NEW GRAND JURY IS DRAWN IN THE OKMULGEE CASE

ORDERED BY DISTRICT JUDGE BOZARTH TO REPORT FEBRUARY 27... COUNTY ATTORNEY SAYS IT IS "HIGH CLASS" JURY... Many of Most "Solid Citizens" of County Included in the List of 24.

OKMULGEE, OKLA., Feb. 16.—A new grand jury panel from which will be selected 12 men to complete an investigation into affairs of the defunct Bank of Commerce here, which was taken abruptly last Thursday when Superior Court Judge H. R. Christopher dismissed a grand jury called primarily for the purpose of investigating the bank's affairs.

INTEREST NOW CENTERS IN THE NEW GRAND JURY... OKMULGEE, OKLA., Feb. 16.—The grand jury panel, which was drawn from among the names of "solid citizens" of the county are included in the list of 24.

RESOLUTION ASKS FOR INFORMATION ABOUT THE TREATY... WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The resolution asking President Harding to call for information regarding the proposed Pacific treaty was adopted by the senate today, after a debate during which the foreign relations committee reported in support of the resolution.

FURTHER REDUCTION IN U. S. ARMY IN GERMANY... WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—An immediate further reduction of 202 officers and 2,000 men in the American forces in Germany was announced today by the war department. There will be remaining in Germany after this reduction, a total of 169 officers and 2,217 men.

EXPECT HARRINGTON WILL SHOW UP AT PALM BEACH, FLA... CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—The police authorities here today in their search for Leslie Harrington, missing head of one of the three concerns here said to have been in the hands of citizens of millions of dollars.

MISS OIL STOCK AND MONEY FROM PAPERS OF TAYLOR... LOS ANGELES, Feb. 16.—Oil stock and money belonging to late constituent part of the estate of William Desmond Taylor, murdered film director, are missing, according to the district attorney, Jones made this statement after checking up Taylor's personal papers and belongings and then turning them over to Mrs. R. M. Berger and income tax experts with whom Taylor is said to have discussed his 1921 income tax report a short time before his death.

EXPRESS LOAD OF HALF DOLLARS TO MAKE CASH BOND... OAKLAND, CAL., Feb. 16.—An express wagon load of silver half dollars—\$2,000 worth of them—was brought to the Oakland post office by George Bruno, manager of an Italian bank, to provide bail money for Lorenzo Guise, under arrest today on a charge of falling down by his automobile. All other police officers were several hours counting the half dollars and Guise was freed until they had completed their task.

GARRETT TAKES THE WITNESS STAND IN TRIAL AT ARDMORE... ARDMORE, Feb. 16.—The defense rested today in the outer trial of Buck Garrett, suspended sheriff of Carter county, and the case was expected to go to the jury early tomorrow.

TELEGRAPH BULLETINS... LONDON, Feb. 16.—The Bank of England today reduced its rate of discount to 4 1/2 per cent.

CHICAGO "PONZI"



Raymond D. Bischoff, 25, a federal investigation at Chicago disclosed that only \$1,000 in assets meet \$4,500,000 liabilities. Without any business experience Bischoff, 27 months ago opened a brokerage business, investing the savings of stockyards employes to whom he gave his personal note. Bischoff says his operations were legal but that he could have recouped his losses had his operations not been interrupted by a receivership.

ATTORNEY FISHER AND GIDDENS ARE ADJUDGED GUILTY

SHREVEPORT, LA., Feb. 16.—U. S. District Attorney Hugh C. Fisher and R. A. Giddens, member of the republican state committee, were found guilty of contempt in federal court here today. Judge Joseph G. Hutcheson Jr. finds Giddens \$1,000 and said he would pronounce sentence on Fisher later, which he would be disbarment or suspension until the district attorney changed his present attitude toward the court.

VIRGINIA SNOW STORM CRIPPLES THE TROLLEY AND TELEPHONE SERVICE

RICHMOND, VA., Feb. 16.—Crippled trolley and telephone service here today and in other parts of the state were reported here today as the result of last night's snow storm which resulted in a white covering of six inches depth. Telephone and telegraph lines were damaged in several southern states, particularly in Virginia, by the snow and sleet which fell yesterday, some injury to orchards being reported.

ORDER CANCELLATION OF SCHEDULED COAL RATE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—Proposal to reduce freight rates on coal into Kansas City from Kansas and Oklahoma producing fields by 2 1/2 cents per ton, minus the cost of the railroads, were declared unjustified today by the interstate commerce commission. The schedule were ordered cancelled and present rates maintained.

WILL PLAY FOR GIRLS' TITLE IN QUANAH FRIDAY

QUANAH, TEXAS, Feb. 16.—When the Quanah high school girls meet the Waco high fair here Friday, the state champions will be at stake and the fastest girls in the state will be on hand. Neither team has suffered defeat the past two years while, on the other hand, they have beaten the best in the state.

SINCLAIR CUTS PRICE HEALDTON CRUDE OIL... TULSA, OKLA., Feb. 16.—The Sinclair Crude Petroleum company today announces a reduction of thirty cents in the price of Healdton crude oil, meeting the Magnolia company's price of \$1 a barrel.

PRESIDENT FAVORS SALES TAX PLAN TO PROVIDE FOR BONUS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—President Harding informed congress today he considered general sales tax the only feasible method of raising funds for a soldiers' bonus. The executive in a letter addressed to Chairman Forney of the house ways and means committee suggested that unless congress saw fit to enact a sales tax, passage of bonus legislation should be temporarily postponed.

AN INSPECTION OF MUSCLE SHOALS IS COMMITTEE PLAN

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—Senate agriculture committee today asked the senate to authorize a visit to Muscle Shoals power and nitrate project in connection with the committee's consideration of Henry Ford's offer to lease the properties. The resolution, which proposed that the whole committee of 17 men, be authorized to inspect the auditing committee because of the expenditures that would be entailed.

HEROIC ACTION BY AVIATOR SAVES THE LIFE OF CAPTAIN

HOUSTON, TEXAS, Feb. 16.—Heroic action by Sergeant Bennett T. Collins at Ellington field this morning probably saved the life of Captain George Hinsley, when the plane crashed into a building and burst into flames. The part of the engine personnel of the field prevented what appeared likely to be a disastrous fire.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The American relief administration expects to withdraw from its undertaking in famine-stricken Russia next September. TOTAL CASUALTIES IN BELFAST IS 114 WITH 34 DEATHS

COMMANDER ULSTER HALL FOR THE USE OF THE TROOPS... BELFAST, Feb. 16.—The authorities today commandeered Ulster hall, the commodious structure of Bedford street ordinarily used for concerts and other entertainments, for the use of the troops now engaged in combating the disorders here. Up to 10 o'clock this morning the casualties had reached a total of 114, with the deaths numbering 34.

WORKERS ARE HELD UP BY YOUTHFUL GUNMEN

One Man is Shot Dead, Another is Wounded and Little Girl is Killed... BELFAST, Feb. 16.—The authorities today reported that a young man was shot dead and another wounded and a little girl killed in a shooting in the city.

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CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—A fire in the business district at Third and Main streets did \$25,000 damage today. A safe, cash, and jewelry were saved.

FIVE THOUSAND MEN ARE HELD READY FOR ANY EMERGENCY AS RESULT MEXICO REBEL ACTIVITY

EL PASO, TEXAS, Feb. 16.—Five thousand troops at Fort Bliss were being held today ready for any emergency which might arise along the border. They were mobilized last night when rumors were scattered in Juarez and El Paso that 3,000 men were assembling in the hills south of Juarez and that the Juarez garrison was expected to "turn over."

REVERSE DECISION OF HOUSTON COURT IN PRISON MATTER

GALVESTON, Feb. 16.—The first court of civil appeals today reversed the action of the district court of Harris county, which had granted an injunction against J. A. Herring and others on petition of the National Exchange bank of Houston and entered judgment denying the injunction.

DEFENSE SCORES POINT IN TRIAL OF OBENCHAIN CASE

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 16.—The defense won a point in the morning session of court today when the trial of Mrs. Madalynne Obenchain, charged with the murder of J. Belton Kennedy, was resumed before a jury in the superior court here.

GENOA CONFERENCE MAY BE POSTPONED FOR THREE WEEKS

LONDON, Feb. 16.—The probability of a delay of three weeks in the opening of the Genoa economic conference was conceded in British official circles today. This was the first intimation in such circles that the French were likely to delay their participation in the conference.

APPEAL TO GOVERNOR TO COMMUTE SENTENCE OF CONDEMNED MEXICAN

AUSTIN, Feb. 16.—Angel Cassarin, a Mexican convict at San Antonio, and Nat Llewellyn of Marlin, attorney for Pedro Sanchez, are expected to hang in Falls county on Monday morning. Governor Neff left this morning seeking to have Sanchez's sentence commuted to life imprisonment.

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### FEDERAL ATTORNEY WILL PROBE CASE OF DISTRICT JUDGE

GAINESVILLE CHARGED WITH VIOLATION OF U. S. STATUTE.

### ALLEGED TO HAVE HAD BOTTLE OF WINE IN CAR

Complaint is Filed Here Late Wednesday—Zweifel to Make Investigation.

No action will be taken on a complaint filed with U. S. Commissioner J. A. Lantz by R. V. Petty of Fort Worth, prohibition enforcement officer, against G. R. Fearman of Gainesville, judge of the sixteenth district court, in which Judge Fearman is charged with violation of the federal prohibition law, until U. S. District Attorney Zweifel has had an opportunity to make an investigation of the matter.

Mr. Zweifel called Mr. Lantz over the telephone Thursday morning from his office in Dallas and made the request that no action be taken until an investigation had been made by his office. No warrant or summons had yet been issued against Judge Fearman and will not be until the United States district attorney has satisfied himself that it is a case to be handled in the federal court.

Judge Fearman is charged in the complaint filed by Petty with transporting a bottle of wine from Montague county, Montague is one of the counties in Judge Fearman's district. Judge Fearman's friends declare that the charge is a result of a conspiracy by his political enemies and say that he can give a very satisfactory explanation of the bottle of wine that was found in a suit case in his car.

It is reported that a delegation from Judge Fearman's district called on Governor Neff last week after which Governor Neff asked Mr. Petty, the federal prohibition officer, to make an investigation. U. S. District Attorney Zweifel has been prevented from making a personal investigation of the charge by illness in his family.

Judge Fearman's rulings in several prohibition law violation cases in his court are said to have aroused considerable opposition in his district.

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 16.—A general lockout was declared yesterday throughout the whole country. It affects nearly all industries, including the harbor workers in most of the ports, but not the seamen. About 150,000 employees are involved and it is considered the biggest labor struggle in the history of the country.

### 16,434 Married At the Age of 15 Census Discloses

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—Sixteen hundred boys and 14,834 girls, 15 years of age in the United States were listed as married in 1920, the census bureau announced today in a statement presenting a special analysis of marital statistics.

The analysis revealed a distinct increase since the 1910 census in the percentage of married persons of each year of age from 15 to 24, especially among the younger members of this group. The age group from 15 to 24, inclusive, also showed an increase in the ratio of married persons in the decade, although less pronounced, especially among the women, while the proportion of persons 45 years of age and older showed a decrease.

### DAILY MARKET REPORTS MAY BE TAKEN FROM THE AIR BY RADIOPHONE SET

CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—Daily market reports on livestock and meats, fruits, vegetables, dairy products and grain at the principal market centers may be "taken from the air" by any radiophone set within 500 miles, the bureau of markets announced here today.

### WANT SHIPS SCRAPPED AS A CONTINUATION OF SAN PEDRO BREAKWATER

VALEJO, CAL., Feb. 16.—Recommendation that 12 of the battleships to be scrapped in accordance with the agreements of the armament conference be dismantled at Mare Island navy yard, then taken near Los Angeles and sunk as a continuation of the San Pedro breakwater, was made to the navy department today by Rear Admiral J. S. McKean, commandant at Mare Island. He proposed to take sufficient material from the vessels to pay for the scrapping cost.

### DAMAGE OF \$100,000 IN TWO NEW ORLEANS FIRMS

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 16.—Two fires here last night destroyed property estimated at \$100,000. The residence of E. Edmund Richardson in a fashionable residential section was destroyed with a loss estimated at \$100,000. Another fire destroyed the Ferrich Lumber company and five negro tenement houses with a loss estimated at \$50,000.

### World's Champion Impersonator Dupes Many Notable Ones

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—Calling him the world's champion impersonator of interesting people, the New York police have joined the department of justice in searching for Stephen Weinberg, whose list of distinguished dupes include President Harding, Princess Fatima, Dr. Adolf Lorenz, Mayor Hylan and Harold McCormick.

In the national capital the versatile young impostor is wanted for accepting white house hospitality in the guise of "Commander Stanley Wymann, U. S. N., official escort to the Princess Fatima." In New York he is being sought for a series of daring pranks played to the discomfiture of a succession of notable since 1913.

The record of Weinberg's escapades reads like a series of producer's list of suggested plots for five reel adventure thrillers. It is alleged to reveal him in the following roles:

In 1913 dined in New York as the United States consul to Morocco. In 1915 impressive in the makeup of "special agent" of the United States for the republic of San Salvador." He gave a sumptuous banquet to the vice-president of that country at one of the largest New York hotels.

Shortly after as "Lieutenant Commander Ethel Allen" he paid an official visit to the battleship Wyoming at anchor in the Hudson river and repaid the courtesies he received on board by dining the ship's officers at the Astor hotel. The guests reported the affair as a huge success, but the hotel management was less enthusiastic because the host of the occasion skipped out without the formality of settling the bill.

Next in 1918, as "Lieutenant Royale St. Cyr," he appeared along the Rialto in the uniform of a dashing young army aviator, breaking into print under newspaper headlines announcing his marriage to an actress and their plans to be divorced and then "adopt" one another.

He saw the inside of a penal institution some time later, convicted of forging the name of United States Senator Calder to papers recommending him when he went to Brooklyn to "inspect" a national guard armory. He was released on his prison record for good conduct.

In his immaculate uniform Weinberg got himself accepted without question by Princess Fatima when she came here last July after a voice over the telephone informed the suitman that he had the "indorsement of the chief of police of New York. Also he is said to have

bolstered his reputation with the princess by intimating a sort of connection between himself and J. P. Morgan, the financier. When Dr. Lorenz came to America to work for charity it was Weinberg who got himself appointed secretary to the famous Austrian only to lose his position and his title of "doctor" when Royal S. Copeland, health commissioner, notified Dr. Lorenz that he was an inspector. Complaints had been made that he collected \$100 fees from applicants for the great surgeon's treatment.

HOUSTON, Feb. 16.—Police today were looking for the person who at midnight shot and killed Spero Naxhos, a Greek cafe proprietor. Robbery is believed to have caused the killing. Police found nearby a raincoat with a mark in the pocket which they think was discarded by the assailant in his flight.

**MELLON LAW**  
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### MELLON CONVINCED LAW NOT VIOLATED

Consulted Legal Authorities Before Entering the Harding Cabinet.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Having his views on legal advice Secretary Mellon considers that he has not contravened the law prohibiting the secretary of the treasury from engaging in commerce or business. It was declared today by high administration officials in commenting on the attack on the secretary yesterday made by Senator Watson, democrat, Georgia.

The law was called to Mr. Mellon's attention, officials said, when he was considering the invitation of President Harding to join the cabinet. A number of legal authorities were consulted. It was declared, who gave it as their opinion that the mere ownership of stock in corporations did not constitute engaging, directly or indirectly, in commerce or business.

Before accepting the treasury portfolio, officials said, Mr. Mellon's only active participation in business was upon the directorate of a number of banks and from these he resigned before entering Mr. Harding's cabinet.

Since becoming treasury secretary, Mr. Mellon, officials asserted, has not devoted a moment's time to private business.

The case of A. T. Stewart, nominated for secretary of the treasury by President Grant but whose nomination later was withdrawn, cited by Senator Watson, is regarded as of an entirely different nature as Mr. Stewart was an active merchant actually engaged in business at the time of the nomination.

Mr. Mellon was represented today as being of the opinion that under Senator Watson's interpretation of the law, none of the various secretaries of the treasury would have been eligible for the office, if they had lived on their salaries alone.

### MAIL ORDER HOUSES HAVE GOOD STANDING

Charge is Made By Speaker in Criticizing the Administration.

CHICAGO, Feb. 15.—H. E. Hart of Long Prairie, Minn., speaking before the interstate merchants council here today, said that there seemed to be only one class of merchandise distributors that have had a good standing with either the democratic or republican administration and those are the mail order houses.

"If the accusations of the attorney general against the retail merchants were not inspired by the mail order interests," he said, "by whom were they inspired? What would it be worth to the mail order interests to have the public educated by the attorney general and the radical newspapers to believe that every time they made a purchase at a retail store they were being robbed? It would mean millions of extra trade for the mail order concerns."

### REQUEST RECEIVER FOR BROTHERHOOD

Restraining Order Issued and Date Set For Hearing On Receivership.

TOLEDO, OHIO, Feb. 15.—Appointment of a receiver for the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employes and Railway Shop Laborers asked in a petition filed in federal court here late yesterday by the Bacon Brothers company of Toledo. It became known today that the petition asks that the receiver take possession of all property of the brotherhood within the jurisdiction of this court, including all money on deposit with the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers Co-operative National Bank of Cleveland, and that a temporary restraining order be issued enjoining Frank Grable individually and as president of the brotherhood, and all other officers from withdrawing, transferring, assigning or encumbering any of the funds of the brotherhood on deposit in the Cleveland bank.

The restraining order was issued by Judge Killits who ordered the defendants to appear before him February 24 to show cause why a receiver should not be appointed. The application is an amendment to a supplement to the original bill of complaint in which several hundred thousands of dollars damages for breach of contract are asked by the Bacon Brothers company.

Less vigorous persons with more sluggish digestions would find fatty foods to be a boon. It is better, hence, we consider such foods hard to digest.

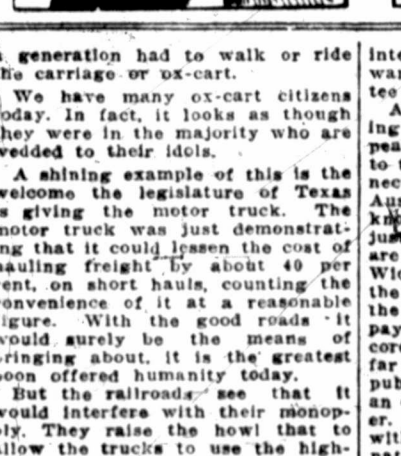

# DR. J. M. PEEBLES LIKED A FEW DAYS LIVING TO BE 100

NOTED PHYSICIAN AND AUTHOR DIES AT HOME IN LOS ANGELES.

## WAS IN DIPLOMATIC SERVICE IN TURKEY

For Last Sixty Years of His Life He Had Eaten No Meat

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 14.—The death of Dr. James Martin Peebles, physician, scientist and author, that he lived until March 23, in order to round out 100 years of life, was announced yesterday.

Dr. Peebles, who was in the diplomatic service in Turkey a long time, wrote a number of books, among which was one entitled, "How to Live a Century and Grow Old Gracefully."

For the last 60 years of his life he had eaten no meat.

Dr. James Martin Peebles, physician and author of Los Angeles, Cal., not only wrote a book on "How to Live a Century and Grow Old Gracefully," but made himself an example and demonstrated his theories.

When he had passed his 75th birthday anniversary in March 1921 he declared that he intended to live not only to be 100 years old but many years more.

Although lacking only one year of being a centenarian, Dr. Peebles then walked erect, only occasionally using a cane. His sight was good, although he used spectacles for reading and he declared that his hearing was as good as ever.

His long white hair, worn nearly to his shoulders and a long snowy beard gave him a truly venerable appearance.

Asked what he considered the greatest contributory cause to his long life, Dr. Peebles replied: "My

abstinence from eating animal flesh." He ceased that practice, he said, when he was 29 years old.

"One cannot strenuously live by living on death," he continued, "I cannot bear the idea of eating dead cows and dead hogs and it is not necessary. See how strong are horses and oxen. They do not live on dead flesh."

Other rules he had made for himself and which he said he believed had helped him to reach his advanced age included: "To bed every night at 9:30. Out of bed every morning at 6:00. Never use tobacco. Never use intoxicating liquor. Never complain."

"Avoid worry and keep a harmonious mind. Worry is among the worst things in the world. Have a strong will power. Always look for the new. Keep calm."

Born in 1822 Dr. Peebles was born at Whitingham, Vermont, March 23, 1822, and was graduated from Oxford academy in Chenango county, N. Y., in 1841. He afterward won degrees from the Pennsylvania University of Medicine and Surgery and from Philadelphia university.

He practiced medicine until he was 59 years old, becoming in turn, he said, allopathic, homeopathic and magnetic. He owned and edited a number of papers and went around the world five times, lecturing in Oriental countries. He was a member of the Indian peace commission which in 1858 settled some of the Indian troubles in the middle west and in 1849 was United States consul at Trebizond, Turkey. Later he represented the United States arbitration league at the international peace commission of Europe in Paris.

One of his favorite sayings was: "I am truly an eclectic, not only in medicine but in all things, including religion." In evidence of this he devoted a number of years to ministerial work, first as pastor of the Universalist church in Baltimore before the Civil war, then he became an Episcopalian and later a spiritist and theosophist.

"Although I am a physician and surgeon," he declared shortly after his 99th birthday, "I call in my spirit guides when I am ill. The spirit never grows old. It helps to keep the body young. I have unbounded faith in God's laws which are also nature's laws."

Founder of College For three years Dr. Peebles was professor in the Eclectic Medical college of Cincinnati. He was president of the California College

of Science for four years and president and founder in 1914 of the Peebles College of Science and Philosophy in Los Angeles. He founded in the latter city the California Centenarian club and served as president of the California Humanitarian league which comprised 27 reform organizations.

Besides his book on "How to Live a Century," he was the author of 11 other books on religious, psychological and similar topics including one entitled, "How to Conquer with the Dead."

He was a member of numerous societies organized for the advancement of science, art, health, philosophy and psychic research, being president of the Psychic Research society of Calcutta, India.

He often delight in pointing out the marvelous changes which had taken place during his long span of life, the coming of the telegraph, telephone, railroads, electric lights, automobiles, the wireless and airplanes.

Dr. Peebles married Miss Mary M. Conkey, in Canton, N. Y., who died many years ago. Their three children died in infancy. His sister was Mrs. C. C. Beach, of Battle Creek, Mich., where Dr. Peebles at one time lived.

## COTTON SEED PRODUCTS REPORT FOR SIX MONTHS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The cotton seed products report for the six months period August 1 to January 31, issued today by the census bureau showed:

Cotton seed crushed 2,228,402 tons compared with 2,547,162 and on hand 418,348 tons, compared with 456,740. Crude oil produced 712,116,259 pounds, compared with 814,135,454 and on hand, 98,293,276 pounds compared with 167,472,421.

Refined oil produced 554,468,665 pounds compared with 554,347,923 and on hand 27,230,429 pounds compared with 29,144,529.

Cake and meal produced 1,046,427 tons, compared with 1,124,345 and on hand 242,375 tons, compared with 234,194.

Linters produced 305,915 bales compared with 296,672, and on hand 122,522 bales compared with 264,289. Export of linters were 69,255 bales, compared with 15,753.

## TEN DIVORCES A DAY A ST. LOUIS RECORD

Average Maintained Four Months By Court of Domestic Relations.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 14.—Ten divorces a day was the average maintained by the court of domestic relations here during the first four months of its existence, according to a compilation by the court clerk.

A total of 1,268 divorce petitions were filed, of which 92 were granted. In about 50 per cent of the cases the custody of the children was made the main issue, while the other 50 per cent of the couples had not children. For various reasons, 173 petitions were dismissed.

The month of November with 224 showed the largest number of divorces granted, followed by 154 in January, with October and December in the order named. Since the establishment of the court, which was authorized by an act of the state legislature in 1921, the speed of the divorce mill in the local courts has been reduced greatly.

It was formerly possible to obtain a decree of divorce immediately after the filing of the petition. However, since the court of domestic relations has taken over the settlement of domestic troubles, ten days at least must elapse between the filing of the petition and a hearing in court. Another ten days, at least, is required for an investigation of the charges.

"Among the benefits of the new court," Judge Vital Garoscha declared, "the safeguarding of the interest of the children of unhappy marriages has become the foremost issue. In many cases, where the couples had children, a reconciliation has been effected and happiness restored in the homes, all for the best of the children and all on account of the children."

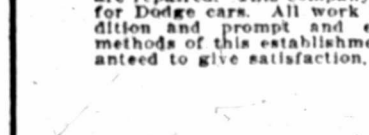

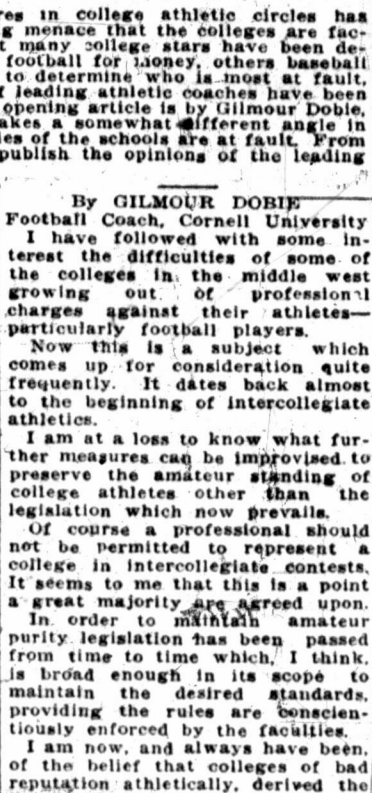
### DICK KERR REPORTS HE'S READY TO HURL NOW

Can a pitcher prolong his career by changing his pace? I am positive a change of pace will prove most beneficial to any pitcher not only will it tend to prolong his career but it will make his task of winning ball games much easier.

I am sorry that I didn't try to master a slow ball earlier in my career. Some pitchers take naturally to the throwing of a slow ball.

It is a matter of record, that pitchers using a very fast ball have always had more or less difficulty mastering the slow ball.

I am at a loss to account for such a condition, unless it is because the grip on the ball is much different in throwing the fast or slow ball.

I have spent much time of late, trying to perfect a slow ball, but have not been able to do so.

For a slow ball to be effective, it must be thrown with exactly the same motion as the fast ball. This has been my greatest difficulty with the slow ball.

I have found it a hard matter to use my fast ball motion in delivering the slow ball. As a matter of fact, I have never been able to consistently do it. I have a habit of shifting my style slightly, which, of course, tips off the batter to the slow ball.

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### LETTER DEFINES LABOR POLICY IN IRRIGATION WORK

EMPLOYMENT OF LOCAL MEN IS URGED AS MATTER OF JUSTICE.

### NO RECOGNITION TO BE EXTENDED TO AGITATORS

Attention of Subcontractors Called to Large Number of Unemployed Here.

That home labor should be given preference on irrigation sub-contracts as a matter of justice, regardless of the absence of any contract stipulations, is the stand taken by the Callahan Construction company, general contractor, in a letter to all sub-contractors on the project.

The letter urges that labor be obtained through the Salvation Army and the Welfare council, which are prepared to give the names of those men most in need of work. Mr. Heizer's letter reads in part: "We have been requested by the directors of the Wichita county water improvement district No. 1 to give preference to the employment of home labor, and we are in turn making the request of you."

"You, of course, realize that the citizens of Wichita Falls are being heavily taxed to pay for this improvement, which has made your work and ours possible, and for your further information there are in Wichita Falls a large number of unemployed men with families who are in dire need of work. The Welfare council and Salvation Army have a list of these destitute families which they will gladly furnish to us upon request, and I sincerely hope that all of the sub-contractors on this work will not import any labor other than that of the men of particular skill or to take care of stock in moving to the work."

"That you may better understand the seriousness of the situation, it might be well for you to know that the Salvation Army is supplying bread to a large number of families in this city and that that is practically all these families have to eat."

"We appreciate the fact that there is nothing in your contract with us that makes it obligatory upon you to work home people, but we believe that when the foregoing facts are presented to you, you will recognize the justice of employing home people. A great many of these men have been awaiting the beginning of this work with the expectation of having employment furnished to them, and it will be a sore disappointment to them if same is not forthcoming."

"We are not recognizing any agitators, nor any agency or committee purporting to have any rights in the premises and the rate of pay that you will be required to pay these men will not be in excess of what you would have to pay men from the outside."

### ARRESTS FOLLOW ROBBERY LATE WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Three negroes were jailed Wednesday night but two were later released when the investigation failed to implicate them in the hijacking of L. L. Huff, 1103 Scott street, who reported to the police that two negro men, both heavily armed, had robbed him of \$11 in cash as he was returning home from work late at night.

The third negro was carrying a pistol when arrested and was turned over to county officials for prosecution. It is not thought that he was involved in the Huff robbery.

The hijacking took place on Eleventh street between Ohio and Indiana, according to Mr. Huff's reports to the police.

### DOG OWNERS MUST PROVIDE TAGS FOR CANINES AT ONCE

The dog tribe of Wichita Falls is threatened with complete extermination, according to information from police headquarters, unless owners of dogs provide their pets with proper license tags and keep them from running at large in the city streets. Police men have been given orders to shoot on sight any dogs, unprovided with tags that appear to be mad, while approximately 100 ownerless canines have been killed at the dog pound within the last two weeks.

Mad dogs are constituting a serious menace in the city at present. Chief of Police Morgan declared Thursday morning. He stated that a large dog, infected with rabies and plainly mad, had terrorized pedestrians in the library park neighborhood Wednesday afternoon until it had been killed by officers and that a dog, also believed to be mad, had so frightened small children in a heavy street home that they could not leave the house Thursday morning until an officer had shot the brute.

### \$2,000 PROPERTY LOSS IN SUSTAINED IN GROCERY FIRE

Fire of undetermined origin swept out the W. W. Wheeler grocery store, Scott and Second streets at midnight Wednesday, causing an estimated property loss of \$2,000. Two other adjoining buildings were slightly damaged by heat, sparks from the Wheeler fire but hard work by firemen prevented any serious loss.

The flames had spread to all parts of the building before being discovered, this resulting in the entire structure being consumed. The grocery stock was also ruined, according to reports.

### BIG ROYALTY DEAL FOR \$250,000 MADE AT BRECKENRIDGE

What is declared to be the biggest all cash royalty deal ever made in this section of the state has been closed in Breckenridge, transferring royalty in the Black Brothers ranch of 11,000 acres for the all cash consideration of above a quarter of a million dollars, to Breck S. Walker and C. M. Caldwell of Breckenridge, purchasers.

There are 15 producing wells on the tract, and the Texas company has the original lease on the land. This company and the Link Oil corporation are doing most of the drilling. Besides the wells now producing on this land there are locations for 13 others to be started right away, and still other locations are being considered.

This tract is said to be one of the most promising from a standpoint of oil production of any in all this section of Texas. Not a dry hole has been drilled on the entire 12,000 acres, it is said, and each of the wells is showing a good production and some of them have been producing two or three years and are still holding up exceedingly well.

The Black Brothers ranch has three miles of the Brazos river front and the big dam of the Texas company across the stream has impounded sufficient water to promote vigorous drilling operations on all its acreage.

### PATTERN SHOP IS ESTABLISHED HERE AS NEW INDUSTRY

Another new industry has recently located in Wichita Falls. It is the Wichita Falls Pattern Works which has been opened at 205 Mississippi street by Charles H. Harr, who was for 13 years head pattern maker for the Fort Worth & Denver railway and who has had 18 years experience in the making of metal drawings, patterns, models, mechanical drawings, blue prints and experimental work.

Mr. Harr says that he has been more than pleased with the amount of work that has come to his shop since its opening, the work requiring its operation both day and night.

Oil companies, refineries, water and light plants, oil mills, construction companies and others which use machinery are among the patrons of the new company. It is also doing much of the pattern work for the Wichita Falls Foundry and Machine company.

Work has already come into the shop from a number of points including some as far distant as Plainview and Amarillo. Mr. Harr expects to enlarge his plant and his working force as his business grows.
