interested in calories. They ask few questions when they tackle kraut and its near relatives-pretzels, spareribs, cheese sandwiches and beer.

Possibly the real reason for sauerkraut's comeback is the rumor that its juice, at the proper age, has an alcoholic content that comes close to the Volstead deadline. Or is that just propaganda by cunning kraut manufacturers?





of the excess profits tax is Benjamin C. Marsh, managing director of the Farm National Council. He has appeared before the ways and means committee to urge that this tax be restored. He says that it would yield a billion dollars annually. Any tax that will yield as much as a billion dollars is certain to receive some consideration from congress, but there is much doubt whether an excess profits tax would yield this much. It cannot be said that there isn't any such animal as excess profits but it is rapidly becoming extinct.

The excess profits tax was imposed as a war measure. It was justified as a war measure. Almost anything that would have raised money would have been justified. It is not justified as a revenue measure in peace times. It has already been too long continued by an administration whose slogan was "back to normalcy." It is a brake upon enterprise and ability. It lets the big corporation out and gets the little one. It exempts the corporation which has watered its stock and has, in many instances, laid heavy burdens upon the coaservative institutions which are the backbone of industry. The excess profits tax is bad because it encourages extravagance and discourages enterprise. It is doubtful whether it would raise any great amount of revenue at this time. It would appeal to that element which believes that it is wrong to be successful of or to make or have money.

The excessive taxes that have been laid upon large incomes also fail to accomplish their purpose, whether this purpose is to penalize such incomes or to raise revenue. It has driven the incomes of the wealthy into tax exempt securities and away from industrial investment. It is hurting industry without raising revenue. We can change our laws all we want to and while we may be able to break up large fortunes we can never make them pay taxes that are beyond reason. As the government needs the money, it can, and perhaps ought, to impose a pretty stiff rate on large incomes. But there is a point beyond which the rates will decrease rather than increase revenues. Congress has gone far beyond that point in its surtax rates.
