WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—Sharp reductions in railroad freight rates on livestock were urged in the interstate commerce commission's general rate hearings today by producers of cattle and hogs and the national livestock exchange.

The present railroad rates on livestock are tending to discourage the producer and limit his operation, Henry R. Park, traffic manager for the Chicago livestock exchange, testified.

NORFOLK, VA., Feb. 21.—The number of dead from the Roma disaster was estimated today at 33, while it was said that there were a total of 43 on board when the explosion occurred.

PORTSMOUTH, Feb. 21.—According to a message received at the naval station at Portsmouth at 3:15 p. m., 38 men on board the Roma were killed.

PORTSMOUTH, VA., Feb. 21.—Believed that 25 or 30 bodies were still pinned under the wreckage of the Roma, which exploded over the Hampton Roads base this afternoon.

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18 YEAR OLD GIRL ALLEGED TO HAVE SHOT SWEETHEART

MIKE TUCKER SUFFERING WITH PISTOL WOUND IN LOCAL HOSPITAL

GIRL RELEASED UNDER \$500 BOND TUESDAY

Statutory Charges Filed Against Victim of Shooting Which Occurred Monday

Mike Tucker, automobile mechanic, aged 23 years, residing at 2104 Taylor street, lies in a critical condition in a local hospital, suffering from a gunshot wound and Miss Ethel Ellinger, aged 18, of 1711 Trueheart street, is under \$500 bond charged with assault with intent to murder.

The alleged shooting affair took place at 9:30 o'clock Monday night, according to officers, near the cemetery, west of the city. The complaint against the young lady was filed in Justice of the Peace H. V. Gwin's court Tuesday morning.

Charges of a serious and statutory nature were filed against Tucker in Justice of the Peace Gwin's court Tuesday afternoon, in which it is alleged that the offense was committed by force. The complaint was sworn to by City Detective Jack Miller.

According to the information given by the police, the couple, who were riding in a car, were shot while driving. As they neared the cemetery Tucker stopped his car, stating that he thought he had run over something. There had been some words passed between the two officers stated, before the car had stopped.

The story told by officers is to the effect that the pair had run out automobile riding the night of Monday, Feb. 20, when the bullet struck Tucker on the left arm, looking whether he had run over something. The girl it is said started to get out of the car.

"What are you going to do," it is said Tucker asked the girl. "I am getting out," was the reply.

"Are you going to take a walk?" officers said Tucker told them he inquired.

The reply was, "I might." At this point Tucker said he leaned over the rear door of the car and while in this position he stated the girl was aiming the bullet at him. She then fired, the bullet passed through his body, puncturing the left lung and came out just below the other rib.

According to the officers, the girl then walked back to town and upon arrival telephoned the police what had happened. When the officers arrived at the scene, they stated Tucker was sitting on the running board of his car.

He was taken back to town and medical attention summoned. Officers have the pistol, with which the girl is alleged to have done the shooting. It is a .43 caliber.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—The navy department was notified of the disaster at Norfolk, Va., by telegrams from the naval authorities at Norfolk.

"Army dirigible Roma caught fire and crashed at Norfolk, Va., this afternoon, according to reports received here today. Thirty-five persons reported dead out of 60 aboard."

Immediately on receipt of the official dispatch, Major General Patrick, director of the air service, left by airplane for Langley field.

THIRD BIG AIRSHIP TO BE WRECKED BY ACCIDENT

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—The dirigible Roma which blew up today over Hampton Roads, was the third big airship to be wrecked in a spectacular mishap in the last 12 months.

On August 24, 1921, the ZR-2, built by the British for purchase by the United States at a cost of \$2,000,000, exploded over Hull, England, killing 42, including sixteen Americans.

On January 1, 1921, the R-34, which flew from England to Long Island and back in the summer of 1919, the first heavy airship to cross the Atlantic, was wrecked in a gale while tethered outside her acreage in Howden, England.

ACCIDENT OCCURS WHEN CONTROLS ARE CARRIED AWAY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—The accident to the Roma occurred when the vertical controls were carried away, Captain Doyle of the naval air station at Hampton Roads said in a telephone conversation late today with Rear Admiral Moffett at the navy department. This, he said, caused the dirigible to arched nose first and in its descent it struck a high tension electric wire causing the airship to catch fire. Captain Doyle reported that 28 men were believed dead and that 10 or 12 had escaped.

DISMISS CASE AGAINST LEAGUE CITY CATTLEMEN

HOUSTON, Feb. 21.—The case of nine League City cattlemen charged with falsifying importation, a misdemeanor, was dismissed today in county court. Two important state witnesses, including the man named in the complaint, Tommie J. Campbell, had been absent when the case was called before and Judge Roy Campbell dismissed it today.

THE DEFENDANTS were named in a grand jury misdemeanor indictment returned early in January, following a complaint of Gus Beck, formerly of Webster, but now in jail in Waco, that he had been taken from his home in Webster in April of 1921, tied to a telegraph post and whipped.

SYSTEM OF BETTING AT FAIR GROUNDS ILLEGAL LOUISIANA JUDGE HOLDS

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 21.—The "pencil and paper" system of betting in use at the fair grounds race track here is illegal and comes under the definition of "device" as laid down in the Locke anti-gambling law, Judge N. E. Humphreys of the criminal district court ruled today.

GRAND JURY AND WELDON SUBPOENAED

Subpoena for members of the recent grand jury and for Judge Weldon, recently resigned as judge of the 26th district court, was issued shortly before 4 p. m. Tuesday afternoon by Judge J. M. Napier of the 26th district court.

No information was available at the court house at 4 p. m. as to the purpose of the summons. At that hour several members of the grand jury had responded to the subpoena.

REPORTED ACTIVITIES OF ALLEGED 'KU KLUX KLAN' IS UNDER INVESTIGATION

FRESNO, CAL., Feb. 21.—Reported activities of an alleged Ku Klux Klan organization in this section is under investigation, according to a statement by Sheriff E. J. Cowley, shot through the left hand and foot; former jailer Bud Bird, shot through the left hand.

Near where they met down the corridor in sheriff's office yesterday afternoon, the right hand and foot; former Deputy Sheriff Bud Ballou, wounded in the right hand and hip; former Deputy Sheriff Bill Whitson, wounded twice in the abdomen and once in the left arm; the purpose of arriving at a common policy which would bind all participants in the proceedings. A decision to vote en bloc was apparently not reached.

STILL HOLD TWENTY-SIX OF THE IRISH KIDNAPED

By Associated Press. BELFAST, Feb. 21.—While most of the unionists captured in recent days in northern Ireland have been released, the Ulster home office announced today that 26 of the kidnaped men had not yet been returned.

Of these men apparently still held in custody 14 are class "A" special constables and 11 class "B" specials. The only missing man is Ivan Garson, former light ship's steward, who was kidnaped at Clady, Feb. 5.

POLICE ADMIT THEY FACE 'STONE WALL' IN MOVIE MYSTERY

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 21.—The mystery surrounding the slaying of William Desmond Taylor, motion picture director, still remains as far from solution as when the body of the director was found in his apartment here almost three weeks ago, investigators working on the case said today.

With the elimination of Daniel Whelan, a suspect in the case, the night of February 1, the night on which Taylor was murdered, from the list of suspects, the police are confident that the investigators will solve the crime.

Henry Foster, houseman for the slain film director, also was questioned yesterday regarding a statement he made publicly that he was not in the office of District Attorney George E. Winters, it was reported that the investigators believed it to have no important bearing on the case.

ENTIRE STRUCTURE OF CLASS FREIGHT RATES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—An investigation into the entire structure of class freight rates in the southeastern territory was instituted today by order of the interstate commerce commission. Hearings will be at various places in the territory, the commission said, at dates which will be announced later. The class rates between practically all points south of the Ohio and east of the Mississippi rivers will be considered.

The investigation was undertaken at the request both of the carriers and shippers, the commission said.

SHERRMAN, TEXAS, Feb. 21.—Taking of testimony in the ouster proceedings instituted against Hester Bookout, county attorney, by 43 citizens of the county was started today. The jury was completed at 2 p. m. Monday evening. It is expected that the ouster trial will last two weeks. The county attorney is accused of corrupt practices and incompetence.

TEXAS STATE BOTTLERS IN SESSION AT HOUSTON

HOUSTON, Feb. 21.—Nearly 100 members of the Texas State Bottlers' Association assembled here today for their annual convention, which will last through Wednesday. In the morning session reports of officers were made and a number of matters of particular interest to the bottlers were discussed.

TWO HOURS DEBATE ON RESERVATION TO FOUR POWER TREATY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—A reservation to the four-power treaty, providing that no "adjustments or understandings" reached under its provisions shall be binding without the consent of congress, was debated for two hours by the senate. Forging relations, a committee today without action, but with a majority of the members indicating their general approval.

FORMER DIRECTOR OF WAR INSURANCE DIES IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—Colonel R. G. Cholmeley-Jones, formerly director of the bureau of war insurance, died at the Presbyterian hospital early today. He had been ill at the hospital since October last.

TWO ARE INJURED WHEN BOILER NEAR ELECTRA EXPLODES

PRINCETON, N. J., Feb. 21.—Indications of the world point to a States minister to The Netherlands and Luxembourg, told a meeting of realization of the governmental ideals of Woodrow Wilson. Dr. Henry Van Dyke, former United States minister to the Netherlands, made an actuality of the words spoken by President Wilson to congress on April 2, 1917, when he voiced his belief in "a universal dominion of right by such a concert of free peoples as shall bring peace and safety to all nations and make the world itself at last free."

HAS DIFFICULTY IN FORMING A CABINET

Former Premier Orlando Declines Post in Italian Government

ROME, Feb. 21.—Signor Giolitti is entertaining considerable difficulty in forming a cabinet to succeed that of Premier Giolitti which resigned last week. Former Premier Orlando has declined to accept the portfolio of foreign affairs, declaring he does not desire to attend the Genoa economic conference. Signor de Nicola, also, is reluctant to accept a secretaryship, having been a candidate for the head of the government at the Orlando and De Nicola, however, assured Giolitti of their full support. Signor Giolitti still hopes they may enter the new ministry.

STRIKE SYMPATHIZER KILLED WHEN THE POLICE DISCHARGE RIOT GUNS

PAWTUCKET, R. I., Feb. 21.—Joseph Assucan of Valley Falls, one of a group of strike sympathizers, was killed today when police discharged riot guns after a mob refused to disperse. Two others were seriously wounded. Mayor Kenyon, in command of the police had read the riot act to the crowd. The shooting occurred near the Jencks Spinning company's plant, where there is a strike.

TOM WATSON'S ATTACK ON SECRETARY MELLON

Andrew J. Mellon, secretary of the treasury, is an able, conservative financier. He is not a politician and he faces facts and conditions squarely. Perhaps that is one of the reasons why some of the politicians are barking at him. Mr. Mellon doesn't even get the full support of the administration. We sometimes wonder why he doesn't hand his resignation to President Harding. Doubtless it is a patriotic sense of duty that keeps him at his post.

The latest annoyance to the secretary of the treasury has been an attack by Senator Tom Watson of Georgia who charges that Mr. Mellon is ineptly engaged in business, private business, business in nowise connected with the government.

There is a law which declares that the secretary of the treasury of the United States must not engage in private business, whereof, it is asserted by Senator Tom Watson that Mr. Andrew J. Mellon is ineligible to serve as secretary of the treasury of the United States.

"This is the same Tom who asserted that illegal executions took place in France, but let that pass. Of course, the theory of Mr. Mellon's ineligibility is not based on the amount of stocks and bonds that he owns, but on the fact that he owns some."

"The theory, if sound, would work just as well on two shares of 5-cent mining stock as on a million shares of Standard Oil."

"The theory were sound, it would disqualify practically all citizens of the United States, except bums and idlers."

"We cannot believe that the law in question was intended to do that."

"We cannot believe that it was designed to bar financial experience and financial ability as demonstrated by a certain degree of individual success."

"There are people who consider that physical poverty betokens a wealth of intellect, and that honesty is only to be found among those who possess nothing."

"Their interpretation of the law defining qualifications of the secretary of the treasury would admit no one but a pauper or a bankrupt."

"Happily, such people constitute but a small minority, though they seem able to make quite a noise occasionally, when led by demagogues."

"The business affairs that must be passed upon by the secretary of the treasury of the United States are, of course, gigantic."

"We do not believe, nor do we believe a considerable portion of the people believe, that a man can fit himself to handle them with any degree of intelligence by remaining a nonentity, or becoming a failure, in private life."

The increased exchange value in American dollars of the British pound has been responsible in part for the recent increases in the price of wheat and other farm products in the United States. Of course, the condition of winter wheat and the shortage of the supply have been the main reasons for the advance in that crop but increased value of the British pound has strengthened the price.

YOU NEED A RESERVE SUPPLY OF BODY FUEL—HOW TO GET IT

This men usually have a larger supply of muscle in proportion to weight than fat men. The weight from the general rule of feeding is necessary. Since food is a reserve supply of body fuel, it is essential that it should be of good quality and in such quantities as to keep the body well nourished and resistant to disease and protect it from bruises and jars.

Free use of butter, cream and bacon and taking of one to two tablespoons of olive oil after each meal are practical methods of increasing fuel value of diet. Vegetables may be served with cream sauces or in the form of salads with mayonnaise, French or cream dressings. 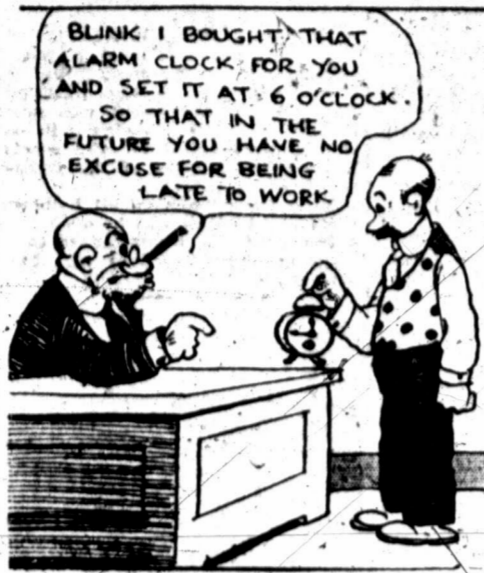

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SHERIFF TELLS OF 'BIG DICK'S' OFFER FOR PROTECTION

VISITOR WANTED TO RUN A RESORT AT BURKBURNETT, OFFICER TESTIFIES

WOULDN'T GO NEAR WHERE PROSECUTORS WERE HIDING

Failure of Sheriff to Connect Accused Attorney With Case Results in Instructed Verdict

"It will be worth more to you than a year's salary," is the statement "Big Dick" made to Sheriff Fred K. Smith, according to the latter's testimony Monday during the trial of Attorney B. Heyster, who was charged with conspiracy to offer and offering a bribe to the sheriff. The case came to a sudden ending when the state attorney, James H. Dyer, who was followed by a move by defense counsel for an instructed verdict of not guilty.

"The officer stated that "Big Dick" had been introduced to him by Attorney Heyster. The day that the alleged negotiations were to have transpired, Heyster told him, he testified that he told Big Dick to meet him that evening at 7 o'clock.

"The officer stated that he had called County Attorney Fulton and District Attorney Wilson. The two, he said, were hid in one of the rooms of the living quarters of the jail.

At 7 o'clock that evening the sheriff said he met Attorney Heyster at the door of the office in the court house. Heyster told him, he said, that "Big Dick" was in his automobile outside and that he wanted to speak to him. The sheriff testified that he told Heyster if "Big Dick" wanted to see him he should meet him at the jail.

According to the prosecuting witness' testimony, "Big Dick" met him at the jail door. He said that "Big Dick" told him he wanted to "open a house" at Burkburnett for gambling, for women and for the selling of whiskey and that he would make a good proposition that would be worth more to him than a year's salary.

"All we want you to do is to let us know when you're going to raid us," Smith quoted the other as saying.

Sheriff Smith then asked him to go into the room so that they could discuss it more freely. The officer stated that "Big Dick" refused to enter, stating, "You might have some one planted in there, Fred, and

I don't want to go in. We can talk it over here." At this point in the trial County Attorney Fulton asked the witness: "Who did 'Big Dick' tell you had told him not to go inside any room while he was talking to you?" "He didn't tell me anyone had told him not to do so," was the reply.

This was followed by a question, "Didn't he tell you that Heyster told him not to go into any room?" Before the defense counsel had time to make his objection on the grounds that the question was leading, the witness answered, "No, he did not tell me that."

County Attorney Fulton said, "That's all."

Before any questions could be propounded to the witness on cross-examination, County Attorney Fulton begged leave of the court to consult with District Attorney Sam Holladay.

After a very brief conference the two returned into the court room and asked for dismissal of the case, stating that the witness' testimony was other than what they had been led to expect.

Says "I'm Hungry" Then Wastes Pie Enough to Feed 9

"Bo, can't you help me out? I'm hungry."

The request was addressed to a young man, just emerging from an Indiana avenue restaurant.

The young man turned back into the restaurant, motioning the other to follow. He handed the cashier half a dollar.

"Here's fifty cents," he said, "give this man something to eat."

"All right, bo," he said, "slip me that 45 cents."

The cashier told him that the remaining 45 cents was to eat on, not to be given him in cash.

"We'll give it back to the man who gave it," when he comes in again," said the cashier.

"You will like hell," stormed the other. "I've got 45 cents coming, and I want it."

"You've got 45 cents worth of cats coming," returned the cashier. "That's the only way you'll get it."

"All right, then," said the "hungry" man, "give me 45 cents worth of apple pie."

When the pie was served he seized it in both hands, wadded it into an inedible lump, stalked out of the restaurant with it, and hurled it at an automobile parked nearby. Then he disappeared down the street.

While there are undoubtedly many individuals, disappointed from lack of work, who sincerely need the help they solicit on street corners, the experience described above is not exactly exceptional.

One Wichitan, knowing the unwisdom of giving money to all those who ask his help, has arranged with a restaurant to feed those who present notes from him.

Within three days, recently, he gave out seven such orders for meals. When he went to the restaurant to settle, he found that one man had come in and eaten a 60-cent meal; two others, not really hungry, had partaken of only pie and coffee; the other four had not shown up at all, but had asked for "something to eat" in the hope of getting money to spend for less worthy purposes.

The Salvation Army issues orders for meals to all who apparently are in need of that kind of help. They point out that to refer all solicitors to them is to prevent charity being misplaced.
