Declares Political Significance Will Be Lost in Neighboring Welcome.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—It has been learned from a reliable source, says a Central News Office, that a secret meeting of the cabinet took place today, representing both the supporters and the opponents of the agreement on the treaty, a compromise was reached which will insure the ratification of the pact.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—A statement from Prime Minister Lloyd George was issued here today to the effect that the government had gone to the utmost limit in the Irish treaty and that it was impossible to reopen the discussion.

The delay in ratification in Ireland, the statement said, was held up by the cabinet. The cabinet committee appointed to arrange the evacuation of the British forces in Ireland, settle the terms of armistice and transfer of executive responsibility to the Irish provisional government.

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ALL HOPES FOR AN AGREEMENT TO LIMIT TONNAGE IS DECLARED ABANDONED BY THE COMMITTEE

A demand by France for a minimum submarine tonnage of 50,000 tons was declared by delegates to have closed the door to any agreement, the American compromise proposal having been rejected finally and completely by the French.

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 28.—Loot obtained last night when the express car safe of Missouri Pacific train No. 209, Joplin to Kansas City, was robbed between Pleasant Hill, Mo., and Sheffield, a suburb of Kansas City, this afternoon was placed officially at approximately \$2,000 in cash and possibly double that amount in securities, most of which were non-negotiable.
