WASHINGTON, March 6.—An appropriation of \$3,978,023 to meet expense of the agriculture department during the coming year is recommended in a bill reported today by the agriculture committee.

The bill carries \$2,878,890 for the eradication of tuberculosis in animals, \$1,728,890 for the payment of indemnities for tubercular cattle.

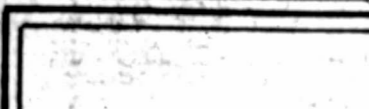

PLAN UNITED FRONT ON WORLD PROBLEM

Such Is Program of Internationals As Announced by the Leaders.

By Associated Press. MOSCOW, RUSSIA, March 6.—A united front on world problems affecting capital and labor, and a meeting of all internationals are recommended by the executive leaders of the third international. The vote was 46 to 10.

Leon Trotsky and other Russian chiefs who were instrumental in hastening this decision explained that the move simply was in keeping with new tactics having as their purpose a flank attack on capitalism instead of the old open battle for an immediate world revolution.

Some opponents, however, considered that this step would mean the ultimate destruction of the third international. The French, Italian and Spanish representatives voted against conference with "the enemies" on the final ballot. Trotsky and other Russians declared in favor of the meeting.

Nikolai Lenin was not present. A group of 23 Russian communists, chagrined at the new economic system, which they describe as a resurrection of the bourgeoisie, not only from the party but from the internationals unless they maintained their party loyalty.

SPEAKER SUGGESTS LOYAL FRATERNITY

Wants Great Universities to Defend Republican Institutions.

CHICAGO, March 6.—The great universities of the country should form a loyal fraternity pledging themselves to maintain and defend republican institutions and cooperate in warding off any impending danger which may threaten them now or hereafter.

He pointed out that William and Mary university, founded in 1527, had educated four signers of the constitution, Chief Justice John Marshall, three presidents, 27 members of congress, 15 United States senators, 17 judges, one lieutenant general, one commodore, 12 professors and four signers of the declaration of independence.

George Washington also gained his knowledge of surveying at this university, he said. "We of the alumni of Michigan university have a duty to perform of vital importance. Other universities, Harvard, Yale, California, Wisconsin, Illinois, as well as William and Mary, and other great institutions of learning, should also take part in the movement I am suggesting."

"The Japanese come to California and drive out our honest farmers with their subtle methods. They undertake to force us to give them rights which they do not grant us in any of their possessions. This government long ago should have stopped without fear this imposition upon our loyal citizens."

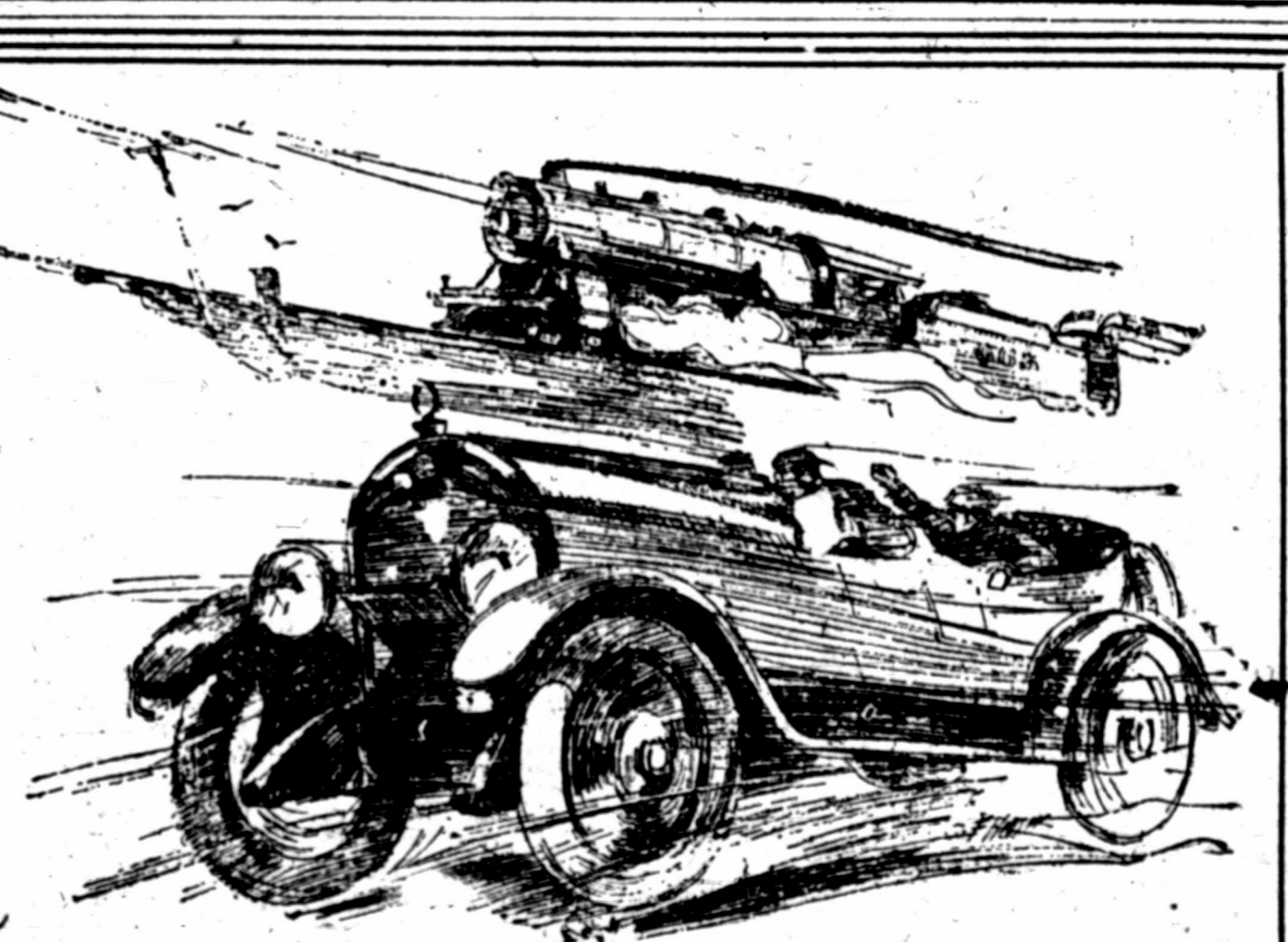

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Little Human Stories of One of Texas' Great Institutions

"What Bit You?" Is Password to the Democracy of Grim Tragedy Averted, at Pasteur Institute, in Austin. Here the State of Texas, Engaged in Its Greatest Humanitarian Practice, Defeats the Dread Spectre of Hydrophobia.

"Daddy! Daddy! Something's biting me!" cry and the scent of a skunk wafted us, and in a few minutes our seven year old son's bitten finger was soaking in kerosene and a dead polecat's head was ready to be packed in ice and shipped to Austin, two hundred miles away, for examination in the Pasteur institute.

In less than 24 hours a telegram came stating: "Positive evidence of rabies in skunk's head." Within 24 hours more Sonny Boy and I, his mother, were entering one of the greatest institutions in the world. And in the next 16 minutes after arriving we had been courteously received, had been registered and the hydrophobic—the first of 21 days' treatments—given. We were then told to be back in about 9 o'clock the next morning.

At this time there were about 25 people, patients and their attendants together, most of whom came from the Pasteur boarding house about three blocks away from the institute, assembled under the trees or in the waiting rooms. Spanish, Italian, Bohemian and "Texans" all sat in the same group. There was no formality, no waiting to be introduced, no holding aloof. Each was there with a common misfortune and good fortune, and all one had to say was "What bit you?"

Perfectly at home with another of these weeks' time one heard and saw much, and so it was that I picked up these little stories, too good to keep, that I am passing on.

There was a father with five children, ranging from three years on up, all bitten by a dog. When he was called in the children followed him quietly and took their seats in the waiting room. The little five year old girl would sit with her head on his knee, raising it only when she heard anyone enter the room whom she feared was the doctor coming to call for her. She wouldn't make a sound until the baby brother screamed when the hydrophobic was given him. Then she would start crying and wouldn't stop until here's was over, too. No one could take her mother's place, for she resisted any sympathetic attention that was shown her. I thought how the mother, at home trying to care for the farm in their absence, was longing to be there to help each to be comforted in his trying turn.

Another father had two small boys, one of whom had to take two treatments a day because he had been bitten on the face. The father himself was under treatment, as all three had been bitten within three days' time by a pet dog. His wife was there with the little boy's old baby, but not once did she ever go inside the building to see a treatment given. Her eyes were always swimming from the time her three boys were called in until they were through, though she never made a sound or complaint about it. The first week the little boys tried to run off and hide to keep from taking their treatments, and fought so hard when their father carried them in that they all could do to walk and hold them one at a time. who had been bitten while sleeping in the yard at home. When a mad dog came into the yard their dogs got into a fight with the mad dog, and they jumped right into the children's bed, fighting right over them, but the only one who was hurt so they had to wait until morning.

One little boy eight years old was there without either father or mother, and he took every treatment without a complaint, always coming out smiling, because he wanted to please the boys who were cry babies.

One 14-year-old girl, whose mother was a widow, had to borrow money to pay for her treatment.

to come on. After paying her board bill and buying her ticket home she had a single lunch on her 24-hour trip. Her gratitude to friends who found it out and amply provided for her was beautiful.

An old negro man, who always patiently waited until the last and then hobbled off to work for his board was another unforgettable part of the day's picture.

And the old man who had never been away from home so long before. How eagerly he waited the twenty-first day, so he could be getting back on his way to the farm. So they have been coming and going in a never-ending stream for 15 years.

And now, because everyone from childhood up has dreaded a mad dog, and the danger of having hydrophobia, and because there are so many tales (and ideas advanced) that are not true, I want to add some statements made to me by the doctors at the institute:

First: The disease is free (One might think that in a free institution that the doctors would become hardened, or at least indifferent, but just the opposite is true. One little boy said he wanted to hug the doctor before he left, speaking of the doctor who had taken all the hydrophobic and I passed the window where this doctor was resting for a few minutes one morning, and he said, "It's hard to speak one's day making folks suffer and cry, but it has to be done.") Second: Rabies usually develops in a human being in from 48 hours to 10 days, and in an animal from 21 days. Third: After one has taken the serum, he is immune for the space of one year. Fourth: Hydrophobia (rabies) is not contagious. Practically 100 per cent of the wild vermin, especially skunks, which bite people are rabid. Dogs are less subject to rabies than any of the other animals of the 22 animal heads sent in for examination in June, 1921, only 16 were rabid. The record of 15 years shows the per cent of rabies to run higher in January and February, and lower in August, than any other month, contradicting the popular theory of the prevalence of rabies in the "dog days" or hot weather.

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Science Finds the Secret of the Poison Pen



**Psychologists
Now Discover
That Anonymous
Letter Writers
Themselves Once
Wanted Very Much
to Do the Evil Deeds
They Ascribe to Others.**



UT recently a long series of anonymous letters virtually tore to pieces the little town of Tulle in central France. Neighbor suspected neighbor, husbands held their wives under lock and key, two town officials suffered mental derangement, and a third citizen committed suicide. Not long ago a similar flood of anonymous hatred poured through the town of Elizabeth, N. J. A little while before that a young girl living in West New York, N. J., drowned herself because an unknown person had written bitter things about her, to her fiancé. Innumerable other cases in police and hospital records give eloquent testimony to the pernicious power of the poison pen.

The attitude of society toward these cowardly attacks on its members has always been a mixture of dread and indignation. Quite naturally the wielder of a poison pen was classed as a criminal. But Science has come forward with another analysis. In the person of Dr. Edward J. Kempf of New York, formerly a clinical psychiatrist of the Government Hospital for the Insane at Washington, psycho-analysis has classified such a person as Mlle. Angel Laval, the alleged author of the Tulle letters, a pathological case and not a criminal. The furious urge of a suppressed desire, he says, is be-

hind the poison pen. Generalizing from the facts of what happened in the French city, Dr. Kempf said: "Usually persons who write poison letters blame some one for committing a wrong or evil deed which they themselves at some time in their lives wanted very much to do.

"At the same time they had these strong cravings, feelings of shame and inferiority, because of the illicit desires, finally succeeded in making them forget their wishes. Consequently they suffered great disappointment because life seemed rather barren without the illicit pleasure.

"In order to protect themselves thoroughly against these desires they unconsciously develop a compulsion to root out and destroy anything that may arouse the old illicit cravings.

"And should anyone happen into their lives who in any way tends to remind them of their repressed wishes they become obsessed with an inspiration (divine inspiration, they think) to accuse that person of having the wishes they once had or of doing the things they once secretly wished to do.

"Often times these attacks are so cunningly devised and are so filled with half-true information that the populace, at first, is inclined to accept them as being true.

"And if the attacked person has been at any

time in a half-compromising situation people instinctively retain the information."

The great majority of poison pen writings, in Dr. Kempf's opinion, arise out of interest in sex either normal or abnormal. Generally these desires were planted during childhood by veiled information obtained from parents or viciously distorted information obtained from other children. This would only be remedied when parents had learned to give their children straightforward, authoritative sex knowledge as soon as they reached an age of comprehension.

The writer of a poison pen letter should "be committed to an asylum," Dr. Kempf felt, and one who received such a letter should simply ignore it.

"Any one who is seriously worried by receiving such a letter," he said, "should talk it over with some sympathetic friend—that is, if it makes him really unhappy. If not, tear it up and forget it."

The poison pen letters that threw a blight on so many families in Tulle and filled so many others with dread lest they, too, should be attacked, were started about three years ago. The writer signed herself as "The Tiger's Eye." Husbands were told to watch their wives, young men were given derogatory information about their sweethearts, wives were told to watch out for their best friends,

Often the writer got a maddeningly cumulative effect by having the letter passed from hand to hand. The records show that several went insane, and one committed suicide. But worse than that was the poisonous cloud of suspicion that was thrown about even the most innocent household. A correspondent for a Paris newspaper said that happiness had been banished from Tulle. Though it was generally recognized that the leaven of truth in the charges of "The Tiger's Eye" was small, no one could tell with any certainty the innocent from the guilty.

With everybody in the town brought to this frame of mind, one wasn't safe even from his own reproaches. The smallest sin of many a forgotten past rose up to haunt its possessor. He knew how black it could be made to look.

The poison pen that loosed such a torrent of venom in Elizabeth, N. J., was not active for as long a time as in the French city, but the results were almost as violent. Prominent women were accused; one was hurried out of her home by a United States marshal only to place charges against another. Mrs. Charles E. Jones found her front porch covered with black cats one morning. Some mysterious person had placed an ad. for the cats in a newspaper. Accusations were being hurled right and left. Finally sanity came to the rescue and the poise of the town was restored. Nobody ever found who penned the document that started all the trouble.

MILTON'S VICTORY NETS HIM \$10,000

500 Points Toward 1932 Title Also Goes With Great Auto Win.

LOS ANGELES, March 6.—Tommy Milton, winner of the 1931 national speedway championship under the American Automobile association contest rules, today was the possessor of 500 points toward the 1932 title, and \$10,000 prize money as the result of his victory in the 250-mile race at the Beverly Hills speedway yesterday.

Milton, whisking his fast mount around the bowl for an average of 118.4 miles an hour, jumped into the lead in the first lap and held that position throughout with the exception of a few circuits during the middle of the race when Ralph De Palma crept out in front.

The veteran Italian, however, went out in the 151st lap with a broken piston.

Jimmy Murphy, winner of the French grand prix last year, was the second to cross the finish line, the 250 miles being 109.2 miles an hour, Harry Harts won third place; Frank Elliott fourth; Eddie Hearne fifth; Joe Thomas sixth, and Eddie Miller seventh.

Miller, the man in the field, after the first six had crossed the finish line, was flagged at the end of the 190th lap after he had completed a total distance of 237.5 miles.

Pietro Bordino, a recent arrival from Italy, who had been regarded as one of the most dangerous contenders for first honors, went out in the 123rd lap with engine trouble after he had treated the crowd of more than 50,000 to what was claimed to have been the fastest lap ever negotiated on a mile and-a-quarter course by a car of 141-inch piston displacement. His average time for this lap was 114 miles an hour.

The average major league career of the player is short lived. Perhaps six years would be a fairly conservative estimate. If the standard of big league ball is continued there must be constant development of players.

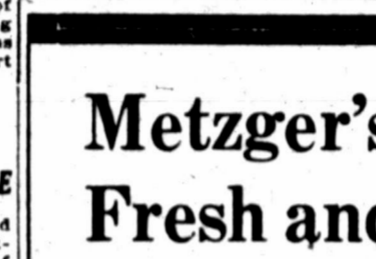
