AUSTIN, March 27 .- The recent claim of the state of Arkansas to a fusal of the Supreme court of the United States to allow the case to be past year in which Texas land has been the bone of contention in suits. 

Mr. Jewell opened his fight against general wage reductions sought by 205 railroads before the board today. ## WHY SHE DIFFERS.

California mixed juries have disagreed in recent celebrated criminal trials because almost any 12 men and women will disgrace on sex questions.

That's the size-up by Edwin V. McKenzie, prominent criminal lawyer on the Pacific coast, Do you agree with McKenzie?

The cases he refers to "have all been so-called sex crimes. They have involved moral issues of much discussed nature. Few people in the street have agreed on them. Only recently, three supreme court judge in California were unable to agree on the status of the eternal triangle. Mixed juries involve the situation even more."

Woman generally is either very liberal or very strict on sex and morals. On this subject she forms very decided opinion, a personal code that she

sticks to through thick and thin. Men usually are more tolerant, more flexible in their viewpoint about the deviations of sex from ac-

It is this flexibility, often indifference, among men that has compelled woman to formulate a strict code of opinion for her own protection.

So reasons McKenzie—that, in a sex trial, women

jurors are harder to sway from personal convictions, men more open to argument. It's an interesting bio logical opinion.

In these days of frank sex discussion and psy choanalysis, argues McKenzie, a jury is very apt to include women of ultra-liberal viewpoint, also the conservative minded.

He points out, there have been no such disagreements in California trials where there were no fine points of sex morals,

The discussion emphasizes this difficulty of trial by jury-that jurors usually are inclined to give less weight to law than to personal moral views and selfcreated philosophy of rules and regulations that should govern sex questions.

The very fact that women, by an average superior noral character, are inclined to disagree with male jurors is one of the best arguments ever advanced for including women in a jury that hears a triangle or other sex case.

A woman is always involved in such cases, and she has a just right to have the feminine code represented in the verdict.
