



RAISING THE MONEY IS THE QUESTION.

While a considerable number of citizens, a number of congressmen and senators and a number of veterans themselves are opposed to the principle of a soldier bonus or "adjusted compensation" as it is now being called it is pretty generally accepted that congress will pass some kind of a bonus measure.

The idea of a bonus came with a return of the soldiers from France. At first the majority of veterans appeared to be opposed to it but slowly it gained support from the veterans until all their organizations were supporting it. The attitude of citizens generally has been that if the soldiers wanted a bonus it ought to be paid. A recent election in Ohio on a state bond issue to be used to pay a state bonus was adopted by an overwhelming vote.

The question now appears to be not whether there shall be a bonus but what kind of a bonus and how the money will be raised to pay it. Any bonus will cost money and will add to the heavy tax burden already being borne. The people must accept this as a matter of course. If the bonus is authorized, as it will be, we ought not to complain of the taxes levied

Here are some of the taxes that are being favored by the House ways and means committee, ac-

Increase in letter postage from 2c to 3c, raising \$70,000,000. A tax of 1c a gallon on gasoline, bringing in \$80,000,000 annually.

A tax of 25c per horsepower on autos, to yield \$75,000,000.

An added tax of \$1 per 1,000 on cigarettes, and increased taxes on smoking tobacco other than cigars.

A tax on bank checks.

A tax of one-tenth of 1 per cent on stocks and bonds sold in exchanges, to bring in \$80,000,000. A tax on the transfer of real estate of onehalf of 1 per cent or less, a one-half of 1 per cent tax yielding \$50,000,000.

But these taxes will raise only a small part of he amount required.

How is the remainder to be raised? If the reader has any suggestions the ways and means committee will doubtless be glad to hear them,

figures so big that even the average adding machine cannot handle them, let alone a family that is thinking in terms of two cents a pound saved on butter. Having got the railroad problem down to a levy

figure of \$50 a year apiece, the question naturally rises: "What do we get for it?" In return for the \$50, the railroads perform serv-

ice equivalent to hauling each American 336 miles s year on passenger trains and carrying, for him, one ton of freight 2817 miles-almost across the conti-Back in 1913, a normal year, the railroads did

just about the same passenger and freight service for the average American as in 1921.

The cost of doing this was about \$30 a year for each of us. In other words, the railroads in 1921 performed

nearly the same service as in normal times, but charged two-thirds more. The increase just about matched the expansion of cost of living.

A thousand and one morals can be drawn from these railroad figures. The most important is, that all economic problems at all times should be considered in terms of actual services rendered and bulk of commodities changing hands, instead of in terms of dollars, whose buying power changes constantly like an eternal moving picture.
