Meetings Are Held in Great Hall of Justice at The Hague.

y Associated Press, THE HAGUE, Feb. 15.—The peace alace, which dynis during the war labeled "closed owing to bank-ruptcy"—was the scene today of the inaugural session of the permanent court of international justice, the corner-stone of the league of nations. The event was hailed by dherents of pacifist ideals as a new milestone in the evolutionary progress of the world toward peace. At the opening session the judges were to take the oath to fulfill their offices "honorably, faithfully, mpartially and conscientiously." In their future sittings they are ex-pected not only to clear up such doubtful points of international law

as may come before them, but also The first meeting was held in the great hall of justice.

Members of the court represent

12 nationalities and eastern and western worlds. The judges in accordance with the law creating the court, possess the "qualifications required in their respective countries for appointment to the highest judicial offices," or are "jurisnault of recognized competence in



THE SOLDIER BONUS.

In a statement issued Tuesday President Harding olced his opposition to the tax measures proposed to raise the money to pay the soldier bonus. The the bonus but there was an intimation that the time under the stars. for the payment of this bonus was not opportune.

By opposing the tax measures being considered by the ways and means committee Mr. Harding takes upon himself the responsibility of suggesting other methods of raising the money unless he means to bonus measure. This is a serious responsibility and if you will just keep your heart happy, there is interest in knowing just how Mr. Harding

As this newspaper has pointed out there is considerable sentiment against the payment of a bonus of any kind to the veterans but the public has considered this a matter for the veterans themselves to decide. Organizations of the veterans have declared in favor of a bonus, or "adjusted compensations" as it has been termed and these organizations are making a determined fight to get a bill through congress.

The United States has never been ungrateful to its defenders. Soldiers of the American Revolution were given grants of land in the territories west of the Allegheny mountains. The soldiers of the war of 1812 and in the Mexican war, the Civil war and the Spanish-American war have received and are receiving liberal pensions. Pensions are still being paid for the war of 1812. It is not improbable that the United States in the year 2032 will be paying pensions growing out of the world war. It is easy to believe that the American government will pay to the veterans of the world war an amount in pensions far exceeding the whole cost of the war to the United States up to this time. Twenty years from now it is probable that the government will be paying more than a billion dollars a year in pensions to the veterans. There will be liberal pensions for the veterans unless the American people reverse their national policy in this regard.

Isn't there some danger that insistence upon a bonus or "adjusted compensation" at this time may change the traditional American policy in its treatment of her defenders? Isn't there some danger that such a bonus might lower the value that the veterans themselves place upon their service?

It is not for us to answer these questions but we feel that they ought to be given consideration by the veterans themselves

Frederic Palmer, the noted war correspondent and the companion and friend of the American soldier, has written a communication to the New York Times in which he discusses the proposed bonus and concludes against it. Mr. Palmer said that with the laborers at home during the war pay day cleared scores with his job and contrasts the soldier with the workman. He says:

But with the soldier it was different. The wage he received, though they were larger and his comforts greater than were ever provided for any army in the world, were only a part of his payment. By far the greater part lay in the honor accorded him. the honor given from a recognition of his loyalty, his facing of danger, his sacrifice of himself for others, the honor due to the defender of common liberties and the champion of the right. It is this honor which the nation lavished visibily on the burial of the unknown soldier, who was regarded as its recipient and its symbol. And now the advocates of the bonus propose that this shall be commuted into money. 'Yes, we were heroes and all that,' they declare, but now we want to be paid for it. We prefer to take it in cash; \$400 apiece will be about the market-rate for heroism. That would settle things up and raise us to the level of the workmen in the shipyards. Let's have things squared.'

"But this argument cuts the ground from under itself and is therefore suicidal. The tribute of honor to the soldier is given because of his nobility in sac rifficing himself for his country. But if he commutes his sacrifices for cash, those services are no longer unselfish and noble and he has therefore no claim to extra compensation for them; they have been in cluded in the payment already made. He has in get rich. truth been crowned with a halo, a real halo of intrinsic and lefty worth, on the value of which his speeches in patriotic meetings are loud. It is conse- north. quently a depressing sight when one sees him going about peddling his balo or insisting that they shall be brought up wholesale. It is much as if a distincoished general, on the presentation to him of a sword in recognition of his services, should say that if it is all the same to the committee, he would prefer to take it in groceries. The hero who has sold his halo for cash is not on the level of the civilian who never had a halo, but must take a lower place.

"There are, of course, high-minded soldiers who feel all this and scorn the commercialization of their ber of the family gets into the movies? patriotism by a bonus. The American Legion itself apparently was at first of this noble mind, for at its organization it passed a self-denying ordinance expressly declaring that it would not go into politics. This action was then approved by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt. I have seen neither approval nor repudiation by him since of the action of the American Legion. "The case may be put in a few words. The truly patriotic soldier stands on a higher level than the ordinary citizen.
