BANKERS FAVOR THE REAPPOINTMENT OF GOVERNOR HARDING

WANT THE FEDERAL RESERVE BOARD REGARDED AS CONTINUING BODY.

OPPOSE MAKING PLACE A POLITICAL FOOTBALL

Personnel Should Not Change With the Administration, is Opinion Advanced.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—The question whether the present head of the federal reserve board, W. E. G. Harding, shall be reappointed has become the subject of rapidly increasing interest. This interest first arose among politicians and has spread among bankers and business men. It centers primarily of course, on Governor Harding as an individual and on his record as president of the public officials; but in its later manifestations the discussion is based more largely on the broader issue of the non-partisan quality of the reserve board, its freedom from politics and, in general, its position as a kind of supreme court in the world of banking and business.

Before his appointment by President Wilson, he was a banker at Birmingham, Ala. At the time President Wilson left office and just before President Harding entered the white house, it is understood that Governor Harding proached President Harding with the suggestion that if his resignation were desired it would be tendered. The federal reserve board was a new institution, which had arisen during Wilson's administration, and there was no precedent as to whether or not the head of it would be expected to give the new president the opportunity to name a new man.

Some departments of the government have one precedent, some another. It is generally expected, for example, that ambassadors to foreign countries shall always give a new president the opportunity to name his own man. In other departments of the government precedents are to the contrary. In the present case, when Governor Harding offered to make his resignation available, it is understood that President Harding took the position that the federal reserve board should be regarded as a continuing institution and that the head of it should not be expected to tender his resignation on the incoming of a new president.

President Harding's earned approval from all who were concerned with building up for the federal reserve board a standard for which he was appointed. The question now is, whether he shall be reappointed or whether President Harding shall name a different man. There has arisen throughout the country a formidable movement on the part of bankers and business men in favor of the retention of Governor Harding. This movement has been expressed in the possible attitude of using it as a leverage from which to rise to a later career in private business. In short, the movement which has for its object the reappointment of Governor Harding, would give to the federal reserve board the greatest possible sanctity and dignity, as nearly as possible the sanctity and freedom from self-interest and from all outside considerations that the supreme court has.

It is also true that in the past there has been a great deal of criticism of Governor Harding and of the management of the federal reserve board. Much of this opposition has been expressed on the floor of the United States senate. In fact, so many senators have at one time or another criticized Governor Harding and the operations of the federal reserve board, that some doubt has occasionally arisen whether Governor Harding if reappointed by the president would be ratified by the senate.

However, the opposition to Governor Harding within the senate has died down markedly and it is probable that if President Harding should conclude to reappoint him, the senate would not oppose him stubbornly. The criticism of Governor Harding first arose about two years ago when the federal reserve board began the process of deflation. This process worked much hardship in various sections of the country, not only to individuals, but to whole communities. There was no place where the feeling of resentment

It is the part of statesmanship to make every section of the state, from the piney woods to the plains, feel happy in its father's house. The 'give us by Houston and Austin is not too big unless the brood of men has become too small.'

CHICAGO, May 11.—

The modern high school girl is round, shoudered, flat footed and under-nourished, according to Dr. Caroline Hedger of the Elizabeth McCormick Memorial institute, who addressed the vocational education convention yesterday.

"Modern girls, it seems, have neglected their beauty," said Dr. Hedger. "They show a lack of rest, fresh air, play and good food. I find them with defective teeth and eyes, incorrect carriage and bad habits of exercise.

"One mistake parents make is to keep their daughters dependent upon them. A girl should be mentally weaned from the family life at the age of 18."

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STATE'S ATTORNEY OUTLINES CASE IN TRIAL OF GOVERNOR

WAUKEGAN, ILL., May 11.—Governor Small's trial on charges of conspiracy to embezzle state funds got under way this morning when C. Fred Mortimer, state's attorney of Sangamon county, began his opening address for the prosecution.

Mr. Mortimer told the jury the indictment charges the governor with conspiracy to "steal and defraud the state of Illinois out of a large sum of money, amounting to between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000."

The state's attorney explained the state's theory of the alleged conspiracy, linking the governor, Lieutenant Governor Sterling and Vernon Curtis, Grant Park banker. Mr. Mortimer traced the alleged conspiracy through the Small and Sterling farms in the treasurer's office and until the information leading to the indictments was placed before Attorney General Brundage early last year.

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ROCHESTER CONTRACTS PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS

ROCHESTER, TEXAS, May 11.—

A contract was closed this week between the citizens of Rochester and a Dallas firm to the effect that work is to be started inside of the next 30 days and completed in three months on the erection of a light and power plant, a bottling works and a steam laundry.



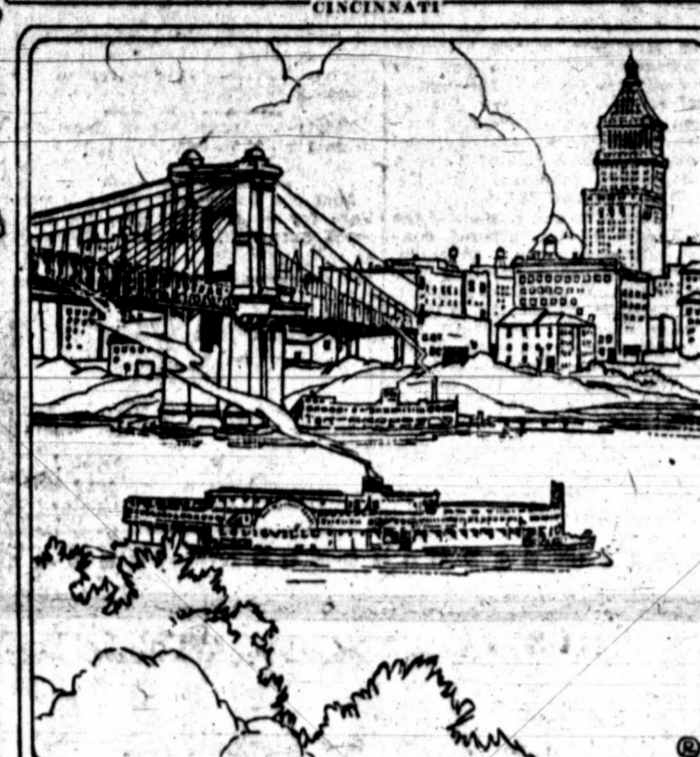
JUDGE KAY WILL SPEAK BEFORE THE TRADES COUNCIL

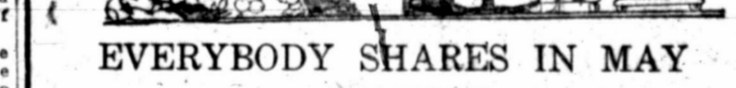

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FAIRVIEW PLANS TO ERECT A NEW TO ROOM

MISS SCHOOL COURSE TO BE OFFERED UNDER NEW PLAN

SUPERINTENDENT TO BE SELECTED BY TRUSTEES

It is the most important one in an annual of public schools of the entire state.

A new school for ten-room school building will be erected in the Fairview district of the county during the summer, according to the plan of the trustees and the board of directors.

A superintendent who will have complete control and supervision of the school in the district will be selected by the trustees and the board of directors.

Officials connected with the public school system of the state consider that this move on the part of the trustees in the Fairview district is one of the most advanced steps in the history of the public schools of the entire state.

The Fairview district has a scholastic census of over 150 and during the past school year, 31 teachers were employed in the district. The present school buildings will accommodate only 100 pupils, including the fifth grades and the sixth building will provide space for 100 more in the sixth to the seventh grades, including the eighth.

The course to be offered in the high school work will be exactly the same as offered in the cities of the state and will be of such caliber that an effort will be made at once to make it an accredited school, recognized by the higher institutions of learning.

The advanced step taken by the district has met with the hearty approval of county and state school officials. A gratifying part of the credit for this important and commendable step is due to the efforts of the three school trustees who are: T. E. McKinney, general superintendent of the Woodruff Oil corporation; C. E. Hubel, manager of the Ryan Petroleum company, and J. E. Davenport, a groceryman in Strington.

The trustees stated that it was their sole purpose to provide institutions of learning for the children of their district that would be on an equal and on par with that offered by any city in the state.

The Fairview district takes in that portion of the county known as Newton, Strington and Burdick corner, and surrounding territory. In addition to the erection of the new school building the trustees have ordered the purchase of a steam heat for all the buildings and the equipment as a whole will be modern in every respect.

At the close of the present school year a surplus of \$30,000 will remain in the school fund for the Fairview district. Tentative plans that have been arranged indicate that this will be a sufficient amount to defray all the expenses of the new building.

The trustees have decided, although not definitely to erect the new building near Bradley's Corner and Bridgetown as this is the most thickly settled part of the district. Transportation will be furnished the students from the other parts of the district according to plans.

The trustees will meet within a few days to select the superintendent of the district who will supervise the work of the entire district. The district however will remain a part of the rural school system and will not be an independent district.

CONTRACT FOR BRIDGE ON BRAZOS AT GRAHAM

GRAHAM, TEXAS, May 11.—The commissioners court was in session this week to receive bids for the construction of both a temporary and permanent bridge across the Brazos river four miles south of Graham. The contract was awarded a Dallas firm. This bridge is the main gateway to the Brazos oil field south of Graham and construction will begin at once and will be rushed with all possible speed. The commissioners court having ordered piling for the temporary bridge more than a week ago. It will be recalled that one pier and two spans of this bridge were carried out by high water on April 28.

J. T. TAYLOR IS NAMED ELECTRA POLICE CHIEF

ELECTRA, TEXAS, May 11.—J. T. Taylor, former night watchman, has been appointed chief of police by the city commission at a salary of \$150 a month. He succeeds City Marshal Ligon, who resigned. His application for the new position was made by R. T. Macy, who recently moved from Vernon to Electra, has been appointed assistant chief. Mr. Macy will act as night watchman. Authority has been given the police chief to appoint a mounted policeman. It is expected that the office will be filled at once.

ARRANGED FOR CROSSING RAILROAD AT OKLAHOMA

VERNON, TEXAS, May 11.—Prospects for the near determination of a time in which to commence the laying of pavement in the Colorado-to-Gulf highway in Willbarger county received a distinct impetus Monday through the receipt of word by local officials that a decision has been reached by the federal government in respect to the railroad crossing at Oklahoma, eight miles east of Iowa. An underpass to the tracks will be effected at the first bridge west of Oklahoma.

A. John Hubert, county engineer, will immediately commence a revision of his plans to accommodate the new arrangement. Upon their completion they will be forwarded to the state highway commission for approval. They will then go to the federal department maintained in Texas and for final approval will be sent to Washington, D. C.

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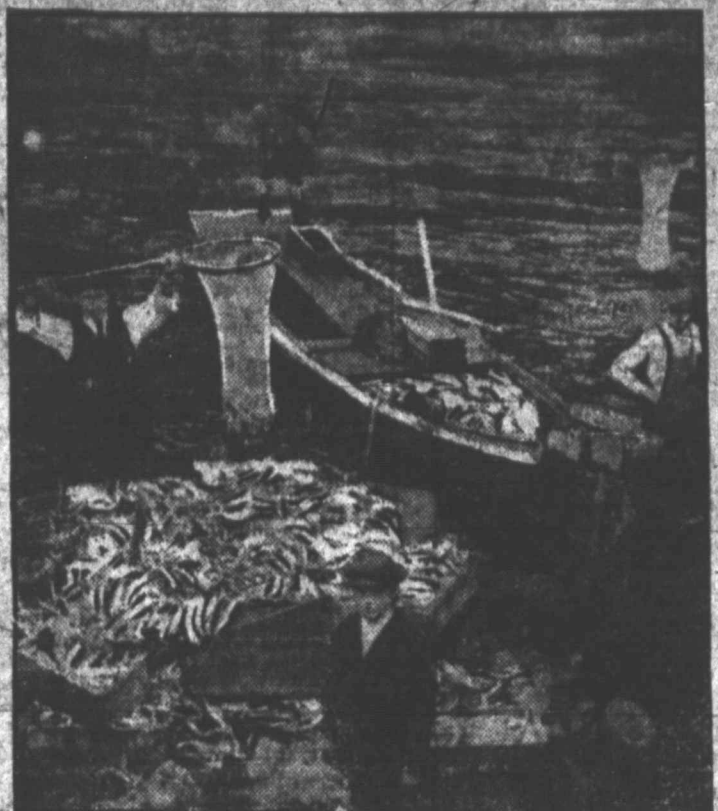
