



TODAY'S BIG MYSTERY.

A mysterious object-apparently the petrified sole and heel of a shoe-has been discovered in solid rock far under the surface of the earth.

The discovery was made by Albert Knapp, mining prospector, in blue limestone of the Humboldt mountain range, Nevada.

The Triassic rock, in which this peculiar object was entombed, was formed between 100,000,000 and 200,000,000 years ago. So says Dr. William D. Matthew, paleontologist of the American Museum of Natural History, to whom the fossil was rushed.

John T. Reid, mining engineer, thinks Knapp's find is a clue to an extinct civilization that existed millions of years ago. If so, mere youngsters in time are the Piltdown Skull and Java Ape Man which, scientists say, date back hundreds of thousands of years.

The "fossil" found by Knapp is a perfectly shaped sole and heel for a shoe worn by a modern 10-yearold boy. It has beveled edges as smooth as could be made by a shocmaker's knife. Inside these edges are two rows of neat perforations such as would be made in stitching the sole to the shoe's upper.

Furthermore, it is the same color as leatherpossibly due to iron sulphide, which, however, was not present in the surrounding rock.

Veteran cobblers, who have examined the object, insist it is unquestionably the work of a master shoemaker.

Dr. Matthew says that Knapp's find is an accidental creation of the period before man first appeared on earth. It is the most perfect specimen of its sort ever found, better than the recently discovered stone that looks amazingly like a petrified
