mum interest rate and thus provide needed funds. Of equal significance, Burleigh says, are a number of actions taken by the recently adjourned Texas Legislature with respect to practical support for Texas water programs and Tex-

The Legislature took two main actions of special significance: actions that will quite probably enable Texas to continue an orderly development of intra-state water use programs, regardless of dwindling congressional funds for this

as administrative agencies con-

cerned with these programs.

First, the legislature authorized the Water Development Board to sell an additional \$200, 000,000 in bonds, previously constitutionally authorized by the electorate, to support continued state financing and construction of needed Texas water supply projects.

The Board has already financed--and committed to finance -- 43 projects of this nature at a cost of \$112 million. With the new funding capacity plus a residual of \$85 million from earlier bond authorization, the state has approximately \$285 million to continue financing integrals of the broadly based overall statewide water programs.

Secondly, the recent legislature removed restrictions on the Board's dollar investment in water supply projects. Heretofore, Board financing was limited to projects costing no more than \$30 million. The Board can now help finance water supply projects of a size that heretofore often required reliance upon federal financing -- a money source that, as noted. has steadily dwindled under present federal policies.

. . . . Cooperation by the state and federal agencies on water matters of mutual interest should continue, however, according to the Water Development Board official.


Close rapport has been exhibited in recent months among the Texas electorate, the legislature, and state-level administrative agencies concerned with our water matters, and this should enable federal-state cooperation in water matters to proceed in an orderly manner and at a rate that the times demand, Burleigh predicts.

The City of Friona has applied for federal funds in the improvement and enlargement of its sewer plant. The action by the voters last May vested the Texas Water Development Board with management of the \$100 million Water Quality Enhancement Fund.

Creation of the fund makes Texas towns and cities eligible for increased federal participation in the construction of sewage treatment facilities, and reduces costs to local entities.

The city of Friona began taking steps toward application for the participation shortly after the passage of the new constitutional amendment.



Farm Safety Week **Declared By RMN**

President Nixon has designated the week of July 25, 1971, as National Farm Safety Week. The rate of accidental deaths in agriculture remains second only to that of the construction

President Nixon has urged "farm families and all in the rural community to make every effort to reduce accidents occurring at work, home, in recreation and on the highway." National Farm Safety Week, 1971, has more significance this year than before. The enactment of the Occupational

Safety and Health Act, 1970, places special responsibility upon employees of the Department of Agriculture to promote safety and accident prevention in rural areas. The Act requires the U.S. Department of Labor to establish and administer safety standards for workers in many fields, including agriculture. This Department has a special responsibility to work with the Department of Labor, farm organizations,

lation in agriculture in ways that will recognize the special needs and problems of farmers and achieve genuine reductions in farm accident rates. Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin has established a USDA Task Force on Safety in Agriculture. The Task Force will provide special assistance to agencies of the Department in meeting its responsibility in helping reduce loss of lives

AN EDITORIAL Farming Ranks High As Hazardous Work

For many years farming has ranked as the third most hazardous occupation. Only mining, including quarrying and petroleum drilling, and construction have higher death rates. In general the death rate from accidents has followed national trends, decreasing steadily since the turn of the century.

But where the rate on farms was once below the national average, in recent years it has been higher. And the difference appears to be increasing.

National Farm Safety Week, July 25-31, is an opportune

home and public accidents -- the three largest accident categories nationally -- hit farm residents about as hard as the rest of the country

It is in work safety that farming lags behind. Work accidents are second only to motor vehicle accidents among farm residents, comprising 31 per cent of the total.

Other industries have developed safety procedures that have made work accidents the smallest of all four canegories ... accounting for 15 per cent of the nation's accident toll. These same procedures, put to work on the farm, can bring farm safety back into line with the national record.

A farmer must be many kinds of a craftsman, He often is called on to be a carpenter, an electrician, a mechanic. He uses fuels, chemicals, fertilizers, and many different kinds of

To work safely he must know and follow the safe practices developed in many different industries.

In most industries, employees' mistakes are noticed and corrected immediately. But much of farm work is done away from direct observation and supervision. Too often, an unsafe act, unseen and unrecognized, becomes a habit instead of being corrected promptly. These bad habits must be discovered and replaced with proper methods.

National Farm Safety Week is not a week in which to be more KVII-TV (Channel 7) produccareful, then to be forgotten until next year. Instead it is a time effective in other industries, and to seek out better and safer wavs to do our jobs.

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

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

Considerable publicity has been given to Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis and its impact upon Texas', and potentially the nation's horse industry. Since mosquitoes are considered to be the prime vectors of this serious disease which attacks horses and, in a milder form humans, Federal, State and local officials are marshalling their forces in determined efforts to provide large-scale mosquito control where these pests are a problem.

Area control programs consisting of larviciding, spraying and fogging can effectively reduce mosquito populations. Individual homeowners can help greatly to destroy mosquitoes and possibly prevent the spread of VEE by eliminating mosquito breeding areas on or near their own premises.

less they are in water, so all standing water around houses should be eliminated or treated. Mosquitoes frequently breed in commonly overlooked containers such as old tires, tin cans, jars, tubs, birdbaths, unused fishponds, evaporative coolers, or even on a flat roof where water accumulates. Also, septic tanks are ideal breeding places unless they are kept tightly covered. Standing puddles can be treated with a household insecticide or a small quantity of kerosene or diesel fuel, but avoid treating animal's

drinking water. Spraying shrubbery, eaves of the house and around windows and doors with malathion will help control hiding mosquitoes and prevent them from entering homes. If there are places around your home where mosquitoes breed you may be raising the very mosquito which could bite you or your horses to transmit VEE.

The crop insect situation throughout the county is not building quite as rapidly as was expected. However, it is still a major threat and should be closely watched. Corn aphids and greenbugs are not building up their population as they have in years past. Banks grass mites are working in both corn and grain sorghum earlier than last year. They should be watched closer and prevented from building into damaging numbers. These insects can do more damage than the greenbug if a complete outbreak of them oc-






