## MEXICANS THREATEN TO BOYCOTT AMERICAN GOODS

Former President Says the Retirement of POU Would Be Serious Loss

PARIS, May 23.—At the opening of the chamber of deputies today Andre Tardieu, who at one time was high commissioner to the United States, declared that America was largely responsible for the present economic troubles of Europe.

"Americans," he added, "in trying to make laws for Europe make a big mistake as we should if we tried to make laws for America."

One of the deputies who interrupted M. Tardieu, interpreted his speech as advocating "a Monroe doctrine for continental Europe." To this interpretation M. Tardieu offered no objection.

# HOUSTON HOTEL BURNS ESTIMATE LOSS \$250,000

## GOVERNOR WOOD ESCAPES A PHILIPPINE TYPHOON

## CALVESTON SHRINERS TO BE HERE JUNE 30 ON WAY HOME FROM COAST

HOUSTON, May 24.—Fire of undetermined origin which broke out in the Dodge hotel in the downtown section shortly after 3 o'clock this morning and raged for more than an hour, virtually destroyed the four-story building and threatened adjoining office buildings. Preliminary estimates placed the loss between \$250,000 and \$300,000.

Twenty-two guests registered at the hotel left hurriedly and scantily clad. Firemen were forced to hold one woman who wished to return to the third floor to rescue a canary.

When the fire was discovered persons on the two upper floors were apparently trapped and descended by fire escapes and ladders furnished by the firemen. Cartridges in a sporting goods store on the first floor of the building began to explode as the flames reached them and an explosion, probably from a keg of powder, broke many plate glass windows in the vicinity.
