Police say Dr. Shipley was checking Mrs. Shipley, an invalid, when his son stepped up behind and fired a shot into his neck. Mrs. Shipley made a statement defending her son.

HOUSE PASSES BILL AUTHORIZING FUNDS FOR ROAD BUILDING

WASHINGTON, May 1.—By a vote of 291 to 131, the house today passed a bill authorizing an appropriation of \$45,000,000 for road building for the year beginning next year and \$75,000,000 for the year after.

130-CARRIERS FROM DEEPER SAND GIVES ELECTRA NEW BOOM

Flowing at the rate of 1,200 barrels a day from the recently found 1,800 foot sand the Texas company No. 215 on the Waggoner tract in the South-Electra pool came in early Sunday morning, making the deepest producer for this district since the days of the discovery wells. This well marks the fifth completion from this depth, the first being finished by the Gulf Production company on the Collett land in the south part of the pool. The second well was completed a few weeks ago by the Texas company in section 10, T. 21 N., R. 12 E., S. 27 of the Griswold pool. It came in last week good for 1,000 barrels. Also on section 6, T. 21 N., R. 12 E., Harvey on the tract is now producing from depths in the vicinity of 1,000 feet. It is preparing to drill to a productive level.

ANY RECOGNITION OF RUSSIA DEPENDS ON 'SOUND' CONDITIONS

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Political recognition of a new government in Russia must await the establishment of "sound" business and social conditions there, Secretary Hughes declared today in response to a petition presented by a delegation of women who asked American aid toward Russian rehabilitation. "Political recognition," said Mr. Hughes, "is dependent upon the existence of a government that is competent to discharge its international obligations. This whole matter is in the control of those who dominate the affairs of Russia. We are most desirous to do what we can to aid in Russia's recuperation, but they must establish the basis of such recuperation."

FIRST DECLARATION OF THE POLICY OF THE U. S.

Reply is Given Special Significance in Diplomatic Circles. WASHINGTON, May 1.—The first formal declaration of the policy of the United States regarding Russia since recognition of the soviet republic, became a matter of prime importance at the Genoa conference. In view of the pending negotiations at the meeting Mr. Hughes' statement was given special significance in diplomatic circles.

MEMBERS SESSION OF LAWTON CHURCH LOYAL TO THE PASTOR

LAWTON, OKLA., May 1.—Resignation of the pastor, the executive committee of the First Presbyterian church here, with the announcement that it would complain to the Oklahoma synod against what it termed the action of the pastor, the Rev. Thomas J. Irwin, and a statement by the minister that members of a church faction were responsible for his abduction by three unidentified men late Saturday night, were developments today in the attempt of the church membership to have the Rev. Mr. Irwin removed. The commission of the governing presbytery will hear on May 3 charges against Mr. Irwin, alleging conduct unbecoming a minister.

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DRIVE TOWARD PEKING IS STILL RAGING WITH ARTILLERY IN ACTION

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Agreement by both General Wu Pei Fu and General Chang Tso Lin, rival Chinese leaders to examine Peking and Tientsin from the standpoint of military operations was announced in an official dispatch received by the Chinese legation today from the Peking government.

ARMED AND MASKED AUTO BANDITS ROB A BANK MESSENGER

OAKLAND, CAL., May 1.—Six armed and masked automobile bandits held up a messenger for the Central Bank of Oakland in a residential district today and robbed him of \$12,000, which he was taking in an automobile to a branch of the bank in North Oakland.

AMARILLO, TEXAS, May 1.—Governor Neff was summoned to appear before the grand jury of the 4th district court in session here today, but he left early this morning for Canyon to visit the West Texas State normal without taking any notice of the summoning. Governor Neff made two speeches here yesterday and made a statement on political matters. His expression could be obtained from him concerning the action of the grand jury here in summoning him to appear before it.

ALL RAIL LINES TO FORT WORTH OPENED FOLLOWING FLOODS

FORT WORTH, May 1.—For the first time in a week all rail lines into and out of Fort Worth are open today, following the subsiding of flooded creeks and overflowed rivers. The last section to be opened was that west of Sweetwater, where service was restored this morning. Passenger trains, which had been cancelled or removed from service a week ago, were restored today. The 200 transcontinental passengers, who spent a week in ranch houses around Aledo or remained in the mapped cars were moved yesterday and resumed their journeys west.

RAILWAY CLERKS IN SESSION IN DALLAS; LARGE ATTENDANCE

DALLAS, May 1.—Virtually every section of the United States was represented by delegates here today in the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees convened in eleventh annual convention which, leaders said, probably would continue three weeks. Delegates estimated more than 2,000.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, May 1.—Governor Neff's final decision in the request for commutation of sentence of Carl Parker, sentenced to hang in Houston next Thursday for murder of Mordie Conroy, is expected to be received tomorrow, Secretary Walthall announced today. The governor will be taking on an active speaking tour. Secretary Walthall expects a message announcing his decision. Pleas that executive clemency be granted were received by Walthall from Mrs. M. A. Gantt, of Houston.

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RIVER IS CHANNEL BETWEEN CUT BANKS SAYS COURT'S RULING

WASHINGTON, May 1.—The supreme court today declined to decide at this time what constitutes the south bank of the Red river—an issue in the controversy between Texas and Oklahoma involving rich oil lands—but in an opinion delivered by Justice Van Devanter declared the claim of Oklahoma to the bed of the river was not well founded. The court in a decision a year ago held that the south-bank of the river constituted the boundary between the two states but in today's opinion did not say whether the river bluffs or the "cut bank" was the boundary.

Lawton Minister Is Victim of an Attack Found Early Sunday

LAWTON, OKLA., May 1.—Both factions of his congregation here today were discussing the abduction Saturday night of Rev. Thomas Irwin, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, who was found lying in a mud-filled ditch 13 miles east of here shortly after midnight Saturday.

At the home of Senator J. E. Thomas, near Lawton, Irwin was taken for first aid, the minister stated that he was on his way to the home of a member of his congregation here Saturday night at about 8 o'clock when he was stopped by three men who he did not recognize.

A few minutes later, Rev. Irwin said he was thrown out of the machine into a mud hole and he lay on the road there for four hours, during which several persons in motor cars passed him while he lay there.

During the ride, he said, he heard one of the men say: "Let's do away with him now," while another member of the trio interceded for him with the words: "Don't kill him now. Give him one more chance to get out of town."

Mr. Irwin apparently suffered no ill effects from the experience and returned to Lawton early Sunday evening. He reiterated that although the three men were masked, he had no idea who his abductors were and said there was "nothing he could do in the matter until he found their identity."

The St. Rocco presbytery held a session in Mr. Irwin's church here last Wednesday and after hearing a report of a judicial committee, which had charges against the pastor, ordered that he be tried on May 9.

Four formal charges were preferred against the pastor. It was alleged that he had caused his usefulness as a minister for being responsible for alleged "disorders and deplorable conditions" in his church.

Mr. Irwin founded the First Presbyterian church here in 1882 and since that time has filled the pulpit.

Mr. Irwin declared recently that he had been made to feel that he was being intimidated and forced him out of Lawton. He said three men confronted him as he was leaving the church on Sunday night.

BUSINESS OUTLOOK MORE ENCOURAGING SHOWN BY SURVEY

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Increased production, more stable prices and a large export trade are shown in the survey of current business issued today by the commerce department.

"From the figures available in recent months," the department said, "it is clear that fundamental conditions are much better, and conditions should gradually work better all around."

Building materials were more active, exports of copper, wheat and beef and other food products were lighter, and while there was a slight increase in wholesale prices, retailers showed a relative decrease.

23 GRAND JURORS IMPANELED IN U. S. DISTRICT COURT

JUDGE JACK INSTRUCTS JURY AS TO ITS DUTIES MONDAY MORNING.

Forty Petit Jurors Answer to Roll Call and Are Sworn In For Two Week's Service.

Only two out of 30 men summoned as grand jurors for federal court after the adjournment Monday morning. Five men were excused by Judge George W. Jack, and the remaining 23 were sworn in and instructed.

The Wichita Falls division of the United States district court here on Monday morning opened at 10 o'clock. Judge Jack of Shreveport, La., will occupy the bench until May 15, he announced, at which time another judge will come to take his place.

In instructing the grand jury, Judge Jack stated that there were a large number of alleged violations of the national prohibition law on the docket but that as a whole the law was being enforced throughout the country.

"There would be no bootleggers," Judge Jack said, "if there were no buyers. Both the seller and the purchaser violate the law. Of course it is natural that the law looks a little more harshly on the seller because he does so for mercenary reasons while the purchaser does so to appease an appetite."

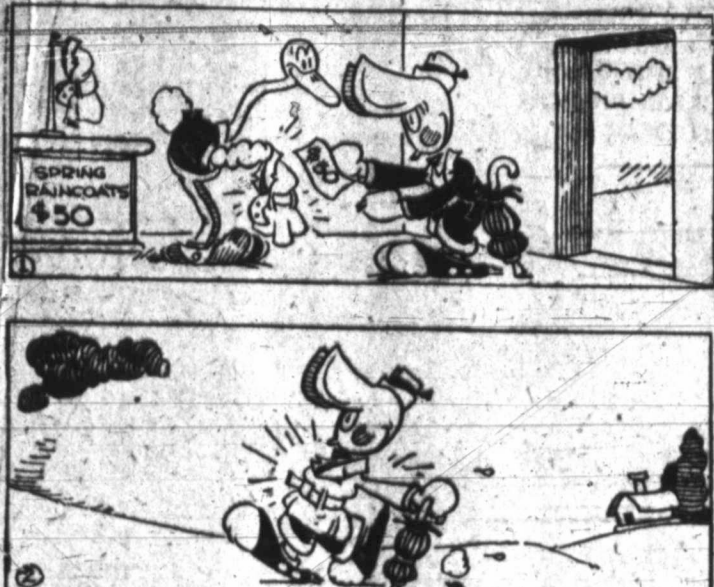

WHITE SOX PITCHER IN PERFECT GAME

Not One Tiger Reached First Base With Robertson On the Mound. CHICAGO, May 1.—Charley Robertson, Chicago American league pitcher, entered baseball's hall of fame today by pitching a perfect game against Detroit. Robertson obtained by the White Sox from Minneapolis, paralleled the feat of Addie Joss, hurling pitcher for the man who became the sixth in nearly a half century to turn back 27 consecutive batters. Robertson was given faultless support, particularly by McClellan and Collins, whose snappy fielding retired six Tigers at first. Collins also retired four on flies. Only six balls were driven far into the outfield.

ROBERTSON SIXTH HURLER TO PITCH A PERFECT GAME

CHICAGO, May 1.—Charley Robertson, White Sox hurler, who yesterday inscribed his name on baseball's record of the most illustrious when he pitched a perfect game against Detroit, is a rookie so far as major league baseball is concerned, for he is no juvenile wonder. It is the third try in the big league for the man who became the sixth in nearly a half century to turn back 27 consecutive batters. Robertson has been pitching winning baseball in minor leagues for several seasons. He first came to the White Sox in 1917 from the Sherman, Texas, club and was turned back for seasoning. In 1918 he came up again. After the spring training manager Gleason thought he was not quite ready and notified Sherman to dispose of him. The Sox got no response from Sherman and farmed Robertson to Minneapolis of the American Association under an optional agreement. In 1921 he pitched a perfect game for the White Sox in 1918, with an additional \$1,750 to be paid if he kept him. Apparently there was no Sherman club and the money was not paid. This spring the Sherman club came to life, demanded the payment, and the Sox, rather than fight the case, settled. Atop Robertson's name in the baseball, no-man-to-first column in baseball's hall of fame are these names: George Brilly, St. Louis, July 18, 1876, against Hartford; John Richmond, Worcester, June 12, 1880, against Cleveland; John M. Ward, Providence, June 17, 1880, against Buffalo; Cy Young, Boston, May 5, 1890, against Philadelphia; Addie Joss, Cleveland, October 2, 1891, against Chicago; Los Angeles architects have formed an association to assure better building in this city.
