Party Managers Taking Advantage Of Activity and the Record It Has Made.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—One of the factors relied upon by the republicans to help them this year in the change in conditions in the farming communities of the mid-west and west and west.

Six months ago the farmers were in despair. The prices of the commodities they had to sell had not merely fallen to pre-war figures but were actually in many cases below them.

There was a time when the resentment of the farmers and the business men in farming communities took the form of strong feeling against the federal reserve system. They blamed the system for the period of deflation and low prices.

All that seems now to be in the past. The prices of farm products have risen anywhere from 10 to 20 per cent. The added value given to corn and other products by these increases in price has been estimated in the billions.

Much of this result is attributed to the activities of the farm finance corporation. Congress in August last year passed an act making half a billion dollars available for the war finance corporation to loan on agricultural commodities.

Made Heavy Loans Through these agencies upward to \$200,000,000 has been loaned on farm commodities. The result is that in a state like Nebraska, which in the rural districts is one of the most panicky in the country, the state senate passed a resolution relating that "We recognize and appreciate the help and assistance rendered to the farming and financial interests of the state of Nebraska by the Hon. Eugene Meyer, Jr., chairman of the war finance corporation of the United States, also the untiring efforts of the state committee, through whom millions of dollars have been loaned on Nebraska on liberal terms to the great benefit of our farms, livestock dealers and financial institutions."

The home state of William Jennings Bryan expressing contentment and gratitude to the United States treasury and to the bankers for averting conditions that promised to duplicate the early nineties is an extraordinarily novel performance.

There can be no doubt of the reversal of conditions, and to doubt that the loaning of money by the government enabled hard-pressed owners of commodities to hold their commodities off the market. This in turn resulted in the cessation of panicky prices, what now remains to be seen is whether the thing that has taken place has been merely the saving of owners of commodities from being compelled to part with their goods at low prices through the pressure of banks holding their notes.

Whether this is all that has happened or whether we are to have a resumption of business activity does not matter greatly in a political sense. The panic has been averted and that the state of mind has been changed admits of no doubt. The republicans take the credit for this and hope, with much justification, that it will help them in the elections. In point of fact, however, some of the party managers who now exult over this performance were among those who were most dismayed when it was first proposed by the farm bloc. It is the farm bloc members rather than the

WILBARGER COUNTY FAIR IN SEPTEMBER

Dates Announced By Management As September 20 to 23.

VERNON, TEXAS, March 31.—Dates for the Wilbarger county fair have been set by the management for September 20, 21, 22 and 23, and will embrace Wednesday until Saturday inclusive. The appearance of the attractions here will be in line with their showings at similar fairs such as at Quanah August 20, 21, 22 and 23; Washington September 6, 7, 8 and 9; Childers, September 13, 14, 15 and 16, and Oklahoma State fair September 22 to 26 inclusive. A special railing will permit exhibitors in the Wilbarger fair to withdraw their displays early in order to enter the Oklahoma exposition.

There is serious contemplation on the part of the local management to eliminate the textile and culinary departments in the fair next fall in order to provide additional prize money for individual farm exhibits. The livestock division, especially, promises to hold more than ordinary interest this year due to a stimulation of that industry in Wilbarger county.

LOS ANGELES, March 31.—The trial of Arthur C. Burch, charged with the murder of J. Belton Kennedy, will be resumed this afternoon, having adjourned yesterday until that time at the request of defense attorneys. The latter said they would present affidavits setting forth their grounds for challenging the entire jury panel. A verbal challenge to the jury panel that prospective jurors had been tampered with was denied yesterday by Judge Sidney N. Beeve.

A motion to subpoena District Attorney Thomas Lee Woolwine and other persons who might have information concerning alleged attempts to investigate jurors was included in the challenge.

Paul W. McKinley, chief defense attorney, announced today he would not call Mrs. Madalyn Oberchain as a witness for Burch.

TEMPLE, TEXAS, March 31.—Receipt of identification certificates from the Texas Passenger Agents association entitling each delegate to the Texas federation of labor convention to a rate of fare and a half for the round trip was announced here today by Robert McKinley, secretary-treasurer of the labor organization. The convention will be held in El Paso beginning April 17.

Mr. McKinley also announced receipt in date of over 200 duplicate credentials which indicates, he said, a record attendance. W. W. Fitzwater, president of the farm-labor union of America, and Wayne Davis, state commander of the American Legion, will address the convention.

AUSTIN STARTS MOVEMENT FOR BOOKS FOR PRISON

AUSTIN, March 31.—A movement to secure books to replenish the library at the Huntsville prison destroyed by fire recently has been started in Austin by Max H. Bickler, a local citizen. His plan is to have Austin citizens contribute books and then send them direct to the penitentiary. He proposes to enlist the cooperation of civic, women and other local clubs.

A small number of books were received at Governor Neff's office this morning in answer to the circular request for books to rebuild their library. These will be forwarded at once.

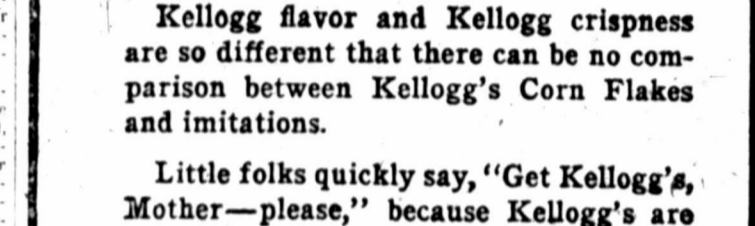

2,528 OIL WELLS DRILLED IN TEXAS DURING YEAR 1921

MORE THAN ONE THOUSAND STARTED SINCE FIRST OF JANUARY.

HUNDRED AND NINE GAS WELLS DRILLED IN 1921

Eighty-Two Producing Oil and Gas Fields in the State, Bureau Reports.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, March 31.—Statistics compiled in the gas and oil division of the railroad commission of Texas show that 2,528 oil wells were drilled in the state in 1921. More than 1,000 wells were started in the first three months of 1922. Of the wells drilled in 1921, 1,780 were producers, 751 were dry, and 294 came in as producers and afterwards went dry. During the year 1921, 1,132 wells in the state were plugged.

During 1921 the number of gas wells drilled in the state was 109, with a total average daily production of 698,248,135 cubic feet. Of the 1,090 wells started in the first three months of this year, 824 wells were completed and 260 plugged. The pipeline runs of oil in the state for each month of 1921 were: January, 7,701,404 barrels; February, 7,284,902; March, 8,620,822; April, 7,245,870; May, 7,991,321; June, 8,267,192; July, 8,165,394; August, 7,780,478; September, 7,111,494; October, 8,189,025; November, 7,882,021; December, 8,164,260.

The pipeline runs of oil for January and February, 1922, were: January, 8,745,907; February, 7,956,320. According to department officials the pipeline runs do not give the total amount of oil produced in the state each month because large quantities of oil are shipped directly from many wells. It was estimated that the total production of oil in Texas during 1921 was approximately 1,000,000 barrels. Results for 1920 showed about the same quantity produced, officials said. There are 82 producing oil and gas fields in the state. Approximations made show that the United States produces about 80

M. & N. A. RAILROAD WANTS TO REORGANIZE

WASHINGTON, March 31.—The Missouri and North Arkansas railroad through its receivers made formal application to the U. S. C. C. today for permission to reorganize, by issuing 30,000 shares of common stock and \$5,000,000 in six per cent first mortgage bonds in a new company which will acquire ownership of the entire railroad. The plan proposed has been tentatively approved by the interstate commerce commission and has been the subject of negotiations and investigations before the commission for several weeks. The railroad suspended its operations last year. Arrangements have been made, however, for resumption, which will be brought about by a government loan of \$2,500,000, and in addition by an increase of its revenues from traffic handled jointly with other railroads. The commission has indicated that if reorganization along the lines laid out in the application today was effected, the government would advance the \$3,500,000 and accept the bonds created as collateral for the loan.

AGREE ON PROVISION TO CONTINUE DYE EMBARGO

WASHINGTON, March 31.—A provision of the permanent tariff bill under which the present dye embargo with a licensing system would be continued for one year from the date of signing of the measure was agreed upon today by majority members of the senate finance committee. The vote was six to four. At the expiration of the one year period duties proposed by the special dye subcommittee would come into force. Those duties are seven cents a pound and 50 per cent ad valorem on intermediate, unfinished components of dyes, and seven cents a pound and 60 per cent ad valorem on finished coal tar products.

PERMISSION IS GRANTED CENTRAL TO ISSUE BONDS

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Permission was given the New York Central railroad today by the interstate commerce commission to issue and sell \$60,000,000 in five per cent refunding mortgage bonds, at not less than 98 per cent of par. The Midland Valley railroad asked the commission today for permission to issue \$241,000 in bonds, sale of which will reimburse its treasury for expenditures already made. The Midland Valley operates in Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

BRITISH LABORITES WIN A SUBSTANTIAL VICTORY

LONDON, March 31.—The laborites have won a substantial victory in a bye-election at East Leinster, their candidate, Stanton, polling 14,062 votes, against 8,710 and 3,825 for the coalition liberals and independent liberal respectively. It was announced today. The appointment of Sir Gordon Howat to the lord chief justiceship made the election necessary.

The missive directed that the money be unmarked, in \$5 to \$100 bills, and that the donor come alone to the place. "You may get some of us caught, but there will be enough of us left to get you. Fail not, if you value your life," is the concluding message of the letter, which is written to pencil in a fair hand. Mr. Kell did not comment on the letter except to say that it was a little early for April fool jokes.

2000 JACK RABBITS SLAIN THURSDAY IN DRIVE NEAR COOPER

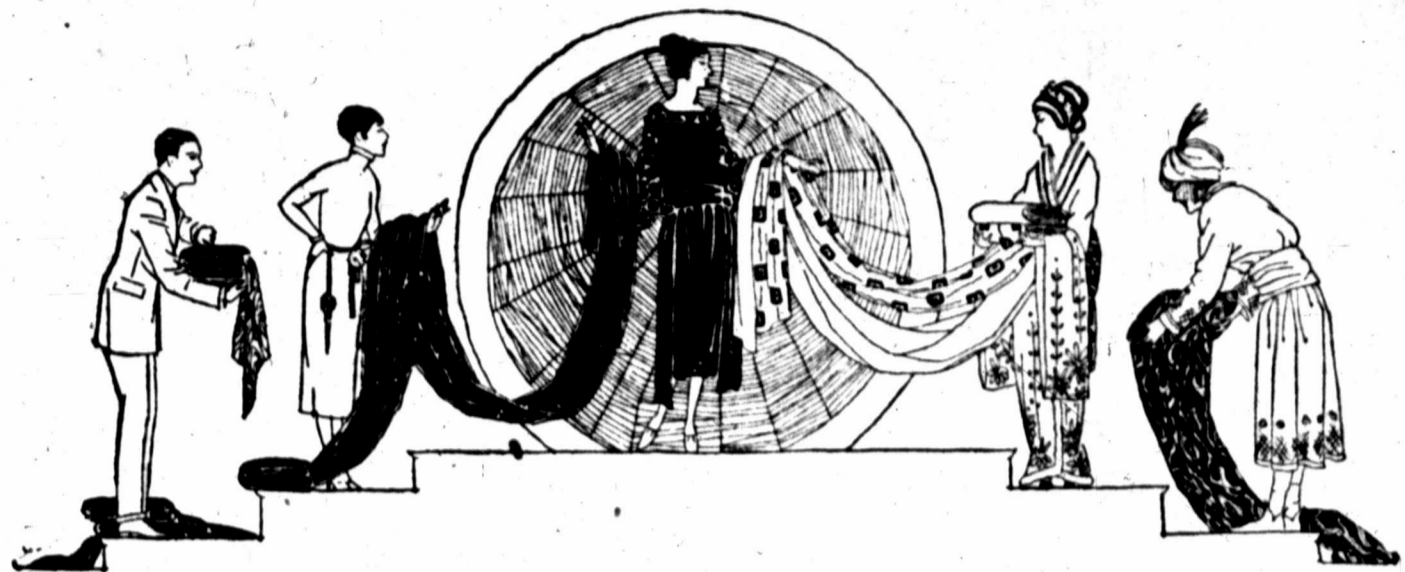
The death penalty was inflicted on more than 2,000 Jack rabbits Thursday by farmers in the vicinity of Cooper school house, who had adjudged the long-eared bunales guilty of damaging crops and of other mischief. A large number participated in the drive, which covered ten sections and which very nearly wiped out the Jack rabbit population. Another drive is scheduled for next Wednesday at a point about five miles from town on the Thornberry road. - Keep Your Coffee Air-tight**
Roasted Coffee loses its flavor rapidly, especially after it is ground. All Coffee, and especially Ground Coffee, should be kept in a container that is moisture-proof and as nearly air-tight as possible.
- Measure Carefully**
The amount of Coffee to use depends upon the strength you like. Experiment until you find just the amount of Coffee that suits your taste, then stick to it. Don't guess! Measure proportions carefully, both Coffee and Water.
- Use Grounds Only Once**
Don't leave the Coffee grounds in the pot and re-steep for the next meal. Used Coffee grounds are of no more value in making good Coffee than ashes in building a fire.
- Use Boiling Water**
The water used in making Coffee should come to a full boil before it is taken from the fire and poured into the Coffee pot. But don't let the water and the ground bean boil together after they are mixed. Boil your water, but don't boil your Coffee!
- Serve at Once**
Make a pot of perfect Coffee has been ruined by letting it cool. If you must wait, keep the Coffee piping hot, but never let it boil. Re-cooking injures the flavor.
- Scour the Coffee Pot**
It is not enough to give the pot a hurried rinse and set it away to dry. Scour it even more carefully than other cooking utensils.
If you use a percolator, pay particular attention to the little tube through which the hot water rises to spray over the grounds. Scrub it with the wire-handled brush that comes for the purpose.
If you use a drip pot with a filter bag, rinse the bag clean in cool—never hot—water. Keep the bag sweet by submerging it in cold water when not in use. Renew filter bags frequently.

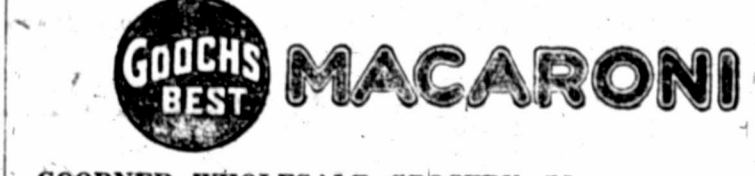

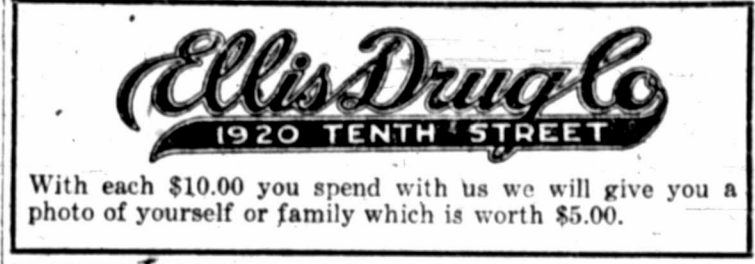

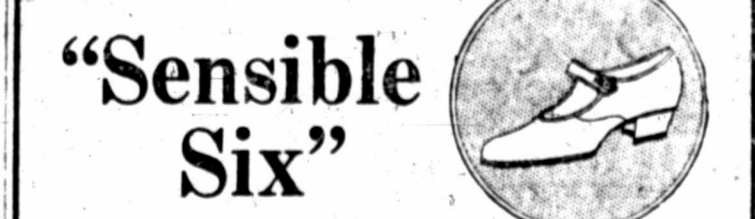

LEGAL PROBLEM IS PRESENTED IN DEATH OF SIAMESE TWINS

MUST DECIDE IF BOY IS SON OF ONE OR BOTH WOMEN.

PHYSICIANS NOT AGREED ON ANSWER TO QUESTION

State - There Are Physiological Facts to Support Each Contention in the Case.

CHICAGO, March 31.—The death of Rosa and Josefa Blazek, the "Siamese twins," has left the Cook county probate court with a legal problem which apparently is unprecedented. In determining the disposition of the \$100,000 estate of the twins, the court must decide if 11-year-old Franz is the son of one or both of the women.

A scientific controversy which began even before the death of the sisters early yesterday has resolved itself into the question: "Were Rosa and Josefa Blazek two individual personalities or did they constitute separate entities?"

If they were one personality the son will inherit the entire fortune which was accumulated by the twins during their exhibition tours of the world. If they were two distinct personalities, Rosa being the mother and Josefa the aunt, only Rosa's half of the estate would go to the lad, while Josefa's closest relatives, including her 45-year-old father and four brothers, would be entitled to her half.

Physicians say there are physiological facts to support each contention and attorneys agree that a legal opinion must be based upon a scientific analysis of the bodies.

No far a postmortem has been opposed by the brother, Frank Blazek, who is in this city.

Dr. C. K. Briggs, one surgeon, who had an opportunity to examine the twins, insists that it is a case of dual motherhood while Dr. Benjamin Breakstone, chief of the surgical staff at the hospital where the women died, contends that Rosa is the mother and Josefa the aunt.

Decision concerning disposition of the bodies has been deferred pending word from the father in Czechoslovakia. If the father desires to have the bodies returned to the homeland, the brother says he is willing that some local university be given an opportunity to make an examination.

TEXAS PANHANDLE BENEFITS BY RAINS

East and South Section Of State Suffers From Flood Conditions.

DALLAS, March 31.—Rains yesterday reported throughout the state were for the most part characterized equally by farmers as "good and bad." Range country inspectors reported optimistically as follows: Lubbock, good; Clarendon, good; Amarillo, good; Canadian, good; North Pleasanton, good; Beeville, good. Approximately 100 car loads of cattle moved from Texas ranges during the last week, inspectors of the Texas and southwestern cattle raisers association said.

On the other hand, the hardest rain of the season, 14 hours without ceasing, was reported from Killdare at Brown Lake being washed away carrying the fill of the Henderson branch of the L. and N. K. railroad, stopping traffic to Henderson.

At Terrell, the heaviest precipitation in several years resulted in a large amount of stock water being caught in tanks which will be a material aid to farmers in that section.

Clear weather prevailed in Austin for the first time this week. Despite the heavy rainfall, the Colorado river at this point has not been affected but there were reports last night that a rise may be expected Friday. Heavy rains north of Georgetown, Williamson county, caused the headwaters of the North Sangre de Cristo river to rise on a considerable rise. It is reported to have fallen in Williamson county causing slight early corn crop damage.

Flood warnings are out to persons who live near the Trinity, Brazos, and Neches rivers. Almost every road in south Texas is impassable and there is promise of still more rain.

Not since last September have the rivers in the south-Texas threatened such damage to crops and cattle. It. Bunnemeyer, weather observer at Houston weather bureau predicted that the Trinity river at Liberty will become six miles wide within five or six days.

FRANCE RECOGNIZES RIGHTS OF THE U. S. TO ARMY EXPENSES

By Associated Press.

PARIS, March 31.—France today replied to the note from the United States concerning payment of the cost of the American military occupation of the Rhineland. The French note repeats the recent declaration of the minister of finance before the senate that France recognizes the rights of the United States in the matter. The only question is to whom the request for reimbursement should be made—the allies or to Germany, the note says.

The French foreign office characterizes the note as a mere acknowledgment of the American communication. The American embassy, however, considers the note as full acceptance of the claims as set forth in the American note.

PRESIDENT MEXICO CONFISCATES LAND OF LUIS TERRAZAS

ESTATE COMPRISES SOME SIX MILLION ACRES IN CHIHUAHUA.

DOES NOT APPLY TO LAND NOW CULTIVATED

Plan to Sub-Divide Property With View to Agricultural Development.

By Associated Press.

MEXICO CITY, March 31.—President Obregon has ordered the expropriation of the estate in Chihuahua of General Luis Terrazas, over which there has been considerable controversy. The president ordered that confiscation "commence as soon as possible within the period prescribed by law and for the reason of public utility." The estate comprises 6,000,000 acres.

The reasons for the expropriation are said to be because a large part of it is uncultivated land and no effort is being made by the owner to make it productive. It was stated that "the program of the government is to endeavor by every legal means to sub-divide large holdings which do not constitute a source of production at present due to the inability of a single owner to bring about its agricultural development."

The confiscation is not to apply to those lands which now are cultivated by Terrazas, but this exception does not include farms tilled by his tenants as the government contemplates placing the latter in a position to acquire allotments.

Instructions also have been issued not to interfere with these small farmers at present, but that they be allowed to continue in possession of land which they now are working under contract until such time as it is definitely allotted to them.

PENNSYLVANIA EXPRESS WRECKS NEAR BUFFALO; SEVERAL ARE INJURED

HARRISBURG, Pa., March 31.—The Pennsylvania railroad's Dominion express which left Buffalo last night and due in Washington at 9:10 a. m. was derailed near Halifax, 18 miles north of here, early today and about a dozen persons were slightly injured.

A coach and five following sleepers were derailed and went over an embankment but remained upright.

THREE BANDITS IN TWO HOLDUPS ARE SHOT AND KILLED

SACRAMENTO, CAL., March 31.—Two of three bandits who last night attempted to hold up a local cigar store were shot and instantly killed by John Cullip, an employe. The third is believed to have been wounded. One of the dead men is a negro.

MINNEAPOLIS, March 31.—Eddie M. Rosenfield, 22 years old, clerk and former high school athlete, shot and killed one bandit and seriously wounded another late last night during an attempted hold-up at the La Salle drug store in North Minneapolis.

PEAK OF THE FAMINE IN VOLGA HAS BEEN PASSED

MOSCOW, March 30.—"The peak of the famine in the Volga has been passed; henceforward conditions will rapidly improve," says Colonel William N. Haskell, director of American relief administration work in Russia in a statement today.

MORE DISTRIBUTING HOUSES REPORTED IN PROSPECT HERE

ANNOUNCEMENT IS MADE AT WEEKLY LUNCHEON OF BUSINESS COUNCIL.

BERT BEAN TELLS WHY HIS FAMILY MOVED HERE

Steps For Securing Irrigation Experiment Station Discussed at Luncheon.

Wichita Falls' importance as a distributing center is increasing steadily, and inquiries from substantial concerns indicate a still further increase. Hubert M. Harrison, general manager of the chamber of commerce, told members of the council at a weekly luncheon Friday.

The announcement by the general manager of two recent additions to distributing houses here, and the possibility of several others, led to a discussion in which B. J. Bean related an interesting circumstance of how his family happened to come to Wichita Falls. His father, Mr. Bean said, took a map of the United States and sketched upon it, 40 years ago, the probable route that men from the northeast, and east and from the north, would take en route to Gulf ports. The two routes crossed at a point about where Wichita Falls is now, and that fact caused his father, Mr. Bean said, to decide that this locality was one with a future. Mr. Bean told this in illustrating his statement of the value of geographical location.

Mr. Harrison declared that he considered it wise policy to work with Dallas, rather than against the city, in securing distributing houses, pointing out that Wichita Falls' location makes this city a logical point for subsidiary distribution.

A variety of other matters were considered at the weekly luncheon, and so much time was consumed that it was necessary to postpone for a week the first of the "classification talks" on the buy-at-home campaign.

The establishment of an agricultural experiment station to develop irrigation farming was discussed at the meeting, following a report by the general manager that there seemed to be small possibility of securing a federal station. H. J. Johnson said that it would not be an easy matter to secure a state appropriation, but that in view of the fact that no federal station has been established in Texas, something might be done here.

A committee was named to look into a proposition for the establishment of a new form of taxicab service here, some Chicago parties having inquired about the prospect.

Another committee was appointed to investigate the possibility of securing life insurance loans for home-building, after the matter had been brought up by H. J. Naylor, representing the lumbermen. Several members had information on

RIVER AT MEMPHIS CONTINUES TO RISE; HEAVY RAINS FALL

MEMPHIS, March 31.—Heavy rains throughout the Mississippi valley from Cairo south during the past 24 hours may cause a higher stage of the river at Memphis and points south than was expected yesterday. J. H. Scott, weather bureau forecaster, said today. The gauge here registered 42.6 feet, a rise of 3.2 in 24 hours. The crest of the flood is between Osceola and Memphis and will probably arrive some time tonight, it was stated. Reports from the various levee districts show no marked change. The almost continuous rain of the last 24 hours and high winds throughout the night have made the situation more serious in this part of the river, government engineers say, but they are still confident that a break will be prevented.

COST N. Y. CENTRAL THREE MILLION TO CONTRACT REPAIRS

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Contractors with outside locomotive construction companies during 1920 for the repair of engines cost the New York Central and Pennsylvania railroads each approximately \$3,000,000 more than the same work would have cost in their own shops, the interstate commerce commission found today after an investigation. The Atlantic Coast Line railroad, however, which also contracted repair work out to locomotive construction shops during 1920, was justified in so doing, the commission held, even though it also incurred excessive costs. Five members of the commission dissented from findings of the majority, centering the Pennsylvania and New York Central.

NEW YORK ATTORNEY SUES FOR \$2,450,000 ALLEGED DUE AS FEE

LOS ANGELES, March 31.—Ola Humphrey Hassan, better known as Ola Humphrey, an actress, was sued for \$2,450,000 in an action filed in the Los Angeles county superior court here yesterday by Herman L. Roth, New York attorney, who asks the money as fee for services rendered. Roth alleges that he was engaged by the defendant to recover for her a half interest in the \$14,000,000 estate left by her late husband, Prince Ibrahim Hassan of Egypt, whom she married in Paris. He declares he obtained nearly \$1,000,000 in fees for his services. Mrs. Hassan, Roth claims, agreed to pay him 50 per cent of what he could obtain from the estate.

S. F. BARNES IS KILLED IN M'LENNAN COUNTY; T. E. THOMAS SURRENDERS

WACO, TEXAS, March 31.—S. F. Barnes, 25, was killed this morning by T. E. Thomas at Spring Valley, this county. Thomas came to the city and surrendered to the sheriff. He said he acted in self-defense. Barnes was shot to death. The two men were brothers-in-law, Thomas having married Barnes' sister. The cause of the trouble is not known.

PLANS COMPLETE FOR MINE STRIKE

(Continued from Page One.)

Maryland, Michigan, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and Washington. Western Canada is also expected to join the suspension, but not the Nova Scotia district. Not only is Pennsylvania expected to send out the greatest force of union men but all the union officials anticipate an exodus of the non-union miners in that state. The anthracite districts, which are half unionized, are expected to be shut down completely and in addition many bituminous miners from the central part of that state have been called on to join with the union men there. West Virginia, Kentucky, Alabama and Washington also are expected by the union officials to experience idleness at the non-union mines of those states, the

most important of these strikes being from the New River and Windling Gulf fields of West Virginia.

SECRETARY OF LABOR DISCUSSES THE STRIKE

WASHINGTON, March 31.—White stating that a general strike in unionized bituminous coal mines is certain to begin Saturday, Secretary of Labor Davis declared last night that the situation leaves "no excuse for advance in coal prices" and no prospect of coal shortage for the public.

Mr. Davis expressed "keen disappointment at the failure of certain operators to fulfill the terms of their obligation" to confer with miners for the making of new wage agreements which might have prevented suspension of work.

"All the government's efforts in the proffer of mediation, conciliation and compromise," he said, "have failed to save the country from the national strike test of economic strength between employer and employe in the coal industry." In this effort, the president and myself have had neither legal right nor personal desire to dictate any program. Our one duty is to see that the force of persuasion and urgency, the operators and miners to discharge the obligation they assumed themselves, to confer for the shaping of a new agreement.

The miners, the secretary said, had always been willing to confer through their union representatives, but the operators had turned their backs on a chance to lay bare, not only to the miners but to the public, at least their reasons for declining a new wage agreement. A conference for the operators, he added, would have removed any stigma of bad faith.

"There may be faults on both sides of this bituminous dispute," he declared, "but the side that openly repudiates its written and signed obligations has crippled its case before the bar of public opinion."

The agreement repudiated, the statement explained, was contained in the wage agreement between operators and miners in the central competitive field, including Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Western Pennsylvania, which has constituted the basic wage contract for all other coal fields in former years. The situation as to anthracite mining, it was added, "forms a pleasing contrast because operators and miners are meeting directly together."

Further complications in the coal industry, Mr. Davis continued, were due to over production, amounting to "fully 10 per cent over production in the bituminous fields." One result of this, it was pointed out, was to leave available in storage now stacks of coal estimated at 10,000,000 tons for anthracite and 62,000,000 tons for bituminous.

"This means that railroads, public utilities, manufacturing industries and retail dealers will have on hand Saturday nearly two months supply."

KANSAS INDUSTRIAL COURT ISSUES ANTI-STRIKE ORDER

TOPEKA, KAN., March 31.—As the country approaches the verge of a nationwide coal strike further developments were awaited today in this section following action yesterday by the Kansas industrial court in its issuance of an anti-strike order. The court ordered the present wage contract in the Kansas coal fields in effect 30 days following April 1, at the same time instructing representatives of both the miners and operators to speed up their efforts to reach an agreement before that date.

ANNOUNCE INCREASE IN COAL MINE FATALITIES

WASHINGTON, March 31.—An increase in coal mine fatalities of 2 per cent in February over the corresponding month a year ago was announced today by the bureau of mines. Two hundred and ten lives were lost in mine accidents during the month compared with 160 in February 1921.

SEE NO POSSIBILITY OF A SETTLEMENT IN TEXAS

FORT WORTH, March 31.—No possibility of a settlement in this district comprising Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma, is indicated by either side of the coal controversy, according to statements here today. Three hundred men at the Bridgeport Coal company will go out in Texas. All other bituminous mines have been out since March 17, 1921. No plans to continue the operation of the Bridgeport mines by non-union labor is contemplated by officials of that company, according to a statement by W. H. John, secretary-treasurer of the organization. Union miners will hold a mass meeting at Strawn Saturday, which is to be attended by several hundred workmen from Strawn, Mingo, Thurber and Lyra.

SUSPENSION OF INDUSTRY IS ALREADY UNDER WAY

NEW YORK, March 31.—President of three anthracite districts in New York to administer the suspension of work in the mines of Scranton, Hazleton and Shamokin regions of Pennsylvania in connection with the nationwide strike of the coal industry. Reports from district headquarters indicated that cessation of production already was under way. Actual suspension of the industry probably will be completed by sundown, it was said.

GETTING READY TO QUIT IN PENNSYLVANIA FIELD

PITTSBURGH, March 31.—Before nightfall some 43,000 miners and other workers in and around the mines of the western Pennsylvania bituminous district and approximately 20,000 in the central state field will have cleaned up their tasks, taken out their tools and completed every preparation for the strike which will become effective at midnight.

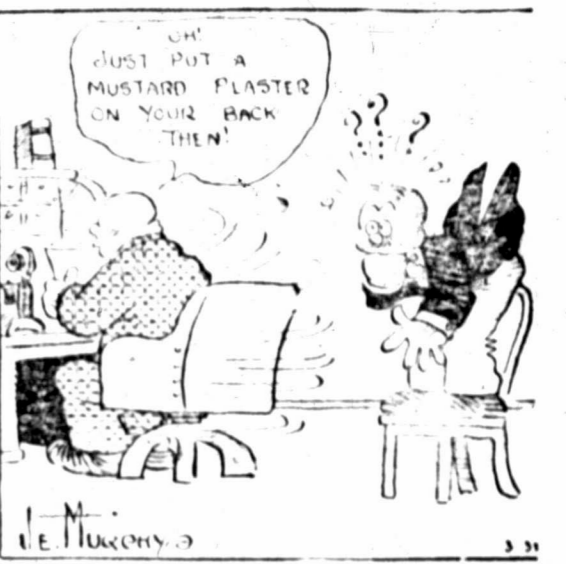
