





MAJOR BEACH SAYS \$7,500,000 CAN BE PROFITABLY EXPENDED.

WORK ON THE PROJECT SHUT DOWN LAST APRIL

Present State Of Work Is Discuseed By Chief Of Army Engineers.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 .- Seven and one-half millions of dollars "can be profitably expended" in new work on the Muscle Shoals, Alasama, nitrate and waterpower project during the fiscal year of 1923, Major General Beach, chief of army engineers, says in his report today to the secretary of war. Work on the project was shut down last April as a refusal of congress to ppropriate further funds for it and the government now is negotiating for the sale and lease of the plant

net total of \$15,278,828 has been excompleted, the percentages of completion for the various units being: Wilson dam, 45 per cent; power house, 11 per cent, and locks, 10 per cent. The sum expended in the fis-cal year ended last June 30 was \$7,840,781, the principal items listed by General Beach being:

Dam construction, \$3,108,800;
power house construction, \$1,917,-90; main line railroads, construction, maintenance and operation, \$495,000; general plant, purchase, construction, operation and maintenance, \$1,391,200; camp construc-tion, maintenance and operation tion, maintenance and operation, \$728,500; general expenses, including flood losses, labor recruiting and office expenses, \$731,200, and lock construction, \$143,800.







ras has concluded the gathering of data in the school survey of Wichita county that has been in progress the past two weeks. Prac-tically every school in the county was visited and facts ascertained. the most interesting conclusion be-ing that high school facilities should be put within reach of rural commenting on the survey Mr.

"The object of this investigation has been to ascertain as nearly as possible just where the rural por-tion of Wichita county stands edunecessary to gather the facts. The facts were gathered through visits to schools, interviews with teachers and trustees, questionnaires with the county jail. The request was granted and the sheriff of Clay county brought them to this city superintendent, the country treasure of the co ationally. 

THE AMAZON ARMY.

The manifestations of a growing, groaning civilization are always interesting, especially from afar. One of the most interesting manifestations of our present groaning civilization is the Amazon army in the Kansas coal fields which has been gaining objective after objective lately.

Alexander Howatt, head of United Mine Workers district number 14 has been wrangling with the new industrial court of Kansas ever since that court was established. He has called strikes of the mine workers against the orders of the court, he has prolonged strikes in spite of the court's orders, he has persisted in his authority in the face of contrary orders of final upshot was that Lewis displaced Howatt and the civil authorities of Kansas re-placed Howatt, that is, placed him in jail to serve a six months sentence for contempt of court. He is now serving this sentence. Some of the members of his union remained on a strike, others went back to work and new miners came in to take the place of those who remained on the strike.

The situation seemed to be somewhat pleasantly worked out until the women took a hand. They decided to stop all mining of coal in their section of the state. There were no bloody massacres such as the terrible affair in Colorado a few years ago, there was nothing similar to what takes place in West Virginia coal fields every few months in the nature of violence, but their efforts were just as effective. They spurred themselves on in their cause, believing in its righteousness as much as any warriors who may ever have marched under any banners whatsoever. They carried no weapons except some red pepper and reams of invective. They scattered this pepper where it would do the most harm and while scattering it they shot a few million words of invective at the working miners. Their onslaught was effective, unusually so, and the working miners fled before the attack.

What else could the miners do but flee? When a man attacks them they can fight back, they may face bravely machine guns and high explosives, poison gas and aerial bombardment, but they cannot face red pepper and women's cries of "shame on you." There is nothing for a gentleman to do when such an attack is made but to turn tail and run. He cannot strike her, he stands no chance whatever in coming out first in a verbal battle, he cannot use logic on her to any advantage. The only thing left for him to do in the face of such an attack is to get out and hit the dirt, and trust that all cylinders will keep hitting.

The Kansas state authorities have sent the militia to handle the situation and keep the mines open, but the militia will be powerless. The officers cannot give orders to shoot down women and even if they did the privates would not fire. The Amazon Army can use its supply of ridicule and even red pepper on the soldiers as well and as effective as upon the miners. The uniforms, guns and bayonets of the soldiers may have a helpful effect in subduing I'd filled my pipe and settled down beside the cosy the fighting tendencies of the woman army but that is all that they can do. The only hope for the situation is that the women will tire of their plaything and go back to their homes quietly, allowing those who wish to work to do so.


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FREE OF EPIDEMICS

ful Scourge During The World War.

NICH, JUGO-SLAVIA, Dec. 17 .-Serbia today is practically free of epidemics of disease. The population never enjoyed better health or more genuine contentment. The hospitals never held fewer patients. The death rate seldom has been lower. Doctors have rarely found it so difficult to make a living. This is regarded as remarkable in view of the fearful scourges which claimed half its population during the world war and the post-armi

tice period.

The correspondent, who visited Serbia at irregular intervals during 1918, 1919 and 1920, recently made another journey through the counanother journey through the try. He noted ar amazing change try. He noted ar amazing change in the appearance of the people. The men and women looked strong, vig-orous and well fed. They were the finest homespun clothing. The Everywhere the homes were exam of cleanliness, comfort and

No such picture could be found in Serbla from extinction, the corre-for example, when the armistice mercifully intervened and saved Seerbia from extinction, the correspondent saw men and women clad in rags, afflicted with disease, homeless and hopeless, dying of in-anition as they walked. He observed bables wrapped in empty flour sacks, in newspapers and even in pieced-together leaves, the bones showing through their frail little bodies for want of sustenance or as a result of disease. He visited hos-pitals packed with typhus-ridden patients; orphanages overflowing with parentless children; asylum owded with the feeble-minded and

Presents Different Scene. But Serbia of 1921, or Jugo-Slavia, as it is more correct to call it, presents a different scene. The country has emerged from those years of misery, want and woe in an almost miraculous fashion. It is a changed nation, not merely politi-cally and territorially, but physically, and spiritually. While the rest of the world has been squabbling over territorial boundaries, economic zones, reparations, indemnities and internal strife. Jugo-Slavia has been "sawing wood" and minding her own business.

Her house is now completely in order. And it is a model house for the rest of the world to see. This metamorphosis, for such it

must be called, may be ascribed first to the country's freedom from war; second, to the unceasing thrift and energy of its people; third, to the abundance of foodstuffs, cloth-ing, medicines and other necessaries which the country up to now had lacked; fourth, to the material assistance given by the American food administration and the American Red Cross; fifth, to the self-sacri-ficing work of the Serbian doctors and sanitary authorities; sixth, to the sanitary and medical reforms introduced by American, British and French doctors and nurses during

and since the war.

It would be difficult to find any where else in the world a people at once so happy, healthy, hopeful, prosperous and active as the Serbica peasantry. Certainly their counterpart cannot be found anywhere among the diverse races of the Balkan peninsula.

It is true that here and there a ome has been saddened by the loss war-of a husband or a brother or in war of a husband or a father, but taken collectively it may be said that the welfare of the Jugo-Slav was never better; their morale seldom higher; their useful-

TOLSTOP'S DAUGHTER IS MAKING EFFORT TO SAVE HOME OF NOTED AUTHOR

TASNATA POLYANA, RUSSIA, Dec. 17.—Miss Alexandrie Tolstoi, the favorite daughter of Count Leo Tolstoi, the novelist and chief literary figure in Russia during the half century preceding his death in 1910, is the leader of the movement to save the great writer's home from decay and to make here on the estate a popular university where lovers of Tolstoi's writings and creed may come, study and even

and creed may come, study
settle indefinitely.
"Tolstoi's was a universal mind.
He does not belong to Russia entirely," said the famous writer's
suchtar, "and for that reason I "Tolstoi's was a universal mind. He does not belong to Russia entirely," said the famous writer's daughter, "and for that reason I feel that England, France and the United States have an interest in this historic place. The soviet government is doing what it can to preserve the home and maintain it as a place for pilgrims, but it hasn't any funds. Anyway, the materials must come from absoad, and I have been promised by Kalenin, chairman of the central effective committee of all the soviets, that contributions of all the soviets, that contributions of materials or money will not be interfered with or diverted."

Miss Tolstol, who is a vigorous type of woman and bears physical

and intellectual resemblance to her and intellectual resemblance to her father, has been in Russia since the general war. She was a field nurse during the war, and after the revolution, has been imprisoned several times, once for eight months in the Lubianka dungeons of Moscow, and was arrested during the summer for a few hours, as a member of the famine committee.

LONDON, Dec. 18.—An ingenious contrivance to determine efficiency automobile headlights and to sbolish their glare is being tried out by the Royal Automobile club Already satisfying results have

The apparatus is nothing morhan a black disc, on which are ir regularly shaped areas crossed di-asonally by white parallel lines. To measure the intensity of driver's headlights, the disc is car-ried until the man at the wheel can discern any one of its lined areas. That, it has been shown, would be about the distance at which this same driver could see a man in a

khaki-colored suit.

Men working on this problem of headlight dazzle have discovered that the irregular areas are more true in testing a driver's ability to view objects ahead of him at night than if the areas were definite-



aped squares, circles or triangles The reason for this, they say, is that the human eye, trained to look for a popular pattern, will believe it sees that outline before it ac-tually comes into view. For this reason this strange design is chosen.

The disc is placed at several heights and varying distances from the car, to determine the strength the headlights and their degree conformity to the law. Headlight glare is determined by

placing the disc at a point six feet to one side of the automobile. It is faintly illuminated by a small light in front. When the headlights are the faint light makes the disc visible to an approaching motorist.

TWENTIETH CENTURY METHODS IN AN ANCIENT LAND

Where the Far East Seems Like America—Parlor Cars, Porters, Fast Trains, Roof Gardens, Technical Schools, Laboratories, Normal Schools, Steel Works, All a Part of a Modern Railway

Taking this modern railway at Mukden. you ride in the standard Pullman, attended by a uniformed porter. You awaken in the morning feeling very much as you would were you riding in one of the crack transcontinental trains at home. You look out of your window when seated in the dining car and find that you are approaching a city. The smell of salt is in the air. You are near Dairen, the wonderful, all-year icefree port of Manchuria.

You'll find the station there like any modern station. There's a subway for passengers' exit under the tracks. There is a carriage and motor stand. If you have availed yourself of all the conveniences of this modern railway in an ancient land a

Away back in the early days the Chinese had a name for the place which meant "Black Mud Hollow," then the British and the French made it a base of operations when attacking Pekin, and later on it was leased to Russia, and the old Chinese Eastern Raflway, which was not Chinese but Russian controlled the place.

When the strife of war had passed and the leases of the Russian Government bad passed into the hands of her conqueror the South Manchurian Railway was found to be supreme. It was backed by Government



The Plan to Spread 27,000 Miles of Improved Roads Over the United States Is Certainly Being Realized; 9500 Miles Are Completed and 17,500 Are in Process of Construction

COTT HAPPENS now and again that visions said Thomas H. Macchief of the Bureau of Public "These visions may become reality by an unfolding process that is so gradual that those in whose very presence the miracle happens may not be aware of it. There is, for example, the vision of a nation which is spider-webbed with a system of good roads that brings this master convenience almost to the very door of every individual. That dream of the good roads enthusiast is just now being made a reality. With the passing of a few years it will be as though some magician waved his hand and, lo! in the place of the troubled thoroughfares of the past, the whole map of the nation will be interwoven with the network of highways that is the best that science can build.

"In that plan for co-operative development of good roads that has been worked out as between the Federal Government and the States during the last half dozen years, it has come to pass that 27,000 miles of highly improved roads are built or building. Nine thousand five bundred miles of these roads are actually completed, while 17.500 miles are under way. If this stretch of highway reached straight into the distance it would circle the world and there would be enough left over for an additional thoroughfare from New York to San Francisco. Instead of girdling the earth, however, the purpose of this great road system is to carry a model thoroughfare at least to the county seat of every county in the States and thus to bring that

to think of the size of the job of which this man was in charge. It is admitted that ten or fifteen years will be required to finish the job of laying down the network of highways to which the Government has set its hand and which, it should be understood, is entirely aside from State and county projects. Already \$350,000,000 have been appropriated for it by the Federal Government, which amount is to be matched by the States. It is certain that it will require seventy or eighty millions a year for at least ten years and probably fifteen, or, probably, a billion more. This makes a total of \$1,350,000,000. It is the habit to measure all such tasks by that of completing the Panama _anai, so we may take that as a gauge and recall that \$373,-000,000 was spent on it, or a little more than one-fourth what is here to be laid out by the Federal Government alone. That amount was spent in ten years or at a rate about half as fast as is being spent by the Government on this roads program. This road-builder for the Government was born in a log cabin in the mountains of Colorado, up in the Leadville country, two miles above the sea, but a little more than forty years ago. He went down to Ames. Iowa, where Secretaries of Agriculture come from, for his schooling. There he studied engineering and when he was through went to building roads for the State of Iowa, which certainly needed them. He kept on at roads in that State as its highway engineer until he came to the Federal job some two years ago.



"The increase in motor vehicles and particularly in motortrucks resulted in a very great increase in the use of the roads of the Nation and resulted particularly in subjecting those roads to a strain which had not been contemplated when they were built, placing them under this strain at the very time when they were most neglected and when the least provision was being made for their maintenance. The result was that we came out of the war with a very greatly increased use of highways and at the same time with a national system of highways which had not been built for the sort of

strange thing, for example, that the years 1914, 1915 and 1916, despite all that had gone before, were years of highway depression. Quite naturally there were many conflicting points of view to be overcome before a permanent policy could be developed. These were conflicts, for example, between the proponents of local control. State control and national control. If, for example, a county bonded itself that it might lay down a system of improved roads, that county was very likely to insist that it was the final authority as to the manner in which those roads should be built. It might well happen, however, that the officials in charge of the expenditure of this money were far from being the best road-building talent that was procurable. The State, as a larger organization, was likely to have more information on the subject, was likely to know



more about the advantageous methods of procedure than was the county. The Federal Government, on the same principle, was cossessed of wide information and was needed to harmonize the whole scheme and establish common standards. It was during this period of 1914, 1915 and 1916 that the contentions between these various agencies were being worked out and the result was this period of depression.

"All over the country at just this same time a new problem was being raised, for the roads of the Nation which had been built for lighter traffic were being subjected to the pounding load of the motortruck. A macadam road with a tar binder might resist the wear and tear of passenger automobiles, but it would be likely to break down under the greater weight of these trucks. So everywhere it had become necessary that roads should be rebuilt to resist this weightier traffic and so did the road problem become more complicated during the very period when it was being neglected. Now, bowever, the clouds seem to have rolled by and the time of accomplishment to be at







A New Device for the Wireless Phone

The standard sending tubes now used for radio telephony are extremely perishable. So delicate is the filament contained in them that, although theoretically expected to last 1000 hours, they do not in actual service average more than 100 to 200 hours of contisuous operation. And every time one of them burns out it costs \$30.

A wireless telephone station, to do business properly, must use a number of such vacuum - tubes. When Arlington (by the Potomac) talked to Honolulu, a while ago, about five hundred tubes were employed.

Dr. Smith's tube has no filament to burn out. It is good for at least 4000 hours' operation—not theoretically merely, but in real work.

Having nothing to burn it saves money. Also, it economizes electric current.

Use of a filament sharply limits the amount of power a tube can develop. No strenger current can be passed through than the filament will bear without burning out. Thus, for the existing standard vacuum tube the limit is fifteen-hundredths an ampere at 1000 volts. Which means that six such tubes must be used together in order to carry a total current of only nine-tenths of an ampere.

Dr. Smith has built a tube which, as a single unit, will carry ten amperes. For \$30 he can make a one-ampere tube which will carry more current than six tubes of the present standard type costing \$180.

One way in which the Smith tube saves electric power is by doing away with need of power to heat a filament. The standard tube now in use requires sixty-five watts to

The new tube (filled with helium) establishes magnetic control over the path followed by the electrons, thereby setting up a requisite intensity of conduction and varying the conductivity between the electrodes with such nicety as to reflect the slightest modulations of the human voice.

This novel invention has great possibilities in the field of power transmission. promises to provide an efficient, economical means of converting high voltage alternating into direct current (more confor transmission over long distances), and then turning it back again into alternating current at the point of destination. Another thing expected of it is that it will give a better supply of current to electric locomotives on railroads.

Apparently the Smith tube brings the day of the wireless phone's unqualified success, on a commercial scale and over long distances, much nearer. It should be particularly welcome to amateur operators of

the radio telephone, inasmuch as it will save them much expense.

It will encourage the faith of those who believe that before very long every one of us will be talking by wireless-taking down the instrument from the wall and calling up the office, the neighbors and even friends in distant cities, without having to bother with a "central."

What We Get From the Coconut

the coconut, into the United States during the year 1921 are estimated at about 84,000 long tons, six thousand nuts to the

Pacific archipelagoes produce 10 per cent of the world's coconut crop, the Dutch East Indies 16 per cent, the Philippine Islands 15 per cent, Ceylon and continental Asia 55 per cent, Africa 2 per cent and tropical America 2 per cent. The coconut crop fills a big place in the

world's food supply. It contributes a highly valued material for candy-making, cakemaking and other uses familiar to the housewife as well as the confectioner. Immense quantities of copra are pressed for oil, much of which is now utilized in the manufacture of artificial lard,

Over \$2,000,000,000 is invested in the industry, more than half that amount being represented by land and groves. Nevertheless, it is in a very backward state, the producing trees, for the most part, receiving little care or cultivation, so that they are stifled by undergrowth. Under such conditions the average tree does not yield more than twenty-five nuts a year, whereas on well-managed plantations the output is four times that many, and therefore comes nearer to being profitable.

More than half the Pacific copra is of low grade, rancid and so pervaded with flavors due to putrefaction and mold that expensive "renovating" can hardly render its available for human consumption. The oil content is only 75 per cent of what it should be, owing

ripe and to incomplete drying.

During the last five years many crushing mills have been established in the Philippines, the Dutch East Indies, Australia and French Oceania. Crushing where the nuts are grown saves freight and prevents much spoilage in storage, and shipment; also, the fresh copra yields a better quality of oil. But there is much difficulty about containers for the oil. Wooden barrels do not serve the purpose well. Steel drums cost too much, Tank steamers would serve for transportstion, but the only ships of that kind available are those which carry kerosene to the Orient, and a kerosene flavor would lower the market value of the coconut oil.

The cake left over after pressing the copra for oil, called "poonac," fetches a good price in Europe, where great quantities of it are fed to dairy cattle. It seems to stimulate milk secretion in the cow, and is believed to supply fatty elements that enrich the milk.

Ozone and Health

OZONE is supposed to decodorize and purify air. Hence certain experiments recently undertaken with a view to finding out whether it might be introduced to advantage into schoolrooms, churches and other places, where people are congregated

To give a whole fot of people all the fresh air they need under such circumstances taxes the heating plant in cold weather, if the place in which they are assembled is to be kept properly warm. Perhaps, if ozone were supplied, less ventilation would

Ozone (a form of oxygen) is a powerful stimulant. Too much of it is dangerous. A little is supposed to be very healthful. It is alleged to be a germ-killer-for that reason, also, a beneficial ingredient in the atmosphere. But the fact is that not very much is known with certainty about it. The stuff ts artificially produced by electrical machines. Experts of the United States Bureau of Mines are trying to see how it works. There is a notion that, used in the way above suggested, it might irritate folks' throats and lungs. Possibly harmful oxides of nitrogen are produced together with it.

A Trap for the Hold-up Man

MAGINE the horrified astonishment of a bandit who, while engaged in holding up a bank, should see a strange-looking formidable machine, cylindrical in form and armed with huge claws, dash out of an obscure corner and rush upon him with an intent of obvious menace!

Gasping, he stands rooted to the spot. The machine throws its clawlike arms about him and embraces him in a close hug, holding him helpless until officers of the law appear and effect his capture.

The machine here described is no figment of the imagination. It is a contrivance invented by Stanley Valinski, of Homestead, Pa., and is called a mancatching tank, the purpose for which it is designed being to grab and hold bank

The tank is an armored watchbox, inside of which an armed watchman is concealed during the business hours of the bank. It is provided with peep holes so that the occupant can see what is going on outside, and with a number of openings through which he can thrust out a pistol. At the top is a ventilator with shutters which may be opened or closed by turning a knob.

The critindrical steel box has a floor sufficiently elevated above its bottom to leave room for a small truck on four wheels, which, operated by an electric motor, will rapidly propel the tank, the steering of the latter being done by the hand of the man inside gripping a handle conveniently

He enters the tank through a door on the side, which he closes after him and secures with a steel latch. Then he seats himself

Clams Now Canned

NOBODY thought of canning the clam until within the last very few years. Now that estimable mollusk is coming to market in great quantities in a tin shell.

It is particularly a Maine industry, and one of its recent developments is the canning of clam juice, clam bouillon and clam chowder. Clam juice is bully for soup, and is highly recommended for invalids. To get first-class clam chowder one is no longer obliged to go to the seashore; it may be had from the grocer in Omaha or Oshkosh.




Cigarette Holder on a Ring

It is made of a single wire bent in such fashion as to clasp the cigarette, while it forms a ring to be held between the fingers. The part of the wire that for the cigarette is made gat and lighter than the rest of it in order

without injuring its integrity. 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
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

























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
