

ECONOMY AT EXPENSE OF NAVAL EFFICIENCY NOT WANTED.

As much as a reduction in governmental expenditures are desired it is very doubtful whether the American people desire such reductions made at the expense of the efficiency of the American navy, and even if there is such a desire the leaders of the American people ought to combat it.

The American people have approved a limitation of the American navy by which it is placed upon the the fishing season. same basis as the British navy and they have every right to expect and want it to be maintained in a high state of efficiency.

The naval appropriation now before congress would limit the naval personnel to 67,000 men. It is claimed by those in the best position to know that our limited navy cannot be maintained in the highest degree of efficiency with less than 80,000 men and that it ought to have 100,000. Any reduction in the personnel to a point lower than the highest degree of efficiency ought not to be permitted. We believed the country will stand with President Harding in demanding this.

The idea of a subsidy is generally repugnant, but if a subsidy is necessary for the existence of an American merchant marine then we ought to have a subsidy if for no other reason than to provide auxiliary service to the navy.
