SENATE IS SO INFORMED BY PRESIDENT IN REPLY TO REQUEST

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The Lansing-Ishih agreement has been completely superseded by the nine power treaty relating to China now before the senate. President Harding informed the senate today in response to the recently adopted Senate resolution. The executive added that the four power treaty did not refer to China and does not directly bear upon the Lansing-Ishih note.

The Lansing-Ishih agreement, the president declared in a letter to the senate "has no binding effect whatever, either with respect to the past or to the future which is in any sense inconsistent with the principles and policies explicitly declared in the nine-power treaty."

LODGE DISCUSSES PROVISIONS OF THE FOUR POWER PACT

DECLARES NO ENTANGLING COMMITMENTS ARE IN THE TREATY

DESIRE OF DELEGATES WAS TO GET RESULTS

Were in Complete Accord as to the Policies to be Pursued at Conference

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Termination of the Anglo-Japanese alliance and substitution of a political system actuated by peace in the Pacific was described in the senate today by Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, the republican leader and a member of the American armistice delegation, as the "main purpose" of the four power Pacific treaty.

The Anglo-Japanese arrangement, Senator Lodge declared, was regarded by the delegation as the "most dangerous element" in this country's relations with the far east. He asserted that if the American pact with its clause abrogating the alliance failed, the naval limitation agreement, also would be jeopardized, resulting in "failure of the conference."

No entangling commitments are contained in the treaty, he asserted and no provisions are included in the treaty which are "only an experiment" but added that it was one that must succeed if the United States is to have good relations with the world. He declared he desired to "tell the senate with entire frankness" the motives which actuated the American delegation. Mr. Lodge said: "For a month and more before the conference met the American delegation was in session almost every day. We tried to determine and mark out the course which the American delegation with whom rested the responsibility of initiating all the work of the conference should follow. The treaty is in complete accord as to the policies to be pursued. The shadow of politics or of personal feeling never rested for a moment upon our deliberations."

FIFTY-SIX OFFICERS ORGANIZED RESERVES TO ATTEND TRAINING

ASSEMBLY WILL BE HELD AT FORT SAM HOUSTON IN APRIL

OFFICERS ARE MOSTLY OF THE HIGHER GRADES

Will Be on Pay Status During the Time of Their Special Duty

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS, March 5.—Fifty-six officers of the organized reserves in the eighth corps are to be sent to Fort Sam Houston starting April 1 and last- ing for two weeks, when a course of training and instruction for the organization of the units of the reserves in this corps area will be carried out. The reserve officers are mostly of the higher grades, including one general officer. They will be quartered in one of the barracks at Fort Sam Houston and will be on a pay status during the time of their special duty here. Most of them are commanding officers of the various units in the divisions and corps and army troops. The course of instruction will be carried out by lectures, conferences and demonstrations, the purpose of which is to show the organization work should be done and to stimulate interest among the officers.

The officers selected to represent the reserves at the conference can hope to succeed? We called this conference, we proposed the treaties, agreements and declarations in which the conference culminated, are we now to stumble and fall at the threshold of the undertaking which we designed and brought to fulfillment? Are we to sink back into a sulken solitude, a prey to dark suspicions, a hermit nation armed to the teeth and looking forward always to wars as inseparable from the existence of mankind upon the earth?

"The United States has never yet permitted failure or defeat to be written in her history. She will not permit it now."

Plan to Promote Peace. "The purpose of the American delegation in the conference, and, I think, of every member of the conference besides those of the United States, was to endeavor to do something at once practicable and feasible which would promote the peace of the world. They believed this could be done without alliances or penalties. Such experiments have been made in the past in isolated instances, but I venture to assert that never has the experiment been attempted on such a scale or under similar conditions. We have passed through a war the like of which the world has never known. The misery and horrors of the great war must never again come if we can do anything to stop it. We must try our best to secure this peace."

REAL FIGHT AHEAD ON RATIFICATION OF FOUR POWER TREATY

BITTER DEBATE EXPECTED BUT FRIENDS BELIEVE ALLIANCE WILL WIN

FOUR OF REPUBLICAN SENATORS ARE OPPOSED

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Let there be no doubt that there is a real fight ahead on the ratification of the four-power treaty. The present probability is that it will pass.

As it stands today, the overwhelming bulk of the republican party is favorable to ratification. Many of the republican senators have doubts, but these doubts are mostly of a kind that can be satisfied by reservations of one or another.

Only four republican senators are definitely in opposition: They are Borah of Idaho, LaFollette of Wisconsin, Johnson of California, and France of Maryland. Incidentally, the last three of these come up for renomination and election the coming summer.

Where Democrats Stand. As to the democrats, there are about half a dozen who are implacably hostile to the treaty, and about an equal number who are definitely and strongly favorable to it.

On the treaty, as well as on some other matters, Pat Harrison of Mississippi comes nearer being the spokesman of what may be called the militant democratic thought in the senate than Underwood.

This thing that may be called the sentiment of the country is what will really determine the question. If the country stays where it is now believed to be, namely, in favor of making the Washington conference a clean job by ratifying all of its results, then the considerable body of democrats who have the balance of power will vote that way.

U.S. GOVERNMENT IS SCORED IN REPORT ON SUGAR INDUSTRY

DECLARES CONTROL COST THE PEOPLE HUNDREDS OF MILLIONS

SAYS THE LAW OF SUPPLY AND DEMAND INEXORABLE

Question Is Discussed by President of American Sugar Refining Company

NEW YORK, March 8.—Severe condemnation of the government control of the sugar industry is contained in the annual report of Earl D. Babb, president of the American Sugar Refining company, which was read to the stockholders at a meeting in Jersey City today.

"For these experiments of control and of decontrol," he said, "the people of the United States and of the world have paid hundreds of millions of dollars. The magnificent sugar industry of the United States, including the producers and refiners, both beet and cane, whether of continental United States, or the Philippines, Hawaii, Porto Rico, or Cuba, have paid almost with its life. United States investments in the hands of hundreds of thousands of people amounting to several billions of dollars have been placed in jeopardy."

The United States sugar industry was decontrolled by legislative fiat and executive order without proper regard to elementary economic laws.

The report shows a loss on operation of \$2,177,778 during 1921. Surplus was determined for \$1,111,547 to meet operating losses and to provide for dividends declared. The operating losses were attributed to steadily declining prices. The total tonnage of the country equaled that of the year before and the volume of business amounted to \$140,000,000. Balance of surplus and interests amount to more than \$25,000,000.

PRESIDENT DECLARES PROGRESS MADE WITH AGRICULTURAL PLANS

WASHINGTON, March 8.—Declaration that "we are making splendid progress toward disposition of our agricultural difficulties" is made by President Harding in a letter to Eugene V. Meyer Jr., managing director of the war finance corporation, made public today at the white house.

The president in his letter, which was in reply to one from Director Meyer, detailed the work of the war finance corporation, said "cheering" evidence had been presented to show that "we are moving fast towards establishing that necessary balance between the selling price of the producer and the costs to the consumer."

MEETING WILL DISCUSS AID FOR 'ORIENT' ROAD

FORT WORTH, March 8.—Representatives from Kansas City, Oklahoma and Kansas will be invited to attend the meeting called by the West Texas chamber of commerce to work out assistance for the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railway, which is threatened with early suspension of service due to financial troubles and failure to obtain concessions sought in Washington, according to Porters Whaley, general manager of the West Texas chamber, who arrived Tuesday afternoon in Fort Worth.

HARTFORD, CONN., March 8.—John H. Hynes, station master here of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, has been recommended to President Harding as one of the two men from whom to appoint a member of the United States railroad labor board, it was announced today. Hynes' recommendation follows the count of a vote of 42 divisions of the railroad yardmasters of America at their Columbus, Ohio, headquarters. The appointment is made necessary by the retirement from the board of A. Wharton of Missouri, whose term expired this year. W. A. Phillips of Kansas City, Mo., is understood to have been the other railroad man recommended. The salary of the position is \$10,000 a year and the term of the appointment is five years.

NOVEL AND UNUSUAL FEATURES IN BRIEF IN SUPREME COURT

FILED BY GOVERNMENT IN THE CHILD LABOR LAW CASES

The brief also, through an appendix, presents a historical paper on the French revolution, while parallel column methods are utilized to emphasize parts of the government argument. Another interesting departure from time honored practices is that part of the brief in which the government has recourse to questions and answers. It reads in part:

"Q. Has a federal government the power to impose an excise tax?"

This information, he unfortunately had only too true as the Fiume incident had created a situation diametrically opposed to the provisions of the Rapallo treaty. The Jugo-Slav government therefore had decided to protest to Rome against attacks emanating from Italian territory. At the same time the Italian government through its representative at Belgrade had communicated its decision to take energetic measures to restore order and reestablish conditions as provided for in the treaty.

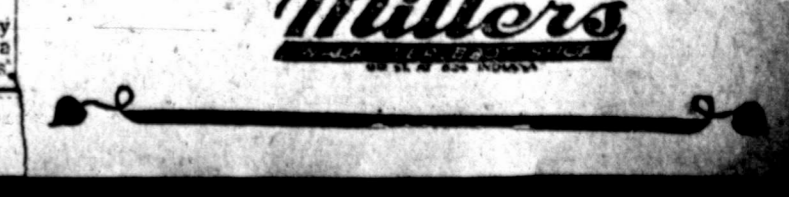

MOGULS DECLINE TO DISCUSS SALARY OF BABE RUTH OPENLY

NEW YORK, March 8.—George Wright, star shortstop of the Cincinnati Red Stockings, played throughout the entire season of 1921 for a salary of \$120,000. Wright was the highest paid member of the team.
Babe Ruth signed a contract with the New York American league club which will net him approximately \$75,000 during the coming season. If continued for the full five years, George Herman Ruth will receive a total of not less than \$375,000. These figures are the cause of frequent conferences behind closed doors in which baseball magnates argue the question as to whether they are building a salary Frankenstein which will in the end turn and destroy what has been in the past a reasonably profitable business. Big league baseball club owners will not discuss publicly this project except in the most abstract way. It is the consensus of opinion as expressed by the magnates, however, that the situation is serious.
It is estimated that the salary lists of ten clubs of the two major leagues will aggregate more than \$2,000,000 this season. The minimum figure for any club are placed at about \$225,000 and the minimum figures at a trifle over \$100,000.

Billy Evans says

Recently the Yale News, in discussing football reforms, suggested a board of control in athletics to govern conditions that present themselves from time to time is advisable.

The Harvard Crimson replies that such a board would further emphasize the overorganization of football. It suggests the following changes in football customs:

"Abolish Walter Camp's and all other All-American mythical teams. Also cut down all publicity as far as possible.

"Abolish all summer or pre-college team practice. For college teams to go south to train is ridiculous. It savors too much of the professional in baseball.

"Abolish all advertising of any intentional sort of intercollegiate contests. Eliminate as far as possible inter-sectional contests. Play teams of as nearly equal strength as it is possible to secure.

"The matter of subsidized athletes, clean professional coaching, and the so-called tramp athlete are not problems which can be successfully dealt with by rules. No college need have any of these if it does not so choose."

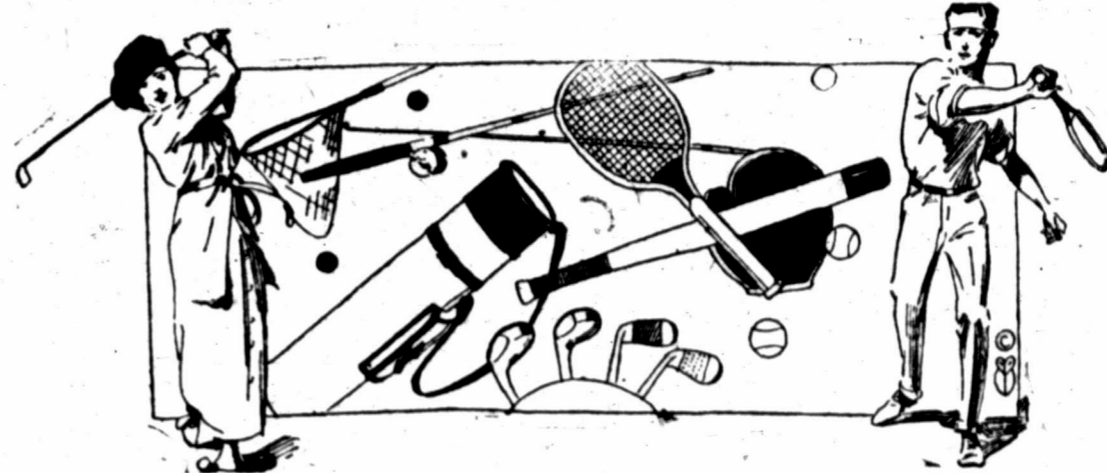
