



### WHOLESALE PRICES LITTLE CHANGED IN PAST TWO MONTHS

GENERAL LEVEL REMAINED  
STATIONARY IN NOVEM-  
BER AND DECEMBER.

### STATISTICS REPORTED BY DEPARTMENT OF LABOR

Of 327 Commodities, 116 Decreased,  
89 Increased And 122 Re-  
mained Stationary.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—The general level of wholesale prices remained stationary through November and December, the bureau of labor statistics of the department of labor announced today. The bureau's weighted index number with the 1913 price level denoted by 100 stood at 149 in those two months with the prices of 327 commodities unchanged.

Foodstuffs, farm products, cloths, clothing, chemicals and drugs showed a declining tendency, which was most pronounced in such articles as cattle, hay, hops, peanuts, butter, cheese, eggs, lard, lemons, oranges and sugar. Metals and house furnishing goods were listed as unchanged, while fuel prices showed a slight increase and building materials advanced 1 per cent in December over the November level.

An increase for the month of two per cent was reported in the group of miscellaneous commodities, including brass, mill feed middlings, linseed meal, lubricating oil, paper, manila rope, Mexican sisal and tannage. Of the 227 commodities, 116 were shown to have decreased, 89 increased and 122 remained stationary in price in December.

### PLAN DEEP TEST WEST OF VERNON

Those interested in the Penn-Burk-  
burnett Well Plan to Drill  
Deeper.

VERNON, TEXAS, Jan. 19.—Prospects for a deep oil test near the city have brightened materially following a meeting here of those interested in the Penn-Burkburnett hole just west of Vernon. E. A. Carpenter of Salem, N. J., president of the company, and A. E. Dean of Philadelphia are in Vernon at this time for the purpose of investigating activity.

Mr. Carpenter explained to those present Saturday that the company wishes to complete the well to the contract depth of 3,500 feet unless oil is found at a more shallow depth, and he expressed the belief that work could be resumed shortly if the concern could be assured of the support and co-operation of those interested. The organization, said Mr. Carpenter, does not possess funds to proceed, but directors put into office a short while ago are prepared to contribute substantially to the cost of the project.

The Keystone-Willbarger syndicate, organized by the present management of the company, will have charge of the work if drilling is resumed. The opinion of the meeting was that the well should be drilled, and that the united co-operation of officials in Philadelphia and those interested in the project would bring sufficient funds to resume work without delay.

### PREPARATIONS ARE MADE TO COMPLETE PYRAMID

VERNON, TEXAS, Jan. 19.—The bit has been sent on its final journey in Pyramid No. 2, the well holding interest in the Sliger field, and any time, in the event the well is a producer, a strike may be expected. Casing was completely set Monday and the hole thoroughly cleaned of obstructions. All preparations made to drill in.

### CHIEF OF POLICE AT OKMULGEE, OKLA., DIES FROM BULLET WOUND

OKMULGEE, OKLA., Jan. 19.—Homer Spaulding, chief of police, died this morning as a result of a bullet wound received January 9 in a gun fight between a party of officers and six alleged bandits. His death came while he was undergoing an operation.

### RESOLUTION PROPOSES LIGHT WINES AND BEER REVENUE FOR HIGHWAYS

CHICAGO, Jan. 19.—A resolution proposing to use the revenue derived from taxes on light wines and beer to build the new highways of the future in the United States has been introduced at the National Good Roads congress in session here.

Another resolution introduced proposes the use of approximately \$200,000,000 saved by scrapping of warships in building roads and a third resolution proposes that the interest on the European debt be converted to highway construction. This revenue would pay for a complete network of national highways in ten years' time, financing 10,000 miles of construction each year, builders said.

### CONDITION OF THE POPE IS REPORTED UNCHANGED

ROME, Jan. 19.—Reports from the bedside of Pope Benedict, who has the grippe, stated today that his condition was unchanged. He had a relatively high temperature this morning, but so far as is known serious symptoms have not appeared.

A bulletin issued by physicians attending the pope said that his condition was unchanged, and that his temperature had diminished.

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### ACTIVITIES AT SITE OF DIVERSION DAM WELL UNDER WAY

#### THREE SUB-CONTRACTORS AT WORK ON FEATURES OF PROJECT.

#### 70 TEAMS NOW BUSY ON SOUTH SIDE CANAL

#### Drag Line For Diversion Dam Being Installed—Mush Machinery En Route.

The site of the diversion dam for the irrigation project is rapidly becoming a scene of real activity, and with all obstacles to the work removed, three sub-contractors are rapidly getting their operations under way.

Work began Thursday on the first section of the south side canal. Many Brothers & company, sub-contractors for this part of the project, putting 70 teams to work on the ditch. Callahan & Walker, also sub-contractors, are installing the drag line for the diversion dam and will have in operation shortly. The machine was hauled across the river by a caterpillar tractor without mishap, giving some indication of the dryness of the river at this time. The drag line will be used for the transfer of steel, sheet piling and for loading the barges. McCabe Brothers, sub-contractors for the diversion dam bridge, are making steady progress, and are half way across the stream. The big steam shovel for the storage dam excavation has been unladen at Maybelle and is now being set up, preparatory to its journey across country to the dam site. As

previously stated, it will do some road building on its way. The machinery and equipment to be used by the Puget Sound Dredging and Drainage company, sub-contractors for the storage dam, will start arriving about February 20. It is being assembled from all parts of the country. With operations getting well under way, a considerable amount has been made in the number of unemployed in this section, and the number of men at work will increase day by day for some time.

### ARGUES REDUCED RATES APPLY FIRST TO COAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—Should the interstate commerce commission decide as a result of its inquiry that rate schedules may properly be lowered, the lower rates should be applied first to coal, the commission was told today by J. H. A. Morrow, vice-president of the National Coal Association, who said he spoke for 2,900 mine operators producing approximately 80 per cent of the country's bituminous coal. He estimated that coal rates had advanced from 75 to 200 per cent since 1914.

Substantial reduction is a prerequisite of the industrial and business revival, Mr. Morrow said.

### ASSESSOR MAILED RENDITION FORMS TO NON-RESIDENTS

Tax rendition blanks were being mailed out Thursday by the county tax assessor, Irvin Deaton, to all non-residents who own either property or oil and gas leases in Wichita county.

The office force has made a complete check up on all leases and property owners of which reside in other counties or states.

The assessor is following the same plan adopted last year in making assessments. It is his plan to have all people have the opportunity of rendering their own property rather than placing it on the unrendered rolls.

He asks that people co-operate with him and his deputies in placing a fair value on all property.

### HAS NOT INDICATED INTENTION TO RESIGN

AUSTIN, Jan. 19.—Attorney General Keeling was out of his office here today and nothing to indicate an intention to resign had reached the governor's office. The attorney generally said after a recent conference with Governor Neff that a resignation had not been mentioned.

### FRENCH 75'S WILL BE USED IN TRAINING OF U. S. ARTILLERY UNITS

By Associated Press.  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Training of regular army troops with American modeled 75 millimeter guns will be discontinued and training with the French 75 will be extended to artillery units of the regular establishment, the national guard and officers of the organized reserves. Orders already have been issued by the chief of field artillery, it was learned today, directing organizations in the regular army equipped with the American models to turn them in for the French type replacements.

It is the policy of the field artillery chief to equip all field artillery brigades stationed in the United States with the French guns. They have been accepted as the standard light gun for the regular army and national guard and in time of national emergency would be issued to the organized reserves.

"The American 75 millimeter gun," says an official communication issued by the chief of field artillery, "is an experimental split train gun with which several regiments heretofore have been equipped. The shortage of field artillery troops makes inadvisable to continue further experimental work with this gun."

In extending the instructions to organized reserve officers, the letter says a new departure in army training has been made.

"Heretofore courses have been maintained for regular officers and for national guard officers," it says. "We are now inaugurating the systematic instruction of the third component of the army of the United States—the organized reserves. Insofar as the field artillery is concerned the size of the classes will be limited only by the amount of funds congress makes available."

### POPE BENEDICT REPORTED SUFFERING FROM COLD

ROME, Jan. 19.—The condition of Pope Benedict, who is suffering from a cold, is not considered serious, but he will be forced to remain in bed five or six days, it was said at the vatican today. The cold has settled in the bronchial tubes.

The correspondent was informed this morning that the pope's temperature had subsided to almost normal. His holiness is eating very little and has been ordered to remain quiet. Cardinal Gasparri and other vatican prelates are constantly near him. Cardinal Gasparri said today three things were necessary to restore his holiness to health: "Bed, bed, bed."

BENJAMIN FRANKLIN'S THRIFT.

This is National Thrift Week.

As was appropriate the week opened on the anniversary of the birth of Benjamin Franklin, that great American exemplar of thrift.

Franklin furnished a splendid example of thrift, indeed. His was the thrift of temperance and industry. It was the thrift of thoughtfulness and planning. It was not a mean and parsimonious thriftiness. If Franklin had practiced that kind of thrift his name would have been forgotten as soon as he was dead and while he would have been only a miser counting his gold.

Franklin was careful to husband and increase his resources but at the same time he was generous with his service to his community and to his country and to mankind. That's the reason we honor Franklin's name today.

If Benjamin Franklin were living in Wichita Falls today we might expect to see him contributing to the chamber of commerce and more than likely he would be among those who are soliciting memberships. He would make a contribution to the Woodrow Wilson foundation. If he were summoned for jury service he would go to the courthouse and would offer no excuses from performing his duty as a citizen. In short, we would see Franklin performing his full duty as a citizen today, even as he did more than a hundred and fifty years ago.

The Houston Chronicle, a few days ago, had a splendid little editorial on Franklin's thrift which is well worth reprinting. It follows:

"It is appropriate that we should open Thrift week on the anniversary of Benjamin Franklin's birth.

"His life, his work and his influence furnish, perhaps, the finest example in American history of what individual thriftiness can accomplish.

"He was not a mean man, but purposeful. He never moved in circles, never tried to burn the candle at both ends, never wasted his energy or resources in frivolous ways.

"He seldom undertook anything without first reasoning out the cost and calculating whether the advantages to be obtained were worth it.

"Having decided on an undertaking, he pursued it deliberately and resolutely. He never tried to deceive himself, or others, with that cheap smirking optimism which so many people have come to mistake for the real thing. His hope and faith were made of finer stuff.

"He believed in man's ability to progress, but only if that ability were honestly improved and employed.

"He did not believe that an ignorant could smile difficulties out of the way, or a ne'er-do-well laugh wealth into being.

"Neither did he believe that gold tucked away in the toe of a stocking represented sound economy.

"The motif of his career was an unceasing use of talents, an endless search for opportunities—not in response to passion and sentiment, but to attain carefully thought-out ends.

"He gave no advice he was unwilling to take himself, and preached little, except after having tried it out in practice.

"One gathers the idea, not only from his precepts, but more definitely from his life, that Benjamin Franklin considered thrift close akin to temperance—sound logic when one comes to think about it.

"Most of the waste, most of the extravagance, most of the squandered time and money which deplete our power for constructive advancement is due to immoderate, uncontrolled, intemperate desires.

"Generally speaking, the thriftless man is one who has allowed his emotions and appetites to run away with him. Vice versa, the man who thinks things out is usually able to take care of himself.

"Thrift is not the hoarding of so much substance just for the sake of hoarding it, but the judicious employment of resources for improved conditions on the one hand and their conservation to meet probable emergencies on the other.

"The man who has an umbrella is better prepared to meet a rainy day than the man who can jingle a dollar in his pocket with all the stores closed."

ROACHES PERIL HEALTH, TRAP AND KILL THEM

By DR. R. H. BISHOP. Cockroaches as carriers of disease have not been proved to be more dangerous than flies. Yet there are few people who would not rather have many flies around than one cockroach.

Like flies, however, cockroaches carry germs on their legs. Their legs are not hairy, as those of flies are, and in consequence the number of germs on a cockroach is not liable to exceed 10,000, while flies commonly have more than 100,000.

Cockroaches feed on excrement, where there are germs of pneumonia, typhoid fever and cholera, and on filth where reside germs of typhoid fever and summer complaint. Their legs, covered with the germs from excrement, are wiped on the next food which they may be ready for human consumption.

All in all, cockroaches are not as capable of spreading disease as are flies, but they are capable enough to warrant reckoning with. A dark, damp tarp baited with sugar

### K. OF C. AND VARSITY CLUBS ARE WINNERS

Elks Break into Losing Column; Methodists Outscored But Not Outaged.

Two fast and furious battles were staged in the American Legion hall last night and had the losers displayed the brand of basketball in the first periods that they did in the last the much vaunted Knights of Columbus and University club quintets might have been stopped. As it was, however, these two outfits got the jump on their opponents and the Knights won from the Elks in the opener 29 to 11 while the University finished on the desirable end of a 19 to 11 tally in the nightcap. The best basketball of the night was displayed by the K. of C., despite the fact that they were weakened in the first period when Capt. Wilson was disqualified for four personal fouls. A peculiar coincidence of the night's play was that all four captains were disqualified before the night was over for overzealousness. Wilson went in the first half of the Knight's game while Capt. Sharpe of the Elks was waved off the court shortly before the game ended. In the second contest Captain Viner of the University and Capt. Neal of the North Methodists were disqualified at the same time late in the second period.

A double foul being the fourth for each. None of the fouls, however, were intentional and the best of feeling prevailed among the players. The Elks simply fouled themselves to death. No less than 15 fouls were called on them in the two halves and Don Faichney turned 11 of these into points. Faichney's work in the first half featured this contest. The Elks changed their tactics in the second period and though Weldon jumped center again Faichney, Captain Sharpe guarded him and clung to him like a leech. Don did not get one chance to shoot a field goal in this period.

The Coffey brothers had the Elks forwards bottled up to a nice and Kennedy was the only one to drop in a field goal from the forward position. They managed to maintain this relative lead until the end, though the Methodists carried the battle to them in the second period.

The work of Referee McClain and Ferguson was worthy of note. Both had exceptionally hard games to handle and they called the fouls as they saw them—fairly and squarely regardless of which club it hurt. The sooner the players realize that they must abide by the rules, the better off they will be. Both arbiters know the game from every angle and very few fouls escaped them. The Elks were the principal offenders of the night, 15 fouls being charged against them. The Methodists broke the rule nine times, the Knights six and the University club five.
