Had Been Arrested On Tuesday Night On a Charge of Theft Of Auto Supplies.

TEXARKANA, ARK., May 20.-This city was quiet today following the lynching last night of Hullen Owens, negro, by a mob who took him from the Miller county, Ark-ansas, jail, where he had been con-fined following the fatal shooting of R. C. Choate, policeman. Authorities nave made no announcement concerning what steps will be taken toward investigating the lynching.

Owens had been arrested Thurs-

owens had been arrested hursely ay night and placed in jail on a charge of theft. Yesterday afternoon he told Choate and Chief of Police Lummus that if they would release him he would show them where he had concealed stolen auto mobile appliances. Taking him at his word the officers accompanied him to an alley where he rummaged in a trash receptacle and suddenly in a trash receptacle and suddenly pulled out a gun. Chief Lummus drew his gun and

chief Lummus drew his gun and shot Owens in the face. The negro fled for three blocks with the officers in close pursuit. He hopped aboard an automobile and when Choats attempted to prevent his escape, the fugitive fired on him, it shots entaring his abdomen re-

Despite his wound from Lummus' Crowds gathered around the hos-pital while his injury was being dressed. Officers associated in getting him safely forthe jail but at about 8:20 o'clock a mob estimated at 1,000 stormed the structure, breaking down the heavy door with an iron battering ram and despite the remonstrance of officers, dragsed the wounded negro from his

Owens was taken to Offenhauser park, in the heart of the city and his body riddled with bullets. The mutilated corpse then was dragged to an open space near the union depot where a large quantity of kerosene sorked fuel was ignited. The body was thrown on the fire
