#### UNUSUAL STRENGTH FOR LIBERTY BONDS ON EARLY MARKET

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—Unusual strength and activity were shown by United States war issues in the early stages of today's bond market. Liberty 3 1/2, tax exempt, rose \$1.20 per \$100 in the first hour, others of that group rising 10 to 20 cents. Victory 4 1/2 was nominally better, but the 3 1/2, which is to be re-issued at par next June sold off 1/2 cent.

#### HEAR TESTIMONY IN STANDARD OIL SUIT

Universal Company Asks Fifty Million For Alleged Patent Infringement.  
SANTA BARBARA, CAL., Feb. 9.—Holmes Hall of Soda, Mo., manufacturer of soda water, today testified in a hearing before Judge J. O. Anderson in the Standard Oil Company's suit to restrain the defendant from using the name "Standard" for its distilled gasoline for use as fuel for automobiles and for other purposes. The hearing is the first in a series of proceedings in the case which began in 1917 when the Standard Oil Company brought suit against the defendant for alleged infringement of its patent to amount to \$50,000,000. The Universal company, said to be heavily backed by J. Ogdon Armour, has been previously accused of rights to the process on the ground that it acquired the invention of the late Jess A. Dubbs for demulsification of oil. The hearing is expected to continue for several days.

#### COMMITTEE TAKES UP SPECIAL TAXES FOR SOLDIER BONUS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Majority members of the house ways and means committee charged with drafting a special tax program in connection with the soldiers' bonus, set to work today with the expectation that they would be able to virtually complete their task by the end of the week. Treasury experts were called in to give the probable yield from the various tax sources. The decision was as to which will entail the least burden on business in particular and the country in general.

#### OPPOSE PERMITTING GOVERNMENT TO BID

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—An effort by Senator Lodge, republican, to allow the government to bid on the independent offices appropriation bill an amendment which would allow the government to bid on the independent offices appropriation bill, encountered as much opposition in the senate today as it did in the house. Representative Green of Iowa, began a study today to decide what changes are to be made in the bonus measure.

#### MASKED MEN HOLD UP WOMAN CASHIER ADAIR, OKLA. BANK

ADAIR, OKLA., Feb. 9.—Two masked men entered the Bank of Adair here at noon today while Miss Fay E. Dorsey, 23, assistant cashier, was alone and compelled her to the point of revolvers to sit in a chair while they searched up all the money in the cashier's cage. They escaped with approximately \$2,000.

#### HANDS BELIEVED HEADED IN DIRECTION COFFEYVILLE

COFFEYVILLE, KAN., Feb. 9.—The bandits who robbed the bank of Adair drove away in a big gray car, which carried a Missouri license tag. A posse was hastily formed and set out in pursuit. The bandit car was reported near Vinita, Okla., half an hour after the robbery and headed for Coffeyville.

### CLOUDS OF STEAM IS REPORTED RISING FROM MT. REDOUBT

ANCHORAGE, ALASKA, Feb. 9.—Clouds of steam have been reported rising from Mount Redoubt, 30 miles south of here, on Cook Inlet. By L. C. Grove, wireless operator at Kennel. Mount Redoubt, in the same district as the state legislature, is a greater or less degree for several years but this is said to be the first time Redoubt has shown signs of activity in its long history. ### MEXICAN OFFICIAL HELD FOR DEATH OF AMERICAN

LAREDO, TEXAS, Feb. 9.—Urbano Nolla, Mexican federal official, and Jose Marie Cruse, his subordinate, are in custody of the military commander at Nuevo Laredo, Mexico. Today in connection with the fatal shooting of February 5 of Walter Whitney, an American traveler. An investigation of the attack on the Texas side of the river, led by Nolla and Cruse, was completed by the police at Nuevo Laredo, it was learned today.

### FORMER PREMIER FAILS TO FORM NEW CABINET

LONDON, Feb. 9.—Former Premier Orlando of Italy has failed in an attempt to form a new cabinet in succession to the Bonomi ministry, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Rome. He visited the British ambassador today but declined to make further efforts to form a ministry owing to the hostility of several groups in the chamber of deputies.

### ROBBERS GOT ONLY \$1.50 AFTER BURNING WAY THROUGH BANK VAULT

BRECKENRIDGE, OKLA., Feb. 9.—Robbers who late last night burned their way through the vault of the Bank of Breckenridge, obtained only \$1.50 in stamps, according to officials. About \$2,000 in cash in the bank's safe was untouched.

### SUSPECT FOUL PLAY IN CONNECTION WITH BURNING OF VESSEL

#### ULSTER FRONTIER A LINE OF STEEL FOLLOWING RAIDS

NORFOLK, VA., Feb. 9.—The fire which destroyed the former transport Northern Pacific yesterday with a reported loss of four lives, originated in a leaky oil tank on a lower deck amidships, according to officers of the vessel. Captain William Lusti, as far as could be learned, made no suggestion in his report to the shipping board as to the manner in which the fire started.

#### ESTIMATED 5,000 ARE ENGAGED IN POLICING THE LINE

BELFAST, Feb. 9.—Ulster's frontier was virtually a line of steel today following the raids yesterday in which many unionists were kidnaped. From Portadown, county Armagh, to Belleek, on the Fermanagh-Donegal border, forces of "specials" were on guard as well as heavy contingents of the regular constabulary.

#### ESTIMATED 5,000 ARE ENGAGED IN POLICING THE LINE

High tension prevails at all points. Strangers traveling through the six counties are subjected to the closest scrutiny. No communication was possible with Enniskillen today. Colonel White, commanding the Ulster specials, has received a communication from Dublin castle, reporting that the provisional government is sending special officers to investigate the kidnaping. The number of men held captive after yesterday's raid is placed at 200 by the Northern Whig, a unionist newspaper, which adds:

#### ESTIMATE TWO HUNDRED UNIONISTS ARE KIDNAPED

LONDON, Feb. 9.—All the Ulster unionists kidnaped in yesterday's raid in Vigo were still held today, according to latest reports from Dublin. The highest estimate being nearly 200, although most accounts put the figure considerably lower.

#### EMPHATICALLY DECLINES TO MAKE A STATEMENT

NEWPORT NEWS, VA., Feb. 9.—Capt. William Lusti, master of the former army transport Northern Pacific, destroyed by fire yesterday morning, was captured and held today, according to reports from Newport News. The ship was on its way to New York when it was destroyed.

#### ADDITIONAL KIDNAPINGS IN COUNTY FERMANAGH

BELFAST, Feb. 9.—Additional kidnapings occurred today in County Fermanagh, one of the counties in which yesterday's raids were carried out. Four men were taken to the Rosses district. They were special constables who were kidnaped in the direction of Dallybeg, where it is believed other prisoners are being kept.

#### ENNIKILLEN, COUNTY FERMANAGH, IRELAND, FEB. 9.—Quiet has been restored here today. The roads were closed for several days.

The provisional government, it is stated, has telegraphed instructions to the commanders of the Irish republicans to release the prisoners taken during the raids.

### CREATES A COMMISSION AND OTHERWISE MAKES PROVISIONS FOR FUNDING ELEVEN BILLIONS

WASHINGTON, February 9.—A bill creating a commission and otherwise making provision for the conversion of the \$11,000,000,000 debt owed the United States by the allied powers, was signed today by President Harding.

### ORDINANCE CHIEF GIVES VIEWS ON HENRY FORD'S OFFER

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—An announcement by Chairman Kahn of the house military committee that Mr. Ford, would testify Monday, opened the second day's investigation by congress of Henry Ford's offer for the purchase and lease of the Alabama power and power property at Muscle Shoals, Ala.

### KANSAS WHEAT BELT SWEPT BY A STORM

TOPEKA, KAN., Feb. 9.—Western and central Kansas, the heart of the state's wheat belt, today faced a continuation of severe dust and wind storms which yesterday swept across a wide strip of territory and blew wheat out of the ground. No estimate was available here as to the extent of the damage.

### ANOTHER PARTISAN CLASH IN SENATE OVER NEWBERRY CASE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Another partisan clash occurred today in the senate over the Newberry election case, democratic senators taking sharp exception to an attack by Senator Pepper, republican, Pennsylvania, on their votes against Senator Newberry, democrat, Arizona, called the senate's attention to a speech by Senator Pepper last night at Albany, N. Y., in which the new senator said that every democrat had exhibited "lack of moral courage" in voting against Senator Newberry.

### ASSERTS RESERVE BANK LOANED FIVE MILLIONS TO G. O. P.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The assertion that William Boyce Thompson of the national republican organization had loaned \$5,000,000 from the New York federal reserve bank on a "dummy note," was made by Senator Hefflin, democrat, Alabama, in the senate today. He accused of an attack on the federal reserve board.

### TELEGRAPH BULLETINS

KANSAS CITY, KAN., Feb. 9.—Two bandits held up a street car here today, took \$100 from two bank messengers and terrorized a score of other passengers. The bandits escaped.

### DENY ORDERS WORK STOPPED ON SHIPS AFFECTED BY TREATY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Orders have been issued by Secretary Denby for the suspension of all ordinance work designed for the vessels affected by the naval limitation treaty signed at the Washington arms conference. The effect of the order, it was said, will be to lay off temporarily those employees who have been engaged on such work.

### CHARGES JAPANESE HAVE A GOVERNMENT IN THE GOVERNMENT

MOST DANGEROUS TO AMERICAN INSTITUTIONS, SAYS PUBLISHER.

### DECLARES AGREEMENT SHOULD BE CANCELLED

Must Stop Admission to Maintain Friendly Relations, Says Statement.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—If friendly relations with Japan are to be maintained, the United States government "must effectually stop the continued admission of Japanese and the rapid increase of Japanese population," V. C. McClatchy, publisher of the Sacramento, Cal. Bee, declared in a statement today before the house immigration committee.

He declared the "gentlemen's agreement" should be cancelled, as failing to carry out the purposes for which it was made, and this country should "take prompt and proper legislation, accomplish the intent of that agreement, as clearly set out by President Roosevelt under whom it was made."

Although immigration from other countries has been sharply curtailed, Mr. McClatchy said, approximately 6,500 Japanese have been permitted to come into the United States under the agreement since new immigration legislation went into effect.

While the immigration of Japanese "picture brides" has been stopped "in deference to public protest," he said, there are now coming to this country in still greater numbers "what he described as 'picture brides'." These, he declared, are urged to begot many children in order that the agreement since permanently established on this continent.

Mr. McClatchy asserted the Japanese in this country were "maintaining here a government within a government most dangerous to American institutions."

The citizenship of those born here is being "utilized largely for purposes of Japan," he declared, adding that of the 36,000 claiming rights as American citizens by registration up to last year, only 73 had applied for expatriation from Japan and only 44 had received it. "Thousands are being 'lost for loyalty to this country,'" Mr. McClatchy asserted, by returning to Japan at an early age to be educated there and later to re-enter the United States.

### HARVEY CHURCH STAGES A HUNGER STRIKE AND HAS LOST 40 POUNDS

CHICAGO, February 9.—Harvey Church, convicted of the murder of two automobile salesmen here last fall, has begun a hunger strike, it was reported here today, and his condition already has alarmed jailers, it was said.

Church is reported to have lost 40 pounds since he was imprisoned last fall, and in the past few days, a condition that it is believed a persistent effort to refrain from taking food would cause his death in less than the forty days usually believed as the greatest length of time an average human can exist without food.

### SUPREME COURT DENIES A STAY OF EXECUTION

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Feb. 9.—The supreme court this morning denied Harvey Church a stay of execution for the murder of two Chicago automobile salesmen. Church has been sentenced to hang Feb. 17.

### \$25,000 IS ASKED BY E. O. FRITZ FROM TRACTION COMPANY

Alleging that as the result of an accident that occurred at Denver and Ninth streets on November 25, 1921, he suffered serious, painful and permanent injuries, E. O. Fritz brought suit against the Wichita Falls Traction company in the 78th district court Thursday in which he asks \$25,000 damages.

The petition recites that he was proceeding across Ninth street in his automobile driven by his daughter and that without sounding a warning and traveling a greater rate of speed than is legally provided, a street car of the defendant company struck the automobile. The plaintiff alleges that the automobile was dragged along the street for a distance of fifty or sixty feet and that the car itself was completely demolished.

### POWERFUL SEARCHLIGHTS SWEEP HILLS AROUND THE YORKVILLE STEEL PLANT

YORKVILLE, OHIO, Feb. 9.—Five powerful searchlights mounted on water towers and other high parts of the Yorkville plant of the Wheeling-Steel corporation swept the hills on each side of the Ohio river all last night. They also searched every road leading into the village for possible gatherings of mill workers who have been on strike since last July. The night passed quietly after the excitement of yesterday when one striker was killed and a sympathizer wounded by shooting from within the mill.

### THREE PRISONERS AND A MULE ARE RECOVERING AFTER ATTACK OF GAS

CHICAGO, Feb. 9.—Three military prisoners and an army mule were recovering today from a gas attack which took place at Fort Sheridan yesterday. Clouds of chlorine gas were released when a tank burst near where the prisoners and mule were standing.

### PALESTINE MAN DROWNS IN THE TRINITY RIVER

PALESTINE, TEXAS, Feb. 9.—Perry Reed, 49, was drowned late yesterday in Big Lake, 12 miles west of here, on the Trinity river. He was attempting to swim his horse across the lake when the animal became entangled in a trammel net.

### PROHIBITION DIRECTORS INSTRUCTED TO ASSIST IN FIGHTING THE INFLUENZA

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Federal prohibition directors in all states were instructed last night by Commissioner Haynes to cooperate to the fullest extent with physicians and druggists wherever influenza is raging or there is other public catastrophe.

"All applicants for permits from physicians and druggists in localities affected," Mr. Haynes said, "should be acted upon as promptly as possible and such work should be given preference over all other work of the director's office."

### DOG PROTECTS MAN WHO FELL IN CHICAGO STREET EXHAUSTED FROM HUNGER

CHICAGO, Feb. 9.—Three weeks ago Peter Ribik, out of work, was wandering the streets when he struck up a friendship with a blue Dane, Ribik, weak from lack of food, fell in a busy street yesterday and the dog, halting traffic, stood guard over the man, protecting him from passing trucks and wagons. The dog also kept pedestrians at bay until a patrolman coaxed him from his post with a piece of meat until Ribik could be revived.

### SUGGEST VETERAN SHIP BE SCRAPPED WITH CEREMONIES

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Administration officials are undecided as yet as to suggestions that a veteran battleship of the fleet be scrapped under the naval limitation treaty to be sunk at sea with full military honors to symbolize ratification of the pact which will end competitive navy building among the five great naval powers. The idea is known to have appealed to some high officers as a fitting tribute to the old battleship. It has impressed other officers as an undesirable and impractical course, however, and final decision probably will not be reached until the full program of disposing of scrapped battleships has been worked out in detail by technical experts.

In any case one of the ships destined to be destroyed probably will be sent to the bottom by gun fire. The pre-dreadnaught Iowa, now equipped for distant control by radio and successfully tried out in aircraft maneuvers incident to the sinking of former German craft last year, is to be sunk by the fire of the fleet some time this spring. She was equipped for that purpose to be shot as a moving manuevering target before the Washington conference placed her among the worn out craft to be scrapped by the United States in reducing the fleet to treaty limits.

### HEAVY RAINS HOLD UP TRAIN SERVICE

Heavy Rains Fall in Northeast Oregon and Southeast Washington.

PENDLETON, ORE., Feb. 9.—Large areas in northeastern Oregon and southeastern Washington were washed out today and train service is held up in many places as a result of heavy rains that have been falling since yesterday.

### MINERS MEET TO CONSIDER A SCALE

Committee Begins Consideration Of New Proposals at Indianapolis.

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 9.—With reports showing widespread unemployment among coal miners before the U. S. mine workers of America began consideration today of the wage demands affecting the entire soft coal industry.

Attention was centered by the committee on 300 resolutions sent by local unions throughout the country containing suggestions as to new wage agreements to become effective next April 1. Members of the committee predicted that their report on the demand would be completed by the end of the week.

### SOVIET SECRET POLICE ORGANIZATION ABOLISHED

MOSCOW, Feb. 9.—The all-Russian check, the soviet secret police and judicial organization maintained largely for the suppression of counter revolution, has been abolished.

Suppression of open revolts, banditry and fighting, and the work of espionage, guarding the railways and other preventive measures, are transferred to the ministry of the interior.

ATTORNEYS ARGUE THE TWYMAN CASE

Testimony is Completed at Gatesville Late Wednesday Afternoon.

By Associated Press. GATESVILLE, TEXAS, Feb. 9.—Arguments of counsel, expected and consumed much of today's court session, were scheduled this morning in the case of H. G. Twyman, on trial here for murder in connection with the death of Dell Thames, 14 year old Beaumont boy, at the state juvenile training school last September.

Twyman, former military trainer at the institution, on the stand late yesterday asserted his innocence and declared that punishment he inflicted upon the boy for alleged failure to drill did not contribute to Thames' death. Defendant said when young Thames was brought to him by Joe Thomas and Eddie Stokes, boy drill captain on September 22, Thames fell to the ground. "I knelt over him and raised his head and arms," Twyman testified. "He was dead then, I think."

Other witnesses had testified that Thames was kicked and beaten by Thomas. REPORT THOUSANDS OF ACTORS ARE UNEMPLOYED

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—There are today more unemployed actors and other stage people walking along Broadway and a hundred main streets looking for jobs than ever before.

Several well known managers estimated today that half of the 15,000 actors in the United States, exclusive of vaudeville performers, were out of work. The Actors' Equity association had a smaller estimate. The bicycle riders and dancing teams which file from city to city under vaudeville contracts, have not suffered greatly. Vaudeville tickets generally are less expensive than drama and girl shows and the public seems willing to buy them even if money isn't so easy. The managers of legitimate productions complain of considerable overhead expenses. Increased railroad fares and union regulations followed by the cost of the employment at the wages of a lot of men who only want to sit around and boss somebody else. Union leaders say this isn't so. Some of the actors have found other things to do—clerking, punching typewriters, selling one thing or another and in some cases, actresses have become cooks. But many can find no work and meanwhile the girls wash their clothes and the men substitute the mattress for the stean presser.
