RUSSIA MEETS FINANCIAL DEMAND

150,000 ACRES ARE COVERED BY WATER; NINE TOWNS FLOODED

LEADERS REPORT FURTHER GAINS IN NON-UNION FIELDS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 13.—Continued gains in non-union fields were claimed today by the United Mine Workers of America for the nationwide suspension of work in the coal-mining industry with the union's announcement that 655,000 miners are now participating in the walkout.

HELENA, Ark., April 13.—With approximately 150,000 acres in Phillips county under water, 50 workmen were dispatched to Old Town today following a report that another 60 foot slough occurred just south of the original 69 foot slough.

THE largest town inundated in Elaine, with a population of 450, and other towns include Lambrook, Countiss, Lundell, Ratio, Melwood, Lacombe, Modoc and Ferguson.

It has not been determined how many persons have been driven from their homes. The Missouri Pacific railroad has placed 150 box cars along its Memphis, Helena and Louisiana branch for the refugees.

AUSTIN, April 13.—Three cases bearing on the Ku Klux Klan were submitted to the court of criminal appeals this morning. They are those of J. C. Jennings, H. G. Miller and Walter Martin, who were cited for contempt of court for refusing to answer questions about the Ku Klux Klan. The men seek relief from the order imposing a fine and jail sentence on them. They refused to testify as to their membership in the Klan.

MOTIONS FOR REHEARING IN CASES AT AUSTIN

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AUSTRALIAN AIRMAN AND LIEUTENANT ARE KILLED IN A FLIGHT

LONDON, April 13.—Sir Ross Smith, the Australian aviator, who, with his brother, Sir Keith, had planned to start from Crofton April 25 on a flight around the world, was killed when his plane crashed in a practice flight at Crofton today.

Lieutenant Bennett, an engineer, who was planning to accompany Sir Ross and his brother on their around-the-world flight, also was killed.

The machine which crashed was the one the Smiths intended to use in their flight. Captain Conker Hill of the Vickers company had previously flown it for a half hour and then handed it over to Captain Smith.

As the machine was approaching the airfield to land it got into a spin and the crash followed. The accident occurred 15 minutes after Captain Smith and Lieutenant Bennett began their flight. Sir Keith had intended to make the trial flight with them, but he arrived too late.

The machine had climbed gracefully to a height of about 3,000 feet when suddenly her nose dipped and she went into a spin, which became faster and faster until the machine crashed into the earth with terrific impact that the plane was splintered.

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THREE REPORTED KILLED 20,000 POUNDS POWDER EXPLODE THURSDAY

CHARLESTON, S. C., April 13.—Three workmen were reported killed and several others injured in an explosion of 20,000 pounds of powder this afternoon in a building near the Charleston general ordinance depot, ten miles from here. One of the men killed was J. Hill of Virginia, who was blown to pieces. The others were reported workmen. Thirty or more workmen were near the scene of the explosion. They ran, but some were said to have been injured.

CHICAGO, April 13.—The livestock industry has set the pace for agricultural readjustment and indications are that it will continue to exert a dominant influence in the return of business to normal conditions, according to a quarterly report issued today by S. B. Stafford, president of the livestock exchange.

RAILROADS EARN 4.57 PER CENT ON THEIR INVESTMENT

WASHINGTON, April 13.—Railroads in the United States—exclusive of lines with less than \$1,000,000 in gross revenue—earned during February \$47,762,606, according to interstate commerce commission reports compiled by the association of railway executives. There was an operating deficit of \$5,176,867 during the same month in 1921. The February earnings indicate an annual return rate of 4.57 per cent on the property investment.

BAD WEATHER DELAYS PORTUGUESE AVIATORS

LISBON, April 13.—Bad weather conditions prevented a start today by Captains Naredura and Coutinho, the Portuguese aviators, on their third stage of their flight to Brazil from the Cape Verde islands, to St. Paul Rock, in mid-Atlantic. The aviators called here this forenoon that the conditions would make it impossible for them to leave before Sunday.

GOV. COX OUTLINES CAMPAIGN ISSUES IN FALL ELECTIONS

LOUISVILLE, KY., April 13.—James M. Cox, former democratic candidate for president, speaking before the Woodrow Wilson club at its annual dinner here last night, outlined the issues which, in his judgment, will be presented to the congressional elections this year. "It simply will be necessary," he said, "to articulate the grievance against the present administration which has fastened itself upon every community in America."

POINCARÉ OPPOSES A MEETING TO DISCUSS GERMAN REPARATIONS

PARIS, April 13.—Premier Poincaré is opposed to the holding of a meeting of the allied supreme council in Geneva to consider Germany's reply to the reparations commission's ruling on the question of a partial moratorium, it became known today. Moreover, it is regarded in French official circles that there is little likelihood of the question coming up before the allied governments until May 21 when the next German payment under the old schedule comes due.

REITERATES STATEMENT GERMANY CANNOT PAY

GENOVA, April 13.—Karl Bergmann, German representative with the reparations commission at Paris, who arrived here today, reiterated the previous statements made by Germany's behalf. "It would be impossible for Germany to make the reparations payments required of her except through a foreign loan which would improve German exchange. Further taxation in Germany would be unbearable, he declared.

DISCOUNT RATE OF BANK OF ENGLAND FURTHER REDUCED

LONDON, April 13.—The Bank of England today reduced its discount rate to 4 per cent. The last previous reduction was on February 16 last when the rate was dropped from 5 to 4 1/2 per cent.

NEW YORK, April 13.—With the exception of Switzerland, Great Britain now has the lowest bank rate in the world as a result of the Bank of England reducing its discount rate to four per cent today.

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EFFICIENCY NOT POLITICS AIM OF BUREAU REMOVALS

HARDING WANTS DEPARTMENT REORGANIZED ON BUSINESS BASIS. NO DANGER OF A RAID ON THE CIVIL SERVICE

Neither the President or Members of Cabinet Contemplate Such Move.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—It is fair to say that the country far from Washington is excited about the civil service as a result of the news that the cabinet members and some of the heads of important departments. It does not apply to so much of the agitation that is in congress. There are more than a few congressmen and senators who would like to raid the civil service and raid it thoroughly. As a rule, they are not the biggest men.

The really big politicians in both parties are satisfied with the civil service. They think that patronage is on the whole a liability rather than an asset. They have an aversion to the effect that for every office there are ten applicants and that the appointment results in one disgraced and nine disgruntled ones. But there are in congress and the senate quite a few new republicans who have not had experience enough to have picked up this bit of wisdom.

As to Harding personally. It is clear that his position is that he is not going to carry through his ambition to reorganise several departments of the government on a basis of greater efficiency and economy. It is a fair inference that he has been provoked by some of the obstacles. He will make the government efficient within the civil service if he can. If he cannot, he will modify the civil service so far as he deems necessary and go as far as he is able to do it by executive order.



Mr. Harding is about the last man to act in so brusque a manner with out good cause. Everybody who listens to Harding talk observes that such words as "becoming," "proper" and "fitting" and the properties appear in his vocabulary with emphatic frequency. They reflect Harding's point of view about this relations with other human beings. He is not a man to "blow up" without cause.

Harding a Patient Man.
There are stories about Washington to the effect that on a few occasions since he has been president, Mr. Harding has shown strong feeling in finally putting over a program determined upon. But his patience so prolonged as to make it clear to everybody that the methods of patience and gentleness would not be the program through.

Nineteen times out of twenty it seems to be a fixed principle with Harding to go the limit of patience. Some of his former associates recall that when he was editing the Marion Star, and was moved to write something in strong feeling, it was frequently his way to put the manuscript in his desk over night and then not to write it. On at least one occasion since he has been president he is said to have written an analogous course after a letter which he was moved to write at a moment of feeling.

All in all, it is incredible that President Harding should have dismissed these civil servants in just the way he did without having had enough contact with the situation to be deeply moved by it and without feeling sure that the subsequent investigation would justify him.

That these particular removals were made for the purpose of giving jobs to republicans cannot be argued successfully. If the motive were to "help something over" on the civil service it would have been done with the deliberations of guilt. There is a strong feeling on the part of many business men who have recently come into the government to the effect that many of the higher officials of bureaus should not be within the civil service, but should be within the personal appointment of the men at the head of the department.

Bureau chiefs and the like are the "key men" of the organization and a new man at the head of a department, wishing to do a thorough job of reorganization, cannot be expected to do it well and speedily unless he can appoint his own "key men."

Every business man and every one who has had any contact with problems of organization realize this.

FERGUSON'S LATEST POLITICAL MOVE.

James E. Ferguson, candidate for the senatorial nomination, has announced that a petition will be circulated to have the democratic state committee submit the question of legalizing the sale of beer and light wines to the democratic primary in July.

It will be necessary to secure the signatures of ten per cent of the number of democratic votes cast in the last election. It is probable that the number of signatures can be obtained.

While the dispatches do not state just what the proponents of the petition will seek to have placed upon the ballot, it is presumed that it will seek only an expression of the voters for the information and direction of the Texas representatives in congress.

It is improbable that the voters of the state will declare in favor of light wines and beer. While it is admitted that there is some sentiment in a revision of the prohibition laws in this respect, it cannot be believed that the voters of Texas are ready for such a change.

There has been a lot of talk about home-brew, violations of the prohibition laws and desire for light wines and beer, but on the whole prohibition is proving helpful and satisfactory and the majority sentiment is rather in favor of strengthening the law and its enforcement than for making any other changes.

While written before the announcement of Ferguson's intention to circulate his light wines and beer petition the following editorial from the Houston Chronicle is interesting and timely in this discussion. The Chronicle says:

"The measure of the enforcement of the prohibition law differs widely in different cities, but it is but fair to take the country as a whole. It has been customary to take the number of arrests for drunkenness as a test as to the relation of liquor to and its effect upon social conditions.

"We have the benefit of the conclusions of an impartial observer based on such a test.

"Sir Arthur Newholme, late principal medical officer of the social government board of England, has lately published a book entitled 'Prohibition in America,' in which he states the conclusion that 'probably over something like nine-tenths of territory of the United States prohibition is being enforced fairly well.'

"He uses the figures of arrests for drunkenness in the following nine American cities, for the years 1917, 1918, 1919, 1920: Baltimore, Boston, Louisville, Minneapolis, New Orleans, New York, Philadelphia, San Francisco and Waterbury, Conn.

"The figures are as follows: In 1917, 171,289; 1918, 141,163; 1919, 95,000; 1920, 60,066. It will be seen that the arrests in 1920 were more than 60 per cent less than in 1917.

"P. W. Wilson, formerly a member of the parliament of England, and until recently the American correspondent of the London Daily News, says in his recent report to Great Britain: 'Prohibition has come to stay. It is a policy particularly approved by women. It has virtually stopped the consumption of beer and has enormously reduced the consumption of wine and spirits.'

"The New York Herald, a paper noted for its independence and freedom from partisanship, has been conducting an investigation, and says: 'Practically all reports agree that in nearly all parts of the country there has been a marked decrease in crime, and a decrease of insanity cases in some sections, and, judging by court records, an improvement in domestic relations.'

"Nearly one-half of the physicians of the United States declare whiskey unnecessary as a therapeutic agent and seven out of 10 declare wine to be unnecessary. As to prescribing beer as a medical remedy, the majority of physicians against it is overwhelming, the proportion in Cincinnati, Ohio, a great beer city, being nine for and 99 against.

"The most surprising reports come from Peoria, Ill.—once headquarters of the distilling interests, of which city ruin was predicted if prohibition prevailed. The chamber of commerce there has put out a signed statement that each of the two years, 1920 and 1921, the bank clearings have increased \$15,000,000, and more men are employed than ever before, even in buildings formerly devoted to whiskey.

"Probably the fairest statement is made by the New York Times: 'Observers who try to see the situation as it is will incline to the belief that prohibition is not such a failure as its enemies insist, or so much of a success as its friends claim. That it has made a big change for the better in industrial circles is the verdict of the employers of labor. That such seems to be a certainty, among all the uncertainties, and it is not a little.'

"These statistics are from wholly impartial sources, and furnish food for careful and prayerful thought.

"They augur well for the future, and presage the broad success of a policy which many good people, prompted by honest convictions, strenuously opposed."

THE ENDOCRINE MYSTERY.

The psycho-analysis craze threatens to be eclipsed by the wave of curiosity about the endocrine glands, now sweeping the nation. The gland specialists put it like this:

Near your windpipe is the thyroid gland. It works on the principle of a gas valve. By regulating the amount of energy produced and consumed in your body, the thyroid controls your speed of living—makes the human auto a racer or a creeper, physically, mentally and emotionally.

The adrenal glands, attached to the kidneys, are the glands of combat. They mobilize energy for emergencies, making you frightened or brave during a crisis.

The pituitary gland, located in a cave in the skull, has for its chief function the regulation of the growth of the skeleton and supporting tissues. Giants and dwarfs, say the scientists, are simply individuals with overactive or subnormal pituitary secretions.

Less important endocrine glands are the pineal, thymus, interstitial, pancreas and parathyroids.

Most mysterious parts of the body are the glands. Doctors are learning about them rapidly. Tinkering with them, they produce astounding changes in health, emotions and intellect.

For instance, the type of mental deficit known as a cretin was once supposed incurable. Now cretinism is recognized as thyroid deficiency.

A cretin, fed thyroid extract from sheep, begins growing normally and develops intelligence close to normal. If a cretin stops his thyroid diet, mental and physical deterioration set in almost overnight.

Or, say scientists, it is possible to take an erratic genius and pull him down to normal by treating his glands.

Extreme gland-fans picture the world as peopled by a mass of normal slaves ruled by individuals with abnormal glands.

Some gland specialists reach Haeckel's conclusion; that the body and being are nothing but chemical machines. They see a vast amount of potential human thought imprisoned in a bottle of iodine, the element that is the very life of the thyroid.

Nevertheless, the glandularists are unable to prove that emotions and intellect are merely expressions of glandular conditions instead of glandular conditions being expressions of emotions and intellect.

In the last analysis, the controversy among glandularists is whether mind controls matter or matter controls mind.

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Girls, Here's Dr. Bishop's Recipe For Beauty

By DR. R. H. BISHOP Many a girl and young woman fails to make the most of pretty or attractive features because she is ignorant of how to take care of her face.

Skin authorities all have different routines which they recommend but the one which seems to have the best results is this:

At night scrub the face and neck thoroughly with warm water, almost hot, and use any mild soap which you may have found agreeable to your skin.

A coarse wash cloth of face brush should be employed. Rub thoroughly with warm water and then dash on some cold water.

A few drops of benzoin added to account of probably thinking of soap as unimportant, closing the pores and removing the oiliness.

Whether you use a night or grease cream depends upon the condition of your skin. If it is not dry and scaly, do not use the cream just as a matter of course, because it will only make your skin unnecessarily oily.

In the morning wash the face in cold water, without soap, and apply a vanishing cream.

A simple home-made cold cream that may be used in cleansing the skin of the face and in removing dried dead skin particles can be made with the following materials:

One-ounce of spermaceti, one ounce of white wax, five ounces of oil of sweet almonds, one and one-half ounces of rosewater, and 20 grains of chloride of potash, dissolved in the oil.

As the old skin is gradually carried away by this method, all unsightly blemishes of the face will disappear gradually and harmlessly.

Texas Viewpoints

Houston Chronicle: Lexticography presents no exception to the prevailing rule and reign of progress, and there has been within the realm of the word a new word introduced, cent past a new vernacular, which describes a class that must be reckoned with. Indeed, when we analyze the figures relating to that class they show in the highest degree discouraging. The word "moron" is a scientific term which is now used to designate a feeble minded person, who is of a higher grade than an idiot, an adult with mentality of a normally developed child of from 7 to 12 years of age. There is no doubt whatever that mental capacity can be accurately graded by scientific processes. That fact was so clearly and conclusively demonstrated when we were organizing an army of four million men that the same tests have been continued by the military authorities of the United States. The tests were made by what can properly be termed laboratory psychologists. They were not tests of general information, nor primary tests of memory or rapidity of mental processes, much less of literary proficiency, but were tests of intelligence, the power to reason, to grasp a situation, and were administered to both the literate and illiterate. There were subjected to the tests 1,235,566 drafted men. Of that number 22 per cent of the population, as rated at the mental age of 9 years or less, and 47.3 per cent were rated at a mental age of 12 years or less. That is no moron. Of the entire negro draft 89 per cent were graded at the mental age of 12 years or less. Those who have carefully analyzed all the figures concerning the problem reach the conclusion that the proportions would apply to our whole population. Whether the moron or not is not of course be surely determined, but when more than half of nearly 2,000,000 grown men are found to possess no higher degree of mentality than a 12 year-old child, it is furnished for serious thought. Of course, just to the extent that the population is mentally incapacitated for proper discharge of the highly important duties of citizenship to the same extent is the burden of responsibility put upon the rest of the population, and the query has been put, why instead of an age test for voting we should not adopt a scientific intelligence test? A very interesting contributor to one of the oldest, best known and most conservative of American magazines, after analyzing the figures and considering the facts, makes the following very forcible observations: "Such individuals (the morons) form the bulk of the army of the ignorant, and which mobs are made, the tools of demagogues, for they are peculiarly liable to the emotional uncontrol which has been found to characterize so many criminals who come before our courts. They are persons who not only do not think, but are unable to think; who can not help in the solution of our problems, but instead become a drag on the progress of civilization. In a crude society they have a place, may even serve a use, but in a society so complex as that which we are developing, they are a menace which may compass our destruction."

Sherman Democrat: President Harding's appeal to the churches of all denominations to use their mighty influence for obedience to the law and religious tolerance, takes cognizance of the unsettled state of mind prevailing among all classes of citizens. Groups of citizens in many states are taking law enforcement into their own hands, ignoring the proper authorities and individual rights, and groups of citizens in many states are flagrantly breaking the law. Among workmen there is still a deep seated feeling of dissatisfaction with conditions generally. Certain forces are trying to keep up wages in opposition to the common welfare. Farmers are discontented with prices and circumstances. Industrial interests are not unlike the workmen in their distorted ideas. The same disturbed state of mind is evident in congress. Everybody is at cross purposes with affairs. On the other hand, it is surprising to what extent merchants all over the land are adjusting their point of view to the realities of business. Merchants everywhere declare that they have adopted to forget about their losses, reverses and troubles, and set themselves to the task of making money this year by hard work and small margin of profit. The churches can do much toward rectifying the general state of mind. The influence should be very effective, and it should not only affect the conduct favorably, but create a better and more rational sentiment in business, politics and society. Idleness and agitation have fostered the rancorous mental state that has existed for a long time. As soon as manufacture becomes active again, and men return to work, and there are evidences of normal, or comparatively normal, business conditions, the malcontent will pass away quickly. Men will be interested in their work or business. Basic conditions in commerce are nearly normal now. Strikes are the last spasms of the reactionary period. We may look for the normal state of mind when "trade gets going right."



DECREASE IN DAILY OIL PRODUCTION IN U. S. FOR THE WEEK

DECLINE OF 28,875 BARRELS IS REPORTED BY PETROLEUM INSTITUTE.

PRODUCTION AT MEXIA IS OFF 14,500 BARRELS

North Texas Shows an Increase of 350 Barrels For Past Week.

NEW YORK, April 12.—Daily average crude oil production in the United States decreased 28,875 barrels for the week ended April 8, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. The estimated daily average production for the week was 1,422,825 barrels, compared with 1,451,700 barrels for the preceding week.

The Oklahoma-Kansas fields' daily average gross production was 446,100 barrels, an increase of 1,900 barrels; North Texas showed an increase of 350 barrels; Central Texas Louisiana decrease of 22,500 barrels; a decrease of 15,600 barrels; North and Arkansas an increase of 850 barrels.

SMALL CROWD ON HAND AT LEGION BOXING CARNIVAL

Pal Brown Stops California Beasley In Fifth of Scheduled 10-Round Bout.

A crowd that was anything but satisfactory from a numerical standpoint, but which made up a degree in enthusiasm what it lacked in size, turned out for the American Legion boxing carnival in the Legion hall Wednesday night. Four of the five scheduled bouts were offered, the fifth being withdrawn at the last moment when the small gate failed to justify its being presented.

Hostilities opened with a four-round scrap between Bill Finger and Louie King, local negroes, went on a four-round tilt which ended in a technical knockout for the former in the second. The referee, who failed to identify himself, finished out the fight and had decidedly the better of the argument.

K. Stanton of Cordell, Okla., and Ken Snyder of Burk Burnett, weighing in at 115 and 115 respectively, went four lively rounds which might have constituted a good fight had it not been for too much clinching. Both boys hit hard. They were given a draw, although it appeared that Stanton had a shade the better.

Brown Kayes Beasley. In the concluding round of the night, scheduled for ten rounds, Pal Brown of Burk Burnett, Okla., and California Beasley in the fifth. The first two rounds were even, but in the third and fourth Beasley weakened perceptibly. He went down a count of six in the fourth and drove up in the fifth.

Bob Veach Is a Slugger of the Old Time School

There is only one 100 per cent natural hitter in the American league and he is Bob Veach, left fielder of the Detroit Tigers.

Napoleon Lajoie led the batmen, free swingers became about as removed from baseball as the dodo from this earth. Lajoie was a natural batsman, probably the greatest that ever faced a pitcher. Lajoie's success prompted batmen to accept the free swing. The popular method at bat, Lajoie passed and in his place came Tyrus Raymond Cobb, the game's greatest scientific batsman. Cobb never has been a natural batsman, never a free swinger. He is a chop batter, meeting the ball in front with a chop stroke.

His success brought about a change in batting style and the newcomers followed his example. The great batmen that struck along with Cobb, the speaker, and others are all exponents of the chop stroke, all scientific hitters.

The natural hitter "takes a nasty cut at the ball" in the variance of the sport. "He swings from the ear with a perfect follow through." Veach is the only man in the American league that does this today. No matter what pitcher he opposes, what situation he happens to find himself in, Veach always swings with the same motion, always takes a long cut, "from the ear."

Babe Ruth, greatest slugger of all time, is frequently classed as a natural batsman. Ruth is a free swinger more than anything else, but not a 100 per cent free swinger. Not infrequently Ruth changes his batting style, slapping the ball, which is another form of the chop stroke. Most of the time, though, Ruth takes the nastiest cut in all history.

List of the Sluggers Harry Heilmann, batting champion of the American league for 1921, is an almost perfect free swinger, but occasionally he switches to the chop stroke. New York has several players classed as free swingers, Bob Meusel, Wally Pipp, Frank Baker and Willie Schang.

Larry Gardner and Steve O'Neill are Cleveland's slugging duo. Ed Hahn and Johnny Mostil are the Chicago members. St. Louis, with its array of heavy sluggers, can list but two, Williams and Collins.



VERY STRICT RULES DRAWN FOR BRONCO BUSTERS IN RODEO

The rules for the cowboy bronco busting contest of the Roundup which will be staged at the ball park May 2, 3 and 5, according to an announcement by Tom L. Burnett, producer, will be more strict than the rules governing any contest of this kind in this part of the country in many years.

According to Mr. Burnett, some years ago many of the bronco busters who are regular contestants at the various meets began having their own saddles made to order, and this developed in time to where some of them were using what is termed freak saddles. Some of the old-time bronco riders began criticizing these saddles and some of the old-timers have even gone so far as to say that the present day bronco riders are not as good riders as the old-timers. In this Mr. Burnett stated that he thought they were in error and that he believed that the present day crop of bronco riders were probably a little advanced over the old-timers and to prove whether or not he is correct he has had made a number of special saddles similar to the old style cowboy stock saddle and this type will be used by all contestants in the bronco riding of the roundup.

The rules, however, are so strict that none but the most proficient in the art of staying above the hurricane deck of a bucking broncho will have any business entering the contest. The rules call for one rein only, this must be held straight in the hand and not knotted or wrapped around the hand. The riders must leave the starting place with both feet against the animal's shoulders and must keep their feet moving in a kicking motion all the time, and while so doing the rider for an instant pull either foot out of the stirrup then he is disqualified and out of the running. The rider must not touch the horse with his hand or even with his hat, he may fan the bronco all he pleases so long as the hat does not touch the animal; he must further not change hands on the rein or drop the free hand below the waist line.
