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



His theory sounds convincing when you recall that turtles, lizards, snakes and other forms of life that bask in the warm sunlight have no hair or very little of it.

Do they develop hair to counteract loss of the sun's direct heat? Or does loss of the sun's direct

or chicken?" Science frequently runs in a circle. Face powder is a permanent feminine beautifier,

says Dr. Oliver. It acts as a mask or insulation pro tecting the complexion "from the injurious tints and wrinkles and permanent freckles caused by the ultraviolet rays of the sun."


