

IRRIGATIONISTS DISTURBED BY A COURT DECISION.

(Dallas News.) That fifteen or twenty men representing "more

than 250 large irrigation companies" were brought to Austin last week by a decision of the court of civil appeals is both suggestive of the importance of that ision and indicative of the magnitude of the interests affected by it. Information given in the press stches does not illuminate the case as much as uld be desired. It does appear, though, that in the lecision which has caused this commotion among the irrigation companies the court held a riparian right to the use of water superior to a right appropriated by the board of water engineers exercising an authority given it by our irrigation act. From that fact, alone one might infer that the court had held the riparian right to be indefeasible, in which case would amount to a nullification, on constitutional grounds, of a vital provision of the irrigation act. But that conclusion is somewhat negatived by the statement that a remedy will be sought in the legislature, in the event the supreme court can not be to set aside the decision of the court of civil appeals. This suggests that it is the court's interpretation of the act rather than a criticism of it that has listurbed the irrigation interests. This surmise is more accordant to The News' understanding of the provisions of that act. For its understanding is that that act does not attempt to annul riparian rights, nor even to subordinate them, but merely to subject the exercise of them to the regulatory power of the board of water engineers to the end that the water of a stream may be equitably apportioned among ap-

The one and obvious certainty is that this decision has brought great disquietude to a large number of men who have invested an immense sum of money in irrigation" works. 

ter will wave the determination of the western boundary of Oklahoma from the soutwestern corner of the state to the point at which the Oklahoma panhandle extends westward from the main part of the state. This litigation grows out of the fact that a survey made in 1903 by Arthur S, Kudder, head of the United States geological survey, revealed the fact that the line originally run as the boundary between Texas and Okla-homa along the western side of Ok-lahoma was far out of lim, being

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
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
