FORMER EMPEROR CHARLES DIES

MINERS ANSWER CALL FOR GENERAL STRIKE AT MIDNIGHT FRIDAY

For the first time in the history of the coal industry both bituminous and anthracite coal fields virtually were idle today as the result of the cessation of work by 600,000 miners effective at midnight last night.

Union officials asserted that 100,000 non-union miners were included in the walkout and that 5,000 of the 7,500 mines in the country were shut down.

Daily loss of production in an anthracite field was estimated at 302,000 tons and the daily loss in wages at present rates in that branch of the industry at \$500,000, affecting 20,000 families.

First day of the nationwide suspension fell on the anniversary of the adoption of the eight-hour day, April 1, 1892, a date which has been generally observed as a holiday in normal times, estimates of the completeness of the suspension were not regarded as being very accurate.

Miners officials in Kansas where the industrial court ordered that the present arrangement between miners and operators continue for another month and the miners in that state would be shown on Monday to be complete.

The northwest reported supplies sufficient for about two months with more than 18,000,000 tons piled up by the railroads and at the Duluth docks at the head of the lakes.

Officials await reports from district leaders in Indiana, April 1.—Confident that the suspension of work by coal miners would be complete in that state, officials of the United Mine Workers of America at its headquarters in Indianapolis reported from district leaders showing the exact effectiveness of the shut-down.

All about 600,000 men—100,000 of the non-union miners—were expected by the union to be enrolled in the walkout, which is planned to continue indefinitely in complete defiance of the government's attempt to force operators to accept the miners' terms for new wage contracts.

For the first time in the history of the coal industry union officials said both bituminous and anthracite fields were tied up simultaneously and the estimate was that 5,000 of the 7,500 mines in the country were closed as a result of the walkout.

UNION MINERS IN SOUTHWEST STATES JOIN COAL STRIKE

ONE EXCEPTION WHERE MINE IS SUPPLYING A PUBLIC UTILITY.

MINE IS LOCATED AT HENRYETTA, OKLAHOMA

Fort Worth, April 1.—Fifteen thousand miners in Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas ceased work at midnight.

With a single exception, all union mines in Oklahoma are closed, according to John Wilkinson, president of the 21st district, United Mine Workers of America, in a message from Muskogee, Okla., this morning.

The mine where union miners are still permitted to work, he said, is at Henryetta and is supplying a public utility in Texas.

Orders have been issued allowing union men to continue work in mines supplying schools, hospitals, gas plants, electric light and power plants and other public utilities.

Timbermen and other miners whose continued work is necessary to keep the mines from physical danger, will not cease work.

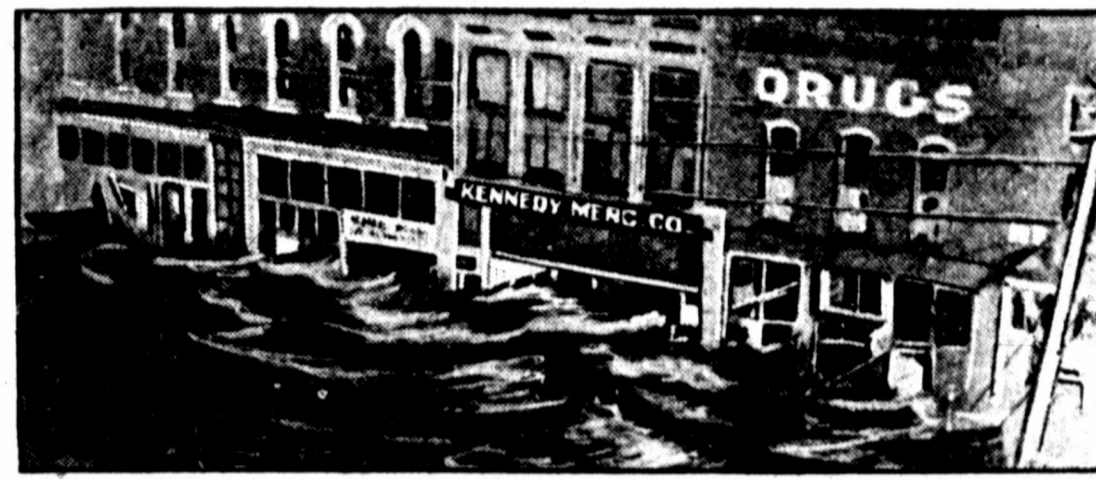
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WAKE OF RUIN LEFT BY CLOUDBURST

# Love — or a Million Dollars?



## How the Problem of Duty to Self and to the Living vs. Loyalty to the Dead with a Contingent Rich Legacy, Was Solved by a Massachusetts War Nurse!



**T**HE nature of such reservations as were in the mind of Eleanor Berlin of Worcester, Mass., when she promised her dying sweetheart that she would never marry, is only known to Miss Berlin. Thus far Miss Berlin hasn't chosen to throw any light on what her attitude toward the agreement was at the time it

was made. But she has shown in the most conclusive manner possible that she could no longer be bound by her pledge to the dead man. Miss Berlin has married—and for love. She is now the bride of Raymond L. Goding, a real estate broker of Worcester.

Miss Berlin's action has thrown into the whirlpool of public discussion not only a delicate question of ethics but a question fraught with practical and sentimental considerations as well. For in addition to breaking her promise to her dead fiance she has also forfeited a million dollars.

When Charles A. Hamilton of Chicago, the young Lieutenant of Aviation to whom she was engaged, was dying in a hospital at Ellington Field, Texas, he called Miss Berlin to his side. He told her he would leave her all he had if she would promise to remain single. She promised, a will was immediately drawn up in which she was left \$60,000 outright on the basis of this agreement, and Lieut. Hamilton died with a smile on his face. After his death his family allowed her to understand that if she would devote her life to Hamilton's mother and not marry, she would fall heir to the family fortune of about \$1,000,000.

Miss Berlin was afforded a clear choice. On the one hand was a fortune, security and position—but all conditioned upon her definite refusal to have anything further to do with love. On the other was entire freedom and the potentialities that life always holds for a beautiful girl. It was not an easy choice.

To take either course necessitated a big sacrifice.

But when the potentialities of her life materialized in the form of another man; when

love again presented itself to her—she did not hesitate. She chose love—and she advises any woman to make the same choice.

As for the ethical point involved in her action, a clue to her mental processes may possibly be found in one of Gouverneur Morris's short stories on a similar theme. In this, a young married woman was asked by her dying husband to swear that she would always remain single out of respect to his memory. She made the promise without hesitation and made easy, thereby, the last moments of the dying man.

She was young and pretty. After a while an inevitable suitor came along. He proposed and she accepted. A relative of the dead man upbraided her for her so-called breach of faith. She replied that her duty to herself and to her living lover was greater than her duty to a man whom she could no longer hurt. The relative then told her that she should never have made her promise to the dying man if she felt it imposed an unnatural obligation upon her.

The young widow's answer to this was that it would have been wicked and cruel not to have humored a dying man, even though she had to tell a lie in order to do it. It was right to make the promise, she felt, and it was equally right to break it.

This fictional character had thought out the whole matter before a decision became necessary. Miss Berlin, however, was uncertain to the last, as an interview which she gave out not long before her marriage indicated. At that time no definite choice was facing her.

She said: "I simply can not make up my mind. It is a big question. It is not merely one of love against money. If it were it would be easy to decide. But really I do not care for any one sufficiently to call it love; so that the choice does not exist—at present.

"The real problem is what the future holds. There is no way of knowing for a surety whether

happiness or unhappiness will result from any decision I may make."

The unusual bequest in favor of Miss Berlin came about as a result of a war-time romance which started in Texas. When the war broke Miss Berlin offered her services as a canteen worker. At Galveston, Texas, she was one of a group of girls serving hot coffee to soldiers coming through on a troop train.

From one of these coaches a tall, handsome, striking young man in an aviator's uniform stepped out. He was Lieut. Hamilton. Miss Berlin offered him refreshments. His interest in her started from that moment.

After taking station at Ellington Field, Lieut. Hamilton pursued his acquaintance with this pretty, dark-haired girl, and it was not long before it became known that they were engaged.

Then, one day, Lieut. Hamilton took his "ship" up for what was to be his last flight. Something went wrong with his controls. "I rushed to the hospital to see him," said Miss Berlin. "He was dying. He took my hand in his and asked me if I would promise never to marry any other man if he would leave me all he had and would provide for my future.

"He also asked me to go and live with his mother at Chicago. Well, I promised.

"Then while he was dying he had his will drawn up, leaving his money to me and stating the conditions. He signed it and died with a smile."

It is now said that Miss Berlin and Mr. Goding had determined to marry before

the terms of the Hamilton will were made public. The marriage was hastened, it was said, to save further embarrassment, for the problem was one that attracted nationwide interest and hundreds of letters offering advice.

Mr. and Mrs. Goding were married in New York City. Mr. Goding, like Lieut. Hamilton, was in the service during the war.
