GENOVA, April 12.—Prime Minister Lloyd George is expected to propose at the earliest opportunity, probably at tomorrow's sitting of commission No. 1 of the economic conference, a part of an undertaking that no nation shall attack another, thus abolishing the possibility of war for the duration of the peace.

NEW YORK, April 12.—The gates of Ludlow street jail snapped at General Semenov, chief of the Cossack forces, again today, but in vain.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Details of what was described as wanton and unprovoked killings of Russian and some American in Siberia by the forces of General Semenov were given in the Senate today at the first session of an investigation which Chairman Borah has asserted is designed to determine the responsibility for the United States of the anti-bolshevik leader.

WACO, TEXAS, April 12.—Odus Spivey, age 14, the lad who killed a teacher at McLanahan, six miles from Marlin, by striking him with an iron pipe, was today ordered to the state reformatory at Huntsville at Gatesville for one year by the Marlin juvenile court. The tragedy followed an attempt to punish the boy.

DALLAS, April 12.—The Dallas county citizens league, an anti-Ku Klux Klan organization, today mailed to all public office holders a questionnaire asking whether they belonged to and what they thought of the Ku Klux Klan.

SAN ANTONIO, April 10.—Two more soldiers are at the point of death today as a result of the explosion of pyrotechnics at Camp Bullis, Monday night, which has already claimed four men of the Seventeenth infantry. The men, whom little hope is held out for, Private Joe Russian of Orange, Texas, and Private Antonio Duarte of New Bedford, Mass. All others injured are improving and will get well.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC EXECUTIVE DENIES M'ADOO STATEMENT

PROTESTS CHARGE ROADS BREAK DOWN UNDER PRIVATE OPERATION.

GOVERNMENT CONTROL AND M'ADOO CRITICIZED

Declares Former Director Would Not Delegate Authority to Local Officers.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Another railroad official, Julius Kruttschnitt, chairman of the Southern Pacific board, appeared today before the senate interstate commerce committee and vigorously denied statements by William G. McAdoo, former director general, that the railroads had broken down under private operations and were returned to their owners by the government in as good condition as when taken over.

Mr. Kruttschnitt quoted statements by Mr. McAdoo, President Wilson and other officials that federal control was adopted, not because of private breaking down, but to obtain co-ordination of transportation during the war.

Two bad features that stood out prominently in the government operation of railroads, which were responsible for most of its shortcomings and subjected it to most criticism, said Mr. Kruttschnitt, "was extreme centralization of authority, established by the first director (Mr. McAdoo) and attributable to his temperament and unwillingness to delegate adequate and necessary powers to local officers and excessive and unintelligent standardization."

Mr. Kruttschnitt declared that Mr. McAdoo during federal control "placed his name on everything and everywhere, such as service blanks, menus, communication and railroad receipts and even on the circulation notices posted in the toilets of passenger vehicles."

ARBUCKLE CASE TO THE JURY LATE WEDNESDAY

SAN FRANCISCO, April 12.—Defense counsel will not be satisfied with dismissal of a charge against Rneoc Arbuttle in the event that the jury for the third time is unable to agree. This was the announcement of Miss McNab, chief defense counsel, made this morning. Nothing short of a definite verdict would satisfy him, he said. McNab today was scheduled to complete his argument seeking acquittal of the film comedian for responsibility for the death of Miss Virginia Rappe, film actress. Leo Friedman was expected to close the argument for the prosecution and it was considered probable that the case would be in the hands of the jury by 5 o'clock this afternoon.

DECLARES HOUSE WILL NOT YIELD VALUATION PLAN

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The declaration by Chairman Fordney of the house ways and means committee that the house would never yield on American valuation has revived discussion of the tariff question at the capital with opponents and proponents estimating their possible strength when the bill gets to conference.

Senators generally were studying today the new tariff bill as reported yesterday to the senate in preparation for the long days of controversy that are ahead on the senate floor. The several amendments to rates in the bill already have been offered from the republican side, while democratic leaders are preparing attacks on many of the rates. Democrats on the finance committee have been given ten days in which to file their minority report.

A plan is being considered of constructing a tunnel beneath the Strait of Gibraltar to Africa.

STUDENT ACCIDENTALLY KILLED BY A GOLF CLUB IN HANDS OF CLASSMATE

Haverford, Pa., April 12.—Paul Flagler Turner, a student at Haverford college, is dead as the result of a fractured skull received while playing golf. He stepped behind a classmate just as the latter swung his club for a drive. Turner received the full force of the back swing on the head. He died yesterday a few hours after being injured.

OIL MEN WILL MEET SECRETARY OF FINANCE OF REPUBLIC OF MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, April 12.—Formal conferences between Secretary of Finance de la Huerta and the representatives of five American oil companies who were in Mexico City last fall to discuss oil tax questions will start here on April 24, according to semi-official sources.

ELECT REPUBLICAN ON 'DRY' PLATFORM; MAJORITY REDUCED

CORNING, N. Y., April 12.—Unofficial returns complete for the 37th congressional district, today gave Lewis Henry, republican, a plurality of 2,087 over Judge Frank Irvine, democrat, of Illinois, in yesterday's special election. Prohibition was the dominant issue in the campaign. Judge Irvine declaring for repeal of the Volstead act. Mr. Henry stood for prohibition and was supported by prohibition organizations. The result was acclaimed by the "wets" as a victory for their side. They pointed to the fact that nearly 20,000 in 1920 when it was nearly 20,000 in the district reversed themselves today by giving pluralities to Judge Irvine. Prohibition advocates said that a large part of their vote was kept away from the polls because of the bad weather.

ACCEPTS SENTENCE IN TWO CASES THAT TOTALS 146 YEARS

AUSTIN, April 12.—Acceptance of sentences totaling 146 years in the penitentiary was announced in the court of criminal appeals today by Judge Silvester Johnson, convicted in two murder cases in Cherokee county. Johnson was sentenced to 99 years in one case and 47 years in the other. He requested that his appeal be dismissed in one case and withdrew it in the other. The court reversed and remanded for a new trial the 14 year sentence of Tom Winn, convicted in Stephens county for murder; also the 10-year sentence of Myrtle Stiles, convicted of murder in Fisher county, after rehearing was granted.

FORT WORTH, April 12.—Red Cross workers are on their way to Opalin, Callahan county, and to Cross Roads, Runnels county, to aid in the relief of storm sufferers, according to word received today from St. Louis.

RULE GOVERNMENT REVOKE GOVERNMENT PARDON

AUSTIN, TEXAS, April 12.—The authority of the governor to pardon conditional pardon known to him therein have been held by the courts today in the case of A. L. Frazier, Jr. Frazier was granted pardon by Governor Neff ordered to the penitentiary. It is alleged that the provision of the constitution which granted pardon is not a writ of habeas corpus and that the decision of the governor is not subject to judicial review.

POSTOFFICE ARRANGES OF MAIL

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The postoffice department has arranged for the delivery of mail on the earth on the 2,000 miles in the air.

RULE GOVERNOR CAN REVOKE CONDITIONAL PARDON IF VIOLATED

AUSTIN, TEXAS, April 12.—Authority of the governor to revoke conditional pardons when it is made known to him that the provisions therein have been violated was upheld by the court of criminal appeals today in the case of ex parte A. L. Frazier from Erath county. Frazier was granted a conditional pardon by Governor Neff. A short time after his release from the penitentiary it is alleged that he violated the provisions of the pardon. Governor Neff ordered him remanded to the penitentiary. Frazier sought to retain his liberty through a writ of habeas corpus in the district court. This court ordered him remanded to prison. The court of criminal appeals today upheld the decision of the district court and ordered Frazier returned to the penitentiary.

GOVERNMENT OWES 23 TIMES AS MUCH NOW AS IN 1917

CHICAGO, April 12.—The United States owes 23 times as much money now as in 1917 when the public debt was about \$1,000,000,000. Elliott Wadsworth, assistant secretary of treasury, declared in a speech before the central states group of the Investment Bankers' association last night. "This huge debt we must pass on to the future citizens of our country," he said. "For this reason, it is the intention of financial leaders of our government to pay all new debts from current funds. We are just standing still financially, as our expenses this year just about equal our revenues. "Without any surplus of revenue over expenses, we cannot decrease our public debt of \$22,500,000,000. Government expenditures must come down."

POSTOFFICE DEPARTMENT ARRANGES FOR DELIVERY OF MAIL INTO RUSSIA

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The postoffice department has entered into an agreement with the British postal authorities for the delivery of regular mail matter and parcel post packages to various points in Russia. It was announced today by First Assistant Postmaster General Bartlett. Tons of parcels, containing mostly clothing, are being forwarded each week and, according to reports received here, 75 per cent of the packages are being delivered to those to whom they were addressed.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—Secretary Hughes yesterday received from Ambassador Harvey in London a note from Lord Curzon, foreign secretary, which stated that the government of England would not in any circumstances dare to question the rights of the United States in its claim for payment of costs of the American occupation in Germany. Secretary Hughes later transmitted a note to Ambassador Harvey for delivery to the British foreign office expressing his gratification for Lord Curzon's letter and expressing hope that reimbursement for costs of the United States army in the Rhineland soon would be made.

PRINCE OF WALES HAS ARRIVED IN YOKOHAMA

YOKOHAMA, April 12.—The prince of Wales arrived today for his official visit to Japan. Thousands greeted him as he landed from the British battle cruiser, which brought him from India.

MISS BLANTON TO OPEN CAMPAIGN AT DENTON THURSDAY

DENTON, TEXAS, April 12.—In her opening campaign speech here tomorrow afternoon, Miss Annie Webb Blanton, state superintendent of public instruction, will discuss not only her own candidacy to fill the unexpired term of the late Congressman Lucian W. Parrish, but also the stand in congress of her brother, Representative Thomas L. Blanton, and the recent attacks against him, according to friends here today.

SHIPPING BOARD GETS OFFER FOR POCAHANTAS

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The shipping board yesterday received an offer of 17,000 pounds sterling for the shipping board vessel Pocahontas through Vice President Farley now in Europe. The Pocahontas, now at Malta, was under operation by the United States mail line when seized for debt in Italian waters and it cost the board \$200,000 "to get her out of hock," Chairman Lusk said.

DR. LORENZ WILL RESIDE IN THE U. S. AFTER SEPTEMBER

NEW YORK, April 12.—Dr. Adolf Lorenz was a passenger on the La France, sailing for Europe today. He was accompanied by Anton Wedl, importer, who induced him to come to this country. Dr. Lorenz, who treated thousands of cripples during his visit, at first was forced to curtail his operations because of the opposition he met from members of his own profession. He is coming back to stay in September and will bring his family, which consists of his wife and two sons, with him. The elder son, who is 26, is a physician and his father's chief surgical assistant, having taken care of his practice in Vienna while his father was in this country. The younger son, who is nearly 18, will enter Columbia next fall, preparatory to beginning a medical career. When it was suggested to him that he might like America as well enough upon his return to become an American citizen, he said: "I hope my son will become an American citizen."

ENCOUNTER A GOOD SAND IN DEEP TEST AT SUNSHINE HILL

Frank Baldwin and Associates have encountered a good sand in their deep test on the Eads tract in the Sunshine Hill district and are setting casing to test. The sand was reached at 1,694 feet and was penetrated to 1,698, showing considerable oil. This is the first deep test put down in the district within the past year although several machines are at work drilling for the shallower pay.

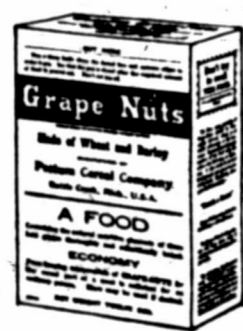

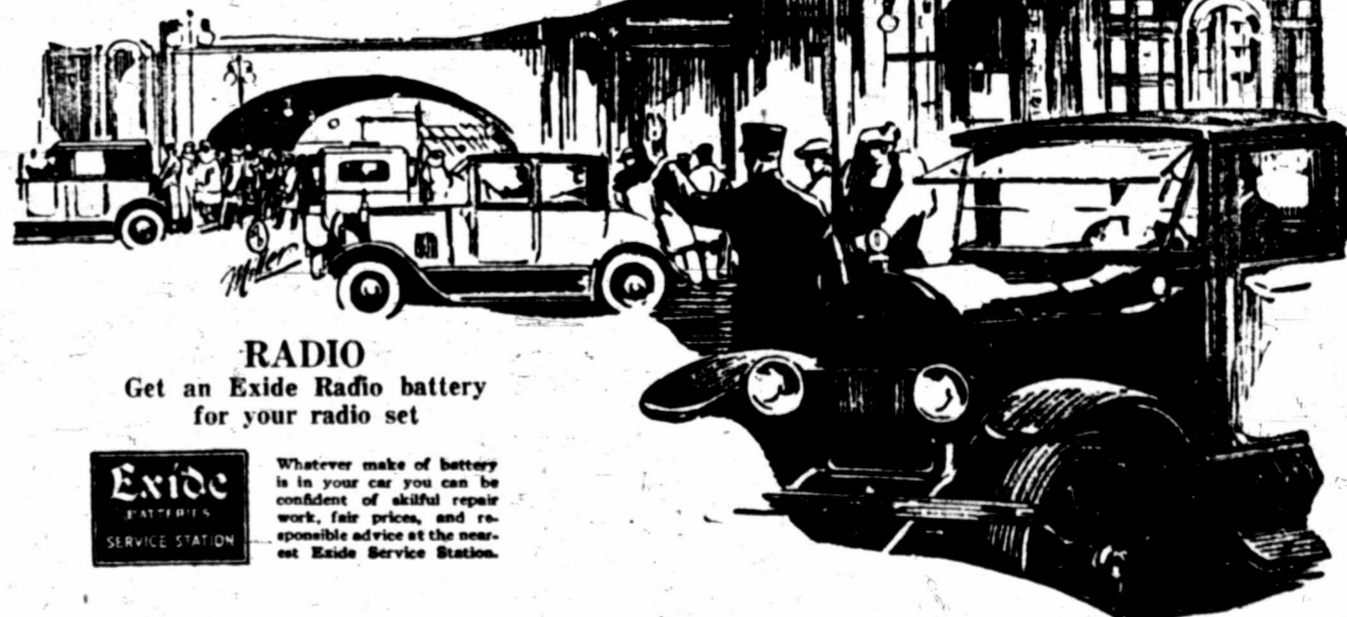

With one arrest already made and with another expected some time during the day, Wednesday, city police were confident that they had sufficient evidence on which to file charges against a man and a woman alleged to have severely beaten O. B. Kelly late last Saturday night.

Kelly, who was a candidate for mayor in the recent municipal election, has been confined to his bed since the fight.

Detectives who worked on the case Monday and Tuesday declared this morning that Kelly was the victim of one of the prettiest "frame-ups" they had ever seen. Six persons were questioned in regard to the attack and each of the six stories tallied exactly in essential points. It was only by accident that the officers found evidence that allied to a solution of the whole affair.

The identity of the parties involved in the fight was not made public Wednesday but it is understood that only two charges will be filed.

Kelly was attacked shortly before midnight Saturday as he was nearing the intersection of Lee and Third streets.

FITTS DENIES THAT AN AGED MAN WAS HANDLED ROUGHLY

Charges made before the city council Monday night that an aged man had been roughly handled by a policeman Sunday were branded as false by Police Commissioner J. B. Fitts, Tuesday. An investigation of the affair in which Patrolman E. L. Hoskins, the officer mentioned as having abused his prisoner convinced the commissioner that he had been guilty of no breach of the official code, was regarded Wednesday as being closed.

Mr. Fitts did not know who the aged man was, nor did he know his address, but he was quite sure the alleged victim was mistaken in his charges that he had been misused. Neither was the commissioner informed as to whether the alleged victim had just been released from a hospital after undergoing a major operation.

According to information developed by the investigation, the man was found on Scott street near the Times office late Sunday night. He was apparently under the influence of an opiate and was locked up until he revived. Night Chief McDonald later ordered him released and sent him to his rooms in an automobile, accompanied by a policeman.

Hoskins, who made the arrest and who later took the man home, bears the reputation of being an efficient and gentlemanly officer. He emphatically denies that he handled the man roughly.

FEEDING THE FLAMES OF PREJUDICE.

Presumably as one of the reasons for the existence of the Ku Klux Klan a speaker for the Klan is going about the country saying that the press is controlled by Catholics and particularly that the Associated Press, the country's foremost news-gathering agency is controlled by Catholics.
There may be some question about the propriety of dignifying such a declaration with a denial, but it is with such misrepresentation that the flames of prejudice are fed. The truth is that the press is no more controlled by the Catholics than it is by the Presbyterians, the Methodists, the Baptists, the Christian Scientists, the Seventh Day Adventists, the Jews or any other denomination.

THE EASIEST WAY.

The trouble with most people is that they seek an easy answer to a difficult problem, says Bishop Page of Boston.
"The other day I was shown two lottery tickets bought by women. Thousands of people have bought these tickets. Millions of dollars are spent in worthless stocks, oil and others. So many young men, even well trained ones, are impatient of the slow processes of earning money by constructive effort. They seek the easy way."
"The easiest way is called, by psychologists and scientists, "the line of least resistance." Usually it leads to failure. Are you, unconsciously, following it? Most people are.

THE TIME IS NOW.

A few months ago dispatches carried the announcement that the four living Ball brothers at Muncie, Indiana, and the estate of another brother had given \$1,000,000 for educational and welfare work.
"We are giving \$1,000,000 because we believe it to be better to do such things while we are living than to allow others to do it after we are dead," explained one of the brothers in announcing the gift. "Life at best is short and uncertain and the time for men who have it to do good with their money is when they can personally direct the use of it. Nobody has ever found a way of taking his money with him to wherever he goes after he dies. We are glad to make these gifts to these institutions and for these purposes, not only because we believe it to be a good thing to do but because of the satisfaction we receive in knowing that we may be responsible to some slight extent in aiding humanity."
There are few men of wealth who do not leave bequests for charity or for other philanthropic work. But isn't the plan of Ball brothers of making gifts while they are yet living and getting satisfaction out of seeing the good done a better way?

LARGE INCREASE IN THE PRODUCTION OF OYSTERS THIS YEAR

AUSTIN, TEXAS, April 12.—Texas will show a large increase in the production of oysters this year over last year, according to W. W. Boyd, game, fish and oyster commissioner, when all figures relating to the industry are received at his office. The season closed April 1 and the only oysters that may be sold now are from private beds. According to Commissioner Boyd the tax receipts so far this year are \$2,000 more than they were last year at this time.

There are thousands of acres in the state oyster beds, extending from Galveston to Rockport in the water along the gulf, Commissioner Boyd said. In many places the oysters are so thick, he said, that they grow only to the size of a man's thumb, and it is necessary to use a dredge to thin them out on the reefs so that they can attain their proper size.

The dredge used to break up the thick beds on the reefs was in operation from September 1, 1921 to April 1 of this year, according to Commissioner Boyd, and will be placed in operation again in the fall, probably on September 1, with the opening of the oyster season.

The oysters sold now, Commissioner Boyd explained, are those grown in private beds, planted by private individuals who pay rent to the state for the use of the beds.

The dredge was self-supporting until March 1, Commissioner Boyd said, through the sale of oysters and other work.

The total tax on fish and oysters for 1921 was approximately \$27,500. For 1920 it was \$26,000.

There were 47,140 barrels of oysters taken from the state beds in 1921 on which tax was collected and a tax was paid on 4,162,092 pounds of fish the same year. The tax on oysters is 1 cent a barrel for wholesalers and 2 cents a barrel for retailers. The tax on fish is \$1 a thousand pounds for wholesalers and \$2 a thousand pounds for retailers.

In 1920 there were 29,482 barrels of oysters taken from the beds and 3,591,460 pounds of fish.

The increase in the production has been gradual, according to commissioner Boyd. He expects about the same, if not a little greater, percentage of increase in 1922 over 1921 as was had in 1921 over 1920.

Reef cultivation cannot be done this summer because of lack of funds, the appropriation for the work having been used up. Cultivation will start again September 1, according to Commissioner Boyd.

LONE WOLF OF THE ARCTIC

SAN FRANCISCO, April 12.—Captain C. D. Pedersen, "lone wolf of the Arctic," is hurrying to get a ringside seat under the Aurora borealis.

From that vantage point he wants to watch history's greatest international marathon across the top of the world in which the untold riches of the northland will reward the victor.

Principals in the international race to the pole will be Roald Amundsen, discoverer of the south pole, who'll represent Norway, and Vilhjalmur Stefansson, who'll carry the flag of Great Britain.

They'll start as soon as the ice breaks up—Amundsen from Seattle with a ship equipped with airplane and radio, Stefansson from Wrangell Island with the old-fashioned equipment of dog sled.

Stake is Large.
The two explorers tell the world they'll shut themselves off from civilization and risk their lives in Arctic ice-packs for the glory of discovery and scientific achievement.

But "Wolf" Pedersen says there's more than that in the expedition. He sees a race for vast treasures hidden behind the ice barriers.

He says the explorers are seeking for Norway and England great radium mines, vast oil fields and coal deposits, fossil ivory, diamonds,

areas of fertile land where reindeer thrive.

And Pedersen ought to know. For every year in the last quarter century the "lone wolf" has carried the American flag into the Arctic at the masthead of his whaling schooner "Herman."

Recovered Amundsen.
He's one of the amazing solvers of northland mysteries. He knows the ice lanes of the north as you know the streets of your city. Scarcely two years ago he rescued Amundsen when the famous explorer was marooned in an ice sea.

"I cannot believe," Pedersen says, "that England and Norway have gone to this great expense purely for exploration purposes."

"For I myself have seen oil ooze from the ground and form a lake near Point Barrow—oil so pure that natives burn it in lamps without refining!"

"And I have seen coal beds so easily tapped that even the lazy natives use them."

Radium and Diamonds.
"That is not all—I have heard tales of fossil ivory, of turps, of radium, of great meteoric diamond beds that formerly furnished crown jewels for Russia. The wealth of the Arctic is tremendous."

The crack of the opening ice will be the starting signal for the great international race—the old method versus the new, the patient Arctic dog versus the airplane and ship.

Pedersen now is clearing his whaler for a start north—

And when the contestants leap forward Pedersen will be "in the grandstand" beneath the northern lights!

NEW GAS MAY SOLVE MANY AIR PROBLEMS

Resembles Helium But is Said to Be Much Cheaper to Manufacture.

LOS ANGELES, April 12.—A new non-inflammable gas resembling helium, but said to be 88 per cent cheaper to manufacture, is being perfected here by Dr. E. Curren, chief of the research department of a local aircraft company.

The new gas, "currenium," will revolutionize lighter-than-air navigation, if it lives up to the promises made for it, aviation experts who are experimenting with it asserted.

Explosions such as destroyed Britain's ZR-2 and America's Rona will be impossible if currenium comes into common use, it is claimed.

It is as safe to handle as helium, Dr. Curren said, and can be manufactured without the almost prohibitive cost of that gas.

"The United States government estimates the cost of producing helium at \$130 per thousand cubic feet," said George B. Harrison, an official of the company which is perfecting Dr. Curren's discovery. "Helium can only be produced in the Texas-Kansas oil fields."

"Currenium on the other hand, can be manufactured commercially, somewhat as oxygen is produced for welding, and the cost of production is only in the neighborhood of 80 per thousand cubic feet."

A flame was passed through Currenium in demonstrations given here, proving it to be non-inflammable. It is also non-explosive, laboratory experts said.

"This gas is approximately as light as hydrogen," the discoverer

Dr. Curren, explained to those witnessing the tests.

"By the processes we have worked out, we increase its original buoyancy so that its life will be about 22 pounds per thousand cubic feet, or about the same as pure hydrogen."

"It is the intention of our 'currenium' to install plants throughout the country for its manufacture for airship use."

The same company is also engaged in the manufacture of other innovations in aviation, including a new type of airplane propeller with a helioid projection which is said to give a great increase of efficiency at the hub. The helioid propeller is the invention of Charles S. Hall.

A new type of aircraft is under construction at the company's plant and laboratories here, known as the "Airway Load Carrier." It is designed for commercial transportation. The builders plan a series of trial trips with passengers and freight between California points and New York and Chicago in the near future.

ENEMY NATIONS AND RUSSIA MEET ALLIES

Great Genoa Conference Has Two Thousand Delegates And Advisers.

(Written for the United Press)

Whether Europe is to remain united in economic and territorial rivalry or is to co-operate for general salvation will be decided at the Genoa conference which opens Monday, April 10. For the first time since the ending of the war, the enemy nations and Russia will be permitted to meet the allies on equal terms. There will be little conflict between the allies as a whole and the conquered nations. Rather, what antagonism develop at Genoa will be primarily between France and Great Britain.

The Genoa conference is likely to witness an Anglo-French struggle for the economic leadership of Europe. Great Britain wants the enemy countries and Russia to be treated leniently and assisted to their feet, so that there can be a quick revival of international trade. France is interested very little in that subject. The French people are largely self-supporting and do not depend primarily on foreign trade for their prosperity. Therefore, France wants to ensure collection of the full war indemnity from Germany and demands indemnity from Russia to recognize her foreign obligations—due mostly to Frenchmen—before there is any agreement about helping everybody at large to prosper.

War War Indemnity.

The French have succeeded in barring any reference to the war indemnity from the Genoa program. If France's delegates can hold the representatives of the other nations to this policy during the two months which the conference is expected to last, Premier Poincaré will have scored a victory. Despite the absence of the reparations question from the program, however, there are many ways by which it may be brought to the front. M. Poincaré threatens to order the French delegates to leave the conference if this is done.

Should such a crisis arise, the European powers will then have to decide whether they can proceed with the reconstruction of Europe by mutual co-operation, while leaving France out. Frenchmen are fearful of just such an attempt at Genoa to isolate France. So, if Premier Poincaré formally summons the French delegation to return to Paris he may be overthrown by the chamber of deputies and a new government, perhaps headed by Clemenceau, may succeed him. The French course, because of the many complications involved, is bound to prove a potent source of disquiet while the conference lasts.

Russia in the Crisis.

The effort of Great Britain to open up the Russian markets to international trade will reach its climax at Genoa. British experts have reached the conclusion that Russia will remain economically impotent until the Moscow government is able to float loans abroad for agricultural reconstruction and rebuilding of the railways.

But loans are impossible as long as the Russian government is not recognized. Therefore, Great Britain will seek to influence the Genoa delegates to recommend to their home governments that the bolsheviks be accepted as constituting the formal government of Russia. France is certain to make objection unless the bolsheviks agree to repay Frenchmen for the money they have lost through the confiscation of Russian industries. Before the war, French investors bought Russian securities heavily. France wants back the money equivalent of these securities as the price of recognizing the Moscow regime.

There will be about two thousand delegates and principal advisers at Genoa. At the Paris peace conference there 100. This enormous increase is due to the international democratization of Europe since the close of the war. Instead of a little group of statesmen controlling Europe's destiny, Europe as a whole is now returning to normal self-determination.

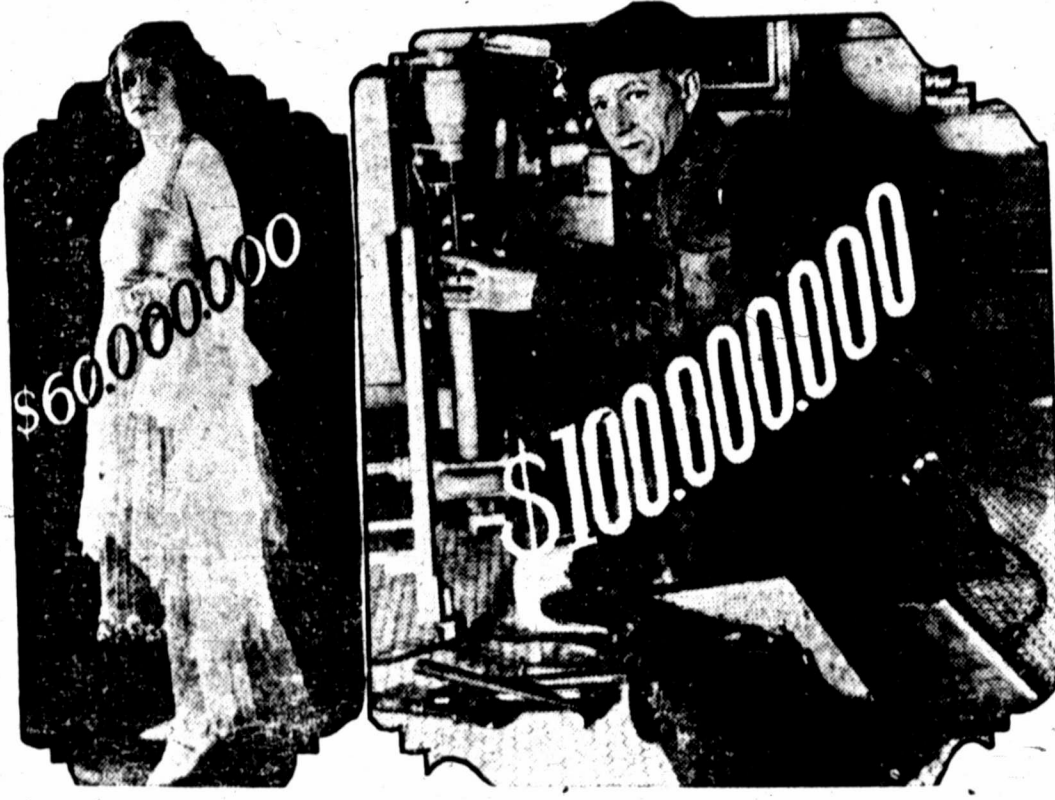

Because she wants to fight in person before a British court for the \$50,000,000 fortune of Sir Jo-

slah Wedgewood to which she believes herself heirless.

She can't get the fortune until she proves the legal marriage 127 years ago of the American progenitor of the Wedgewood family.

In those days few records were kept, but Miss Wedgewood hopes to establish the marriage of her ancestor by taking a dozen representatives of American families descended from marriages of Revolutionary days and showing that no documentary evidence of their ancestors' marriages can be produced.

"I'm going to fight my own fight. Watch and see me win," she says.

With his life's savings Glenn Bell, 35—a week mechanic, has engaged the best legal talent he can find to fight for a fortune that has been eluding his ancestors for almost three centuries.

As national chairman of the Woodrow Wilson foundation, Mr. Roosevelt said that, in spite of the fact that no effort has been made in other lands to secure contributions for the endowment of public service awards being created in honor of the national and international services of the former president, nearly every mail brings one or two gifts from Mr. Wilson's admirers on other continents.

Among the districts outside the boundaries of the United States that have furnished founders, Mr. Roosevelt named England, France, Germany, Spain, Italy, Turkey, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Armenia, Monte Carlo, Sweden, Netherlands, China, Persia, South Africa, Australia, Canada, Brazil, Chile, Panama, Mexico, Alaska, Bermuda, Bahama Islands, Hawaii, Porto Rico and the Philippines.

"The movement to honor Mr. Wilson," said Mr. Roosevelt, "is primarily American. It is an Ameri-

can movement by men and women of all parties to recognize a great American. But in doing that, we as Americans, are proud and happy to have the enthusiastic support and assistance of thinking men and women in every part of the civilized world."

HOLD LITERARY AND ATHLETIC MEET AT IOWA PARK FRIDAY

HIGH AND WARD SCHOOLS OF TWELVE COUNTIES TO BE REPRESENTED.

CONTESTS CONTINUE THROUGH SATURDAY

Successful Entrants Will Complete in Finals at Austin in May.

Iowa Park will be host Friday and Saturday to several hundred students and teachers, representing high and ward schools in 12 north Texas counties, gathered there for the district interscholastic meet. The contests to be staged during the two day period constitute another of the elimination trials that will eventually decide winners of state titles in the various debates, declamations, music memory numbers and athletic features.

County meets, designed to qualify entrants for the district events, were held throughout the section two weeks ago, while at the same time a meet of similar character was held by the Wichita Falls schools. This city, having a population of over 25,000, is not required to enter its representatives in a county meet, but may enter them for competition in the district trials. ALLEGES PROPERTY UNLAWFULLY TAKEN ASKS \$7000 DAMAGE

B. W. Davis, whose case against John P. Williams was on trial before a jury in the 75th district court Wednesday morning, alleges in his petition that he was dispossessed unlawfully of his property and asks judgment in the sum of \$7,000.

The plaintiff contends that he rented a vacant lot from the defendant in Burkburnett in May, 1919, for which he agreed to pay \$25 per month. He alleges that on September 4, the defendant demanded \$250 from him and that when he refused to pay this amount the property stored on the lot consisting of lumber, saws, iron and well supplies was seized and held.

The defendant in the way of answering the allegations contends that he had rented the lot to the plaintiff for a period of one year and that when the plaintiff attempted to move the property from the lot that he demanded the remainder of the year's rental.

CARRYING OUT THE OPEN DOOR POLICY AT WHITE HOUSE

By RAYMOND CLAPPER United Press Staff Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—President Harding, carrying out his policy of open door at the white house, is shaking hands annually with more than 150,000, those friends estimate.

He is breaking all white house handshaking records, the oldest attaches say. The handshaking list probably averages close to 3,000 a week, counting the numerous white house receptions to official society and the scores of conventions which meet in the capital each year.

As a result, tourist guides and rubberneck wagon managers are reaping a golden harvest.

With the coming of spring, hundreds of out-of-town visitors troop up to the white house daily to shake hands with President Harding. If they have the proper letter of introduction from their congressmen—who in view of the approaching campaign is only too glad to issue these—they are likely to have little trouble in passing by the alert secret service men into the big round room where President Harding works.

The open door at the white house has been a railroad, companies and sightseeing excursion managers. Whole schools, sometimes numbering 400 or 500 students, flock in. Delegates from almost every convention that meets in Washington are sure of being received by the president. School teachers, lodge members and large families crowd into the small executive offices and stand in line to be ushered into the president's office.

Once the preliminaries are arranged through a friendly congressman or senator, the rest is easy. The delegation gathers in the white house grounds in front of the executive offices just before 1 o'clock, when the president's business engagements for the day are supposed to end. Police officers and secret service men line up the visitors in double file and start them back through the corridor to the president's office in the rear of the building. Two secret service men man the door leading into the president's office and the visitors are guided into single file and each person is carefully scrutinized as he passes the guards. A request is made to keep their hands out of their pockets and no one is allowed to carry packages. The United States secret service takes no chances.

President Harding, on these occasions, leaves his big arm chair and takes a position out in the center of his office. Although the visitors are rushed through at the rate of about thirty a minute, President Harding by long practice has acquired a knack of giving a warm personal greeting to each one. Usually there is a brief pleasantries.

Women often tell him they cast their first vote for him. Old men who voted first for Lincoln are frequent. President Harding always mentions that red letter day in their early life. Some mistake a dignified secret service man at the president's elbow for a cabinet member or other high official and shake hands with him, too.

"Doesn't he just look like a president?" most visitors exclaim on reaching the outside air. Sometimes Laddie Boy, the white house Alrodale who is brought over to meet the president as he goes to the white house proper for lunch, is playing around impatiently and he must submit to fondling.

Through the white house every week also. Cards are easily obtainable and the doors are practically open to all who come. They go upstairs and wander around in the east room examining the gilt opera grand piano on which Paderewski and many other famous musicians have played.

Sometimes Mrs. Harding happens to be passing and the tourists have the privilege of chatting with her a few minutes.

GETS JAIL SENTENCE

At last an effective preventive for traffic accidents has been discovered. It consists of sending all traffic law violators to jail. A jail sentence is hard on a speeding or careless autoist. But the families and friends of street accident victims in Wichita Falls will tell you that death and injuries are distressing, too. Careful automobile drivers of all persons at the wheels of motor vehicles would welcome law enforcement that would make the streets safe for themselves and for pedestrians. The Times suggests that law enforcement officials read this story carefully. It tells what jail terms have accomplished in Detroit and Cleveland towards reducing traffic accidents.

Martin Blecke, in charge of traffic, predicts a 50 per cent reduction as soon as the traffic courts of Detroit and Cleveland have a chance to percolate thoroughly among the ranks of the "bandit drivers." "One of our motorcycle men, who usually has 40 arrests a week," said Judge Corbett, "ought only two speeders going more than 25 mi. an hour last week." Women in Cleveland get workhouse terms the same as men. "It makes no difference to the victim of an autoist whether the car is driven by a man or woman," said Judge Corbett in sentencing Mrs. Elizabeth Cheney, society woman, to two days in the workhouse for driving her lecture automobile past a street car as four passengers got off.
