bradley became acquainted with Mrs. Raizen when she worked in a shirt factory and took her meals in a restaurant where he was employed. He said that she had befriended him on various occasions.

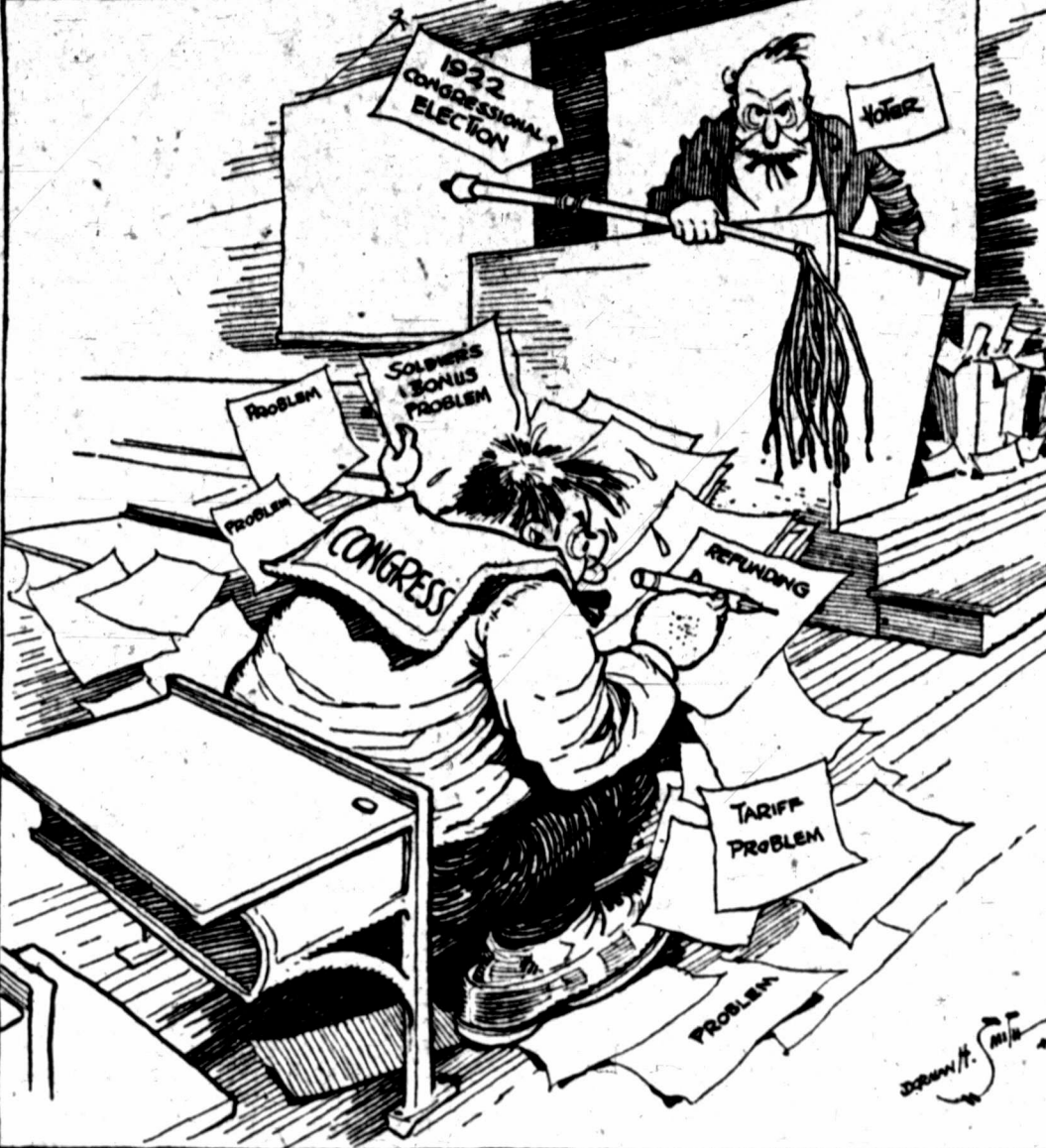
COMMISSION DOES NOT CONSIDER THE GERMAN REQUEST

FOUR RESIDENTS OF VERNON ARE BITTEN BY A MAD COYOTE

VERNON, TEXAS, Dec. 17.—Running amok in Vernon Thursday night about 1 o'clock a mad coyote bit four residents of this town and terrorized an entire section of the city until his career was ended by a bullet from the gun of one of the victims. Guy Puckett, a groceryman; Roy W. Davis, a contractor; Jeff T. Stephens and Willie Freudinger were the persons attacked by the wolf. Puckett was bitten on the hand as he was putting away his car for the night. Davis and Stephens were each bitten on their lower limbs, and Willie Freudinger, 13 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Freudinger, was severely gashed over the temple.

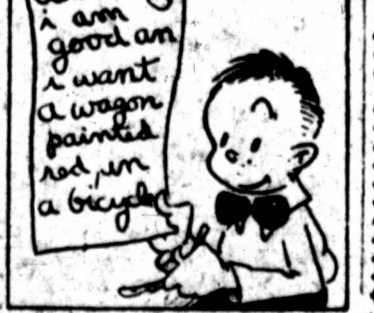
NEGRO WHO KILLED GIRL IS SPIRITED AWAY FROM WACO

It was stated positively today by William J. Burns, head of the department of justice's bureau of investigation. Lindenfeld, who was reported to the department by the Associated Press, was described by Mr. Burns as the key to the solution of the mystery and the only man that we know in the world who knows all about it.

DROP THE CASES AGAINST PACKING HOUSE WORKERS

PORT WORTH, Dec. 17.—Twenty-three strikers from the packing house strike in the city, who were arrested because they had interfered with street car traffic and molested workmen on their way to the office, today were freed after a rain in district court this morning, when attorneys for both sides agreed to drop the matter during the court sitting, a case which has followed having their case taken to federal court by the strikers to cease all aggressive operations and to leave the activities purely to carrying banners.

SEVEN INJURED IN COLLISION OF SHIPS SENT TO HOSPITAL

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Seven seamen injured in the collision between the liner Panama and the United States destroyer Graham, off the coast of New York, today were sent to the naval hospital in Brooklyn. The men, all of whom were of the crew of the Panama, were injured in a collision with the U.S.S. Johnston, a gunboat.

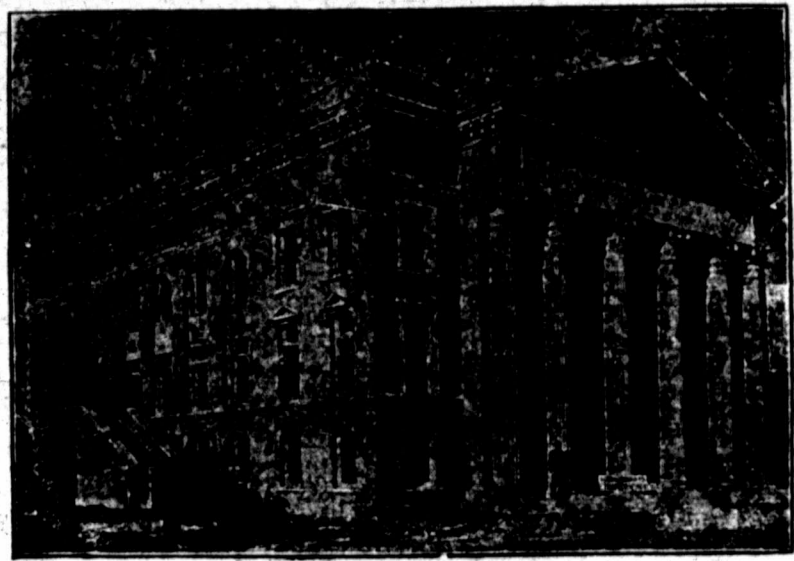
WALL STREET EXPLOSION ON SEPTEMBER 16, 1920

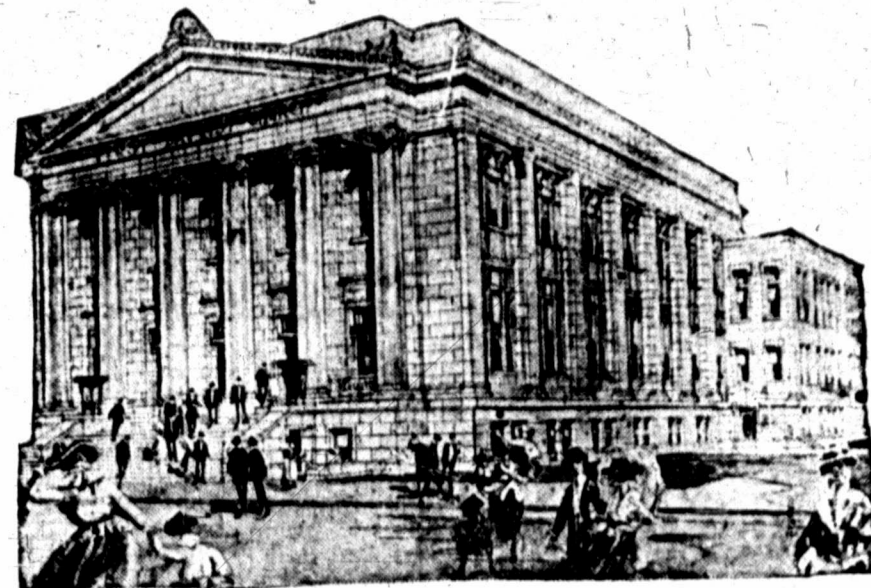

and confession, we have childishly quarreled in His name.

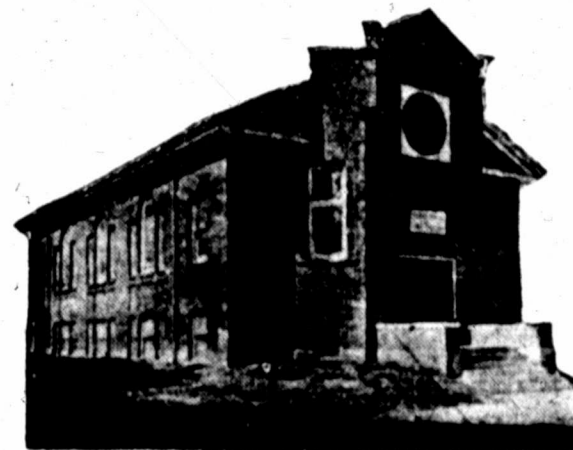
But the wonder which rested under the star that hung over the land of Judea is more potent and tenderly sure today than ever before.
