PLAN FOR LAUNCHING SIGN REMOVAL WEEK

Council Will Hereafter Meet at the Kemp Hotel on Friday Noon

The passing on a variety of civic questions and a brief address by William T. Wheeler, assistant manager of the West Texas chamber of commerce, featured the weekly meeting of the chamber of commerce business council held at the Wichita club Friday noon.

Mr. Wheeler's talk dealt entirely with the matter of a Texas-Oklahoma fair, plans for which are being developed at a meeting of the fair committee tonight. Mr. Wheeler urged an active promotion of the project and outlined a few of the details that might be worked out in connection with the fair plans.

Other matters taken up by the council included plans for the launching of a "sign removal week" as an ordinance, passed by the city council last year, calling for a rearrangement of certain advertising signs in the city.

EIGHT ARE SENTENCED RESULT OF AN ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE KING

BELGRADE, Feb. 24.—Sentences have been pronounced on those responsible for the attempt to assassinate King Alexander here June 23 last, when he was serving as prince regent. Death was decreed for Stetch, 28, who threw the bomb. His chief accomplice, Czakly, 33, was sentenced to 20 years at hard labor, and six communist deputies were given two years each but the women accused were acquitted.

McADOO APPROVES COURSE OUTLINED FOR LAW STUDENT

WORTHY OF SUPPORT OF ALL INTERESTED IN IMPROVEMENT

SPEAKER WAS UNABLE TO GO TO LAW SCHOOL

Urges Highest Moral and Ethical Standards of the Profession

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—Lawyers who have won distinction and a high place at the bar through native ability and industry and who have not had a college education may be expected naturally to offer with a certain degree of hesitancy their approval of the exacting standard which the American Bar association seeks to impose upon future members of the profession.

William G. McAdoo of New York declared today before the natural conference of bar associations. Mr. McAdoo said he had been "unable to go to law school" because of his recommendation of the American Bar association that future members of the profession be obliged not only to take a three-year course in a law school, but in addition have at least two years college training.

"A conference of delegates representing the American state and local bar associations of the country to consider the vital question of admission to the bar," said Mr. McAdoo, "is a significant and dramatic event in the history of the profession. One naturally approaches such a subject from a point of view influenced in great measure by the course and experience of his own life. For example, a lawyer who has been constantly and exclusively absorbed in the active pursuit of his private practice will instinctively view the question from the standpoint of the good of the profession. But the lawyer whose career has taken him away at times from active practice and immersed him in great enterprises and involved him in large responsibilities of public life, is inclined to view the problem not only from the standpoint of the profession, but also in its wider aspects—its relation to the public good as well as its effect upon the profession itself.

"Then again, the lawyer who has held the good fortune of a college education and a thorough course in a law school will naturally regard the more exacting requirements in the way of a collegiate and legal education essential to the welfare of the profession and to the public good, whereas that great body of lawyers who have had to make their own way in the world, who never have been able to go to college, have secured a legal training education through hard work and struggle in the old-fashioned way. In somebody's law office, may naturally hesitate to approve the standard which the American Bar association seeks to impose.

tem by which a young man learned law in a law office has been dead for decades despite the illusion which still exists, William Draper Lewis, former dean of the University of Pennsylvania law school, declared today in an address before the conference of bar associations. To sit in a lawyer's office and read a law book or to act as his stenographer, Mr. Lewis said, is not to "go through a law office" in the old sense of the word. The so-called vice student of today, he declared, learns his law not in the law office, but in the afternoon or evening law school.

Mr. Lewis declared that the problem of introducing into the legal educational system the element of personal contact between law students and members of the bar of high professional ideals could be solved by a united effort on the part of bar associations and law faculties. To emphasize his contention that higher education is necessary to the future standards of the legal profession, Mr. Lewis offered the following suggestions which he said if adopted would go a long way toward remedying the present situation.

SAYS ILLITERATES OF COUNTRY NOT IGNORANT

CHICAGO, Feb. 24.—It is an outrage for any one to think of the illiterates of the country as ignorant. Dr. A. E. Winslow of Boston, told delegates from 14 states attending the literary conference of the middle west and northern states meeting here today.

"Every illiterate from the mountains of Kentucky and Tennessee and the Carolinas was infinitely better skilled to shoot and dodge shots in the world than United States senators and university presidents," he said. "Everyone of them was worth more to the army than any of their critics when it came to handling firearms or facing fire-arms. The keynote was struck when it was said they could not write their families, and if they could their families could not read what they wrote."

PLAN INVESTIGATION OF COLLISION THAT KILLED FIVE PEOPLE

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 24.—Railroad officials today planned to start an investigation to place responsibility for the collision of a snow plow and train No. 16, the Winnipeg Flyer, on the Great Northern, in which five trainmen met death and a dozen persons were injured late yesterday.

The wreck occurred between Delano and Montrose, Minn., 20 miles west of here. The flyer, coming from Winnipeg was 11 hours late and was speeding toward Minneapolis when the smash occurred.

All the serious casualties were suffered by trainmen. The three engines and a small car plunged down a 18-foot embankment and early today four of the dead were still buried beneath the wreckage.

The dead were: R. A. McDonald, St. Paul, engineer, flyer; Hollis McDonald, Wilmer, Minn., engineer snow plow; Hugh Johnson, St. Paul, engineer, flyer; G. McCloud, fireman, flyer, and G. G. Pelton, Minneapolis, fireman, flyer.

Pelton was rescued from the wreckage, but he was so badly scalded he died six hours later.

The Wichita Falls high school orchestra, composed of 20 student musicians, will attend the state interscholastic meet to be held in Austin the first week in May. Announcement to this effect was made by local school officials Friday following the receipt of a message from the interscholastic authorities asking that the high school orchestra here furnish musical entertainment throughout the meet.

The orchestra's appearance at Austin will in no way be of a competitive nature. Musical competition between Texas schools is not yet included in the interscholastic program and the Austin trip is more of an educational crusade, an attempt to show high educational officials that music should be made a part of the competitive meet, just as are athletics, debating and other literary features.

Only two Texas high schools, those at Wichita Falls and El Paso, are given university credit for the music taught, and for this reason the local high school orchestra was given consideration in the selection of a representative musical organization.

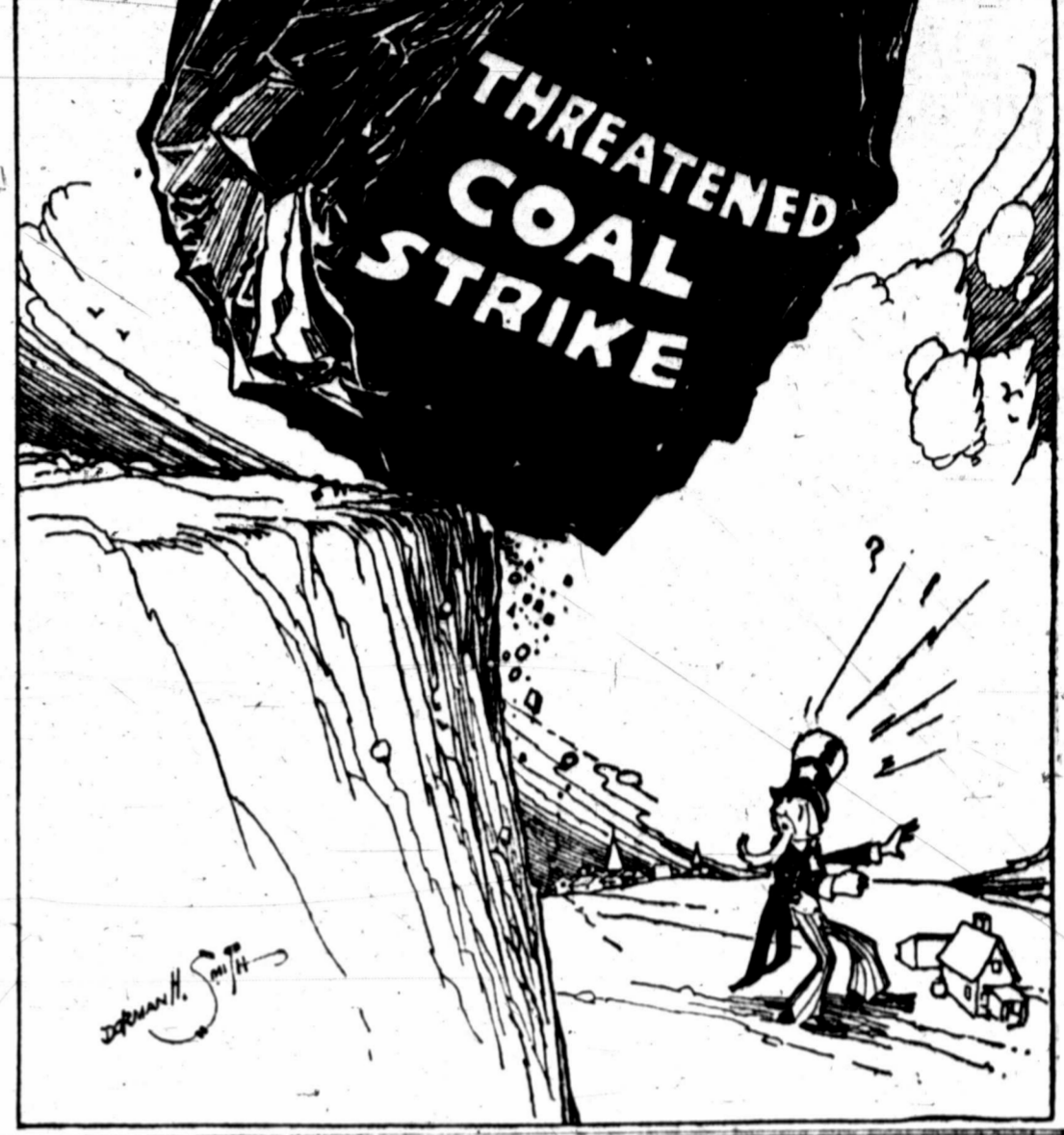

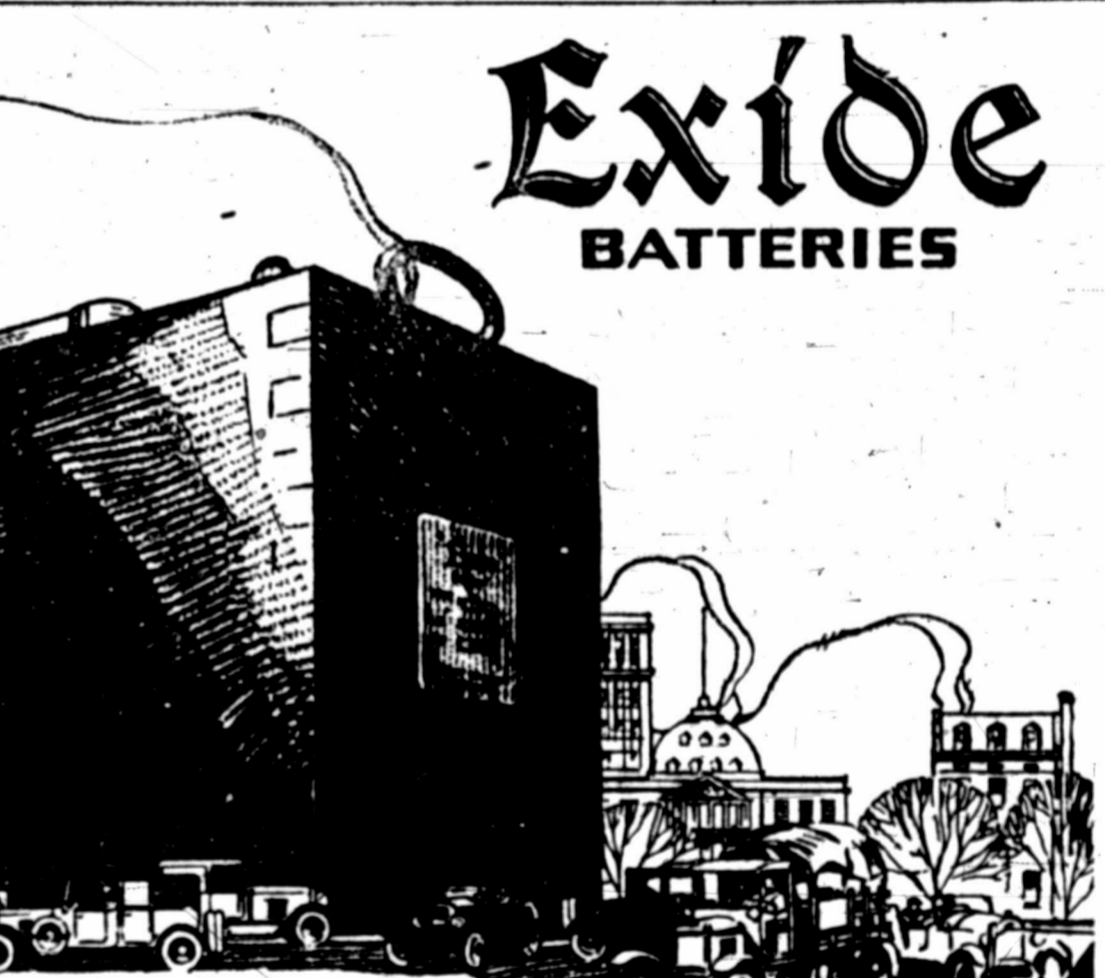

this as well as the other treaties will be satisfied, it is also probably a fact that the four power pact is at the height of its popularity now and that, in the case of the league of nations, all the developments that come out from now on will tend unhappily to undermine the present popular confidence.

If it were not for a sense of international responsibility for a hesitancy to give the world for a second time the spectacle of the United States senate upsetting the work of a great conference, the present atmosphere would express itself in thoroughgoing opposition.

Embarrassing For Hughes.
It is going to be embarrassing for Hughes to explain, when he is summoned before the senate foreign relations committee, on his return from Bermuda just why this part of the conference was so secret, when the rest was so open. It will be hard to explain why his negotiations with Mr. Balfour and Baron Kato could not have been reported as promptly and completely as were, for example, those extremely acrimonious passages between the British and the French about the submarine—It will be hard to give a good reason why the speech Mr. Balfour made after the treaty was written, in which he explained frankly that its purpose was to placate Japan for the termination of the Anglo-Japanese alliance could not just as well have been made in advance of the adoption of the treaty.

There is one partial explanation that may be made which is of a technical nature, and not likely to be very persuasive. It is to the effect that this four-power pact was not the business of the conference as a whole, but of a group within the conference. Also, there is just a possibility that Mr. Hughes might be able to say, if he chooses to, that he wanted these negotiations open, but was overruled. One fundamental fact about the conference which must be remembered in respect to everything that was done is that this was not an ordinary parliamentary body in which the majority rules. In the conference every decision had to be unanimous. An objection from any one power was sufficient to dictate.

Harding as well as some other statesmen seem to think that secret diplomacy means only secret bargains not made public until the occasion for their operation arises. They think that if the results of negotiations are given to the public promptly, that is sufficiently open diplomacy. But the more modern public opinion realizes that not only the results of negotiations but also the negotiations themselves shall be made known to the public from day to day, so that if there is popular disapproval for a course that disapproval can express itself in time to change its course.

This whole embarrassment ought to be the final lesson to convince statesmen that secrecy of negotiations must go into the scrap heap along with big navies and a good many other of the older institutions of international relations. Here was a conference that had the good will of the world to an enormous degree, and its results are jeopardized by an undermining of popular confidence and the arousing of a suspicion against not necessarily the merits of a treaty but merely the method by which it was arrived at.

WOMAN DRY AGENT PIONEER IN WORK

Carries on Crusade Started a Generation Back in Her Family

BUYRUH, OHIO, Feb. 24.—Miss Georgia E. Hopley of Bucyrus, the first woman general prohibition agent to be attached to the mobile enforcement forces at national prohibition headquarters, Washington, in her new work will be carrying on a crusade started a generation back in her family.

In 1872-73, when he who talked of prohibition out of his head, a valiant band of women braving boots and jeers, started to make this city unsafe for liquor. Mrs. Georgiana Hopley, who is dead now, was a member of that band. She was the "first woman general prohibition agent" mother.

Miss Hopley comes of a long line of newspaper folk. One brother was the editor of the first and only prohibition paper in Crawford county. Seven of her brothers and sisters still are in newspaper work, here or elsewhere.

The late John Hopley, her father, as editor of the Bucyrus Journal, was accorded the title of "Nestor of Ohio Journalism."

Miss Hopley has another "first" to her credit. She is said to have been the first woman in Ohio to enter active newspaper work.

Her initial newspaper job was as a reporter on the Columbus, Ohio Times. In 1900, Governor K. Nash appointed her to represent women of the state at the Paris convention, and she remained in France and England from May until December. She made trips to England and the continent in 1903, 1910 and 1911.

ISOLATED PLACE FOR LAST RESTING PLACE OF SIR SHACKLETON

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Grytvisken, chosen by Lady Shackleton as the last resting place for the body of her late husband, Sir Ernest Shackleton, British explorer who died aboard his tiny craft "Quest" last January 5, is an icebound, isolated habitation of 20 persons.

Sir Ernest's body was brought from the Antarctic to Montevideo following his death and will be accompanied by Captain Frank Hussey, a member of Shackleton's expedition, when it starts again on its journey into the Polar regions. Lady Shackleton's decision to halt removal of the body to England is in accordance with a life-long wish of the explorer that he be laid to rest in the sea where his life work had been carried on. Only at the outset of his last voyage, he told friends, he wanted to die with his boots on, like an old sea-dog.

South Georgia Island has figured several times in Captain R. F. Scott's career. He served under Captain R. F. Scott in 1901 when that intrepid pioneer into the icebergs of the south made a dash from that island which resulted in discovery of the south magnetic pole. 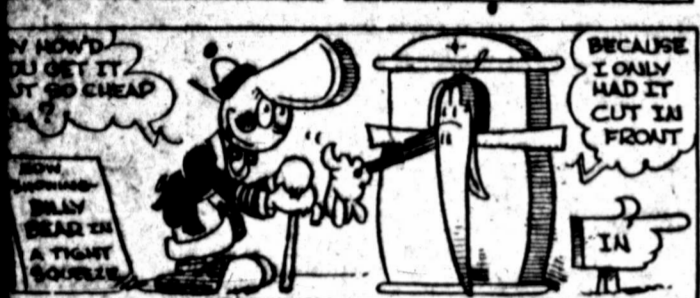
