#### PROHIBITION LAW WINNING ITS WAY. The New Jersey legislature somewhat belatedly

the other day ratified the Eighteenth amendment to the federal constitution which provides for prohibition. New Jersey's ratification is an indication of the strength of prohibition sentiment.

A few years ago anti-prohibition sentiment was strong in New Jersey. A governor was elected on an anti-prohibition platform and received the endorsement of his state as a wet candidate for nomination for the presidency.

Now, after several years under prohibition, even as imperfectly as it is enforced, the New Jersey legislature goes through the empty act of ratifying the federal amendment.

Those who have sought the repeal or nullification of the prohibition amendment have about given up the fight, although some of them still hope to obtain a light wine and beer law. Despite the violations of the prohibition law a very great majority of the people never want to see liquor freely sold again in this country.

Deets Picket, research secretary of the board of temperance of the Methodist Episcopal church, believes that the objections to prohibition will disappear in time under the constant pressure of education administration and Americanization. Discussing the strength of the sentiment for pro-

hibition the Fort Worth Record says:

"Those who contend, many of them honestly believe they are right, that prohibition just slipped through with a bare majority should take note that the vote in favor of submitting the national prohibition amendment was, in the federal house, 281 for and 128 against, and in the United States senate it was 65 for and 20 against. In the state legislatures the total vote of the state senates was 1,288 for ratification to 213 against, or 86 per cent. And the total vote of the houses of the state legislatures was 3.739 for ratification and 934 against or 80 per cent. Forty-five of the forty-eight state legislatures voted to ratify, although only thirty-six legislatures were required for ratification. "Prohibition was a major issue in every congres-

sional and legislative election for years before its adoption. The constitutional amendment providing for it was submitted and adopted according to the prescribed method under the form of government of the United States. Probably no law shopted by such of intelligence fathomed with eyes alone. an overwhelming majority of the people has been so slandered and opposed and fought with malice in adamendment and laws enacted to carry its provisions into effect.

"Attempts are sometimes made to create prejudice against the law by saying it was enacted while soldiers were out of the country. On the contrary when ratification was concluded there were only 500,000 soldiers out of the country and upon their return the soldiers unmistakably showed their sympathy for the law. For instance, in Ohio, prohibition mind. originally carried by about 25,000 majority, but on the return of the soldiers the people of that state in one. On the other hand, it can be developed and ment by the legislature, giving more than 200,000 majority.

"On the further authority of Mr. Pickett it is stated that home brewing of liquors and the manufacture of "moonshine" whiskey, while troublesome in certain communities, has been on the whole a negligible factor. Only a comparatively few German families in America know how to make palatable beer, and the moonshine whiskey produced is so pungent in its odor and violent in its taste that few can consume it. Mr. Henry A. Larson, the man most experienced in enforcing prohibition laws in the United States, says that there is not a home brew manufacturing outfit in more than one out of each one thousand families in the country.

"On the Canadian and Mexican borders, and on the coast of Florida, there has been a great deal of trouble with illicit importation of liquors. The large stocks of whiskey remaining in the country from the days of license have also been a source of trouble. However, it cannot be far wrong to estimate a decreased alcohol consumption of at least 90 per cent on account of prohibition."

#### PRESIDENT HARDING LEAVES WASHINGTON TO ITS TROUBLES.

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon says the solution of the bonus problem announced by the ways and means committee of the house is the worst yet.

Comptroller of the Currency Crissinger says the same thing and more. He says the loan provision of the bill will tend to make frozen credits even tighter throughout the country just at a-time when relief seemed to be at hand. The house is wrestling with the bonus bill. It

has rejected a sales tax which is the only method President Harding will approve for raising the revenue to pay a bonus.

The "Four Power" treaty is being debated before the Senate with the opposition gathering strength. Legislation is at a critical stage in both houses of congress. Leadership, which is needed, is conpicuous by its absence.

President Harding is enjoying the balm and sunshine of Florida, leaving the "best minds" to disagree as widely as they may be inclined.





WARNED TO LEAVE TOWN OF ALAMO IN HIDALGO COUNTY.

WORKER IN CHURCH IS ALSO THREATENED

Meeting Held Thursday Night Provides For Protection of Minister.

BROWNSVILLE, TEXAS, March 10 .- The Reverend William Baldwin, British subject, and pastor of the Alamo community church at Alamo, Hidalgo county, last night was closely guarded by armed citizens while on his way to attend a community club meeting at the church and during the meeting, following receipt through the mails of an anonymous letter threatening him with death unless he left Alamo and the lower Rio Grande Valley by sundown, according to a dispatch to local newspaper.

Citizens have telegraphed for detectives from Houston and six or seven armed men sat up with the pastor all last night following decision of a mass meeting attended by about 30 men. They maintained guard all day.

Baldwin, 52 years old, had declared his intention to attend the meeting tonight at the church, about 60 steps from his home. Ira J. Dutton, worker in Baldwin's church, also was threatened with death unless he aided in get-ting the pastor out of the region. The letter to Baldwin'reads:

Johnny Bull Baldwin, you have until going down of the sun on Thursday March 9, to get out of Alamo, yea, the valley. You are doomed, your life is at stake.

The letter to Dutton stated:
"It is up to you to help the
Jehnny Bull Baldwin get out of our
country. Should you show any inclination to protect him you will get treatment along with Baldwin. We do not intend to tolerate such actions as were put on Sunday,

"Beware of this warning or a bul-let will pierce your heart! Warning!" Citizens at last night's mass meeting resolved to protect the pas-tor and to learn the identity of the sender of the letters, both of which were mailed at the Alamo post-

ceived by Dutton, he said he thought that the warning was due to a sermon he preached in the north sometime ago. Dutton's letter, however, referring to an incident March 5, convinced Baldwin, he said, that the letter was due to local troubles. A dispute occurred in church last Sunday, it was said.
