





### PRESIDENT'S SHIP SUBSIDY BILL IS INTRODUCED

READS MESSAGE TO THE MEMBERS OF CONGRESS ON TUESDAY

### SAYS PRESENT POLICY OF GOVERNMENT IS WRONG

Propose the Sale, Even at a Sacrifice, of Fleet Built During the War

WASHINGTON, March 1.—President Harding, through a message which he read in person to congress in joint session, presented Tuesday the administration program for development through direct and indirect subsidies of the American merchant marine and immediately after he outlined his views, steps were taken to translate his recommendations into legislation.

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### OREGON IS URGED TO PROMOTE EARLY U. S. RECOGNITION

WANT HIM TO TAKE MEXICAN PEOPLE INTO HIS CONFIDENCE

REQUESTED TO EXPLAIN THE NATURE OF DEMAND

Question is Raised in Signed Editorial by Publisher of El Universal

MEXICO CITY, March 1.—An appeal for President Obregon to take the Mexican people into his confidence in matters concerning recognition by the United States, coupled with an urgent demand that something be done to restore diplomatic relations between the two nations, was made in a signed editorial today in the newspaper El Universal by the publisher, Felix Palavicini.

The president was asked to explain through the press what the demands of the United States are and to take counsel with the nation's wisest men as to how these demands can best be met in a manner commensurate with the national pride and dignity.

"If General Obregon is a patriot this is the occasion for him to prove it," said the editorial. "Since he could not by means of prompt legislative methods satisfy the demands of the American government, he should without timidity adopt such administrative methods as by appeasing the American plutocracy would facilitate matters."

"It is necessary the Mexican people, the people of the United States and those of the rest of the world should know the present conditions of American interests and property in Mexico. . . . Frankly a treaty of conditions is not necessary. Experience has proved during the interviews with the oil men that serious and conscientious discussion leads to adjustment."

Today's editorial is a follow-up of one last October in which Senator Palavicini charged the administration with incompetence. He reiterated his criticism of Obregon's cabinet and says that the state governors have converted themselves into "straps, who, ignoring their obligations to the federal government, act as if we had no relations with the outside world."

The Mexican supreme court was described as rendering a decision on article 27 of the constitution which "simultaneously recognized and failed to recognize acquired rights." (This decision handed down last September in a suit

brought by the Texas company, definitely established the non-retroactivity of article 27. Nationalizing petroleum deposits. The court held that the article did not apply to oil properties, title to which had been perfected prior to the going into effect of the constitution.

The editorial says, however, that "the really dangerous condition of Obregon's government is essentially linked with his diplomatic relations with the United States, and after urging immediate adjustment of the differences adds: "All do not wait with the soft, sweet racial tolerance which characterizes us, but creditors are ready with their accounts while we stroll about with our hands in our pockets and a cigarette between our lips."

In conclusion the editorial says President Obregon "can save his government" by discarding the state governors, by setting at rest all matters regarding property legitimacies acquired and regarding religious faiths, by admitting the urgent need of satisfying all Mexican and foreign interests affected by the prohibition laws, by renegeing foreign governments that their nationals are safe in Mexico.

DRY WORKERS ARE TO INVADE SEVERAL FOREIGN COUNTRIES

WESTERVILLE, OHIO, March 1.—The American Temperance Workers will invade foreign countries this year in the interest of prohibition, according to an announcement today by Dr. Ernest C. Herington, general secretary of the World League Against Alcoholism.

Dr. John G. Woolley of Paris, Ill., for nearly half a century an outstanding figure in temperance work, and at one time a candidate for president of the prohibition league, is starting today on a six-month tour that will take him to Italy, Switzerland, France, Spain, Portugal, Czechoslovakia, Finland, Norway, Denmark and Ireland. He will make a survey of prohibition conditions in these countries and will deliver a series of talks in which prohibitionism in the United States will be held as an example.

Rev. David Ostlund of Minneapolis, who is representing the World League in the Scandinavian countries, especially in Sweden, will assist the drys of Estonia who are trying to bring about prohibition in that country.

William E. Pusyfoot Johnson now making a tour of the United States, will go to England about June 15 and on July 21 will sail for New Zealand, after which he will go to Australia about September 1. About October 1 he will return to New Zealand for a prohibition campaign there.

WEDNESDAY saw decided improvement in the wire situation out of Wichita Falls, and telegraph and telephone service to practically all points was normal early in the day. Service was restored to a limited extent late Tuesday, but it was not until Wednesday morning that conditions were generally improved.

The street car company was having less trouble Wednesday, schedules being fairly well maintained on all lines. Automobiles stranded on the tracks and a few derailments were encountered, but no serious difficulties were met.

Complaints of low gas pressure were very few in number Wednesday, and it appeared that the gas company had met the increased demands very satisfactorily.

WIRE SITUATION IS NEARLY NORMAL BY EARLY WEDNESDAY

With two-thirds of the \$75,000 bond issue for the new club house subscribed, officials of the Wichita Falls Golf and Country club Wednesday were hopeful of seeing the entire amount taken within the next few days. Committees from the membership are at work this week in an effort to close up the list without further delay.

The new club house is being financed within the club, and the members have for the most part entered enthusiastically into the movement. It is expected that work will start within a short time after the subscription list is complete.

THREE ARE ELECTROCUTED IN PRISON AT NASHVILLE

NASHVILLE, TENN., March 1.—Charles H. Petree, Tom Christman, Otto Stevens, and John McClure were electrocuted at the state prison this morning. In the space of 25 minutes for the murder of George Lewis of Knoxville on May 28, 1921.

The men went to their deaths with prayers on their lips and all except Petree met death calmly. An hour before the execution Petree became ill.

Buried Jewels Found.

PARIS.—Jewels, worth nearly \$100,000, were discovered recently by a gardener in a public square near Port Lauthine. The jewels are believed to have been buried by burglars seven years ago.

### PREPARE RECORD OF A THIRD SUPER-HERO OF THE WORLD WAR

WILL BE PLACED IN HALL OF FAME WITH OTHER NOTED RECORDS

ITALIAN GOVERNMENT HAS ADDED A MEDAL

Record Believed to Equal Those of Alvin York and Samuel Woodfill

JERSEY CITY, March 1.—The war record of a third super-hero, Frank J. Bart of West Hoboken, is being prepared for a place in the Hall of Fame, following a ceremony here at which the Italian government added another medal to his already generous collection.

Bart's record is believed by officials of the second corps area at Governor's Island to equal those of Sergeant Alvin York and Lieutenant Samuel Woodfill.

Bart enlisted in the ninth regiment at the age of 22, giving his age as 23, after recruiting officers repeatedly told him, he was "too old to fight." He doesn't know how many of the enemy he accounted for or how many of his wounded comrades he rescued. All he knows is that in his old barracks bag he has three croix de guerre, with silver star, bronze star and with palm, awarded by the French government; the French Medaille Militaire, the Montegrin war cross, the Italian croce di guerra and the American congressional medal of honor. And he has his customary year of modesty long enough to remark that he's glad to have a job "after 15 months of pounding the pavements looking for one and never finding any."

Bart was decorated at the fourth regiment armory here last night by Col. V. A. di Bernese, Italian military attache at Washington, D. C. The ceremony was attended by Col. Peter Murray, chief of staff of the 2nd corps area at Governor's Island, several congressmen and state, county and city officials.

Bart went overseas in 1917 with the Second division, along with the marines, his record reveals. He

served as a "buck private," refusing several positions during the war, because as he said, he "didn't want to be tied down to a bunch of men."

He won his first decoration early in 1918, when, as a runner with the Ninth regiment, he went into a line of dugouts that had been abandoned under shell fire by his outfit and carried several of his wounded comrades through a heavy barrage to safety.

His second decoration he won in the Argonne, after he had searched all night for a "lost" detachment of marines, captured by the enemy, and escaped. He fought his way back to the marines and joined his regiment at its next advance.

Bart was decorated a third time by the French in the Champagne drive, when he offered to "go and get acquainted" with German machine gun nests. Armed with an automatic rifle he disposed of a dozen gunners, who had halted the advance of his company.

His decoration by other of the allied nations, including his own country, followed.

For the last 18 months Bart said he has been out of a job. Through persons who attended the decoration ceremony last night, he began work today as a "utility man" in the office of the county clerk here.

MORNING NEWSPAPERS IN ABBREVIATED FORM RESULT CONTROVERSY

NEW YORK, March 1.—Morning newspapers published in this city appeared in abbreviated form today because of a controversy arising from the pressman's wage arbitration award made February 22 by Judge Martin T. Manton of the United States court of appeals. A meeting of members of newspaper web pressmen's union No. 25, the local organization, called to order at 8 o'clock last night, did not adjourn until so late this morning that the publishers were forced to print eight-page papers,

eliminating all advertising and special news features. George L. Berry, president of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' Union of North America, was present.

The meeting, which was reported to have been a stormy one, resulted in the union agreeing to abide by Judge Manton's award, but it was decided that a committee be appointed to negotiate with the publishers in an effort to effect a modification of some of its terms which were found objectionable.

The union members were ordered to return to work in the pressrooms of today's papers and to report for duty hereafter at the regular hours.

The decision handed down by Judge Manton fixed \$31 and \$15 as pay for day pressmen in charge and journeymen, respectively, and \$54 and \$48 for night pressmen in charge and journeymen.



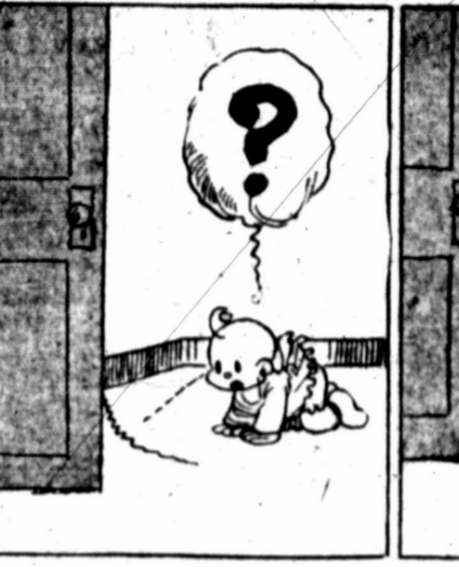

### 5000 INVITATIONS SENT OUT FOR CAGE TITLE TOURNAMENT

KANSAS CITY, MO., March 1.—Five thousand invitations to colleges, universities and athletic clubs in all parts of the country to participate in the Amateur Athletic Union basketball tournament here March 6-11 have been sent out by Dr. A. Reilly, director of the Kansas City Athletic club, under the auspices of which the tournament will be held.

Dr. Reilly, whose fast eagles won the national championship last year, believes his team will be a vigorous contender for the cup again this season. The Los Angeles and the Georgia Tech clubs are to lift the trophy, as is the "Provo Athletic club of Salt Lake City, Utah. Inquiries were received from all three of these organizations before the invitations to the tournament were sent out.

The local team has shown well so far this season, defeating Southwestern college runners-up in last year's A. A. U. tournament, 62 to 53.

Dr. Reilly at center and Singer, a forward of redoubtable reputation, are veterans of last year's five. The guard positions are being taken care of by Herb Saunders, "Ed" Speck, a former Kansas university star, is with the local squad this year, and Fetting and Barrymore, both of whom have shown up well at forward.

The loss of "Dutch" Longburg, a last year's guard, is felt.

Responsiveness to the invitations to the tournament are not expected until shortly before the time for the closing of entries, as acceptance of a new member is contemplated. Clubs are allowed to enter eight men.

## NEW COACHING STAFF FOR MISSOURI UNIV.

COLUMBIA, MO., March 1.—When the Missouri Tigers enter the gridiron season next fall, they will in all probability be under the direction of a new mentor, according to X. G. Clevenger, athletic director at the Missouri university. Clevenger has indicated that a complete change in the coaching staff is contemplated. The change, he states, has been under consideration since the close of the football season last fall.

At least two prominent candidates for the head coaching position on the football staff have come to Columbia to be interviewed by Director Clevenger and President J. C. Jones of the university recently. J. B. McCormick, Philadelphia, who has been assistant football coach at Princeton university, and A. Byron Wimberly, at present football coach at Illinois Wesleyan university, Bloomington, are the two candidates who have been in conference here with the university officials.

Others who are considered as candidates for the position include Gene Van Ger, University of Wisconsin star, once assistant at Missouri and later at the University of Texas and with Leland Stanford; Jack Sutherland of Lafayette; Bert Ingwerson, former Illinois halfback, and N. G. Wann of James Milliken, Fuller of Tulane, Higgins of Penn State and Robertson of Syracuse are others who have been mentioned for the place.

Wimberly is reported to be the choice of the present candidates. He was formerly of Washington and Jefferson, where he had an impressive record as football star of all-American fame. He has been recommended for the Missouri position by a prominent member of the following: Fred Young, sport writer, Bloomington; Ulen Warner, Pittsburgh; Bob Feltwell, head coach of the Navy and captain of Washington and Jefferson.

The reason for the change in the Tiger staff has not been fully disclosed. It is understood, however, that friction existed between James Phelan, the Tiger mentor last year, and other members of the staff. Phelan, however, was a successful season, winning six of the eight contests.

It has been indicated in athletic circles at Missouri that an assistant would be chosen as head football coach.

With an initial flow estimated at 2,500 to 3,000 barrels daily, the Konowa Oil company's well on the Stovall lease of the Sarah Tankersley survey in Young county, came in Tuesday afternoon at 2:10 feet to give the South Bend district an important northward extension.

The well is about four miles northwest of South Bend and gives that part of Young county a valuable stretch of productive territory, from the Cosden No. 1 Parsons in the eastern part of the Banger field to the western part of the South Bend district.
