POLICE BARRACKS IN COUNTY CLARE SCENE OF BATTLE

By Associated Press. DUBLIN, April 10.—British military foot soldiers full armed appeared in the streets of Dublin yesterday for the first time since the creation of a truce in Ireland.

By Associated Press. LONDON, April 10.—The police barracks at Broadford, county Clare, occupied by official Irish republican army units were attacked at 2 o'clock this morning, says a dispatch from Limerick. There was an exchange of fire for a considerable time, the besieged force refusing to surrender.

Captain William O'Brien, who was in charge of the units occupying the barracks, was fatally wounded. No other details were available at the time the dispatch was sent.

AUSTIN, April 10.—The Travis county grand jury reconvened this morning and will, it is understood, continue investigation of the Ku Klux Klan and its alleged activities. The grand jury will finish its investigation by then.

TWO MYSTERIOUS MURDERS STAGED AT BROWNSVILLE

BROWNSVILLE, TEXAS, April 10.—Jesus Garcia, Gomez, 25, who had been arrested last winter in residence on charges of being a member of the Ku Klux Klan, was found dead last night and Abraham Solis, 26, owner of a feed store, was discovered fatally stabbed at a point within half a block of Gomez's store. Solis died this morning.

NO INDICTMENTS IN CASE OF LYNCHING A FORT WORTH NEGRO

FORT WORTH, April 10.—The grand jury has refused to indict four men arrested last winter in connection with the lynching of Fred House, packing house strike-breaker, who was taken from his cell in a hospital and hung to a tree. Subsequently three murder charges and one assault to murder charge was filed.

ONE MAN IS KILLED AND SEVERAL HOUSES WRECKED

SPRINGFIELD, MO., April 10.—Reports reaching here say Ash Grove, 20 miles northwest of here, was struck by a tornado early today and several buildings destroyed. Wires are down and no definite information has yet been received.

ARKANSAS AND WALNUT RIVERS ARE STILL RISING

ARKANSAS CITY, KAN., April 10.—Both the Arkansas and the Walnut rivers are still on the rise here this morning and the Walnut is higher than for a number of days. It is spreading all over the lowlands in this section.

NEOSHO VALLEY FLOOD WORST IN 10 YEARS

EMPORIA, KAN., April 10.—The Neosho valley today is experiencing the worst flood in 10 years. The river at Emporia was up 24 feet, 10 inches, within two inches of the highest mark on record. Hundreds of acres of farm land are inundated and creeks, swollen by back water from the river, have spread over wide areas of land.

NECES RIVER HIGHEST IN PAST THIRTY YEARS

CORPUS CHRISTI, TEXAS, April 10.—The Neches river this morning stood at eight and eight-tenths feet and still was rising, overflowing the banks at the Neches and San Patricio counties. This river stage exceeds any former record of 30 years except during the tidal wave of September, 1820. Property damage is reported slight.

INTERURBAN AND DEMORIALIZED SERVICE IS DEMORIALIZED

INDEPENDENCE, KAN., April 10.—Flood conditions have become serious in the Neches and San Patricio counties. The river is rising steadily, reaching a stage of 11 feet early this morning. The peak is expected to be reached at noon today. Residents in the lower sections of the city are moving out. All interurban and steam service is demoralized.

REPORT SUBMITTED BY ALIEN PROPERTY CUSTODIAN MILLER

MADE IN RESPONSE TO A RESOLUTION BY SENATOR KING.

GIVES DETAILS OF ABOUT 33,000 ACTIVE TRUSTS

Includes Expense Incurred For Salaries and Fees in Handling Property.

WASHINGTON, April 10.—An accounting of the \$250,000,000 worth of enemy property held by the government was given by the senator today in a report, the first compiled since February, 1919, filed by alien property custodian Thomas W. Miller in response to a resolution by Senator King.

"The final disposition of this property," Mr. Miller said, "will undoubtedly have a direct bearing on the economic relations between this country and Europe, with particular reference to the late enemy powers."

Discussing the \$418,000,000 of American claims against Germany, Mr. Miller recalled the terms of the Knox-Porter peace resolution indicating that no disposition should be made of enemy property held by the United States until the German government had satisfied American claims. He said that congress must evolve some plan whereby claims against Germany may be legally adjudicated.

"There are several classes of claims against Germany," Mr. Miller said, "as for instance, those of Americans whose cash was seized by the German custodian, and who are now being offered the return of their money at the depreciated value of the mark, which today is valued at one-third of a cent for each mark."

"It has been suggested that the amount of money which the German government would realize from such taxation might form the basis of a fund in America for satisfying claims of Americans against Germany."

Details of Active Trusts. Mr. Miller's report given the details of about 33,000 active trusts representing property in every state and territory consisting of industrial plants, steamship lines, banks, land and cattle companies, salmion factories, gold and silver mines and thousands of parcels of real estate and securities.

Answering charges by Senator King that the property had been seized since peace was declared with Germany last July the report said that the last property seized was that belonging to the Cleveland-Berard doll which was seized May 27, 1921.

Responding to inquiries for salary and fees paid the report showed the following list: Attorneys fees paid prior to March 4, 1921, \$2,128,548; attorney fees paid since March 4, 1921, \$114,469; salaries to officers and directors of corporations previous to March 4, 1921, \$1,074,017; salaries since March 4, 1921, \$132,453; paid for accounting and auditing prior to March 4, 1921, \$1,084,859; paid for the same since March 4, 1921, \$2,718; paid for advertising and printing previous to March 4, 1921, \$28,067.

One accounting bill alone of \$172,757, the report declared, was paid to an accounting firm for a report covering the accounts of the custodian's office to August 1919, but which was not completed until April 1, 1921, and was then "of no practical value." The report listed \$11 million spent on advertising and "the newspapers so favored."

GENERAL IMPROVEMENT IN BUSINESS EXPECTED. NEW YORK, April 10.—Business depression is over, conditions improvement may be expected, declared Dr. Hugh B. Baker, executive secretary of the American Paper and Pulp Association, here today.

Dr. Baker came here to attend the annual convention of the paper manufacturers of the United States which began this morning.

"Early arrivals had the same report to make," he added, "and the discussions of the week will center on the manner in which the number of orders has increased since the inventory period of dullness."

FEUD OVER WHICH TOWNS HOST TO SOVIET DELEGATES

By Associated Press. SANTA MARGHERITA, ITALY, April 9.—The towns of Santa Margherita and Rapallo are waging a bitter feud regarding the question which municipality actually is host to the soviet delegation to the economic conference in Geneva.

There is talk of danger of bloodshed and that the Geneva conference of the league of nations may be called upon to arbitrate the difficulty.

While the Imperial Palace hotel in which the bolshevik delegates are living actually is within the municipal limits of Rapallo, it is more than two miles from the Rapallo station and only two blocks from the Santa Margherita station. The hotel is but a few rods within the town limits of Rapallo and the dividing line between the two municipalities is so artificial that the Santa Margherita realtors, hotel keepers and members of the commercial club assert that it is an outrage for the conference and the Geneva newspapers to speak of the famous hotel as being in Rapallo and thus send visitors more than two miles out of the way to reach it.

VENIZELOS DENIES THAT HE IS ASKED TO RESUME OFFICE

WASHINGTON, April 10.—Reports that he had been asked by King Constantine to return to Greece to resume the premiership was characterized as "ridiculous" by former Premier Venizelos on his arrival here today from a tour of the southern states and South America.

The report was circulated from Charlotte, N. C., last night after the former premier had been greeted at the station by a number of his countrymen.

The former Greek premier said he planned to remain here about a week and probably would leave the United States shortly after the first of May to go to Paris.

MISS BLANTON TO BE CANDIDATE FOR UNEXPIRED TERM

AUSTIN, April 10.—Announcement of Miss Annie Webb Blanton, state superintendent of education, last night that she is a candidate for congress to fill the unexpired term of the late Lucian W. Parham.

The others are Dr. A. B. Edwards, Mrs. Parrish's father; State Senator Quinn Williams of Decatur, W. S. Moore of Gainesville, and Judge E. A. L. Morgan of Wichita Falls.

Miss Blanton's opening speech of her campaign will probably be made at Denton, her home, some time this week.

Congressman Thomas L. Blanton is Miss Blanton's brother. He is representative from the 17th congressional district, while his sister serves office in the 13th.

SAMUEL COMPERS WILL ATTEND OPEN MEETING OF RAILWAY EMPLOYES

CHICAGO, April 10.—Samuel Compers, president of the American Federation of Labor, who is expected here today to attend the opening meeting of the railway employees department of his organization, plans to remain until Wednesday when he will preside at a general conference of labor union leaders.

The coal miners strike will be discussed by the speakers and nothing more than moral support will be pledged.

One of the topics for consideration at the meeting of railway employees is the contract system under which it is alleged railroads are seeking to evade sections of the United States railroad labor board by the "farming out" of the railway shop work.

CONSIDERABLE DAMAGE AT BOMARTON BY STORM

BOMARTON, TEXAS, April 10.—A storm coming from the northwest struck Bomarton Saturday morning about 5:20. It blew several farm houses off their foundations before it struck town, blew Dr. Seydler's garage away and turned his car over. The wind was followed by a heavy dashing rain that packed and washed the farm land considerably.

The wheat and oats are beginning to look good through here and the farmers say conditions will lessen the cotton acreage considerably. If the boll weevil continues to make its appearance, it might be well for the farmers to cut cotton acreage. The wheat is showing thick in parts of this country already.

AMARILLO TAXI DRIVER FINED \$500 ON CONVICTION OF NEGLIGENT HOMICIDE

AMARILLO, April 10.—Roy Broadus, Amarillo taxi driver, was found guilty of negligent homicide and fined \$500 in district court here yesterday in connection with the death of Georgia Pile, Hutchinson, Kan. woman, who was fatally injured near Amarillo recently, when she was run down by a car driven by Broadus. He was charged with murder.

COLD HIGH NORTH WINDS SWEEP INTO DISTRICT MONDAY

SNOW IS REPORTED AT FORGAN AND AMARILLO BY RAILROAD AGENTS.

UNEXPECTED SHOWERS NETS 0.1 INCH OF RAIN

Rain is Reported East and West As Far As Textline Monday Morning.

A cold high north wind, the velocity of which is reported as having reached as high as 35 miles an hour swept into the panhandle early Monday morning and at 8:30 o'clock agents at Forgan and Amarillo reported snow.

Temperature showed a big drop at all points north of Woodward, but the agents stated that it was not cold enough to do any damage to the crops. The snowfall was light.

An unexpected shower early Monday morning netted another one-tenth of an inch of rainfall in this city. It was reported that practically the same amount fell at all points on the railroads leading into the city. No rain, however, was reported north of Frederick on the Northwestern.

The Altus agent at 9 o'clock Monday morning reported a blinding sand storm and wind from the north. Locally the wind shifted from the west to the north at 8 o'clock Monday morning, but up until 9:20 o'clock and then it blew in any effect on the thermometer.

Sunday proved to be the hottest day of the season, the mercury having mounted to a reading of 91 degrees. The minimum temperature for the night was 63 degrees.

WOMAN TAKES POISON WHEN HER HUSBAND DIES

SAN RAFAEL, CAL., April 10.—Mrs. Alice Frey, widow of Franz Frey, counts the moments that physicians have said lie between her and death by poison and regrets the tardiness of their passing. Her husband, 56 years old and four years her senior, died Thursday. The widow, unwilling to continue alone, that same day took a poison which though slow to act, will prove deadly, attending physicians said.

PASSENGER IN FLAME AT AIR CIRCUS KILLED

SAVIOR'S EFFECT ON LIVES OF MEN IS SERMON THEME

Taking the text and scripture of the evening from the first chapter of John, Dr. T. S. Pittenger Sunday night preached upon "The Effect of Christ upon the Lives of Men." He said:

"At this Easter time it behooves us to stop and study this matter, because we hear the statement in some quarters that Christianity is a failure. Any student of history will tell you that history points to the fact that God was working out His divine plan for the redemption of the world and that Christ's coming was merely a part of that great plan. The events pertaining to Christ's triumphant entry into the city of Jerusalem, and surrounding His death are very important events but they are not nearly so important to us as our actions in the world today, with regard to Christ. "The text of the evening might well be 'He came to His own but His own received Him not.' Many people are trying to imitate Christ, but I say that cannot be done before one has the grace and strength to hold himself steady in the time of temptation. Christ must become a living personality in us and the Holy Spirit must have control of our lives. God let Christ come down to the world in the form of flesh to show the people that Christ could come into human lives and save them.

"No art, science or religion left by man, nor any literature living today that out of Christ has any effect in bringing Christ into the lives and hearts of men and women. We may not understand the processes by which Christ can come into the lives of men and women, but neither do we understand the processes by which a grain of wheat or corn grows into living stalk of grain. All we find is the manifestation of life, no the germ of life, itself. We find a mysterious wisdom directing the processes of life, but we do not know the processes themselves.

"He came to His own and His own received Him not, but to those that received Him He gave the power to believe in the processes of salvation. The coming of Christ into the world was a manifestation of power such as no man has ever yet seen. He brought a living message to men that needs not to be reconstructed; after nearly 2,000 years, so that when He asks men to believe His messages, then those that refuse to believe are left out by their own choice. Unbelievers that reject the church of God, admit that no man, except Christ, has ever come upon the stage of life whom people have revered through nearly 2,000 years.

"Christ has come that men may see light instead of darkness and He says 'Come unto me and I will give you rest.' VISITING KLANSMAN SAYS 1000 MEMBERS ARE ENROLLED HERE

ATTRIBUTES ANTI-KLAN AGITATION TO JEW AND CATHOLIC PROPAGANDA.

SAYS HOSTILE FORCES CONTROL NEWSPAPERS

Is Introduced By Unknown Man and Speaks to Big and Sympathetic Audience.

SOME OF SPEAKER'S STATEMENTS ON KLAN

The Klan in Wichita Falls has over 1,000 members, business and professional men, including ministers.

The attacks on the Klan come from newspapers controlled by Catholics or Jews. The Associated Press is controlled by Catholics and Jews.

The Klan has never flinched or tarred and feathered anyone. Sixty-five per cent of the crime in America is committed by Catholics, who constitute only 15 per cent of the population.

Floggings and tar-feather parties are committed by members of the "understrata" and by Catholics. In order to create sentiment against the Klan, and Catholic-controlled newspapers assist in this propaganda.

The Klan is increasing in membership at the rate of 2,000 daily.

Klux Klan," the speaker asserted. "to take law and order into its own hands but merely to secure evidence on violations of the law and report such facts to the proper officers."

Mr. Camp was introduced by a man unknown to anyone, apparently. The speaker stated that he did not know the man as he had met him just prior to the opening of the meeting.

In his introductory remarks, the speaker, a former layman orator, referred to the fact that he had been subpoenaed to appear before the special grand jury of the 7th district court Monday morning. He stated that if the members of the grand jury would only be present that each one would hear all that he knew about the Ku Klux Klan and that it would not be necessary for him to appear before that body.

The local clan, the speaker stated, has a membership of 1,900 and is "not composed of the riff raff and huns as is the general belief. The members are picked men, white, native born, Protestant, gentle and 100 per cent American."

During his address the speaker received loud applause frequently when he made use of patriotic expressions and discussed moral principles. He stated that the address which consumed two hours and 15 minutes, he unfurled an American flag and waving it he said, "no one has a right to touch the folds of this flag, who is not 100 per cent American."

He enumerated a number of national figures who had been "killed" by the Klan. Attorney General Daugherty and the president's secretary, were, he stated, and so is "Billy Sutz" days an enthusiastic member. He asserted that the president, if he was not a member, was in close sympathy with it.

"The Ku Klux Klan," Mr. Camp stated, "is not anti-Jew, not anti-Catholic, not anti-negro as long as they are 100 per cent Americans. There is nothing wrong with that, is there?" queried the speaker.

He said that there were only two countries in the world where the Jews had free reign to further their activities, namely England and United States. This country, he said, permits any man to worship God as he sees fit, but it also demands that all be 100 per cent American.

"That is what the Klan stands for. Is there any harm in that?" In speaking of the principle of separation of church and state he centered his attack on the Roman Catholic church. The speaker was with him and various statements evinced applause and laughter.

"Fifteen per cent of the population of the United States is Catholic, yet 65 per cent of the criminals convicted in the courts of the country are members of that faith," he asserted. He said that he had secured these figures from statistics compiled by government statisticians.

man as a sentinel who did not express his views and the information that he had obtained while in the course of his daily duties, as to law violations, except in a duly constituted meeting of the Klan. The matter is discussed, and a committee may wait on the alleged law violator, he said, informing him that it would be his duty to attend to the matter. "Each investigation has led to a vindication of the charges," he stated.
