WASHINGTON, May 11.—A new proposal for the lease and operation of the government's nitrate and power projects at Muscle Shoals, Ala., submitted by L. Stern, consulting engineer and manufacturer of Baltimore, was made public today by Chairman Norris of the senate agriculture committee, which is investigating the various offers already filed,

Mr. Stern offered to take over the properties for operation for "a term of 25 or 50 years or such other time as may be agreeable," to complete the plants at government cost, and to repay all expenditures already made at Muscle Shoals at the rate of two per cent annually. Power daveloped at the shouls would be used "to manufacture fertilisers to such extent as may be feasible" and

other products.

In addition to repayments, Mr.
Stern proposed to give the govern-ment sixty per cent of all net profits from operation.
"Our proposal allows the government," the letter said, "for all money expended, gives the farmers 110,000 tons of fertilizer at cost and

gives the government a large per centage of all profits derived, with benefit of private operation." Mr. benefit of private operation." Mr. Stern requested the committee if interested to call him before it for further investigation of the offer.

### ZEPPELIN FOR THE U. S. CREW MUST DELIVER CARNATIONS AND ROSES

By Associated Press.

VERSAILLES, May 11 Germany will manufacture a Zeppelin of 20,000 meters capacity to replace the one allotted to the United States by treaty, but destroyed in Ger-many, under the award of the ampassadors' council which allows America 3,000,000 gold marks in reparation.
