WHERE A TEST OF STRENGTH MUST COME.

Unless something unforeseen happens 500,000 coal our pasts. miners will go on a strike April 1. This will be one of the biggest strikes in the history of the country from the point of the number of men involved.

One of the principal issues involved is the "check off." This is a system by which the operators retain a certain percentage of the miners' wages and pay them to the miners' union for their dues. This system has been in effect since 1896. Operators have always opposed it.

The operators are apparently making no move to prevent the strike. The government will keep its hands off until the public welfare is involved. Union officials are said not to favor government interposition. The stage is set for a long and bitter struggle.

There is said to be a three months supply of coal above ground. There are a number of non-union mines which will not be affected by the strike. The strike is likely to last through the summer. There will be suffering among the strikers and their families. There is likely to be violence and bloodshed. If the strike is long prolonged the public will suffer but the strike is one of the things that appears inevitable. Both sides apparently want a show-down which will come unless there is a backdown by either one of the parties.

This looks like a bad time for the miners to start a strike. There is a larger supply of coal above ground than usual. The consumption is abnormally low. There is general industrial depression over the country. British coal miners started a strike about a year ago which they were glad to call off and from which they suffered the loss of much prestige. The steel workers in the United States started a strike which they lost. Workers have failed to win any his strike in recent years. Maybe the miners' strike will be an exception. We can but wait and see.




